San Jose Unified **School District's Measure R** passes

\$1.15 billion provides funding for employee housing and building renovations

By William Bellou Publisher easure R, one of the largest school bond measures ever recorded at \$1.15 billion, has passed with nearly 65% of the vote. The measure sunsets in fiscal year 2054-55.

The San Jose Unified School District plans to spend the money building and supporting employee housing, renovating buildings constructed decades ago and repairing athletic facilities.

Measure R increases local property tax rates at an estimated rate of \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed property value annually for an estimated 30 years. Funding from the measure will support about 25,000 students at the district's 41 schools.

Brian Wheatley, a school board member and a proponent of employee housing, said he appreciates the community's support because the measure was a big lift with lofty numbers.

"Housing is the biggest issue we're facing in this valley," said Wheatley. "We have to be able to house our people because we want everybody to be able to live here and stay."

Measure R would increase local property tax rates at an estimated rate of \$60 per \$100,000 of assessed property value annually See MEASURE R, page 4

Second Harvest planning for future

Food bank again looking for new headquarters site By William Bellou

ilicon Valley's non-profit food bank, Second Harvest, is again Dursuing the construction of a modern headquarters and warehouse in San Jose after shuttering its warehouse facility due to an increase in rent.

The decision to establish a new headquarters was made after Second Harvest prevailed in a lawsuit that had sought to derail the project. Santa Clara County court dismissed the lawsuit with prejudice in June, 2023.

Organizacion Comunidad de Alviso, a South Bay group headed up by local activist Mark Espinosa, had claimed in its lawsuit filed in 2022 that city officials acted improperly when they approved the food bank's proposed warehouse in north San Jose.



for an estimated 30 years to allow the San José Unified School District (SIUSD) to; The \$1.15 billion in bonds funds four

categories of capital projects:

• Facility upgrades and repairs, including renovating or constructing new outdoor facilities, upgrading or providing new drop-off areas and parking lots, improving accessibility for students with disabilities, and upgrading fire sprinklers and alarm systems.

• New and upgraded facilities for teachers and district staff and electrification of vehicles, including constructing affordable housing for teachers and staff, purchasing federally mandated electric vehicles (EVs), and installing EV charging stations.

 Classroom and school upgrades, including adding classrooms to support transitional kindergarten programs, providing modern labs and career-technical facilities and equipment for students, and improving food service facilities.

• Technology upgrades, including acquiring and upgrading technology or equipment and expanding telecommunications, internet, and network connections.

The SJUSD Board of Education has sole discretion over decisions regarding the projects' scope, function, timing, location, and prioritization. As required by state law, bond expenditures would be monitored by an independent Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee, which reports directly to the public.

Second Harvest can now proceed with its headquarters and warehouse plans — although the project may well be revised.

"We are making progress on our new unified headquarters," said Diane Baker Hayward, a spokesperson for Second Harvest of Silicon Valley.

The proposed headquarters, office and warehouse complex would be built at 4553 and 4563 North First St.

The revamped plans for a new headquarters emerge at a time when Second Harvest has decided to shut its warehouse at 528 Brennan St. in San Jose because it was facing a rent hike there. The nonprofit has been using the warehouse for volunteer production shifts and to store equipment, supplies and food.

along creeks, waterways

Valley Water's Board of Directors adopted an ordinance to address the environmental, health, and safety impacts of encampments along waterways, water supply facilities, and other lands where Valley Water holds land rights on Nov. 26.

The Water Resources Protection Zones Ordinance establishes new regulations prohibiting camping and encampmentrelated activities on Valley Water lands. The ordinance will enable Valley Water to manage encampment impacts better while working with local agencies and private partners to implement long-term solutions to address unsheltered homelessness within Santa Clara County.

"The intention of this ordinance is not to result in the criminalization of unsheltered people living along our waterways," Valley Water Board Chair Nai Hsueh said. "Our agency's mission is to provide Silicon Valley safe, clean water for a healthy life, environment, and economy. By advancing this ordinance, we aim to enhance our capacity to achieve these goals while fostering collaboration with government entities and private partners to create sustainable housing alternatives for unsheltered individuals. Together, we can make significant strides in addressing homelessness and environmental concerns in our communitv.'

The primary goals of the ordinance are to:

• Protect water resources, endangered species, riparian habitat of creeks and waterways, and other ecological resources.

• Protect Valley Water investments in flood protection and environmental mitigation projects.

• Support and improve the safety of Valley Water's field operations staff

The ordinance prohibits camping within Water Resources Protection Zones, encompassing all lands where Valley Water owns property in fee title, has an easement, or has maintenance obligations. Valley Water owns and manages 333 miles of the more than 800 miles of creeks and rivers in Santa Clara County. The remaining stretches of creeks are owned by Santa Clara County, private entities, cities in which the creeks are located, and other public agencies.

The ordinance includes a provision for an implementation plan that provides a framework and timeline for implementing the ordinance. The Ordinance Implementation Plan focuses on reducing and eliminating the most serious environmental, health, and safety impacts encampments have on the environment, unsheltered individuals, Valley Water employees and the broader community.

Valley Water will conduct widespread education and outreach to the community, including unsheltered individuals residing in encampments, advocates and social services providers who support unsheltered people, and local and law enforcement agencies.

The new ordinance goes into effect on Dec. 26, 2024; enforcement will begin on Jan. 2, 2025.

How will the 2024 propositions affect Silicon Valley?

San José Spotlight his year's election cycle brought 10 propositions to California voters. Some will either usher in statewide changes or no changes at all. Some residents were shocked by the rejection of Proposition 6, which would have ended forced labor in prisons. Oth-

ers are celebrating the passage of Proposition 3, which codified the right to samesex marriage in the state's constitution. Proposition 32, which aimed to raise the minimum wage, failed by a slim margin. Here's what people in Santa Clara County have to say about the major propositions that passed or failed.

Proposition 3 enshrined the right to same-sex marriage in the state constitution. Its passage repealed Proposition 8, a measure passed by voters in 2008 that defined marriage as being between a man and a woman. Proposition 3 got 62.6% of the vote statewide. In Santa Clara County, nearly 70% voted yes.

"We're very happy. This was a huge win for us, because it was a sweeping win," Gabrielle Antolovich, board president of the Billy DeFrank LGBTQ+ Community Center, told San José Spotlight. "A lot of our people didn't even realize that the California Constitution still defined marriage as a man and a woman."

While the U.S. Supreme Court allowed California to resume same-sex marriages in 2013 and legalized it across all states in 2015, the language was never changed in the state constitution.

"It's always good to have good state

constitutional policies, because you never know what's going to happen nationally," Antolovich said. "It's also a sweeping wake-up call that maybe we need to be more involved in local and state politics.'

Proposition 5 failed, with 55.2% voting no. Housing advocates had banked on it passing because it would've lowered the voting threshold for future affordable housing bond measures from 66.7% to 55%. In Santa Clara County, only 46.2% voted for it.

(Proposition 5) really was an effort to create safe and sustainable neighborhoods throughout the state of California and allow local people to determine what their cities needed," SV@Home Executive Director Regina Williams told San José Spotlight. "I think we're going to see something like that come back, because we as Californians can't allow for minority groups to prevent the majority of us from being able to improve our neighborhoods."

Earlier this year, a regional housing measure which would've infused \$20 billion in affordable housing funds across nine Bay Area counties was pulled from the ballot.

The anti-slavery measure, Proposition 6, would have ended forced labor in prisons and jails and repealed a part of the state constitution allowing involuntary servitude as a form of criminal punishment. It failed, with 53.4% voting no. In the county, 49.1% voted for it.

Nearly 40,000 incarcerated people are employed by the state for essential work, ranging from fighting wildfires to making hand sanitizer, cooking, construction and cleaning for as little as 74 cents an hour. Proposition 6 would have allowed them to choose what they do and made work voluntary. It would've also allowed cities or counties to determine their pay scale in local jails.

"It's just so morally reprehensible. This is supposed to be a progressive state," local economist and community leader Chuck Cantrell told San José Spotlight. "Incarceration is an industrial complex. A lot of private prisons get free labor from people who may or may not be guilty, who should have an opportunity to better themselves and not just be tokens of slavery."

Proposition 32 would've raised the state minimum wage immediately from \$16 an hour to \$17, and \$18 an hour starting in January. Businesses with fewer than 25 people would've paid employees a minimum of \$17 an hour next year and raised it to \$18 in 2026. This proposition failed to pass with 50.8% voting no — one of the slimmest margins of all the propositions. In the county, 57.8% voted to increase the minimum wage.

Most cities in Santa Clara County pay higher than the mandated \$16 an hour, except for Campbell, Los Gatos, Saratoga, Morgan Hill, Gilroy, Los Altos Hills and Monte Sereno. Mountain View has the highest rate at \$18.75 an hour, followed by Sunnyvale at \$18.55. San Jose's minimum wage is \$17.55 an hour.

"People in our community more than anywhere understand how expensive it is to live in the state of California," Los

Gatos Councilmember Rob Moore told San José Spotlight. "Anyone that's working a minimum wage job is likely working a second minimum wage job."

Without the state mandating minimum wage increases, it's up to municipalities to pass wage increases.

Proposition 33 would have allowed local governments to expand rent control by repealing the Costa-Hawkins Rental Housing Act, a state law prohibiting rent control on housing built after Feb. 1, 1995. The housing act also allows landlords to increase rent when a new family moves in.

The proposition did not pass, with 60.2% voting against it. In the county, 59.8% voted no.

"This defeat is bad news for California, including San Jose, because unaffordable rents are the main cause of homelessness," Sandy Perry, South Bay Community Land Trust board vice president, told San José Spotlight. "So, all the time we are spending millions of dollars trying to house the people living outdoors, new people are getting pushed out of housing and into the streets by high rents."

Data shows nearly half of Santa Clara County residents are rent burdened, spending more than one-third of their income on housing. Three cities in the county - San Jose, Los Gatos and Mountain View — have rent control policies, with limitations. San Jose caps rent increases at 5%, but only covers homes built and occupied before 1979, which is approximately 38,000 apartments. Los Gatos caps it to 5% or 70% of the Consumer Price Index, whichever is higher, and Mountain View caps it to 100% of the CPI. Duplexes are exempt from

rent control in all three cities.

Once a tenant moves out, however, landlords can raise rent to market rates regardless of whether the home is rent stabilized. From 2012 to 2017, Santa Clara County lost about half of its unsubsidized affordable homes as people moved out of rent-stabilized apartments, according to a report by Enterprise Community Partners.


"Until we find a way to rein in unaffordable rents. homelessness will only keep increasing," Perry said.

Out of all the propositions, Proposition 36 gained the most support from Californians. It will reclassify possessing certain illegal drugs and thefts under \$950 as felonies instead of misdemeanors if the person had two previous convictions, thereby increasing prison sentences. In some cases, people arrested for drug crimes will be required to complete treatment. Nearly 68.5% voted yes. In the county, nearly 69.5% voted for the proposition.

Proposition 36 undid policies in Proposition 47, passed a decade ago to reduce overcrowding in prisons by reclassifying some drug and theft crimes as misdemeanors. Retail theft has spiked 28% across the state since 2019, according to the Public Policy Institute of California.

"Passing Prop. 36 was a major step toward common-sense reform but getting it across the finish line was the easy part," San Jose Mayor Matt Mahan, a vocal supporter of the proposition, told San José Spotlight. "Now, it's up to all of us to ensure the voters' will is carried out effectively to stop retail theft, help break cycles of addiction and reduce homelessness.

Cold Moon Rising

What does a Cold Moon mean? Sources claim: "The Native American names for the full moon in December as reported in the Farmer's Almanac are the Cold Moon or the Long Night Moon." The Cold Moon gets its name because December is when it starts to get cold, although our coldest average temperatures are in January.

Native Americans and early settlers described this moon as signaling the changing season and colder weather patterns. The month was traditionally a time to prepare for winter's stronghold.

The Birth Of The Sun

Sources also claim. "A new cycle of life for the sun begins at the Winter Solstice when we honor the magnificent sun, which is born again on the darkest night, bringing a new year of life and growth with it."

Sources claim, "The Winter Solstice, or the December Solstice, is the point at which the sun's path in the sky is farthest south. At the Winter Solstice, the sun travels the shortest path through the sky, resulting in this day of the year having the least sunlight and, therefore, the longest night." How does this affect Almaden Valley and its citizens?

The deciduous trees of winter need to find their way to our gardens, landscapes, and vards before the winter solstice and before the cold moon of December 15 th this year.

When is the winter solstice 2024? The winter solstice will occur in the Northern Hemisphere on Saturday, Dec.

21 at 4:21 a.m. EST. this means trees native to Santa Clara County and, if possible, Almaden Valley and the adjacent Valleys are best to be planted before this time at the very least.

Some Native Deciduous Trees found in California:

• California Buckeye: A beautiful tree that can grow over 30 feet tall. It's a deciduous tree that drops its leaves in the summer heat. The tree produces a large nut that looks like a buck's eye, and the flowers are perfume-like.

• Western Redbud: A small tree with glossy, heart-shaped leaves that turn darker as the season progresses. This tree produces clusters of bright pink or magenta flowers in the spring.

• Coast Live Oak: A recognizable tree with a large canopy and twisted branches. Oaks are a signature tree of Southern California.

• Pacific Wax Myrtle: A shrub growing up to 33 feet tall and producing yellow flowers in early summer. It's mainly found in northern and central California along the coast.

Other Native Deciduous Trees in California include Big Leaf Maple, Black Maple, White Alder, Desert Willow, California Black Walnut, Western Sycamore, Fremont Cottonwood, California Black Oak and Valley Oak.
