## **Newsmakers, Names & Faces** Sen. Collins' Social Security Fairness Act implemented

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Susan Collins praised the Social Security Administration's (SSA) announcement that it will begin issuing retroactive payments and adjusting benefit levels for those whose monthly Social Security payments were reduced due to the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) or Government Pension Offset (GPO)-

two provisions that have SSA, approximately 3.2 unfairly lowered the retirement benefits of many public employees and their spouses. Senator Collins, along with former Senator Sherrod Brown (D-OH), coauthored the bipartisan Social Security Fairness Act (SSFA) that repealed the WEP and GPO. The bill was signed into law last month.

According to the

million Americans are due benefit adjustments or retroactive payments under the SSFA. The agency says that retroactive payments will begin depositing into bank accounts in the coming months.

"This is welcome news for beneficiaries of the Social Security Fairness Act. I am glad that the Social Security Administration has announced that ate colleagues in sending a it will begin issuing retroactive benefits and will increase monthly benefit payments to those affected by the Windfall Elimination Provision and Government Pension Offset. I will continue to urge SSA to implement the law swiftly as we finally right this wrong," Senator Collins said.

Senator Collins recently joined 27 of her Senletter to the acting commissioner of the SSA calling for the immediate implementation of the Social Security Fairness Act.

The SSA also noted that because retroactive payments are being expedited, beneficiaries may receive their payment before receiving an explanatory notice. The agency urges beneficiaries to wait until after receiving their April benefit payment before inquiring about the timeline for their benefit adjustments.

Additionally, while most cases will be processed automatically, some will require manual processing, which may delay adjustments. The SSA will provide more details on the timeline for these manual cases in the coming weeks.

## Seniors Not Acting Their Age Nordic Skiing is Back!

For the first several weeks of winter, Nordic Skiing was almost nonexistent in Maine. Rainstorms dominated the weather pattern in December and early January. Cold weather with minimal snowfall ensued. Finally, beginning in late January a succession of modest snowstorms gradually covered the trails in my favorite ski areas.

As usual, Rangeley Lakes Trails Center was one of the first to report quality ski conditions. Located at the foot of northwest-facing Saddleback Mountain in Dallas Plantation, the high elevation trail system receives over 200 inches of snow each winter. A succession of snowstorms allowed the center to groom about half of their 55-kilometer trail network.

Anxious to return to the trails, I announced a late-January Penobscot Paddle & Chowder Society (PPCS) ski trip at Rangeley Lakes Trails. Two of the usual suspects, Eggman DeCoster and Brent Elwell, enthusiastically agreed to join me.

When we arrived at the Nordic center parking area on Saddleback Mountain Road on a cold, breezy, partly sunny day, only a handful of hardy skiers had turned out to challenge the frosty weather. The friendly folks in the sizeable yurt that functions as the ski lodge eagerly updated us on trail conditions and the best choices for a lengthy ski. The center is operated by Rangeley Lakes Cross Country Ski Club and I find them to be exceptionally helpful.

Lakes Trails

The snow was fast when we began classic skiing on the easy Tote Road Trail while traveling east in a predominantly spruce forest. Gliding over long gentle hills, we arrived at a major intersection at the end of Tote Road that connects with several trails.

Consulting a trail map at the junction, we planned the next portion

eable yurt of our itinerary which was as the ski a gradual ascent on twisting, hilly Bridge Trail. Although thin in a couple of steen sections overall the

steep sections, overall the snow depth was sufficient for a stimulating climb to an open area at the foot of View Trail. True to its name, we enjoyed excellent views of Saddleback Mountain.

We progressed gradually upward on the exposed eastern half of View Trail until reaching the approximate highpoint. After following a circuitous path in a relatively level landscape northwest, we enjoyed a long exhilarating downhill ski to a junction with Lower Pumphouse Road.

Turning right, we proceeded up Lower Pumphouse to the top of a rise and then rapidly descended double-poling to a junction with the eastern terminus of Hoffman Run. Traveling westerly on Hoffman Run, we returned to Lower Pumphouse completing what I call the Hoffman Loop. The loop was so invigorating we skied it again.

After finishing the second loop, we cruised down the western end of Lower Pumphouse until connecting with Lower Pipeline Trail near the shore of Saddleback Lake.

We progressed effortlessly east on straightforward Lower Pipeline along Haley Brook to the Tote Road junction.

Another review of the trail map resulted in a decision to ascend the one-mile hill to the top of Upper Pipeline Trail. Most of the incline is on a moderate gradient that steepens at the end. While climbing, I optimistically contemplated a long rousing descent.

Our rigorous ascent accomplished, we joined the beginning of Larry Hall Trail. My companions decided to traverse south to the yurt on rolling Larry Hall Trail.

Not to be denied my downhill reward, I proceeded down Upper Pipeline into a strong headwind. Protected from the gusty weather most of the day, I misjudged the severity of the chill factor. Mine was a frigid, wind-driven descent before returning to the yurt on Tote Road completing a great day of skiing.

A few days later, Harris Farm in Dayton finally received enough snow to open their trails. I met Eggman for an entertaining ski on their outer perimeter trails on a cool, partly sunny early-February day. We glided over Joe Buzzell Trail, around Bobcat Loop, and plunged down Express Way. In short, we enjoyed another outstanding day of skiing.

As I write, we're in the midst of a significant snowstorm. Chowderheads with the PPCS are planning more ski trips. Some of us will meet at Harris Farm after the storm ends tomorrow. We'll most likely travel to Rangeley Lakes Trails the following day. Let it snow! Let it snow! Let it snow!



## **Red Cross offers free A1C testing for blood donors in March**

**PORTLAND, ME** — The American Red Cross is helping to bridge access to health care for blood donors by providing free A1C testing, commonly used to screen for diabetes and prediabetes, on all successful blood, platelet and plasma donations in March.

One-third of people lack access to regular primary care in the U.S., where diabetes affects 1 in 10 people and nearly a quarter of those living with it have been undiagnosed, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The free A1C screening aims to help address this gap by empowering blood donors with valuable information to maintain their health and well-being. This new offering is among the longtime work of the Red Cross to support the health of communities, which also includes disaster relief efforts such as basic disaster health and mental health services among other assistance.

Visit RedCrossBlood. org, use the Red Cross Blood Donor App or call 1-800-RED CROSS to book a time to give in March and learn more about your health. Additionally, all who come to give blood, platelets or plasma March 1-31 will receive a \$10 Amazon. com Gift Card by email. See RedCrossBlood.org/March for details on both offers.

You can also make a financial donation at redcross.org/GivingDay on March 26 to support people in need of disaster services such as emergency shelter, food, relief supplies, basic health care, emotional support and financial assistance. Both efforts are part of Red Cross Month activities in March.

The Red Cross is also helping to support the health of communities by installing free smoke alarms and sharing home fire safety information with families in at-risk communities through its Sound the Alarm events. Home fires claim seven lives every day in the United States, but having working smoke alarms can cut the risk of death by half.

Here in Maine, the Red Cross responded to more than 250 home fires in 2024, assisting more than 900 Mainers. This March, the Red Cross will be hosting free smoke alarm installation events in the following communities:

B R I D G I N G HEALTH CARE AC-CESS THROUGH A1C SCREENING According to the CDC, some 90% of people living with diabetes in the U.S. have Type 2, a largely preventable and often reversible insulin-resistant condition that can cause dangerously high blood sugar levels. Left untreated, Type 2 diabetes can lead to serious health complications, such as kidney failure, stroke and heart issues. "Type 2 diabetes de-

velops over years and may not cause obvious symptoms until serious damage has been done," said Dr. Courtney Lawrence, medical director for the Red Cross. "By understanding our own health, we can create a foundation to help prevent chronic illness, improve the quality of day-today living and save lives. Blood donation can now be part of that journey."

The Red Cross will begin the month-long A1C screening for successful donations starting on March 1. Donors can expect to receive the results of their test within one to two weeks through the Red Cross Blood Donor App or online donor portal, and they are encouraged to consult their health care provider if their A1C level is elevated. A1C is the latest health insight that the Red Cross provides to blood, platelet and plasma donors, who can already access ongoing donation information such as pulse, blood pressure, body temperature and hemoglobin levels.

DELIVERING CARE AMID INTENSIFYING DISASTERS As part of disaster relief efforts, disaster health and mental health services are as important as ever in the face of intensifying extreme weather across the country. The Red Cross is responding to nearly twice as many major disasters than it did a decade ago across the country — on top of everyday crises like home fires. After disasters of all sizes, the Red Cross also provides emergency lodging, food and financial assistance.

Red Cross health and mental health support may include replacing lost prescription medications and medical equipment, helping people in its shelters cope with chronic illnesses aggravated by the disaster, and providing emotional support and referrals to community health and mental health professionals for additional care.

So far this year, the Red Cross has helped people affected by large disasters such as the record-breaking wildfires in California. This came on the heels of 2024 having the second-highest number of billion-dollar disasters in a single year, due to major events like hurricanes, floods and tornadoes, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.





## Seasonal influenza activity remains elevated in Maine

AUGUSTA, ME — Influenza (flu) activity remains high across Maine with hospitals admitting over 900 individuals so far this season. The Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention (Maine CDC) encourages everyone to take steps to protect themselves and others from getting sick.

People with flu often experience fever, cough,

sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle aches, and fatigue. Certain groups face a higher risk of developing severe illness and hospitalization, including:

adults 65 years and older

people with certain chronic medical conditions (e.g. asthma, diabetes, or heart disease) pregnant people children younger 4 than 5 years (particularly 1 those under 2 years old) t

Recent data indicate that one in 10 emergency department visits in Maine are related to flu-like illness. Last week marked the fourth consecutive week with more than 100 flu-related hospital admissions in Maine. Additionally, the Maine CDC has reported

42 flu-related deaths and 109 flu outbreaks so far this season.

Vaccination is the most effective way to prevent the flu or becoming severely ill from the virus and its complications. It is not too late to receive a flu shot this season. Annual flu vaccination can help reduce the risk of illness, lessen the severity of symptoms, and prevent missed work or school.

To protect yourself and others, the Maine CDC recommends the following prevention strategies in addition to getting vaccinated:

Stay home when you are sick.

Wash your hands frequently with soap and water.

Cover your coughs and sneezes with a tissue

## **Finding meaningful** work that's flexible and close to home

Direct Support workers help Mainers stay connected to their communities

From her earliest memories, Kathleen's mother, Alice, has been independent. Having raised four children largely on her own, Alice worked until she was 85 and is a fixture in their island community.

But as Alice aged, her vision began to deteriorate. She wanted to continue living independently in the home and community she loved, but she and her kids knew that she needed a helping hand to remain safe and happy.

For the family, that helping hand came from Jim, a Direct Support worker, who lives nearby, and now visits Alice for a few hours, several days a week. He supports her with a variety of household tasks, including shopping and preparing meals. Often, the most valuable support is the conversation and camaraderie he provides.





Connecting lives, advancing community

"It makes me feel so happy to be a part of society,"

Jim is part of the growing field of Direct Support, ensuring that Mainers with age-related, physical, behavioral, intellectual and cognitive health needs have the support they need to stay safe, independent and empowered to achieve their personal goals.

For Jim, this is the ideal encore career. At 65, he retired from his full-time job; but after two years, he began to feel restless.


"If you have too much time you can overthink things and feel like you're missing out on something," he said. "But when you're helping somebody, it feels like you're in exactly the right spot. And that's such a good feeling."

For Dakota, 24, the steady presence of a Personal Support Specialist, Sonya, has made all the difference in the world. Dakota, who lives with

intellectual and developmental disabilities, says that Sonya's support has allowed him to gain the independence and a sense of connection to the community that he didn't have before. In addition to assisting with activities of daily living, her support allows him to go to the movies, go to bookstores and do many other activities he loves.
