The Villages Community Progresses Toward Firewise Designation

A dedicated group of Villager volunteers has been hard at work since early November, conducting in-person property assessments gathering data that will be considered for enhancing wildfire resilience within The Villages. To date, approximately 13% of homes have been assessed. It is anticipated that by March 2025, all assessments for condominiums and those requested by single family homeowners will be completed. Once finalized, any home owner will be able to request a data report for their property.

The Villages is actively pursuing recognition as a Firewise community, a national designation that provides a structured approach to improving wildfire resilience. Recently, a core team of Villager community leaders, management, and representatives from the Santa Clara County Fire Safe Council collaborated with the San Jose Fire Department to complete a perimeter risk hazard assessment—an essential requirement for Firewise designation.

The Firewise program promotes collaboration between residents, local fire departments, and other key stakeholders to strengthen home and community defenses against wildfires. Supported by CAL FIRE's Community Wildfire Preparedness & Mitigation Division, this initiative aligns with California's broader wildfire preparedness strategy, providing guidance and resources for communities to reduce risk and increase safety.



Shape the Future: Join the Leadership Development Committee!

The Club Board is launching a Leadership Development Committee (LDC) program designed to prepare and inspire members interested in serving as future Board Directors and Committee members. Members will gain valuable insights into the Villages' governance structure, roles, and responsibilities of directors on all three Boards. Topics to be covered include strategic planning, the role of Board members in non-profit governance, budgeting and financial oversight.

As part of this program, members will also collaborate on a purposeful project, culminating in a recommendation to the appropriate Board for consideration. The program runs from January through October, with monthly two-hour educational sessions.

GM CORNER

Dear Villagers,

We understand you may be experiencing slower internet speeds, buffering, or intermittent connectivity across our Club Facilities. These issues, caused by outdated technology infrastructure, have been increasingly magnified across the administrative offices. Our business operating systems have also faced constant disruptions, including Wi-Fi and internet issues, login challenges, and service interruptions affecting critical tools like point-of-sale systems and credit card machines.

To address these challenges, we are undertaking a major technology upgrade that will stabilize connectivity across The Villages, including public Wi-Fi at amenities such as the Clubhouse, Fitness Center, and Community Centers, as well as in the business offices:

• **Server Upgrade:** Our current servers, running on Microsoft 2008, have not received critical updates for years. We are upgrading to the 2019 system to ensure security, stability, and improved functionality.

• **Switch Installations:** New switches are being installed at the Security Plaza, Pro Shop, and Clubhouse, with upgrades to all other locations to replace non-working or outdated equipment. This initiative aims to improve network reliability, enhance connectivity, and support current and future technological needs across The Villages.

• **Access Points:**
o **Upgrades:** Aging Wi-Fi access points at Villages amenities are being replaced with modern, high-capacity equipment to improve connectivity for public and business networks.

o **Coverage:** The upgrades include the Villages Public Wi-Fi network and the connectivity within our business offices.

• **Network Closets and Power Supply:** Outdated network closets are being cleaned up, and Uninterruptible Power Supplies (UPS) are being installed to enhance reliability and protect against outages.

These upgrades, alongside the migration to Microsoft 365, will ensure faster, more reliable connectivity across The Villages. We appreciate your patience and understanding as we work toward a more connected and efficient community.

Changes to Medicare Premiums in 2025

In 2025, Medicare recipients will see changes to their Medicare premiums and to the surcharge tiers.

High income taxpayers pay an additional surcharge for Medicare Part B and D. High income is defined as more than \$106,000 for a single taxpayer and \$212,000 for a couple. This is an annual calculation based on your gross income from two years before. Consequently, your surcharge for 2025 is based on your 2024 income tax return.

You can appeal the surcharges if your income has substantially decreased since 2024 because of certain life changing events. Examples include the following: getting married or divorced or becoming widowed; you or your spouse retire or reduce your work hours; or you lose income-producing property due to a disaster. Social Security Form SSA-44 is used to request a recalculation.

Unfortunately, a substantial gain on the sale of your previous personal residence is not considered a life changing event. Remember this is an annual calculation. If you had a windfall in 2023 creating a large surcharge in 2025, your 2026 premium will be calculated using your more usual income from your 2024 tax return.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253 or e-mail SRS at villagesrs@sbcglobal.net. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

SRS Reminder:

Property tax bills

2024-25 property tax bills were mailed out starting October 1, 2024. The first installment of property tax payments for fiscal year 2024-25 is due **November 1** and becomes delinquent after **December 10**.

December 10 is the last date for paying your first installment of your Santa Clara County real estate tax without paying a 10% penalty and late fees.

You may pay online at <https://payments.sccgov.org/propertytax>. There is no fee for paying electronically. Just have your checkbook handy so you can enter the bank routing number and your account number.

A 2.22 percent convenience fee with a \$1.49 minimum will be charged by the payment processing vendor when using a debit or credit card.

If you pay with a paper check, your payment envelope needs to be postmarked by December 10. Paying online eliminates the worry as to whether or not the post office processes your mail by the due date, or the County loses your envelope.

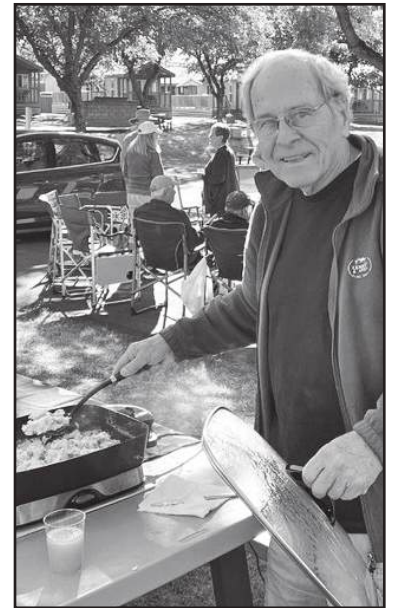

There, folks can buy some fruits and veggies and conveniently bring them home in their cars. This hike is about 4 miles and has a max elevation climb of about 111 feet. We will meet at the Cribari Bell at **8:45 for a 9 a.m.** departure.

Rambler-Lite Hike, Wednesday, December 11: Katy Peretti (408-531-0917) will lead a hike to Larkspur Hill. We'll walk through the Villages gate to San Felipe Road where we'll take a left and walk for about 100 feet to a path on your right which will take us up the slow long hill to the park which overlooks the Villages and the Diablo Range. Meet at the parking lot opposite Public Safety at 9 a.m.

Rambler Hike Thursday, December 19: Eileen Skinner (408) 529-5801 will lead a hike along the Coyote Creek Trail (starting at Silver Creek Road) to Cottonwood Lake. This is approximately 4 miles roundtrip. There are restrooms in the parking lot at the beginning of the hike and at the lake. Bring water and snacks to enjoy at the picnic area by the lake. It is a mostly flat paved trail. Wear comfortable walking shoes. If you are interested in meeting for lunch afterwards, we can all go to a restaurant after the hike. Meet at the Cribari Bell at **8:30 a.m. for an 8:45** departure.

‘The Hope of Advent’

As we begin our Advent preparation for Christ's rebirth—amid troubling times—God exhorts us to hope for greater life in Christ based on and infused by **acts of love** for all and **prayer for strength** to remain united with Christ. The scripture readings for the First Sunday of Advent speak to this in most helpful ways.

The Prophet **Jeremiah** (33:14-16) preached when Babylonia threatened to destroy Jerusalem and destroy Judah's sacred Temple. He voiced Yahweh's determination to fulfill divine promises and give Judah a hope-filled future by raising up a Savior (“The Lord our Justice”) from David's lineage who would keep them safe and secure.

In the Gospel, **St. Luke** (21:25-28,34-36) exhorted the early Christian community—amid times of fear and persecution—to not behave in ways that trap/ensnare them away from Christ. Rather, he encouraged them to always be vigilant for God's presence and to pray for strength to remain united with Christ.

St. Paul (1 Thes. 3:12-4:2) wrote this earliest New Testament letter to Gentile converts in a newly founded community, asking God to increase their love for all and to enable them to be strong, to stand firm in faith and hope amid new and very challenging situations. He also exhorted them to conduct themselves in ways pleasing to God as Christ taught.

So, let us *actively* seek out those opportunities when we can demonstrate our love of others, even despite our cultural or political differences, and thereby be the hope of Christ in our families and in our community.

‘Mystery and Paradox’

Welcome to another day in Paradox. It's a phrase a friend of mine often says to me when we meet. The phrase makes me chuckle, but it also doesn't allow me to gloss over life with pat and formulated answers. It makes me realize once again for the first time that I'm not yet in paradise. There's work to be done. Seems like that should have been obvious. I shouldn't need to be jarred into the realization that there's more to life. But somehow, I still seem to be learning the same old lesson. Life is a paradox of having yet discovering more. And Advent especially is a time of paradox. Christ has already come, but we prepare for his arrival once again. Theologians describe this as the “already/not yet” paradox of the Kingdom of God. The energy of God's love is fully present and with us, but not yet fully present. In fact, every atom of the universe is infused with this presence, but somehow not yet fully present. Here's how the Apostle Paul describes it:

“He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together.”

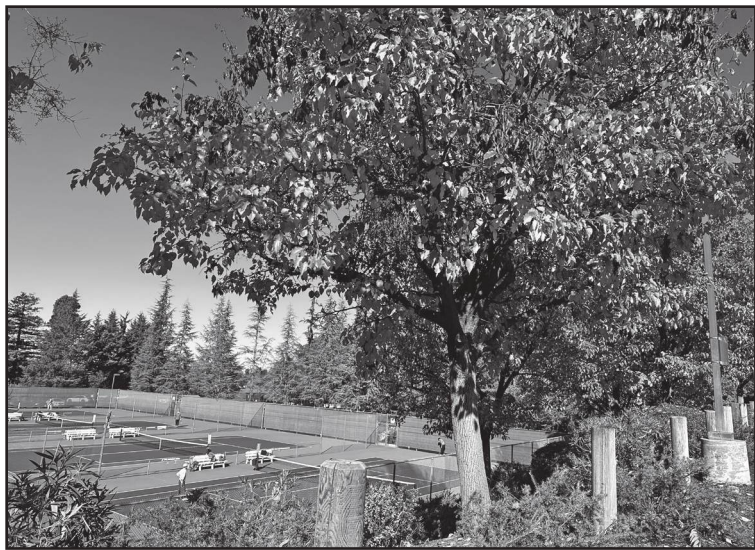

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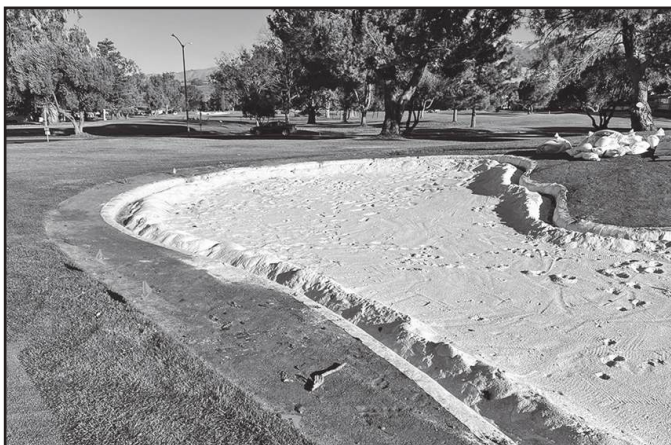
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WOMEN'S 9-HOLE

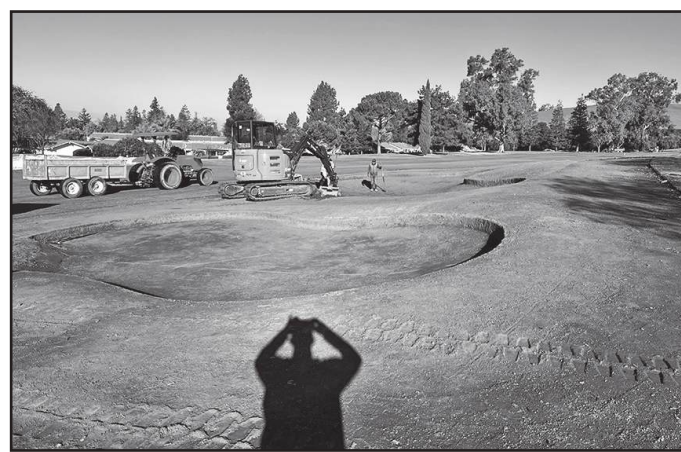

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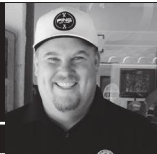

Tips from the Pro— Smaller Can Be Better

As we age, we all lose strength and flexibility. So our ability to turn and extend diminishes.

From The Pro...

Here are some tips to help you turn more...Narrow your stance, flare your toes out a minimum of 45 degrees, stand a bit taller at the waist. If you cannot swing with your left arm straight (few of us can), then go ahead and let it bend at the elbow, just limit the bend...you never want your right hand too close to your right shoulder on the backswing. Elbow Bend is OK...think of a punch or karate chop where the arm goes from elbow bend to straight which is a burst of speed and a source of leverage. Another tip is to use your hands and wrists more...Small muscles can supply power too. When big muscles and joints become less elastic, a good thought is to try to hinge your wrists more on the backswing and to make sure that your swing arc is narrower on the downswing than on the backswing (ala Sergio Garcia). Lastly, try swinging with the club more in front of your body, like Inbee Park and Shanshan Feng and Henrik Stenson; so the arms do not turn behind your shoulders, but rather swing above them in a steeper position...this allows for maximum club swing with minimal turn; i.e. less turn and more lift. **To sign up for a lesson with me, email ssteele@the-villages.com**

Staying safe at the mall

Mall parking lots tend to be magnets for petty criminals prior to the holidays. To avoid being targeted you need to be fully aware of your surroundings and in control of your purse, wallet and tech devices. Also, if you are an after-work shopper, you'll be doing all your business in the dark. Having a small flashlight would be very helpful in a dark parking lot.



Practice These Safety Tips When Parking and Returning to Your Car

- Be aware of your immediate surroundings as you approach or leave your vehicle.
- Have a plan for how you can get to a safe place and call for help if needed.
- Walk with confidence. Keep your head up, eyes scanning the area—not focused on your cell phone.
- If people are approaching you, look directly at them but do not stare.
- Trust your instincts when you feel something or someone doesn't seem right.
- Park near your intended entrance in a highly visible and well-lit area. Or park near the parking attendant, if one is present.
- Always use the main building entrance, avoiding rear or secluded entrances and exits.
- Keep your valuables, including purses, recent purchases and technology hidden out of sight. Always lock them in the trunk if you must leave them in the car.
- Lock the doors and roll up your windows once you are in the vehicle.
- Have your keys ready to unlock the vehicle and a whistle or other personal alarm.
- As you approach your car, look around it and underneath, inside—especially the back seat—for persons who may be hiding. If you are suspicious, walk away. Go to a safe place and call for help.
- Some stores offer carry out services to escort you and your purchases to your vehicle. Take them up on the offer.

Avoid Doing These Things When Parking and Returning to Your Car

- Leaving your vehicle running and unoccupied or with unattended children or pets inside.
- Using more than one parking spot, which may cause angry reactions from others.
- Parking next to large vans, trucks or other vehicles that can offer cover to lurking criminals.
- Using a personal identification tag on your key ring, which can allow access to your car or house if your keys are lost or stolen.
- Approaching someone who is loitering near your vehicle. Walk to a safe place such as a lighted store, house or building. If the person refuses to leave, call mall security.
- Digging in your purse or bag.
- Wearing headphones or engaging in a cell phone conversation.
- Carrying heavy bags or packages that may offer criminals an opportunity to snatch something.

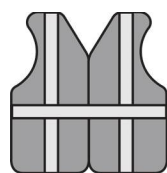

Mignon Gibson 1951-2024



Ever laugh with delight at the rubber duckies in the fountain outside the Bistro? Ever marvel at the intrepid San Jose pioneers whose stories are captured at History Park on Senter Road near Happy Hollow? Ever spot a tall, smiling woman with a hastily pinned chignon topped with a battered straw hat and wearing a flowing Chinese robe who was walking a curious, lively Affenpinscher? If so, you were touched by the spirit of Mignon Gibson, Verano resident who died November 23 after a brief illness. Lover of The Villages open space, public historian, and spiritual seeker, Mignon leaves a legacy in her "baby," History Park, known originally as the San Jose Historical Museum. Mignon worked at the museum for 23 years, and served as Museum Director from 1982-1997. culture groups to celebrate their histories.

She checked with Jerry Neece, then on the Club Board, about floating them in the Bistro fountain as a touch of whimsy. The bobbing duckies brought smiles to golfers, diners, and visiting grandkids. Her last stash of rubber duckies was given to Jerry, who floated a single duckie in the fountain the day after Mignon's death.

Private services were held at Mignon's home on November 24. Next Spring a Celebration of Mignon's Life is being planned at History Park to bring together Mignon's friends and admirers who were touched by her life and legacy.
