Gina Neely touring to promote healthy eating

Celebrity Chef Gina Neely is traveling around the country to help individuals find different ways in which they can celebrate seafood.

Neely, known for her hit Food Channel Network show "Down Home with the Neelys," is a Seafood Ambassador with the Seafood Nutrition Partnership, a nonprofit with a mission to inspire a healthier America through partnerships that raise awareness about the nutritional benefits of eating seafood.

The tour arrived in the nation's capital on Wednesday, October 7, 2015.

"With seafood, many people feel it's overwhelming and they wonder whether they can cook it," Neely said in a web posting prior to her visit to Washington, D.C.

"We are encouraging people to eat seafood at least two times a week because it reduces your risk of a heart attack," she said, noting that being a Seafood Ambassador is personal because her father died of a heart attack.

With Neely aboard as an ambassador, the Seafood Nutrition Partnership has launched a national public health campaign, a three-year effort to educate Americans about the link between seafood nutrition and heart health.

The campaign will initially focus on nine cities with high rates of cardiovascular disease.

"We're going to Birmingham, Alabama; Lexington, Kentucky; Toledo, Ohio; West Virginia and other places," Neely said.

Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States, taking the lives of more Americans prematurely than any other preventable disease, organization officials said in a news release.

The grassroots education campaign was launched during October—National Seafood Month.

Neely says the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services dietary guidelines include eating seafood twice a week. Research has revealed that such a diet reduces the risk of heart disease by 36 percent.

Last year, the Seafood Nutrition Partnership concluded its "Eating Heart Healthy" pilot program, which was conducted in partnership with Brigham & Women's Hospital in Boston targeting low-income women with a high rate of cardiovascular disease. The program was designed to help women curb their risk of heart disease through a seafood-rich diet.

For four weeks, female residents of Roxbury Tenants of Harvard, a nonprofit affordable housing community for low- and moderate-income families, participated in heart health focused talks and cooking demonstrations, sampled omega-3 capsules, and were provided seafood recipes that can feed a family of four for \$10 per meal.

At the end of the program, it was esti-

mated that 92 percent of participants lowered their risk of sudden cardiac death, and 6 in 10 participants were at a lower risk for general cardiac problems.

"I try to eat well, but it's difficult to cook healthy meals when you work full-time," said Jacquie Boston, an Eating Heart Healthy program participant and resident of Roxbury Tenants of Harvard. "The Eating Heart Healthy program transformed my life and my family's life. Now, I have the skills to prepare heart healthy meals."

Neely, who recently turned 50, says she changed her eating habits because she "wants to be around to partner with people who are all about health."

"It fell right into my hands," Neely said of her ambassadorship with the Seafood Nutrition Partnership. "Everything you put in your body should be good and we should exercise because our heart is like an engine and just like a car, we've got to keep it moving and take care of our body."

Alabama's New Jim Crow Far from Subtle

In Alabama, 50 years after Selma, voting rights are once more under assault. Even as Alabama finally took down its confederate flags this year, it has raised new obstacles to voting.

The Supreme Court's decision in *Shelby County v. Holder* to gut the Voting Rights Act, supported by the five conservative justices alone, opened the floodgates to legislation in over 21 states erecting new obstacles to make voting more difficult. These have included limiting the days for early voting, eliminating Sunday voting, requiring various forms of ID, shutting down voting sites and more. Alabama—the home of Selma and the Bloody Sunday police riot that spurred the passage of the original Voting Rights Act 50 years ago—is one of the leaders in the new forms of voter suppression.

Alabama passed a bill, requiring for the first time, a photo ID to vote, affecting African Americans, the poor, the young and the old disproportionately. Now Alabama is using a budget squeeze to shut down 31 satellite offices that issue driver's licenses, the most popular form of voter ID. This new Jim Crow isn't subtle.

Al.com columnist John Archibald reported that eight of the 10 Alabama counties with the highest percentage of nonwhite registered voters saw their driver's license offices closed. "Every single county in which blacks make up more than 75 percent of registered voters will see their driver license office closed," Archibald wrote, "Every one." First the state demands that you get a photo ID, and then it makes it harder to do so, particularly in areas heavily populated by African Americans. Not surprisingly, civil rights activists are asking the Justice Department to intervene.

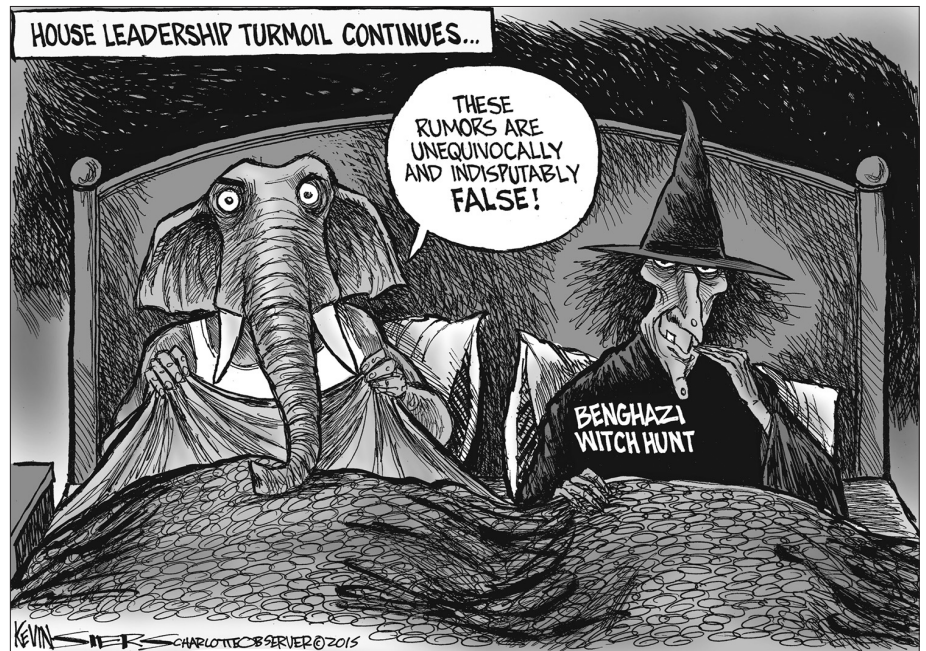
Rep. Terri A. Sewell, who represents Selma and is the only Democratic member of the Alabama congressional delegation, called the restrictions "eerily reminiscent of past, discriminatory practices such as poll taxes and literacy tests that restricted the black vote." State officials claim that other ways of obtaining photo identification is available for voters. However this is Alabama, infamous for its segregationist history, for its rejectionist Governor George Wallace, for bloody Sunday in Selma, for the murder of four little girls in the bombing of the Birmingham church. Under the original Voting Rights Act, Alabama's measures would have required pre-clearance from the Justice Department.

With the bipartisan leadership of Rep. John Conyers, Sen. Pat Leahy, and Rep. Jim Sensenbrenner, a bill to resuscitate the Voting Rights Act is now pending in Congress, although it has yet to get a vote. It revives pre-clearance measures, applying them to states with five violations of federal law to their voting changes over the past 15 years. While the old law applied to nine Southern States and parts of several others, this standard would apply only to Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas.

Yes, Alabama would still be exempt from pre-clearance as would other states with an extensive history of voting discrimination such as North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Arizona and Virginia.

The right to vote is fundamental to any Republic. Voting should be facilitated, not obstructed. We should register citizens automatically. Early voting should be extended and easy. Voting day should be a holiday, so workers have time to cast their votes. American voting rates are scandalously low, largely because we make registration and voting so difficult.

It is particularly outrageous that 50 years after Selma, when the country celebrates the courage of the civil rights marchers, we still witness efforts to suppress the vote, skewed to discriminate against minorities. Alabama's actions demand a Justice Department investigation—and that demand should be met immediately!

Famed Activist Angela Davis to deliver Margaret Brent Lecture at St. Mary's College

St. Mary's City, Md.— Political activist, scholar and author Angela Davis will deliver the 2015 Margaret Brent Lecture at St. Mary's College of Maryland on Thursday, October 29, 2015 at 4 p.m. in the Michael P. The lecture entitled, "Racial Justice, Feminism and the Prison Industrial Complex," is sponsored by the St. Mary's College Women, Gender, and Sexuality Studies Program; Office of the President, Lecture & Fine Arts Committee; and Center for the Study of Democracy.

Davis is an iconic civil rights activist and social justice advocate whose work as an educator in the university and the broader public sphere has always emphasized the importance of community-building in struggles for economic, racial, and gender justice. Her recent work has focused on social problems



associated with mass incarceration and the general criminalization of impoverished and minority communities. She is the author of nine books, including her most recent "The Meaning of Freedom and Other Difficult Dialogs." Davis is Distinguished Professor Emerita of the History of Consciousness and of Feminist Studies at the University of California, Santa Cruz.

The Margaret Brent Lecture Series was established at St. Mary's College in 1981 to honor distinguished public service among women. Margaret Brent was a single, economically self-supporting businesswoman and landowner in St. Mary's City in the mid-1600s. She was an unofficial legal advocate and representative, organizer of the defenses of St. Mary's City, and is best known for her request to the governor for the right to vote.

No Due Process for ‘Standing While Black’

Is Patrick Lynch, president of the New York Patrolmen’s Benevolent Association, obliged to defend his members even when they are wrong? The open letter posted on the PBA website and printed in the New York Daily News lacks credibility and contributes to the fractured state of police-community relations. He has cautioned the media, and others, about rushing to judgment of James Frascatore, the walking assault machine that tackled former tennis star James Blake, put his knee to Blake’s back, and then cuffed him. This was captured by a security camera; the footage is ubiquitous online.

Lynch said, “No one should ever jump to an uninformed conclusion based on a few seconds of video.”

Lynch makes every excuse that he can for Frascatore and chides, “pundits and editorial writers” because “they have never faced the dangers that police officers routinely do.”

Comments about Blake’s false arrest

and further cover-up are “irresponsible, unjust, and un-American.” Lynch says Frascatore deserves “due process, not summary professional execution called for by editorial writers.”

Due process is the legal requirement that the state must respect all the legal rights due to a person. When did James Blake get due process? Frascatore tack-

led Blake with neither provocation nor even conversation. Either Lynch didn’t watch the video or he doesn’t care that there is a pugilistic police officer that has no regard for due process when he interacts with the public.

his comments in the wake of Eric Garner’s murder) has talked himself onto a limb with his passionate, but baseless defense of a police “officer.”

If there were due process, Frascatore would have been arrested for assaulting Blake. However, police officers accused of wrongdoing hide behind their uniforms and rarely pay for their crimes. If

led Blake with neither provocation nor even conversation. Either Lynch didn’t watch the video or he doesn’t care that there is a pugilistic police officer that has no regard for due process when he interacts with the public.

Frascatore should have been history in the NYPD some time ago. He has only been part of the NYPD for four years, yet five complaints against him have been filed with the Civilian Complaint Review Board (CCRB). All of these complaints involve the excessive use of force. Frascatore is fast with his fists (he is accused of punching people in the head, the mouth, and in the torso); tragedy would be compounded if he were using a gun. For all of Frascatore’s abuse of power, it took his assault of Blake to get him desk duty. Blake has very reasonably called for Frascatore’s firing. But loudmouth Lynch (consider

there were due process, a man with five complaints before the CCRB would have been put on desk duty, if not suspended or fired, some time ago.

The New York Daily News reported on a 2013 incident where Frascatore and two others followed bicyclist Warren Diggs home. Once there, they demanded identification from him and proceeded to punch him in the head and pummel his body— before he could retrieve his identification. Diggs’ significant other, Nafeesah Hines, saw part of the fracas and began recording it. She asked officers for their names and badge numbers— two complied but Frascatore refused.

When Hines went to move Diggs’ bicycle from the sidewalk and into their home, she was told that she was tampering with evidence and was arrested. The Civilian Complaint Review Board found

inconsistencies between Frascatore’s statements and the recording Hines made. It recommended, “retraining” Frascatore. Hines also sued the city for false arrest and settled out of court. Warren Diggs still has a federal civil rights lawsuit against the city.

The Diggs case reveals Frascatore as an accomplished liar who doesn’t mind breaking the rules. Just as there was an attempt to cover up the Blake arrest, there was also an attempt to justify the brutal assault of Warren Diggs and the false arrest of Nafeesah Hines. Due process, Patrick Lynch?

As Blake has so gracefully said, all police officers are not like Frascatore. He declined to accuse the NYPD, just the out-of-control officer. He accepted the apologies of the police commissioner and the mayor but he insists that something must be done about excessive force, and he has indicated that he might pursue a lawsuit otherwise.

The NYPD says they have spent millions on training and retraining. Did Frascatore ever get the training the CCRB recommended? Why not monitor those officers who have been “retrained” to see if they have changed their ways? Why not prioritize investigation of those with repeat complaints so that bad apples like Frascatore are terminated before they do more damage?

Patrick Lynch does his members a disservice when he excuses the behavior of officers like James Frascatore whose only due process should move him out of the NYPD. Due process means arresting Frascatore for assaulting James Blake.

In the mid-1970s, Pugh founded Baltimore’s first African-American business newspaper, The African American News, where she served as managing editor for seven years. Later, she served as the dean and director for Strayer Business College in Baltimore which has since become one of the most respected adult-focused universities in the country.

“The importance of events like this is that you have to take advantage of situations,” Pugh said. “Pass information on and understand what’s available to you.”

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International MSU student awarded NextGen Scholarship from local business

Carisse Lansiquot, a 22-year-old international student at Morgan State University (MSU), is the 2015 recipient of the NextGen Scholarship awarded by P.E.R.K. Consulting. The college junior is the second recipient of the \$1,000 scholarship sponsored by the Beltsville, Maryland based advisory firm.

The scholarship assists deserving international and non-citizen students residing in or attending a college in the Washington metropolitan area.

Andrena Sawyer, CEO and founder of P.E.R.K. Consulting, says 84 applicants representing 24 countries, including the United States and five continents competed for the scholarship.

Lansiquot's well-written essay about how much her mother inspired her influenced Sawyer to vote for the chemistry major. Sawyer says a four-person scholarship panel votes to determine who should receive the local scholarship. Along with other factors, Lansiquot's story revealed what the community can do for international students who need support.

"From her application, Carisse seemed to be a good balance of what it looks like when a student is grounded but when they're also very gifted. Her application gave us a picture of a very well-rounded student. She was a 4.0 student, but she was engaged in something like six or seven different activities," Sawyer said.

The scholarship money is intended for a school-related need, such as tuition, books or housing. Lansiquot, who offers mentorship to young women in high school who wish to pursue STEM degrees when she returns to her home in St. Lucia, says she feels blessed to be a NextGen Scholarship recipient.

Sawyer had the idea of starting the scholarship in 2013, when she started P.E.R.K. Consulting, although the philanthropic effort was not implemented until last year. She explained that international students are not eligible for (FAFSA) Free Application for Federal Student Aid, which is a primary source of financial aid for many students. For this reason, a NextGen Scholarship is not available to U.S. citizens.

Sawyer knows firsthand about the lack of resources available for international students.

"I am actually Sierra Leonean. I was born in Free-town. I lived there until I was about nine years old and so when I went to college, my status was an international student, even though I had been in this county for about 10 years at that point. I was still an international student because I wasn't a U.S. citizen," Sawyer said. "At our [P.E.R.K. Consulting] anniversary event last year in 2014, we asked people to donate [money], so all of the proceeds from that event went to the scholarship fund. That night we raised about \$700. This year

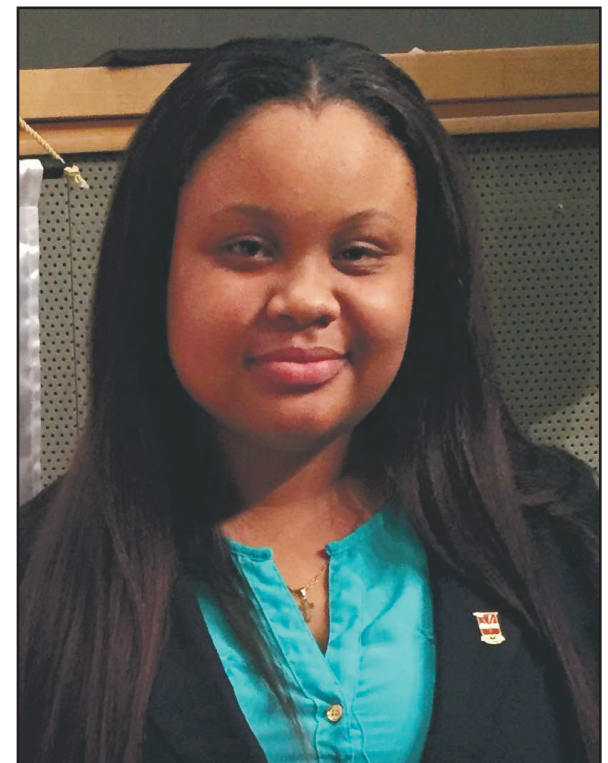
we pretty much did the same thing where we allowed people to donate at different events."

On Saturday, October 3, 2015, Lansiquot received her scholarship check and certificate of award during P.E.R.K. Consulting's annual professional development conference for women called "Embracing YOU Women's Conference" in Silver Spring, Maryland.

"I felt very excited when I found out [that I was selected as this year's scholarship recipient] because the money will go a long way in helping me to pay my tuition next semester," Lansiquot said. "All my family is from Saint Lucia. I am the only one up here."

Qualifying applicants for P.E.R.K. Consulting's NextGen Scholarship must have a minimum of a 3.0 GPA and be college-accepted high school seniors or current undergraduate international or non-citizens students attending a two-year or four-year college. Approximately 30 percent of this year's applications came from international students already attending a college in the United States and the majority of applications were submitted by international students who will attend college in the U.S.

In the future, Sawyer would like to see more local students apply for the scholarship. She estimates that an announcement for the open application period will be made through P.E.R.K.'s social media pages and website in mid-February. Upcycling, recycled clothes raise funds for home for pregnant teens

Tracy Yvette Arnold is a faith-filled woman who is on a mission to help pregnant girls and underserved young women in Maryland. On October 31, 2015 the CEO/community developer and founder of Arnold Place will receive keys to a home that is located at 801 Owens Rd. in Oxon Hill.

Arnold, who has always wanted to do something to benefit the less fortunate, will begin putting cosmetic touches on the transitional home that will open in November in Prince George's County. The transitional home is not government funded. Funds raised thus far for Arnold Place came from upcycling. Approximately 13-26 homeless pregnant teens and pregnant women ages 13-22 who have been diagnosed with HIV/AIDS can soon find refuge through the non-profit organization, Arnold Place.

"We just won't be offering housing. This is a holistic approach..." Arnold said.

A housemother will be on-site 24 hours. Counselors and other professionals will lead required weekly classes in areas such as financial literacy, personal hygiene, parenting and anger management. Older participants will be encouraged to finish high school, if they have not done so. Employment assistance will help prepare them for independent living. Foster care children may also reside at Arnold Place.

An online campaign requesting one million people to donate \$5 to Arnold Place through www.arnoldplace.org kicked off on October 12. Monetary donations will help Arnold to purchase the leased transitional home and contribute to operating costs.

Additionally, the goal of the One Million Upcycling Campaign is to collect one million pairs of shoes, one million pounds of clothing and one million pounds of empty plastic containers, such as shampoo bottles and hygiene products used by women. A recycling company pays Arnold for them. They use plastic containers for the construction of playgrounds, toys and strollers.

"People can donate (clothes) and they can have stains on them, holes in them,

missing buttons and anything like that. What happens is the recycling company gives us a dollar amount per pound. They recycle them and make new clothing and new shoes for third world countries," Arnold said. "We also collect women hygiene products from hair salons and anything that deals with a woman, whether it's a plastic soap bottle, a conditioner bottle, shampoo or dye—anything like that."

Arnold's innovative fundraising efforts are gaining momentum. Rosedale, Timonium and Glen Burnie, are among 14 Salon Plaza locations that support Arnold Place by collecting empty plastic containers used by hair stylists who rent booths. Collection receptacles are picked up when they are full. MGM Grand—a casino located in Prince George's

County—collects clothing for Arnold place. Arnold is a member of The Temple of Praise that is located in the District of Columbia. Her church has been a major supporter. Other business owners and churches have joined forces to collect items. In the future, Arnold will enhance fundraising efforts with creating a pop-up shop. A requested donation of \$20 for selecting five pieces of collected clothing items in excellent condition will be offered to bargain shoppers.

Why is Arnold so driven to give back? She is also a mortgage broker who once owned a successful company, Mortgage Consultants for Life (MCL). The company closed in 2010, due to the economy's downward spiral. Arnold lost seven homes and filed for bankruptcy. She never forgot how she was treated

while seeking help herself. Arnold says her idea was inspired by God. She recalls hearing about a defunct program in which empty toilet tissue rolls could be turned in for money. The entrepreneur was inspired to birth a new dream called Arnold Place.

"I want to be able to freely give back to these girls (and women) in a big way," Arnold said.

Alzheimer's Association's African-American Memory Loss Forum Returns to CSU

Timonium Md. – The Alzheimer's Association Greater Maryland Chapter will host the 11th Annual Pythias A. and Virginia I. Jones African-American Community Forum on Memory Loss, Saturday, November 7, 2015 from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., at Coppin State University located at 2500 W. North Avenue in Baltimore.

Over 400 family caregivers, health professionals, business leaders and policymakers are expected to attend the event, which is named in honor of the parents of State Senator Verna L. Jones-Rodwell, Ernestine Jones Jolivet, Alvin A. Jones, Pythias D. Jones, MD and the late Gilda Jones-Garrett, who were affected by dementia.

Research suggests that the prevalence, incidence and cumulative

risk of Alzheimer's disease appear to be much higher in African-Americans, and older African-Americans are about twice as likely to have Alzheimer's and other dementias than older whites.

Additionally, blood pressure and diabetes, which are more prevalent in African-American and Hispanic people, may increase one's risk for Alzheimer's disease and other dementia.

"Although the rate of Alzheimer's in African-Americans is higher than in white people, they are less likely to have a diagnosis," said Cass Naugle, executive director of the Alzheimer's Association Greater Maryland Chapter. "This Forum is an opportunity to speak directly to the African-American community about the disease, the risk factors, how to plan and what services are available."

Lisa Barnes, Ph.D. (Rush University Medical Center) will open the Forum with the plenary talk on the risk factors

for dementia in older African-Americans. Morning and afternoon breakout sessions will cover legal and financial planning, medication management, causes of dementia and how to diagnose them, healthy habits and managing caregiver stress.

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Thought We Were Writing the Blues

Teaneck, N.J.— “Thought we were writing the blues, but they called it rock ’n’ roll,” said Rose Marie McCoy during an interview for a radio documentary about her life and music. That statement became the title of her biography, the story of how an African American female broke into the white, male-dominated music business in 1952 to become one of the most sought after songwriters of the 1950s and ‘60s, greatly contributing to the crossover from segregated Rhythm & Blues to international Rock ’n’ Roll and paving the way for the female pop specialists who followed.

“I don’t know of any other songwriter that has accomplished what she has,” said Al Bell, former owner of Stax Records and past president of Motown Records Group. “Getting so many songs recorded by established artists: Ruth Brown, Elvis Presley, Nat King Cole, Aretha Franklin, James Brown, Sarah Vaughan, Shirley Caesar, Etta James, Dinah Washington. The list goes on and on. And look at the diversity of styles: gospel, blues, Rhythm and Blues, jazz, pop, country. It’s incredible what she has done.”

Though her legacy has caught the attention of the Smithsonian Institute, which is collecting information about her for its newest museum, the National Museum of African American History and Culture, scheduled to open next year, the Songwriters Hall of Fame has not yet honored her.

“I can only find two black female songwriters who have been honored so far by the Songwriters Hall of Fame, Sylvia Moy and Valerie Simpson. Both worked for Motown, but Rose Marie McCoy, being a fiercely independent woman, chose to make her way as an independ-

ent songwriter,” explains Arlene Corsano, Rose Marie McCoy’s biographer. “Without the backing of a large company she may never be inducted.”

Rose Marie McCoy’s last songs were recorded in 2013. Though she passed on in January 2015, her music lives on. Songs she wrote that were recorded

decades ago get new life as newer artists discover them. Rhythm & Blues songs that did not get much exposure in the 1950s are now used in movies and television shows. Efforts to petition the Songwriters Hall of Fame are under way and her story is now available in a book.

“Thought We Were Writing the Blues: But They Called It Rock ’n’ Roll” is not only a story of the music business, filled with behind-the-scenes of songwriters, musicians, mobsters and legendary singers, it’s also a heartwarming rags-to-riches story of a woman blessed with a great deal of talent, and just as important, the necessary personal qualities to become successful: determination, persistence, sell assurance, and the propensity to take risks.
