

Congressman Vince Fong (CA-20) invites high school students within California's 20th Congressional District to compete in the 2025 Annual "An Artistic Discovery" Congressional Art Competition. High school students (grades 9 - 12) from portions of Kern, Fresno, and Tulare counties who live in California's 20th Congressional District can submit artwork on a wide variety of subjects and mediums. Entries must be submitted by Friday, April 11, 2025, to Congressman Fong's Bakersfield or Clovis offices. The winning entry will be prominently displayed in a corridor leading to the United States Capitol for one year.

All artwork must be an original concept, two dimensional, and no larger than 26" x 26" (the measurement should allow for framing) and 4" in depth. Paintings (oil, watercolor, acrylic, etc.), computer generated art, photography, drawings, collages, and prints (lithographs, silk screens, monotypes, woodcuts, and


intaglio methods) are acceptable. The winner of the overall competition will receive roundtrip airline tickets to travel to the exhibit opening in Washington, D.C. in June.

Supporting Special Needs Students: The Increasing Demand

The number of children diagnosed with developmental disabilities is on the rise, specifically attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and autism spectrum disorder (ASD). According to the CDC's National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS), nearly one in ten children have a developmental disability,

With diagnoses increasing and the demand for qualified professionals at an all-time high, schools are facing a nationwide shortage of specialists, leaving countless students lacking the care they need to thrive academically and socially.

Ahead of World Autism Day (April 2), Pro-Care Therapy, has shared ways that schools and communities can support students of all abilities in the classroom.

1. Implement Universal Design for Learning (UDL)

The UDL framework, which offers visual, auditory, tactile, and kinesthetic learning methods, helps remove potential hurdles in the learning process and caters to the diverse needs of all students, including those with neurodevelopmental and learning disorders.

2. Consider Individualized Support

Teachers can work closely with students to develop personalized learning plans that address their unique needs. This may include offering additional time for assignments, providing visual aids, or using assistive technology.

3. Foster Social-Emotional Learning

educators can encourage positive peer interactions and provide opportunities for students to build friendships and develop their social skills by ensuring students frequently engage in group



activities and cooperative learning,

4. Utilize Multi-Sensory Classroom Design

To accommodate different learning styles and sensory needs, classrooms can incorporate designated quiet spaces, natural or soft lighting, calming colors, and sensory objects. In addition, using visual aids, such as daily schedules and timers, can be particularly helpful for students with autism or ADHD.

5. Include Inclusive Books in Classroom Libraries and Reading Lists

By incorporating inclusive books, such as books with characters with disabilities, teachers expose students to varied experiences, perspectives, and challenges that may differ from their own. Breaking down stereotypes and promoting a more inclusive and supportive learning environment where students who identify with these characters feel seen.

With these tips, creating a more inclusive and supportive learning environment in classrooms where all students can thrive is achievable.

Kidney Stones Affecting Younger Ages: A Growing Concern

of pecans provides 11 percent of the daily recommended dietary fiber and are a great source of healthy fats, as 60 percent of the 20 grams of total fat found in a 1-ounce serving is from monounsaturated fat and 30 percent from polyunsaturated fat.

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

amp has become a staple of the summer season. Each year, millions of children, youth, and adults head to the hills, lakes, valleys, and parks to participate in the time-honored tradition of camp. Camp is worth its weight in gold, 9 and then some! The camp experience is life-changing - developing friendships and memories that last well beyond the final campfire. And there is a camp for literally every budget. Often camps offer special pricing or financial

Green is "zen." Research shows ● that first-hand experience with nature, like those at camp, reduces stress in children and help them better handle stress in the future. In addition to teaching children how to be good stewards of the environment, camps teach children how to enjoy the world around them and take a minute to breathe deep and feel the nature, which ultimately teaches them how to de-stress the natural way.

Mommies and Daddies do it too. Camp is not just for children and youth. There are family camp experiences, and camps for single adults, senior adults, and any adult that wants to relax and enjoy all camp has to offer. Adults benefit from the same sense of community, authentic relationships, and self-discovery that children do. Camp is an excellent vacation option, allowing adults to try a variety of new activities in a safe and fun environment.

Try this on for size! Camp is a great o place to try new activities and hobbies. Afraid of rock walls? According to ACA research, 74 percent of campers reported that they tried new activities at camp that they were afraid to do at first. And, those activities often leave lasting impressions. In the same survey, 63 percent of parents reported that their child continued new activities from camp after returning home.

Manners matter and often linger. The camp experience teaches more than just archery or lanyard making. The entire experience is made of teachable moments, perhaps one of the biggest is how to live with a group of people. Campers learn to pick up after themselves, respect each other's property, and to say "Please" and "Thank You."

Veggies taste better with friends. Hollywood and fictional novels may have given camp food a bad reputation, but in truth, camps are constantly exploring healthy food options and often are at the forefront of things like allergy specific diets, healthy snack options, and vegetarian meals. According to ACA's 2011 Emerging Issues survey, 90.7 percent of responding camps indicated that healthy eating and physical activity was an important or very important issue.

If everyone else went to camp, maybe there's something to it! Camp has played an important role in the lives of some of the most talented people in history. ACA's family resource site offers a list of notable campers - including business professionals, celebrities, artists, and great thinkers.

Camp gets those neurons pumping! Education reform debate and concern over summer learning loss have pushed academic achievement into the spotlight. "Tomorrow's leaders will be able to relate globally and find common ground with people who are vastly different from themselves — people from different backgrounds and cultures. Tomorrow's leaders will be made and educated by experiences like camp."

You may qualify for the Young Child Tax Credit even if you DID NOT have income in 2024.

- A tax credit for individuals & families who have at least one child under the age of 6 (5 or younger).
- The credit amount is up to \$1,154.
- Individuals with ITINS may also be eligible for YCTC.

To qualify for YCTC you must meet all of the following requirements during the tax year:

- You're at least 18 years old or have a qualifying child.
- Have earned income of no more than \$31,950.
- Have a valid Social Security Number or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) for you, your spouse/RDP, and any qualifying children.
- Lived in California for more than half of the filing year.
- Not be eligible to be claimed as a dependent of another taxpayer unless you have a qualifying child.



ust in case adolescence had not hit my adolescent yet. Just in case she was not already grouchy and tired and sleeping until noon and staying awake all night. Just in case she could respond to a question with words instead of grunts. Just in case all was well at the cusp between being a tween and being a teen....

Just in case.

There are braces.

Because right when your twelve-year old is done holding it together. Just when she has given up on acting like a civil human being. Just when she has realized that you cannot force her to use her words anymore.

That is the moment.

The moment when life and growth throw this ball of fun your way.

So now your picky eater who only ever ate sushi and omelets and avocado toast now only eats ... absolutely

nothing. Because you can't chew with spacers between your teeth. So it is smoothies without any berries (because of the seeds, of course) and nothing but smoothies. All day. Every day.

Not that we were eating popcorn and ribs.

But let's just make sure we don't.

No ice. No gum. No biting down on toast.

And the food restrictions are not the worst of it.

At least that is the hope I am holding onto getting me through the next eighteen- to thirty-six months.

Young Words, Big Impact: lvyskye's Journey

vyskye Madison White has been on this earth for just a little more than a decade, but already she has penned two books, runs a magazine and, most importantly, is on a mission to help other kids.

The 11-year-old Bakersfield girl is author of "Little Girl, You Are ..." and "Choices: A Book About Bullies."

"I love reading books and I wanted to make a book just like some of the books I read," she explained when asked why she decided to become an author at such a young age.

She also wanted to help other kids who may be struggling with the same issues that have challenged her.

"When I was a little girl in like kindergarten, kids made fun of me because of my skin color and my hair," she recalls. "I don't like talking about it much, not because it hurts, it's just something from the past that I don't want to bring it into now times."

Under the gentle guidance of her mom, Flossie White, Ivyskye used her experience to create a book for other kids.

"I first I wrote it out on Canva and then took it to a person that could make the writing into a book and with their help, it was easy," she said.

Once the writing bug bit, Ivyskye started doing what writers do-she writes daily for about 1.5 hours after school —and before she knew it, she was focused on creating a magazine, Princess Posse Magazine, for girls ages 5 and up and their parents and grandparents.

"I saw that a lot of kids were sad so I made something that will make sure when they are in there darkest moments, they read it and it makes them feel better," Ivyskye said.

If you're getting the sense that this is a young lady who cares about others and has the spunk to make a difference, you're right!

She also hosted a Princess Party for girls.

"The Princess Party is a party that little girls go to and they are happy. We have games, a DJ and have an enchanted feast at the party and kids dance with real life princesses," lvyskye said.

She said happiness is so important to young girls, especially.

"I think everyone wants them to be perfect," she said. "People don't listen. Maybe some girls are trying to talk but people keep shutting then up. That stuff really hurts, it hurts a lot and no one gets it."

Ivyskye said she believes that's exactly where healing and happiness must start.

"Alot of people ask why girls always look sad or have an attitude. But you make them feel small and then you don't listen and so they get an attitude. And some people say, "They're just a kid, they don't have the right [to an attitude].' Just listen."

Ivyskye's writing endeavors have earned her props from her classmates.

"They love it," she said. "They always walk up to me and say, 'I saw you on the news' and ask 'Can I have a book?""

lvyske's mother couldn't be more proud of her daughter.

"I want to talk about the resiliency of Ivvskye and how she has used her art, writing and passion for inspiring girls to overcome bullying after the unexpected death of her very involved father to an aneurysm. Not only has she overcome those challenges but as a result of COVID, she was behind a grade level in reading but she never stopped reading," explained Flossie White. "She read and read finally reaching grade level and beyond becoming a honor student."

Ivyskye recently made the Honor Roll at William Penn Elementary.

In her "spare" time, she draws, paints, attends church, feeds the homeless and plays cello.

When she completes high school, lvyskye has hopes of moving to a big city and becoming a writer in a different genre.

"I like reading comic books, too, and want to make one," she said.

For topping: Sprinkle chopped nuts and chocolate chips on cake before serving.



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

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
