Santa Clara County aims to restore **East San Jose** hospital services

anta Clara County officials have finalized their \$150 million purchase of Regional Medical Center from private corporation $HCA\ Health care, which\ depleted\ the\ hospital's$ services over the years. But the hard work to

make it whole again is just beginning.

County officials are racing against the clock to restore the gutted trauma care services by April 1, the day the sale closes, followed by heart attack and stroke care at yet to be determined dates. They'll also have to hold ample town hall meetings for community input on what services to restore before others, hire back enough staff while in a budget deficit, and do it all without opening new rifts with their hospital workers.

County Executive James Williams said there's much work to be done between now and April.

"We've also publicly committed to restoring labor and delivery services that were cut in 2020," Williams told San José Spotlight. "We will need some time to be in there, operating Regional, to develop an appropriate timeline to bring back those practices since they were shuttered so many years ago. But right now,

there's a lot of work to do between now and April to take over the operations."

Restoring Regional's downgraded level 3 trauma center to a level 2 will require new licensure approvals from the state — and that can take time. The county needs to get an electronic medical record system up and running and onboard the hospital's 1,000 workers into the county employee system. The county will also have to hire additional staff to revamp the care HCA reduced over the years.

Williams said it's still unclear how many new hires the county will need. He added the county expects to fill some staffing gaps with existing employees at the county's other hospitals, as well as contract workers.

The idea worries Allan Kamara, an emergency department nurse at Valley Medical Center. He said he's heard concerns from members of his union, the Registered Nurses Professional Association, that nurses will be asked to float up to Regional to help out. The issue fueled nurse strikes last April.

"VMC is already so short staffed due to the service cuts at Regional that have already occurred. Our ER is inundated with patients," Kamara told San José Spotlight.

Rachel Ruiz, a pediatric gastroenterologist at VMC and president of the county physicians' union, said physicians have signaled their readiness to travel to Regional and help keep

San Jose has a new vice mayor

wo-term San Jose Councilmember Pam Foley is getting a new title: vice mayor. Foley, who represents District 9, will take over the ceremonial role from District 1 Councilmember Rosemary Kamei, who Mayor Matt Mahan in 2023 appointed in an attempt to bridge political divides between labor and busi-

ness interests.

Foley's new role will start Jan. 28 pending approval by the full San Jose City Council.

Foley, who like Mahan is more fiscally conservative and business friendly, will take over the responsibility of filling Mahan's role of chairing meetings - and appearing at public events — on occasions where Mahan can't show up. She said her fiscally conservative approach to governance makes her a sound pick ahead of looming budget woes.

"The concerns he wants to focus on in the city are pretty much those which residents of District 9 want to focus on," Foley told San Jose Spotlight. "In many ways I am See VICE MAYOR, page 8



Why the new boundaries into



"We know we're up against higher stakes — we have a national physician shortage and our group wants to make sure the culture of Regional Medical Center is part of the county's," Ruiz told San José Spotlight.

Kamara and Ruiz agreed the county's purchase of Regional is the right move.

They see it as an exciting moment for East San Jose. They just hope the county has learned its lessons from six years ago.

When county officials bought three near-bankrupt hospitals in 2019, they promised thousands of workers at O'Connor Hospital in San Jose, Saint Louise Regional Hospital in Gilroy and DePaul Medical Center in Morgan Hill they could keep their jobs. But workers said the county reneged on that pledge once it took over — fueling early months of "chaos"

Williams said the county is more prepared this time around.

"We do have experience to draw on in terms of the steps that are needed. We're of course taking lessons learned from that prior transition," he told San José Spotlight.

In the span of a year, East San Jose went from possibly losing most of its care to seeing more health care options than it's ever known, according to Dr. Raj Gupta, a neurologist and medical director of Regional's stroke center, who risked his job speaking out against the company's cuts.

While he agrees trauma care is the first step, he said the stroke center is still in need of neurosurgeons. He said at some point the county needs to restore gastrointestinal care and care for kidney failure and disease, as well.

"I think these two services will be very vital besides your usual emergency services, critical care doctors, surgeons. We're looking forward to working with the county," Gupta told San José Spotlight.

Darcie Green, executive director of East Side patient advocacy group Latinas Contra Cancer, said she looks forward to the community laying out its vision at future town halls.

"Patients can come up with beautiful, innovative and reasonable ideas to deliver health care — we just need to listen," said Green, who helped lead protests against HCA last year.

Humane Society of Silicon Valley resumes services

doption services at the Humane Society Silicon Valley (HSSV) are back to normal, except for operating rooms after a fire that broke out on December 16 destroyed half the building and temporarily closed the space.

The crucial operating rooms are so badly damaged, the organization is searching for a surgical unit near the shelter. It's estimated that the damaged parts of the building could take at least a year to complete the repairs.

The shelter's laundry operations were damaged, along with its medical areas, shelter operation offices and all the animal-holding areas.



The Humane Society of Silicon Valley in Milpitas is recovering from a fire that broke out Dec. 16 and destroyed half of the building.

The adoption area also sustained damages leaving only two-thirds of the floor operational. No one was injured in the fire.

To keep pet adoptions and housing going during that time, the shelter's staff has been relocating animals to foster homes. More than 100 animals found their new homes.

The shelter has reached storage capacity for donations, so the staff

is now encouraging monetary donations from the community as the staff figures out the costs associated with demolition, construction and other services including renting storage spaces.

The HSSV consists of more than 150 employees and more than 3,000 volunteers. Last year, the shelter found homes for more than 6,000 animals.



Valley Water working to maintain streams to protect homes and businesses from flooding

alley Water crews worked throughout Santa Clara County this past summer and fall, maintaining local creeks as part of our Stream Maintenance Program.

Valley Water is focusing on work

in the creeks to enhance the health of our local ecosystems while reducing flood risks that threaten homes and businesses.

Valley Water currently oversees more than 300 miles of our county's 800 miles of streams. Maintaining streams ensures that our 185 miles of flood protection projects remain effective.

Valley Water crews utilize heavy equipment to remove vegetation and accumulated sediment in our creeks, ensuring water can flow downstream effectively. This proactive maintenance reduces the risk of flooding for local properties.

Bank Protection

High and sustained water flows can cause extensive damage to creek banks, eroding existing flood protection improvements and natural elements. Repairing creek banks also helps protect neighboring homes and property from damage.

Sediment Removal

Sediment and debris washed downstream can restrict water flow in some areas. During a heavy storm, these restricted-flow areas could cause water to back up, increasing the risk of flooding. Crews remove sediment to allow stormwater to flow through the creeks as designed.

Vegetation Management

Valley Water crews manage over 3,000 acres of instream and upland vegetation annually. Selective removal of instream vegetation maintains flow conveyance in streams and riparian corridors.

Mitigation

Valley Water implements mitigation projects to offset impacts associated with some of the bank protection, sediment removal, and vegetation management work.

But she said that doesn't mean she'll go along with every position Mahan takes.

"I am thoughtful in my decision-making process," she said. "We have this relationship where initially we didn't really know

each other, but developed a trust and respect. I am honored to be selected for this."

Kamei, who won her first election in the West San Jose district outright in 2022, held the title for two years. Mahan's selection of her was notable for political reasons.

San Jose politics are often split between a labor-leaning, progressive faction and one that's more business focused, which leans toward loosening rules on development and business taxes. Mahan, who typically aligns with business interests, started his two-year term in 2022 with a labor majority on the city council that at times hindered his ability to pass policies. With Mahan starting his first full four-year term, councilmembers have been more inclined to agree with his business-focused decisions.

Kamei has previously said she considers herself more moderate, not leaning too heavily on one side versus the other. She said Foley is "an excellent choice."

"She brings a lot of experience and is our most veteran councilmember," she told San José Spotlight. "This is going to be a tough year and we're going to have to make tough decisions. We have economically challenging times ahead — weighing different tradeoffs and budget priorities."

She said it's been a privilege to hold the title for the last two years.

"I think I have brought a lot of my own experience and sense of bridge building to the council and I look forward to working with Pam and the mayor and my fellow councilmembers," Kamei said.




