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### **Hamilton expects minimal impact** from 2025 launch of Alabama **CHOOSE school voucher act**

The arrival of 2025 is year one for Alabama's Creating Hope and Opportunity for Our Students' (CHOOSE) Act, which was signed into law by Gov. Kay Ivey on March 7, 2024.

The CHOOSE Act website, www.chooseact.alabama.gov, is now set up to accept family applications for what can be up to a \$7,000 refundable income tax credit, or Education Savings Account (ESA). Eligible families can use the tax credits to cover tuition, fees and other educational expenses at 'approved

education service providers' in Alabama.

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After years of debate, the Alabama Legislature approved the CHOOSE Act last March, with both Franklin County legislators (Rep. Jamie Kiel and Sen. Larry Stutts) voting in favor of the act.

Essentially, the law provides annual \$7,000 tax credits for parents of students who enroll in private schools or \$2,000 tax credits per year for parents who home school their child, with a \$4,000 maximum credit for multiple students.

The act prioritizes siblings of participating students and dependents of active duty military. The tax credits

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are not taxable income and they are protected from offset or debt collection under the law.

The Alabama Legislature must provide at least \$100 million each year to maintain the CHOOSE Act fund.

For the years 2025 and 2026, the CHOOSE Act credit is available only for parents of an eligible student whose family has an adjusted income not exceeding 300 percent of the federal poverty level for the previous tax year. Starting January 1, 2027, the credit will be available to any parent of an eligible student, with priority given to students who participated in the program the previous year.

The first 500 ESAs will be awarded to participating students with special needs each year.

A recent Rasmussen poll commissioned by the conservative Alabama Policy Institute showed,

by a 54-24% margin, Alabama voters believe parents have too little control over their children's education.

The Republican-controlled legislature approved the CHOOSE Act over objections from Democrats concerned about the negative impact of decreasing funding for public education.

One Tuscaloosa representative shared his concerns the legislation constitutes 'use of tax dollars to create separation.'

Most Democratic legislators voted against the


Pest & Mosquito Control 256-332-4008 bill, and were joined by some Republican legislators representing primarily rural districts, including Rep. Tracy Estes (R-Winfield), who stated concerns about the act's potential negative impact on rural public schools.

Franklin County Schools Superintendent of Education Greg Hamilton believes the CHOOSE Act's impact will be minimal in Franklin County.

"I'm not sure we are a good measuring stick. There aren't many private schools in our area, so rural Franklin County isn't a good source to gauge the impact of this act," Hamilton said.

Franklin County Schools' enrollment has remained close to 3,500 the last six years, a number Hamilton "is right about where we need it."

The Franklin County Schools system has strengthened in recent years when it comes to students wanting to enroll in a school outside their district. This is a large reason why its enrollment numbers have remained consistent after a spike in 2017 resulting from Russellville City Schools' implementation of a \$600 annual tuition for students who live outside the Russellville city limits.



With federal funding approximately \$7,000 per child per school year, the tax credit in the CHOOSE Act is the same. While federal funding has always 'followed' the student from one school to another, the tax credit created a way for parents to receive a benefit even if their child

enrolls at a private school or is home schooled.

Although not a supporter of the legislation, Hamilton said the bill's passage wasn't a surprise to him.

"They've been trying to get it through every year I can remember, until they finally got the support needed to pass it," Hamilton said.

mental in bringing free WiFi to downtown Russellville, which gave students a reliable source of broadband internet to complete school assignments during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Are you looking for all of the answers on how to reduce your persistent fears and anxieties?

Fear and anxiety can ruin your life if you do not know how to overcome it.

As a result, here is a brief list of techniques that a person can use to help manage their everyday anxieties, stresses, and fears.

1. Take your fears apart: When facing a current or upcoming task that overwhelms you with a lot of anxiety, divide the task into a series of smaller steps and then complete each of the smaller tasks one step at a time. Completing these smaller activities will make the stress more manageable and increases your chances of success.

2. Take a break: Sometimes we get stressed out when everything happens all at once. When this happens, take a deep breath and try to find something to do for a few minutes to get your mind off of the problem. A person can get some fresh air, listen to some music, or do an activity that will give them a fresh perspective on things.

3. Get all of the facts of the situation: Gathering the facts of a certain event can prevent us from relying on exaggerated and fearful assumptions. By focusing on the facts, a person can rely on what is reality and what is not. This is a great way to take control of your mental health.

4. Use Self-Visualization: Sometimes, we can get anxious over a task that we will have to perform in the near future. When this happens, visualize yourself doing the task in your mind. For instance, you have to play in the championship volleyball game in front of a large group of people in the next few days. Before the big day comes, imagine yourself playing the game in your mind. By doing this, you will be better prepared when the time comes.

5. You can't predict the future: While the consequences of a particular fear may seem real, there are usually other factors that cannot be anticipated and can affect the results of any situation. We may be ninety-nine percent correct in predicting the future, but all it takes is for that one percent to make a world of difference.

6. Think of a red stop sign: At times, a person might encounter a fearful thought that may be difficult to manage. When this happens, visualize a red stop sign, which can serve as a reminder to stop thinking about that thought. Regardless of how scary the thought may be, do not dwell on it. This technique is great in dealing with your negative thinking and will help reduce your fears.

7. Get some help: Sometimes, it helps to be able to talk to someone about your stressful situations. Talking to a trusted friend, counselor, or clergyman can give you additional advice and insights on how to deal with your current problem. Overcoming fear and anxiety takes practice. In time, you will become better able to deal with your stressful problems.

# Russellville girls' varsity splits pair in holiday tournament

The Russellville High School varsity girls' basketball team went 1-1 at the West Morgan Holiday Classic, hosted by West Morgan High School December 27-30. The Lady Golden Tigers defeated Lexington 72-55 on Dec. 27 before falling to Clements in a close one 47-45 on Dec. 30.

After trailing 19-12 after the opening period against Lexington, Russellville went on a 21-10 run in the second quarter to take the lead and a 33-29 advantage into the intermission.

Led by 23 total points by sophomore Ella Copeland, the Lady Golden Tigers continued to outpace the Lady Bears in the second half. RHS outscored Lexington 20-15 in the third and then added another 19 points to the Lady Bears' 11 points in the final period of play.

Russellville's Angeleah Smith scored 13 points in the game and Jemma Moore contributed 10 total points, as well.

Against Clements a few days later the narrative was reversed for Russellville. The Lady Golden Tigers led after the opening eight minutes 17-7, but the Lady Colts shutout RHS in the second quarter to go up 22-17 at halftime.

In the second half, Russellville fought to narrow the deficit. The Lady Golden Tigers pulled within three points after the third, but in the end couldn't complete the job; Russellville fell by two points, 47-45, to drop to 5-8 on the season.

Moore led RHS with 14 points in the defeat. Copeland scored 13 points and Laila Hill added nine points.

Russellville's next contest will be its area-opener. The Lady Golden Tigers will host West Point at the Russellville Middle School gymnasium on January 7th.

The Russellville High School varsity boys' basketball team dropped to 7-5 overall after a 10-point loss to visiting Hillcrest Tuscaloosa on Friday night. After trailing in the first half, Russellville took the lead but was unable to hold on to it as the Patriots won out in the end 64-54.

"You credit (Hillcrest)," Russellville head coach Patrick Odom, now in his 10th season in charge of the Golden Tigers, said. "They're a really good basketball team. If you look at what they've done this year, they've beaten some of the best in the state."

The Golden Tigers had a tough time rebounding against the Patriots, allowing for second chance baskets on the visitors' end, and the hosts didn't get every call they wanted, but Odom said he was proud of the energy his team displayed in the defeat.

"I love how we played," he said. "We didn't finish real well. You know, they amped up the physicality a little bit and I thought the game was— some fouls that were called early weren't called in there, which is frustrating. But love how we played, love how we competed. That's as high level (of basketball) as you're going to see, we just didn't finish

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dominate in the second half. BHS doubled Carbon Hill's nine points in the third quarter and then outscored CBHS 12-5 in the final period of play.

"Against Carbon Hill, we played well," Belgreen head coach Chad Green said. "I think everyone scored in that game."

Next to Dacota Green's 18 points, Belgreen's Lilliana Willingham added 12 points and Bryn Scott scored eight points in the win, the 14th of the season for the Lady Bulldogs.

Belgreen's runaway success against Carbon Hill, however, didn't—in terms of the result—carry over to its next game against the Danville Lady Hawks a couple days later, as the Lady Bulldogs fell to one of the top teams in Class 4A by eight points.

"Danville is a good team," Green said. "They're the No. 10-ranked 4A team, so it was good for us. They had a couple of good players that definitely hurt us.

"We scored well—we scored 56 points—but we just gave us too much defensively," the head coach added.

The two squads traded blows throughout the contest, with Belgreen taking an initial two-point lead after the first period. Danville regrouped in the second quarter and outscored the Lady Bulldogs 18-10 to take a 31-25 advantage into the break.

Belgreen once again came out strong to start the next period, outpacing Danville 18-16 in the third, but it wasn't enough for the Lady Bulldogs to retake the lead. The Lady Hawks 17-13 run in the fourth to close the game out and hand Belgreen its fourth defeat of the campaign—all of which have come against schools in Class 4A or higher.

"We wanted to beef up the competition this year," Green said. "Last year we had a good year in Class 1A. We went to the region finals, one game away from Birmingham. We knew we were stepping up to 2A, so thought we needed to make our schedule a little bit tougher, and we have.

"We've done well," he added. "Every coach wants to be undefeated, but I'm proud of my team. I'll be honest, from last year to this year, offensive-wise, we're better than we were last year. But defensive-wise, I don't think we're quite where we were last year, but hopefully we get there before the year ends."

Makenna Fisher was the Lady Bulldogs' top scorer in the defeat, dropping 18 points. Randi Terry added a season-high 12 points and Bryn Scott scored 10 points.

"Makenna Fisher had a good game," Green said.

"Randi came in in that game against Danville and had 12 big points for us. She rebounds, she's a good on-the-ball defender, so she's definitely been a great addition to our team," Green added. "Bryn has always been a good ball-handler and on-the-ball defender, but she's starting to score more this year and we're really pleased with that."

Belgreen had an opportunity to avenge the loss to Danville soon after, as the Lady Bulldogs took on the Lady Hawks again in their next game on January 2nd. BHS knocked off Danville 55-51 at Wallace State Community College. Fisher led the Lady Bulldogs with 15 points while Terry scored 14 and Willingham added 13 points.

Most recently, Belgreen traveled to Hackleburg and took down the Lady Panthers 46-37 to improve to 16-4 overall. Fisher once again led her team with 13 points in the victory.

real well tonight. Still, it's a great opportunity for us to get ready for area play.

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# **RV City Council approves \$415,000 bid for large scale** micro-surfacing paving project

The Russellville City Council approved a \$415,381.60 bid for a large-scale micro-surfacing paving project, part of a more than \$4 million infrastructure improvement package, the largest paving project in city history.

The council accepted the lowest responsible bid from Florence-based Vulcan Materials Asphalt and Construction, LLC. The city received two bids, Vulcan and Wiregrass Construction out of Birmingham.

The project is expected to begin this spring, weather permitting.

The action was approved at the council's January 6th meeting. In other agenda items, the council:

—approved spending the city's remaining American Rescue Plan Act funds, in the amount of \$288,347.03, for a second Sutphen Heavy Duty Custom Pumper for the Russellville Fire Department.

-déclared a 2007 Spartan Rescue Pumper, 2007 Emergency One Spartan Pumper and a 2003 Spartan Ladder Truck as surplus property and authorized the sale of the same through GovDeals or through advertisement of bids, with the condition the vehicles shall not be sold until the new fire vehicles are delivered to the city.
