

The Vermilion girls team placed third in state as a team last year and returned four state qualifiers and a state alternate.

Returning state qualifiers include juniors Mackenzie Feltis, Cora Frederick, Emily Stiner (6th in state), and Marissa Torres. Sophomore Faith Sergent was a state alternate last year.

In addition to these five is junior Alyssa Woodward who is leading them all in career wins with 85 currently.

The boys' varsity team competes in the SBC conference. There are three seniors this year: Cohen Mooney, a returning district placer at 190, Logan Peterson a returning district qualifier at 165, and Ashton Clifton a returning district qualifier at 132.

The junior class is highlighted by Aiden Kyser, a returning state qualifier at 150, Ethan Stefan a returning district qualifier at 120, and Ashton Juszczyk at 126.

Brandon Gilbert has been the head coach at Vermilion for the past 11 years. Prior to that he was the head coach at Stafford High School in Virginia.

The high school assistant coaches and staff are Gene Hector, Dale Sergent, Owen Kyser, Spencer Geil, Jakob Koleszar, and Brooke Jenkins.

Hector was once the head coach at Vermilion. Additionally, he spent several years at St Edward High School. He has been back in Vermilion for the past couple of years.

Sergent wrestled for Vermilion in the late 1990s and early 2000s. He was a state qualifier and has two children in the program, Faith a sophomore, and Austin an eighth-grader.

Kyser graduated two years ago from Vermilion and was a state qualifier in 2023. He has two brothers in the program, Aiden, a junior and Isaac a freshman.

Geil wrestled and graduated from Vermilion. He went on to wrestle for Heidelberg. He has been on staff for the past few years. Koleszar wrestled and graduated from Vermilion. He was a state alternate his junior and senior years of high school. Jenkins graduated from Vermilion last year and was the heavyweight state champion!

Mike D'Egidio has been the middle school head coach for the past 11 years. He is a do-it-all kind of guy. Barry Miller is a graduate of Vermilion and has assisted with the middle school for the past few years.

Biddy coaches are Mike D'Egidio and Brandon D'Egidio who graduated from Vermilion and was a state qualifier the year Covid shut down the state tournament. He went on to wrestle at Heidelberg and now assists his dad with the youth.

He lost his home twice... ...because of title defects.

LOSING A HOME is a cruel thing, but life can be cruel - even to those destined for greatness.

Abraham Lincoln was born in a meager, one-room cabin on the Big South Fork of Nolin's Creek near Hodgenville, Kentucky. It had a dirt floor, one window and a stick-clay chimney. Lincoln's father, Tom, had paid \$200 for the cabin and 300 acres of discouraging land. It wasn't much, but it was home and the young family's only chance for a decent life.

After four years of fighting mosquitoes, heat and hardscrabble land, the Lincoln family had to pack up and leave. There was a defect in the title. They didn't have the right sort of papers and somebody else had a better claim to the land. With three-year-old Abe in his mother's arms, the family moved eight miles away to Knob Creek.

In less than four years, Tom Lincoln had to go to court to prove his ownership rights to this second farm. Another claimant to the land sued him as a "trespasser." Tom Lincoln won the suit, but was haunted by the fear that he might someday lose another property. There was enough talk of land-titles, landowners, landlords, land-laws, land-lawyers and land-sharks to make him unsure of his title. After all, Daniel Boone, the first pioneer of the Kentucky wilderness, had lost every inch of his once vast landholdings because he had "the wrong kind of papers." Tom decided to move his family to Indiana where there was rich, black land-government land with clear title and the right kind of papers. Thus, Abraham Lincoln lost a second home to title problems.



Wrestling officials needed, consider joining team

When I started officiating, I didn't start with a plan to be a state and national level wrestling official. I was a fill-in at a biddy event; they asked if I could help because there were so many kids, a referee didn't show up, and they knew I wrestled in high school and college.

Twenty-one years later, I have officiated hundreds of youth, middle school, high school, and NCAA wrestling events . . . including 11 grade school and middle school state championship OAC wrestling events, two national collegiate dual tournaments, and the 2022 OHSAA State Wrestling Tournament in Columbus.

This will be my last year as a wrestling official, but the memories and love of sport will continue to grow as I stay involved as a mentor.

Over the years, I learned it is not just about blowing a whis-

tle and raising a winner's hand. There is a deeper experience in being an official than that.

Being an official is about promoting, protecting and developing young athletes. It is about the competitors - who are usually children of all ages. It is about love and passion for sport. It's the feeling I get when I see the joy on the faces of the competitors - win or lose - when they have that one moment in the contest that electrifies the spirit within. It's being part of life's lessons they learn; from winning and losing; from being part of something bigger; from being part of the team; from achieving or accomplishing a goal; and from realization of the

I get to watch young athletes grow, learn, develop their natural skills, work hard to get better, develop determination, learn discipline, become dedicated, develop a work ethic, learn the ability to bounce back from adversity, and learn to respect teammates, opponents and oth-

These are lessons they will carry with them through their competitive sports programs and through life. And I get to be a part of it.

And then there's the other side — the relationships that I have built over the years.

I have come to be close with athletes, coaches, administrators, parents of the competitors – and fellow officials. I started late in life to become an official, because I wanted to spend time with my children when they were young. Watching my children compete and grow because another individual took the time to be there for them (as an official), showed me what the life of an official could be like — and how rewarding it could be.

In becoming an official, I gave up time with my family so that others could be involved in sports and healthy athletic com-

petition like I did. I have earned respect and friendship from many people who understand what it takes to put on the officials' uniform and go out there and facilitate a wrestling match.

In the next few years, a lot of officials are going to retire much like I am. The problem is, we don't have a lot of young people entering the career of officiating wrestling matches.

With the growth of girls wrestling in the last few years, there is an increased need for new officials – both male and female – to fill the pipeline of officials for wrestling.

My goal is to reach new people considering to be an official . . . and help them grow in their officiating skills.

Becoming an official today requires someone like me – and other current officials – to take new people under their wings and guide them through the first few years.

They need to be made to feel

comfortable, welcomed and appreciated. That is an important part of bringing new officials into the fold.

I'm hoping we can inspire current wrestlers, wrestlers who have graduated, and parents of wrestlers who are ready to make the commitment, to step forward and help continue the dynasty that has become Ohio wrestling.

Without new officials, we will lose the competitive edge that makes Ohio the "hotbed" of folkstyle wrestling in the US.

I don't think anyone begins their career officiating, planning to be that official that can do multiple state and national championships events. But, I do think anyone CAN become that official by making the commitment to be as good as you can be — for yourself, for the athletes, for the parents and for the sport of wrestling.

Please consider becoming an official.
