


## UMA hosts "Voices of Hope" recovery film, discussion


This event, presented by UMA Veteran Services along with Students Empowered to End Dependence (SEED), is



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## State of lung cancer report: Survival rates improve

AUGUSTA, ME -Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths here in Maine and across the U.S., but the American Lung Association's 2024 "State of Lung Cancer" report reveals positive news. The lung cancer survival rate has improved 26% in the last five years. The report also presents opportunities for Maine to further improve lung cancer survival by increasing access to screening and biomarker testing.

The organization's seventh annual "State of Lung Cancer" report highlights how the toll of lung cancer varies by state and examines key indicators throughout the U.S., including new cases, survival, early diagnosis, surgical treatment, lack of treatment, screening rates and insurance coverage of comprehensive biomarker testing.

The report ranked Maine in to top 10 best for Screening, Surgery, and receiving treatment, indicating that a higher percentage of residents were screened, report found that Maine underwent surgery and received some type of treatment than in most other states around the country. Unfortunately, the report also found that the incidence rate for lung cancer in Maine remains high, with the state having the sixth highest incidence rate in the country.

New this year, "State of Lung Cancer" examines health insurance coverage requirements of comprehensive biomarker testing across the U.S. Lung cancer biomarker testing sometimes referred to as tumor, molecular, genomic or genetic testing, looks for changes in the tumor's DNA. The results of the test may show biomarkers that can help determine what treatment options would be best for an individual patient. Insurance coverage of biomarker testing is important for removing a cost barrier to people with lung cancer, but coverage for biomarker testing is only required in some states. The

does not require insurance coverage of comprehensive biomarker testing. Although both chambers of the Maine Legislature passed legislation requiring coverage earlier this year with bipartisan support, the measure was one of several bills caught up in a legal procedural issue at the end of session and was not signed into law by the governor. The Lung Association looks forward to working with partners and the Maine Legislature to advance the measure in the 2025 session.

"Lung cancer is a devastating disease and impacts far too many families in Maine. To address the burden of lung cancer and to help improve the lives of people it impacts, we must continue to evaluate the greatest needs. This report helps us prioritize which areas to focus on to truly make an impact," said Lance Boucher, Division Assistant Vice President for State Public Policy for the

American Lung Association. "This year's 'State of Lung Cancer' report shows that Maine must focus on survival. Requiring coverage of biomarker testing can bridge the gap we are seeing between the increased rate for survival nationally, 26% over 5 years, to the 10% increase we've seen here in Maine. Together, we can make a difference."

The report found that Maine ranked:

44 out of 49 in the nation for rate of new lung cancer cases at 67.7 per 100,000. The national rate is 53.6 per 100,000.

25 out of 47 in the nation for survival at 27.5%. The national rate of people alive five years after a lung cancer diagnosis is 28.4%.

18 out of 47 in the nation for early diagnosis at 28.2%. Nationally, only 27.4% of cases are diagnosed at an early stage when the survival rate is much higher.

7 out of 51 in the nation for lung cancer screening at 21.2%. Lung cancer screening with annual lowdose CT scans for those at high risk can reduce the lung cancer death rate by up to 20%. Nationally, only 16% of those at high risk were screened.

9 out of 47 in the nation for surgery at 23.3%. Lung cancer can often be treated with surgery if it is diagnosed at an early stage and has not spread. Nationally, 20.7% of cases underwent surgery.

8 out of 47 in the nation for lack of treatment at 16.5%. Nationally, 20.9% of cases receive no treatment.

The 2024 "State of Lung Cancer" report highlights opportunities for states and the federal government to reduce the burden of lung cancer and encourages everyone to help end lung cancer. This year, the American Lung Association calls for the state to implement policies to require insurance coverage of comprehensive biomarker testing. The Lung Association also calls on Congress to pass the Increasing Access to Lung Cancer Screening Act (H.R. 4286).

In addition to addressing biomarkers, the Lung Association is calling on state lawmakers to continue to address leading risk factors that contribute to lung cancer. Radon exposure and tobacco use are the two leading causes of lung cancer and the rates for both in Maine are higher than the national average. "One of the most effective policies to reducing tobacco use is to raise the price of cigarettes by increasing the tax by \$2 per pack. It has been 20 years since Maine last raised the cigarette tax and lawmakers need to prioritize this in 2025 to help lower our adult smoking rate below the national average," said Boucher.

For my son, Adam, and me, fall is the season for our almost annual surf and turf. Surf and turf is loosely described as an overnight paddle trip combined with a mountain hike or hikes. Past trips have included Moosehead Lake and Mount Kineo, and Attean Pond and Sally Mountain. Last year, Tunk Lake and Black Mountain, part of Donnell Pond Public Lands, was the choice.

Donnell Pond Public Lands consist of over 14,000 acres of remote forested lands located in Hancock County. Several secluded lakes and ponds are surrounded by rugged scenic mountains. Numerous campsites have been established on the lakes and ponds and a network of trails lead from the campsites over and around the peaks. In short, the preserve is an outdoor paradise.

Most of the campsites can only be reached by wa-

mand decreases in the fall. We were optimistic since no one was at the landing when we arrived.

The tiny rustic landing is only wide enough for one vehicle. However, there is a spacious parking area nearby with a toilet.

Although some participants have brought canoes in the past, Adam and I use sea kayaks on surf and turf trips. We unloaded kayaks and gear before parking our vehicles. As we were leaving, two people arrived to remove a moored motorboat but still no competition for sites.

The paddle east across Donnell Pond was nothing short of glorious. The pond was mirror calm, the sun was shining and the fall colors were magnificent. Our primary destination, Caribou Mountain, dominated the eastern shore and Schoodic Mountain towered above us in the south. Beyond Caribou Mountain, the imposing cliffs on the southern exposure of Tunk Mountain was seen in the distance.

Several campsites are situated at a location on the eastern shore called Redman's Beach near a path leading to Caribou Mountain. A canoeist was camped at the western-most site when we arrived. He was bow hunting for the weekend and reported all of the remaining sites were vacant. We quickly claimed the site closest to the trailhead.

We changed into hiking clothes and began our trek on Redman's Beach Trail in a mixed hardwood and conifer forest. After 1.4 miles of rocky rolling terrain, we joined the Caribou Loop Trail.

Turning left, we climbed steadily on the southern shoulder of Caribou Mountain. After ascending steep ledges with sporadic views of Donnell Pond and Schoodic Mountain, we emerged onto a

lengthy predominantly forested ridge.

What constitutes the true Caribou Mountain highpoint was unclear since no summit marker was found. However, a location on the northern end of the ridge near spectacular east facing cliffs seemed to be the highest elevation. We descended until reaching a junction in a col between Caribou and Catherine Mountains. Here the loop trail turns right and the left drops to Dynamite Brook Road.

During our return to the campsite, we decided to change our plans for the following day. Instead of Schoodic Mountain, we intended to climb rugged Tunk Mountain. That would entail paddling back across the pond and driving a short distance to the Tunk Mountain Trailhead, still part of Donnell Pond Public Lands.

At the campsite, we gathered firewood, built

a campfire and spent a relaxing evening watching a brilliant sunset. No other campers arrived and no boaters were seen on the pond.


review read: "It's been many a long day since I've had so much pure (and I MEAN pure!) fun as I had watching this picture".



About a dozen home bakers will be bringing in a platter of their very favorite holiday cookies to put on display. The movable tables in AEkeir Brew Pub will be arranged for showing off the cookie submissions, and the tap room will be decorated for the season. The scene will be set to welcome the panel of judges, all local, professional bakers.

The CCC organizers, Monique McRae and Ann Clifford, both of whom work at First National Bank in Wiscasset, know what to expect. In 2023, the bake-off venue "was buzzing when the judges arrived to sample and judge the cookies," recollected Clifford. "Spectators were eagerly waiting for the judges to finish, especially the kids, so they could begin purchasing the cookies (by donation). The winning cookie was gone within minutes of the Challenge wrapping up."

Last year's judges "all took their judging very seriously," said McRae. Clifford agrees. "The judges tried each cookie, de-

liberated a bit, and scored each cookie on their individual score sheets. Each judge took time to judge not only the cookie, but the display in which the cookie was presented. For the most part, the scores were consistent amongst all the judges." In 2023, the judges were Anthony Weismann, a baker at Jodie's Restaurant; Daphne Cromwell, a well-known local baker under the name Dezerts by Daphne; and Brad McCary, a baker at Treats. According to McRae, two of the judges will be returning with a third new judge in 2024.

The suggestion of adding a Christmas Cookie Challenge to Marketfest weekend came up while brainstorming during a Marketfest planning meeting, but Clifford had a slightly deeper interest. "I'm addicted to the food network," she said, "and watch all the baking competitions." So as soon as the CCC was floated, she was on board. Noteworthy for Clifford was the variety and creativity, and the broad age range, of the bakers. In fact, it was a teenager, Emma Goodenow, who won the 2023 competition with her Peanut Butter Filled Sandwich Cookies, and rumor has it that she's preparing for a repeat win in 2024.

McRae is looking forward to the excitement of watching the cookie entries come in and seeing the bakers' creativity,

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#### MEMIC Group launches life-saving winter safety campaign

**PORTLAND, ME** – The MEMIC Group, Maine's leading workers' compensation specialist, has partnered with former WGME news anchor Kim Block to launch a comprehensive winter safety campaign aimed at preventing dangerous slips and falls on ice.

In 2021, the National Safety Council recorded over 42,000 deaths from falls, with older adults particularly vulnerable. Winter weather significantly increases the risk of slip, trip, and fall injuries, already a leading cause of injuries both at home and in the workplace. Recent National Council for Compensation Insurance (NCCI) data shows extreme cold conditions drive a 10% increase in workplace injuries and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that icy and snowy conditions contribute to nearly 70% of all workplace slip-and-fall incidents during the colder months.

MEMIC is urging employers and individuals to take proactive measures to prevent winter weather-related injuries.

The campaign holds particular significance as it features Kim Block, whose 39-year broadcasting career ended following a traumatic brain injury from a winter fall in January 2019. "In one single swoop, my feet came out from underneath me, and I landed hard. It was the back of my head that broke my fall," Block recalls. Despite more than a year of intensive therapy, her recovery continues to present challenges, leading to her departure from WGME.

"I know the power of sharing stories and experiences," says Block. "Though a traumatic brain injury nearly six years ago required me to step away from my role as an anchor reporter, it has not stopped me from trying to inform and help others. When MEMIC asked me to share my story to help others avoid life-changing falls on the ice, I was grateful for the opportunity." The campaign includes:

Television and digital advertisements featuring Kim Block running from mid-November through late winter

A winter safety webinar co-hosted by WGME and MEMIC safety experts A dedicated Walk Safe winter safety webpage featuring Block's story and safety resources

Weather alerts warning of potentially hazardous conditions "By implementing

effective slip, trip, and fall prevention strategies, especially when weather conditions contribute to potentially hazardous conditions, businesses can safeguard their workforce and customers during the winter months," says Rod Stanley, MEMIC Regional Director of Loss Control and Safety.

Susan Walther, General Manager of CBS 13 and FOX23, adds, "Our station has a deep connection with this campaign because we've seen firsthand how devastating a slip-and-fall on the ice can be. When our own veteran anchor Kim Block had to retire after suffering a traumatic brain injury from slipping on the ice, it really hit home. That's why we're honored to work with MEMIC on this initiative to raise awareness and help prevent these kinds of accidents."

MEMIC emphasizes that with more awareness and safer techniques, these injuries are almost always preventable.

## Maine delegation secures funding for lobster research

WASHINGTON, D.C.— U.S. Senators Susan Collins and Angus King, and U.S. Representatives Chellie Pingree and Jared Golden, are announcing the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Sea Grant Office's decision to award seven Maine projects with \$1,941,692 in funding for the American Lobster Research Program. The grant program supports projects that address critical knowledge gaps about American lobster and its fishery in a dynamic and changing environment.

"Maine's lobstermen and women have long demonstrated their commitment to maintaining and protecting a sustainable fishery in the Gulf of Maine," said the Maine Delegation. "This new investment of \$1.9 million for research will ensure that Maine's fishery will have the latest thinking to guide their work. From economic and technological advancements to research on how the warming Gulf of Maine is impacting lobster growth, this critical funding will ensure that fishermen and women, lawmakers, and scientists have they information they need to make informed decisions about the future of the industry.

As we have always done, we will continue to support federal initiatives that protect Maine's iconic fishery for generations to come."

The 2024 funding will be awarded to the Maine Center for Coastal Fisheries, the University of Maine, the Maine Department of Marine Resources, and the Wells National Estuarine Research Reserve. More specifically, the funding will support research studying the economic implications of changes to the ecosystem, molt indicators to inform machine learning, research into socioeconomic impacts of regulations on the industry, a project to tag lobsters and track them through their first year of life, and a study to follow optimal nutritional conditions for female lobsters and reproduction. Additional information on the

The 2023 funding was awarded to the Gulf of Maine Research Institute and Bigelow Laboratory for Ocean Sciences to support a deep analysis of population shifts in coastal Maine ecosystems and to compare patterns of epizootic shell disease in lobsters originating from the Gulf of Maine and Southern New England.

## Funding to expand rail, improve safety in Maine

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) of the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) announced that it has invested \$53.3 million in new rail grant funding in Maine. Nationally, more than \$2.4 billion in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funding is being invested in 122 rail improvement projects in 41 states and Washington, D.C. These projects will make rail safer, more reliable, and more resilient. getting goods and people where they need to be quickly with fewer disruptions, lower shipping costs and less pollution.

Administered through FRA's Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safearray of rail safety and service improvements eligible under this program, such as upgrading track, replacing or rehabilitating aging bridges, expanding rail connections at ports, adding modern locomotives to fleets, and more. The CRI-SI Program is also the only federal grant program prioritizing smaller, short line railroads vital to the American economy and regional supply chains.

This announcement is part of a series of investments the Biden-Harris Administration has made in nearly 300 rail projects and dozens of emerging passenger rail corridors across the country through Bipartisan Infrastructure Law-funded FRA grant programs. This marks the most significant investment in American rail in more than 50 years. "Today's investments in our rail systems reflect the Biden-Harris Administration's commitment to

building a stronger, safer, and more resilient transportation network," said U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg. "Through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, we're funding rail infrastructure projects that create jobs and expand workforce development, reduce costs for consumers, and directly benefit communities across the country. Each project advances a future where our supply chains are stronger, passenger rail more accessible, and freight movement safer and more efficient."

While the majority of CRISI grants directly improve rail infrastructure, CRISI investments are also supporting the rail workforce and investing in the opportunities, establish partnerships with universities, and advance innovative research. For example, one grant awarded to the Brotherhood of Railroad Signalmen will help develop an effective strategy for integrating wayside hot box detectors to enhance safety and proactively address derailments caused by wheel and bearing failures.

"Under the Biden-Harris Administration and through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, FRA is investing more than ever in communities nationwide, reversing a half-century of federal underinvestment in America's rail network and delivering the world-class rail our citizens deserve," said FRA Administrator Amit Bose. "Today's CRISI grants will enhance rail safety, better connect towns, cities, and ports, introduce more environmentally friendly locomotives, support the

current rail workforce, and provide workforce development opportunities essential to the future of our industry and the national economy."

Selected CRISI projects this round include:

Driving Maine's Rural Economy through Freight Rail Efficiency (Up to \$53,313,091)

Maine Department of Transportation

The proposed project was selected for Final Design and Construction and includes upgrade and repair of track infrastructure on the Eastern Maine Railway on behalf of the Maine Department of Transportation. The project aligns with the selection criteria by enhancing safety and improving system and service performance as the project will upgrade or replace approximately 97 miles of rail, installing crossties and ballast, replacing jointed rail with continuously welded rail, installing Equipment Defect Detectors, and making at-grade crossing upgrades to seven highway grade crossings, thereby improving operating speed, reliability, and safety conditions. Eastern Maine Railway will contribute the 20 percent non-Federal match. This project qualifies for the statutory set-aside for projects in Rural Areas.

In addition to deploying historic funding to modernize and upgrade rail infrastructure, USDOT and FRA have taken unprecedented actions under the Biden-Harris Administration to improve rail safety. This includes finalizing new safety regulations, conducting focused safety audits, expanding a vital safety program to include workers at Class I freight railroads, and pushing freight railroads to provide guaranteed paid sick leave to all of their workers.

Projects in this round of selections reflect the broad hardworking Americans who will help maintain and operate the Nation's rail networks well into the future. 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
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

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


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
