



### Sweet Dreams...


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This year marks the 14th edition of Tennessee Valley Brides Magazine, and as usual, its pages are filled with beautiful brides and their unique celebrations.

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

### On their terms

### Elopement was the intimate experience the couple desired

Megan and Clay Beavers took a unique approach to every aspect of their wedding, beginning with Clay's unexpected, mid-flight proposal in January.

As soon as the couple's privately chartered flight touched down at the Northwest Alabama Regional Airport in Muscle Shoals, they began considering their wedding plans - or rather the plans they did not want.

"Neither one of us likes being in front of large crowds and talking, and we tend to be shy in those moments," Megan explained. "This is something we decided we wanted to be about us."

Megan and Clay had been married previously - they have three children between them - and attended their fair share of weddings.

They noticed a common thread at those events, which was that the weddings tended to focus on accommodating the guests. While Megan admitted that can be special, she said that the couple was looking for something else.

"We wanted to be able to focus on each other and our love for one another," she said.

As a result, eloping was "a no-brainer." Just two months after the proposal, the pair hopped on another flight to Jackson Hole, Wyoming, where they exchanged their vows amidst a snowy landscape.

Thankfully, Megan said that the couple's friends and family were supportive of their decision, which made jumping into planning a breeze.

Initially, she said they thought they would like to travel somewhere tropical for their nuptials. The more they researched, the more it seemed like more work than they wanted.

"it became apparent we would have to have a travel photographer," Megan said, noting that additionally, the season did not fit a tropical theme.

Through a little Pinterest research, she found herself drawn toward wintery, snowy landscapes.

Then, someone mentioned Jackson Hole.

"After very little research, we realized this was the right place," Megan said.

The hardest part of eloping, according to Megan, was the scheduling. Since the couple wanted to marry so quickly after becoming engaged, they had a short timeline to book reservations, choose attire and find a photographer.

But things started to line up quickly thanks to some personal research and plenty of recommendations.

Initially, she found a photographer from Jackson Hole on social media and sent a message. That photographer was booked when they planned to wed,

but she was happy to send over a recommendation for Madison Webb Photography, who Megan said, "was absolutely perfect."

After booking reservations at the Snow King Resort, Megan turned her sights toward a dress.

"I had something in mind that I wanted, but with short timing, I had to find a way to get it quick," she said. "I actually found my perfect dress online from Azazie Bridals."

Using the site, and with some assistance from Clay, Megan added her measurements to her dress order, and the company sent her a perfectly altered dress.


Then, the couple visited Coats Clothing in downtown Florence where they found a jacket for Clay and let employees select a shirt and pants to create a complimentary ensemble.

The best part of all the planning?

"Even though the short timing was hectic, it was actually so easy," Megan said. "It was about us and only us. We didn't have to plan food or wedding favors; we didn't have to plan music, and we didn't have to plan around everyone else's schedules. It was just simple."

After just a little bit of planning, it was time to get married — which the couple actually did at the Lauderdale County Courthouse before taking







their trip out West.

"That was pretty funny, because it almost doesn't even feel real," Megan laughed. "There's no'l dos,' no kissing — they just say, 'OK, here's your papers,' and you leave."

She and Clay went back to the car to exchange rings and a kiss because "it seemed like the thing to do," but they waited until they arrived in Jackson Hole to exchange vows.

The official day of the couple's elopement was the "least hectic, most calm day

ever," according to Megan. After sharing breakfast at the resort, she said that Clay gave skiing a shot while she got ready for the day.

"I actually did my own hair and makeup and just took my time and didn't stress," she said.

That afternoon, the couple met with their photographer at Glacier View Turnout where they finally exchanged vows exactly like they had always wanted: privately and solely for one another.

"What you can't see in the pictures is that we are standing on about 8 feet of snow!" Megan said. She noted that at that point, she realized that they were in for a cold afternoon as they toured Cottonwood Creek, Windy Point, Teton Point and the town square, stopping for photos along the way.

When they finished taking in the views, Megan said they were ready to eat dinner, but on Sunday in Jackson Hole, everything closes early in the day.

The only places open for dinner were a pizza joint and the cowboy bar.

They ate that night at the Million Dollar Steakhouse, which is in the basement of the Million Dollar Cowboy Bar, and since they did not have a reservation, they ate at the bar.


"When I say we just went with the flow that day, I mean it," Megan said. "It was perfect!"

When she thinks about their elopement, Megan has no regrets and said nothing unexpected occurred along the way. She said it was an experience she would recommend to anyone unsure about undergoing the stress of a traditional wedding.

The destination made the journey a breeze



When Abbey and Stephen Robinson began dating, discussions about the future involved one definite: they wanted a destination wedding.

But they were not sold on a specific destination. In fact, Abbey said that their destination was decided based on a resort they fell in love with, and she recommends the method to any bride-to-be who wants to make her wedding the trip of a lifetime.

"When we came across the resort, we started reading how awesome it was from people who had their weddings there," she said. "They have an entire wedding department, and they handle everything down to a wedding coordinator who walks alongside you and checks up on you throughout the entire process."

The resort they chose, Sandos Finisterra Los Cabos, offered a comprehensive and customizable wedding





package which included everything from a DJ, venue and dinner to the rehearsal dinner, floral arrangements and more.

A photographer was even included, but the Robinsons chose to travel with their own.

"They basically reached out to me with a spreadsheet, and I filled it all in," Abbey explained. "They made it so easy!"

She said a representative from the resort spoke with her about theme options and colors, then sent a variety of floral options in menu form, and she chose what she wanted.

The resort even added things to her wedding it usually did not offer, like a champagne tower.

"They basically told me, 'Whatever you want, we will make happen," she said.

As a result, Abbey said the planning process was

wedding planning to be.

The only aspect of planning a destination wedding that Abbey said was stressful was making sure the right number of rooms were blocked off for family and friends invited to the nuptials.

Luckily, Abbey said her best friend, Carly Franks, is a travel agent, and despite never helping with a destination wedding before, she jumped right in to make sure Abbey's plans fell in line. Once Abbey, Stephen and a small group of their families and closest friends arrived in Cabo, Abbey said she did not have "to lift a finger." The resort took care of everything, and the group got to enjoy every moment shared in a beautiful location.

"The best part was having all our family and friends together in Mexico," she said. "There really is nothing like it. It was so special to have everyone together in such a special and beautiful place."

The group arrived in

Cabo a few days before Abbey and Stephen tied the knot. They spent the four days leading up to the wedding creating special memories and "bonding in a way [they] never had before."

Much of the time was spent hanging around the resort pool and participating in special resort events, which Abbey's resortpackage wedding planner arranged for them to attend.

On the day of the wedding, Abbey and Stephen were wed on the Pacific Coast in front of the resort, which helped incorporate a special moment into their ceremony in honor of Abbey's father, who passed away shortly before the wedding.

"After the ceremony, me, my brother and my sister walked down to the water and scattered some of his ashes," Abbey said. "It was our way of honoring him at the wedding and making him a part of it with a special memory."

After their wedding, the newlyweds remained in Cabo for another five days, moving to an adults-only luxury resort before returning home where they had a huge party to include the friends who could not be invited to the destination wedding.

When Abbey thinks back on the wedding, she knows she would not change anything about the process, because it was so easy.

She said that for anyone considering a destination wedding, she highly recommends finding a resort that will provide full wedding service, and then sit back and enjoy the process.

However, she does have one word of caution. "Get to the airport super early, and check and recheck all your travel documents," Abbey said.

She said that on the day everyone flew to Cabo, three people dealt with missed flights. In one case, a flight was cancelled, but others were the result of a late check-in and the name on a passport not exactly matching the name on a ticket.

"Always expect the unexpected with travel and have a backup plan in case a flight gets cancelled or you miss it," Abbey said. "But don't let it worry you, because when it comes down to your day, everything will be perfect."





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Though she has never been there, Sadie said the shades of blue and yellow that come to mind when she considers the location were at the forefront of her mind while wedding planning. Rather than choose one shade of blue, she decided to use a splash of them all.

"We had dusty blue and royal blue and everything between," she said. "I used prints, too, and I wasn't worried about everything matching."

Even her bridesmaids' dresses were white with a print in various shades of blue, and the hydrangeas all over the venue reflected variations of blue, too.

When she reminisces about planning, Sadie said the "crazy amount [of flowers] just kind of happened."

"We met with our florist at Lola's several times, and I had a vision, but he ran with it," she recalled. "He essentially said, 'however many [hydrangeas] you want, let's do more."

As a result, Sadie said a few days before the wedding, so many hydrangeas were present in the flower and gift shop that it was forced to close until her wedding florals were arranged and delivered.

However, Sadie said that she was unaware of just how many hydrangeas were used until long after the wedding ended.

After seeing a social media post from her venue, Danclay Farms, and Lola's, she was shocked to discover that it took 8,000 hydrangeas to bring her vision to life.

She thought the final look was perfect, but even if it had not been, Sadie said it would not have mattered at the end of the day.

In fact, on her wedding



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### MAKING MISSED CONNECTIONS



Jessica and Don Hartsell had each lived a lot of life before a random meeting outside of the Madison County Courthouse in Huntsville.

Much of their lives had been lived parallel to one another.

Both were born in California on April 25 just four years apart, and both share a lot of Scottish ancestry. Both spent significant time in Iraq — Jessica working in the Baghdad Embassy with the United States Army through her former logistics company and Don in the Navy — at the exact same time.

Both had adult — or nearly adult — children from previous marriages. Both had landed in Decatur due to its proximity to Huntsville and its plethora of postmilitary and security careers.

And they happened to be entering the courthouse at the same time one fateful March day in 2023.

"I was walking in for an interview ... and when we saw each other, we started talking,"

Jessica recalled. "By the time we got up the stairs and to the front door, my arm was slipped under his."

The rest of their story began to unfold naturally as they discovered a deep sense of ease between them and started building a life together in the historic area of Decatur adjacent to Delano Park. They purchased a home there on Sept. 21, 2023.

During the 2023 Iron Bowl, Don whisked Jessica across the street and into the park's rose garden where he proposed. And just under a year later on Sept. 21 the couple was married in the same spot.

"We walked down the aisle to the Earth, Wind and Fire song — which we both love," Jessica laughed, noting that the date from the iconic song has become special to the couple.

Their wedding fook place with all their family — including a combined six children and four grandchildren — and the community the pair built in their



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neighborhood by their sides.

In fact, neighbors — and family — performed songs, provided catering and even served as photographer for the day.

For Jessica, having a day that was authentic and comfortable was the goal.

Even the wedding invitations were simple and personal. Don, who has a drone, filmed an aerial shot of the rose garden while Jessica stood in the center, beckoning the camera closer.

Her youngest daughter overlaid Earth, Wind and Fire's song, "September," and the video, sent via email, served as the invitation.

On their wedding day, everyone got ready for the rose garden ceremony in the couple's home, then walked across the street for the nuptials.

After, a horse and carriage carried Jessica and Don to the Princess Theatre where they took photos before sharing a meal with their wedding guests at Josie's, which is owned by a neighbor and friend.

Jessica and her daughters created their own bouquets from white roses special ordered from Publix, and she said that having the opportunity to allow her "girls" to help with planning "was more fun than making any formal plans"

"I used to think job title and the money I make was important," she shared. "But the big expensive things and making it big and fancy weren't really important to us — it was about the small, family feeling, not the big hoopla."

Now, Jessica has a message for any brides-to-be or hopeful brides who fear they waited too long to have the perfect love story: do not give up, and do not be afraid to get out and bump into people.

"It's easy for older brides to feel so insecure," she said. "It's OK not to be perfect — we are right in a lot of qualities earned through life like love, creativity and learning to forgive and say 'I'm sorry.'

"Hold out hope, because they have a lot to offer to someone, too."
















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### Wedding know-how

### Planning expert offers expertise in the vendor selection process

Blair Garner, owner of Blair Bear Weddings & Events, has been in the wedding planning business most of her life.

As a result, she has insights into the industry which are helpful to any brides (and grooms) in the process of planning and choosing their wedding vendors.

"It's very important to choose vendors that are going to give you not only the best experience ... but also do what they say they're going to do," Garner said. "[Those are] vendors who have integrity, arrive on time, clean up on time and are presentable."

Garner admits that for those who do not deal with wedding

vendors on a regular basis, knowing who will meet those marks can be difficult. That is why she said it is important to vet vendors - after all, the bride is in the driver's seat and interviewing each for a job.

#### **Top Considerations**

Garner said that the first three vendors that should be booked for a wedding - after a wedding planner, of course - are the venue, the caterer and the photographer, in that order.

"People will always remember what they ate and what the day looked like," she said, noting that the bride and groom will want to look back on photos of the day, too.





When selecting those vendors, Garner said that it is important to already have a guest count estimation and the season the wedding will take place.

That information may limit some venue and catering options or help the couple narrow down options.

Additionally, Garner said a couple should be wary of any who pressure them to place an immediate deposit to secure their wedding date.

Garner said vendors should be ready to share with brides what they can offer for the wedding day, not pressure them into locking into a location or service without a real understanding of what it means.

#### **Act Now**

While Garner does not like it when vendors pressure brides, she explains that the earlier in the planning process vendors are booked, the better.

"The best thing you can do is lock in 2025 prices for your 2026 or 2027 wedding," she stressed. "This is huge, because every year, prices are increasing."

By locking in prices before the end of the year, brides can save significantly, she said.

#### **Accept Advice**

While treating the vendor selection process like a series of job interviews is a great way to make sure vendors are the right fit, Garner said there is also a lot to be said for accepting the advice of those who work in the industry.


"Speaking with someone in the industry, even if they don't get a planner or coordinator - a venue owner, caterer or baker, a DJ - will be a huge eye-opener for them," she said.

Garner explained that in the Shoals area, new vendors are popping up all the time, and it takes working with them a few times before a real recommendation can be offered.

However, some word of mouth goes a long way, and Garner suggested that brides use it to choose vendors who will go above and beyond for every wedding day.

"There are people who do the extras and accomplish little things for you," she said.

Additionally, Garner said if it seems like one vendor is pressuring a couple to use other specific people, calling another industry professional to determine if the recommendation is valid can be helpful.





### Avoid All-Inclusive Packages

Finally, Garner said that she will "almost never" recommend that a bride and groom choose an all-inclusive wedding package.

"They may be OK, but not excel at everything," Garner said. "In my experience, with all-inclusive packages, tons of things go wrong."

She said that often, it is the small things that get overlooked in such packages. For example, tablecloths might not get steamed or pressed, or food may be mediocre or served late.

"Things go wrong time and again, because either there's not

enough people, or they're trying to include things they don't have the expertise or capability to do with a five-star rating," she said. "It comes out mediocre."

Ultimately, Garner's biggest recommendation when it comes to choosing vendors is to seek the help of a coordinator or planner.

She said that in that role, an individual is able to smoothly handle bringing all the vendors together without adding stress to the bride.

"You're the VIP," Garner said.
"You need someone else to be that glue that brings everybody together."
