Ace Gives Lauderdale Sheriff's Office

FLORENCE — The Lauderdale County Sheriff's Office can now say it has an Ace up its collective sleeve.

Ace is a 11/2-year-old German shorthaired pointer, the latest addition to the sheriff's department.

This marks the first time in at least 10 years that the sheriff's office has had a K-9 unit on the force, according to Sheriff Joe Hamilton.

Ace is a drug/tracking dog and was

purchased from Arete Canine, LLC, which is in Yatesville, Georgia. "I'm excited to have Ace on board,"

Hamilton said. "He will certainly be a great asset to have in our fight against drugs within the county."

By having a K-9 also capable of tracking, Hamilton said the dog will

permits and relocate utility lines to ensure a smooth transition before demolition begins. Traffic control measures will be put in place to maintain public safety and prepare the site. The project contract is for 170 days. Demolition is anticipated to start next month.

During the demolition phase of the project, traffic flow will be impacted to ensure safety:

Pine Street from Tennessee Street to Mobile Street will be reduced to two lanes of traffic, with the north lane closed.

Tennessee Street will be shut down from Court Street to Pine Street. However, access to the municipal parking lot will remain available.

Mobile Street will be one-way westbound from Court Street to Pine Street.

The alley between Tombigbee and Tennessee Street will be open as demolition allows.

Mayor Andy Betterton stated, 'Downtown Florence is evolving, and this project is a crucial step in shaping its future. We are dedicated to keeping downtown accessible and ensuring a positive longterm impact." District 2 Council Member Jackie **Hendrix** emphasized the importance of this project for downtown Florence, stating, "This demolition is important to maintaining our vibrant downtown area. While we understand this process may cause temporary inconveniences, the longterm benefits will be well worth it. We appreciate everyone's patience and support during this

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
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

save the sheriff's department valuable time when it comes to trying to locate a missing person.

"Before we acquired Ace, we were dependent calling on for fromassistance Florence or St. Florian police

departments if we were in need of a drug dog," Hamilton added.

After acquiring the dog, Hamilton opened applications for handler. After weeding through the applications and doing interviews, Hamilton named Reggie Goodloe the handler for

Hamilton said he interviewed several applicants before picking Goodloe.

"First and foremost, I was looking for a great deputy and employee. I wanted someone who was proactive who would take this dog and do some great things with it," Hamilton said. "In addition to finding a proactive deputy, I made sure to select a deputy which would offer a great home life for the dog.

'This is something that I've wanted to do for a long time," Goodloe said. "I have a cousin who lives in Michigan who was a handler for a K-9. When I saw her do what she did, I knew then that was something I wanted to do"

Goodloe said he has had Ace for about a month and a half now.

"He's energetic and goofy, which matches my personality," Goodloe said with a laugh. "What I love most about Ace is his energy level. He's 90 mph 24/7 — always energetic and wanting to play and do his job."

And when it comes to the job, Goodloe feels having a dog like Ace gives the sheriff's department a leg up.

"It's like having an extra pair of hands when it comes to locating narcotics or missing people," he said. "Your dope dealers sometimes are a step ahead, but with a K-9, it puts us a step ahead of them.'

trained with Ace certified K-9 trainers the within Madison County Sheriff's Office for four weeks before Ace and Goodloe trained together for another four weeks, Hamilton said.

short-German haired pointers are typically used by the Transportation Safety Agency for bomb and drug detection. Their typical length of service is five to eight years, according to Hamilton.

The total cost for Ace was \$25,000. Hamilton the dog said cost \$14,000. Ace's kennel for Goodloe's home cost \$4,000, and then the retrofitting for the K-9 vehicle cost an additional \$7,000.

Hamilton said almost a third of the total cost was covered by a \$7,500 grant the sheriff's office was awarded by the United States Police Canine Association. Hamilton said he applied for the grant last year and was awarded the grant in January.

remaining funds came from the sheriff's department's discretionary money, which is funded by pistol permits, Hamilton said.

law under the fifth amendment") and First Amendment protections (citing the same ruling).

On February 24, a federal judge refused to issue a temporary restraining order restoring AP's access while the suit awaits resolution. AP reporters and photographers still possess press passes to the White House and can attend White House briefings.

Court precedent aside, I don't see anything in the Constitution requiring the president to speak to, or the White House to "brief," reporters at all, or specifying which agencies, publications, and journalists are part of a special protected class entitled to that kind of access

In fact, I suspect many Americans wish that the president (not just this one – I'm speaking of the office, not the man) acted a lot less like Dr. Phil (loud, annoying, omnipresent) and more like Punxsutawney Phil (silent, cute, and only very occasionally demanding our attention).

That said, if the press wants to cover the presidency, I suggest that the agencies, publications, and journalists get together and turn the tables.

Just as there's no constitutional requirement for the president or the White House to host, humor, and answer to journalists, there's no constitutional requirement for the press to cover the president or the White House at all.

Why don't the major newspapers, television networks, etc. get together and set up the White House "press pool" on their own terms instead of subjecting themselves to the president's terms?

They could rent, buy, or build a small studio/auditorium facility, handle their own journalist credentialing, and let the White House and the president know when they'll be hosting briefings.

The president and/ or press secretary could show up or not. If they showed, maybe they'd get some coverage. If not, there's always other news to report, right?

In anything resembling a free society, an independent press is far more important than any functionary in any fancy office. America's journalists should take that truth to heart and act on it.

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Worker's Comp Versus On-The-Job Injuries

When somebody talks about worker's comp, the implication is that there is an employer that is covered by the worker's compensation act and an insurance company. Not all companies carry insurance, although they should, and not all employees are covered by the worker's compensation act.

Joel and I have represented literally thousands of workers who have been injured on the job. Some on-the-job injuries simply aren't covered by worker's comp (scars,

minimal PTSD). If there are four or fewer employees or agricultural workers, those workers don't have to be covered by worker's comp. Occasionally, we'll see truck drivers who voluntarily agree to a different sort or type of compensatory scheme.

Worker's comp in Alabama limits the attorney's fee to 15% and is a non-liability type of case. In almost every other type of case, you have to prove that someone did something wrong or broke a rule. It's easy to think about a driver who runs a red light as a person who would be responsible for the harm they cause by breaking the rule that requires drivers stop on red. Under worker's comp, if you are on the job and run a red light and are injured, your employer still owes you worker's comp. The employer doesn't think that's fair. When employees see how little the employer's worker's compensation insurance company wants to pay, they don't think that's fair either.

The lack of fault and the minimal but guaranteed (and not taxed) compensation is truly the basis for worker's comp. If a worker on the job falls off a ladder and has a serious injury, but there are only two employees, then it's probably their fault to some degree that they fell off the ladder. There is no way to get paid (unless it's a defective ladder case). On the other hand, if you fall off a ladder and you work for a big employer, call me.

The point of this article is to explain that all worker's compensation cases involve an on-the-job injury, but that not all on-the-job injuries are covered by the Alabama Worker's Compensation Act. That's not to say that we can't find a way to help, so if you get hurt, we will do our best to find a way to help you. Sometimes, on-the-job injuries are caused by someone who did run a red light or a safety device at work that was disconnected or not maintained. Those cases can be big money cases because you can get worker's comp AND money from a third party.

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
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
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Let the Little Children

One of Trump's executive orders was establishing a White House Faith Office. More of a concern is his choice of Tupelo, MS native, Paula White-Cain to lead it

White-Cain, 58, is a Trump ally, his spiritual advisor, and is twicedivorced, which, in and of itself, wouldn't disqualify her from understanding and adhering to Biblical truths. However, she espouses 'prosperity theology' which teaches that the truly faithful are rewarded by God with material wealth, good health, and personal success. It is a highly flawed and materialistic spiritual perspective with no basis in Biblical fact.

White-Cain's lifestyle and actions are that of a stereotypical TV/Megachurch personality who twists the Gospel for profit and has little regard for adhering to and proclaiming what it takes to obtain forgiveness and salvation. She is a textbook example of a false teacher. Trump and everyone else would do well to distance themselves from any of her advice.

We all know that Trump's attitude is one that elevates himself above the Constitutional inconveniences.

As of this writing, the Constitution was not displayed on the White House website, whitehouse.gov. Is that an oversight? Regardless, since Republicans control the House and the Senate, it's time they addressed the issue of rampant overreach with the President.

The taxpayer savings through DOGE are commendable, but far from being celebratory. Thinking about extending a \$5,000 refund to taxpayers is absurd.

That candy jar will add to inflationary issues and defies the logic of debt reduction. Anyway, the 20% back to taxpayers and 20% to debt leaves 60%. That too should be going to debt.

However, understanding that inflation and expenses have been hard on many US workers, if need be, rebate \$1,000 to the 30 million taxpayers who need it most.

Immediately renaming the Gulf of Mexico was a little cheesy. It has been fine as it is, and that attitude is highly contentious if trying to work with a neighbor on immigration concerns. While on the topic, assuming that Putin is in any way an ally is a mistake. In that vein. more of a presence in the Arctic circle and relationship solid or arrangement with highly Greenland is advisable.

As I mentioned in a previous column, there is a lot of domestic overspending that reaches every corner and almost every aspect of society.

To truly address overspending and our tremendous and increasing debt, we all will have to be pinched through budgets, services, and/or conveniences.

One significant item I have never understood is Disability. Payroll deductions are taken for Social Security and Disability insurance payments – along with an employer dollar-fordollar match. That is an earned benefit.

However, in addition to the workers who become disabled, sometimes their spouses, divorced spouses, children, grandchildren, and stepchildren are also entitled to payments - all generally up to 150– 180% of the disabled's primary benefit. That is significant, especially when considering that the current demands for the Social Security system are unsustainable.

That is just one of hundreds of budgetary issues that need to be reconsidered.

To gain some historical perspective, these are some totals for Executive Orders by each President by term compiled by the *The American Presidency Project*, a nonprofit at UC Santa Barbara*.

For example, George Washington signed eight the whole time he was in office (7.85 years). Thomas Jefferson signed four in his eight years, and James Madison signed one in his eight years as President.

Fast forward to the 1860's. Abe Lincoln signed 48 in his 4.12 years. Andrew Johnson added 79 more, finishing Lincoln's second term.

The number bumped up to 217 with the eight years of Ulysses S. Grant's Presidency.

Teddy Roosevelt reset

the bar to 1,081 in his 7.47 years, although many were hugely insignificant.

Woodrow Wilson had 1803 in his eight years. Franklin Roosevelt, 3,721 In his 12.12 years. Those last two listed are not surprising, considering the levels of socialism that they espoused.

The numbers leveled off for several terms. Jimmy Carter had 320 for his four years, Reagan, 381 in his eight years. Clinton signed 364 in his eight years, George W. Bush – 291 in his eight years, Obama 276 in his eight years.

Trump had 220 in his first term and Biden, 162 in his term. As of February 20, Trump signed 75 already.

*These figures generally do not include memorandums, actions, or directives, etc. The further back in history we go, the cloudier the interpretation might be.

In addition, there are qualifiers – "numbered" and "unnumbered" – executive orders through Roosevelt's term in 1945.



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
SIGNS OF THE PAST





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Service Dogs Can Help Seniors with Disabilities

Dear Savvy Senior,

What can you tell me about service dogs for seniors with disabilities? My 67-year-old father has chronic arthritis and Parkinson's disease, and I'm wondering if an assistance dog could help make his life a little easier.

Dog Loving Leah

Dear Leah,

For people with disabilities and even medical conditions, service dogs can be fantastic help, not to mention they provide great companionship and an invaluable sense of security. But be aware that service dogs can be very expensive to purchase and the waiting list to get one can be long. Here's what you should know.

While most people are familiar with guide dogs that help people who are blind or visually impaired, there are also a variety of assistance dogs trained to help people with physical disabilities, hearing loss and various medical conditions.

Unlike most pets, assistance dogs are highly trained canine specialists - often Golden and Labrador Retrievers, and German Shepherds - that know approximately 40 to 50 commands, are amazingly well-behaved and calm, and are permitted to go anywhere the public is allowed. Here's a breakdown of the different types of assistance dogs and what they can help with.

Service dogs: These dogs are specially trained to help people with physical disabilities due to multiple sclerosis, spinal cord injuries, Parkinson's disease, chronic arthritis and many other disabling conditions. They help by performing tasks their owner cannot do or has trouble doing, like carrying or retrieving items, picking up dropped items, opening and closing doors, turning light switches on and off, helping with balance, assisting with household chores, barking to indicate

that help is needed and more.
Service dogs can also be trained to help people with medical conditions like epilepsy or other seizure disorders, autism, diabetes, PTSD and other psychiatric disabilities.

Guide dogs: For the blind and visually impaired, guide dogs help their owner get around safely by avoiding obstacles, stopping at curbs and steps, navigate shopping centers and buildings, find doors, seats, pedestrian crossing buttons and

Hearing dogs: For those who are deaf or hearing impaired, hearing dogs can alert their owner to specific sounds such as ringing phones, doorbells, alarm clocks, microwave or oven timers, smoke alarms, approaching sirens, crying babies or when someone calls out their name.

Finding a Dog
If your dad is interested in getting a service dog, contact some credible assistance dog training programs. To find them, use the Assistance Dogs International website (AssistanceDogsInternational.org) which provides a listing of around 80 accredited members and 25 candidate programs in North America.

After you locate a few, you'll need to either visit their website or call them to find out the types of training dogs they offer, the areas they serve, how long their waiting list is and what they charge. Most dog training programs charge anywhere from \$10,000 to \$40,000 or more for a fully trained service dog, however, most programs can assist with fundraising or grant applications for those in need. None of that cost is covered by health insurance or Medicare.

To get an assistance dog, your dad will need to show proof of his disability, which his physician can provide, and he'll have to complete an application and go through an interview process. He will also need to go and stay at the training facility for a week or two so he can get familiar with his dog and get training on how to handle it.

It's also important to understand that assistance dogs are not for everybody. They require time, money, and care that your dad or some other friend or family member must be able and willing to provide.

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The first thing to know is, you only receive one "Wellness" visit per year. If you go to a specialist, and they code your visit as a "Wellness" visit, you cannot go to your primary care physician and receive another "Wellness" visit. It is your responsibility to know how your visit is coded. If you do not want a visit to a specialist or primary care physician coded as a "Wellness" visit you must speak up.

The second, and maybe the most important, thing to know is; for a visit to be coded as a "Wellness" visit it must be for preventive services only. Your "Medicare and You Handbook" states; "If your doctor or other health care provider performs additional tests or services during the same visit that aren't covered under this preventive benefit, you may have to pay coinsurance, and the Part B deductible may apply." In other words, if you are having a medical issue and go to your doctor and discuss this issue, you probably will not be able to use your "Wellness" visit and must pay your copay or coinsurance. "Wellness" visits are for preventive screenings and tests only!!

If you go to your primary care physician or specialist, and they "break the news" to you that a visit is not eligible to be coded as "Wellness", please be patient with your provider. It's not that they do not want to help you; it's that Medicare will not approve it.
