100+ Women Who Care Southern Maine hits 515 members

MAINE -- Deb Bergeron, founder of 100+ Women Who Care Southern Maine, announced that the group has reached a milestone of 515 members after the February 10th meeting at the Portland Elks Lodge. "This growing group of women has collectively donated over \$685,000 since its inception in 2014. At each quarterly meeting, we select a nonprofit to receive a donation made up of equal contributions from all members. Together, we create real, lasting change in our communities- beyond what any of us could accomplish alone. The charities present stories that highlight the life-changing impact they're making, reminding us of the difference we can create when we come to-

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gether."

Carol Colton from The Independent Seniors Network, a nonprofit organization dedicated to supporting seniors who wish to age in their homes, presented their organization and was selected as the February recipient. Their mission is to provide services to enable seniors to maintain active, social, safe, and independent lives through a network of volunteers and community resources. These services are offered in the greater Portland area and surrounding towns, funded by minimal membership fees, donations, and grants. As a result of the award, Independent Seniors Network has now received approximately \$24,000. The two runner-up nonprofits, In Her Presence and Grace-Street commits to donating \$50 Ministry, will each receive \$2,000. each quarter to the nonprofit chosen at each meeting,

The chosen nonprofit from the November 2024 meeting, Camp No Limits, shared how the \$24,000 they received has positively impacted their program. Over the past 10 years, Maine nonprofits supporting a wide range of causes have benefited, including those focused on veterans, seniors, children with disabilities, pregnant women, fishermen, terminally ill young adults, victims of domestic abuse, animal welfare, teens, immigrant families, incarcerated youth, animal rescues, and more.

Women are welcome to attend meetings as guests to see if the group is a good fit for them. Each member commits to donating \$50 each quarter to the nonprofit chosen at each meeting, although attendance is not required. At each meeting, three nonprofits—randomly nominated by members—present 5-minute pitches, followed by 5 minutes of Q&A. Afterward, the group votes to select the nonprofit that will receive the donations. Donations go directly to the nonprofit via credit card or check.

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Seniors Not Acting Their Age **Challenging Skiing on Hammond Ridge Trails**

In recent years, several friends have recommended Nordic skiing on the Hammond Ridge Trails (HRT) near Baxter State Park. About a three hour drive from my home in Topsham, arranging a trip to ski the trail system is logistically difficult. A major mid-February storm that dropped 16 inches of snow on the area motivated me to plan two days of skiing in the vicinity.

On the first day, I skied the excellent Penobscot River Trails in Grindstone. While there, I met another skier. Andv Peake, who expressed interest in skiing the HRT the following day. Later that evening, longtime outdoor friend, Ken Gordon, a vet-

eran of HRT, said he would join us. A trip was on!

The HRT is owned and operated by New England Outdoor Center (NEOC) and is located a few miles north of Millinocket near the southern entrance to Baxter State Park. According to the NEOC website and Maine Trail Finder, the trails were designed by Olympian and preeminent trail builder John Morton. They report the network is a mixture of exhilarating downhills, invigorating up hills and everything in between; further stating there are 16 miles of groomed cross-country ski trails on rugged terrain that offer spectacular views.

The three of us drove

north out of Millinocket on

moderately difficult - the firm snowpack was the reason.

After completing most of the 2.2 mile loop, we connected with Twin Pines Loop for a short distance and crossed Blackcat Road before joining Katahdin View Trail. We climbed steadily on the 1.6 mile Katahdin View Trail, also on solidified snow. The trail lived up to its name as we enjoyed wonderful views of Mount Katahdin at the top. Most of the remainder of the path was comparatively steep downhill. Given the unforgiving surface, I used the snowplow technique to control my speed for much of the exhilarating descent.

At the bottom, we rejoined Twin Pines Loop. The trail is confusing in this area. After some trial and error, we completed two road crossings and located the Lakeside Trail.

The 1.7 mile Lakeside Trail travels northeast and then loops back along Millinocket Lake. It appeared to have been groomed and tracked the previous day. Unfortunately, high winds had blown an abundance of small spruce branches and needles onto the trail slowing progress and requiring careful maneuvering. Despite the obstacles, we glided along on gentle grades back to Twin

Pines Loop.

The remainder of our trek on Twin Pines Loop was on newly groomed trail in excellent condition. This sector offered very scenic pleasurable skiing. We passed a trail junction that leads to NEOC and again crossed Blackcat Road.

Soon after, a trail to Black Cat Peak was encountered on the right. The 2.8 mile Black Cat Peak Trail is rated the most difficult skiing in the trail network. Ken had skied the precipitous route during a previous visit and advised that it was a time-consuming endeavor. Since all of us had long drives home, we decided to forego the arduous adventure on this trip.

After passing the Black Cat Peak junction, we began climbing steadily on Twin Pines Loop. The well-groomed surface facilitated an efficient ascent and we progressed rapidly back to Saddle Loop Trail. A short ski brought us to the original trailhead.

We were disappointed with the condition of the trails; wrongly assuming all trails would be freshly groomed. That said, they were exciting, scenic and challenging. We hope to return to complete Black Cat Peak and Hammond Ridge Trails. However, we'll call

and confirm the grooming status before committing the time and travel.

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
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Letter to the Editor: **Eradicate hunger in Maine, Check-off box on your 1040ME**

May 16, 2024: New data released from Feeding America's annual Map the Meal Gap study this week confirms what people in Maine and the statewide hunger relief network have been experiencing over the past two years: rates of food insecurity are on the rise.

December 23, 2024: Quoting a report titled Food pantries see increased need; report finds Maine food insecurity up 47%, published by WGME On Your Side: "Last week, Bangor's Salvation Army said it's seen triple the numbers of those in need just in the last year from about 30 to 35 families showing up to eighties, nineties and even into the hundreds.

March 12, 2025: Quoting an article published in the Portland PressHerald titled USDA cuts programs that supply local food to schools, food banks: "The federal agency canceled contracts to continue providing food and funding to Maine schools and nonprofits for 3 more years. The change comes **99% of U.S. counties are home to people who can't afford food** Individuals with limited or uncertain access to adequate food in 2017:



The Feeding America map shows that Maine is the highest in New England for food insecurity.

as one in eight Mainers about 180,000 people faces hunger. That includes roughly 45,000 children, about 20% of the state's total population under 18."

If you worry that chronic hunger may continue to afflict more than 180,000 Mainers or even increase due to additional federal policies possibly cutting back existing programs, please continue your personal efforts in your location, but also, please consider contributing state-wide by checking off a box on:

#8. TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program) on Schedule CP of the 1040ME form.

You have the option of contributing \$5 or \$10 or \$25 by checking one of those boxes, or more

by checking "other" and adding the amount of your contribution.

If just half of Maine's 800,000 income taxpayers check off \$5 or \$10 or \$25, that would raise 2Million or 4Million or 10Million this year.

Your contribution will either be deducted from your refund or you will receive an invoice if you will not be receiving a refund in this tax year. Look for Schedule CP, which is a separate form that is included in the 1040S-ME short form booklet and in the 1040-ME long form booklet. (If you typically do not itemize Charitable Contributions, you may never have seen it.)

Or let your accountant know that you would like to support TEFAP.

And this option will remain on 1040ME's Schedule CP in future years, so consider making this a habit. Mention it to your colleagues, family, and friends. Submit a blurb to your community or religious bulletin.

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Disbursement of the funds is handled by Maine's Department of Agriculture, Conservation, & Forestry (DACF) which has the ability to reach every nook and cranny of Maine, including the inhabited islands, funding food pantries and community hunger prevention programs, including the tiniest to the major non-profits working to feed those in need.



Arts education in focus at spring conference

WATERVILLE,

ME-For several years the arts scene in Waterville has been growing and expanding, cementing the city's burgeoning reputation as a destination for concerts, festivals, creative workshops, and more. Public comment open for Monarch Butterfly Endangered Species Act

MAINE -- The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is reopening the public comment period for a proposed rule to list the monarch butterfly as a threatened species under the Endangered Species Act. The proposed rule includes species-specific protections and flexibilities to conservation encourage of the butterfly under section 4(d) of the ESA. The comment period will be

reopened for 60 days, until May 19, 2025, to give all interested parties an additional opportunity to comment on the proposed rule, which was published on December 12, 2024. Comments that were previously submitted do not need to be resubmitted as they are already incorporated into the public record and will be fully considered in the final listing determination. Public comments

are an integral part of the ESA listing determination process, and the Service recognizes the complexity of the information requested for public comment in the proposed rule. By reopening the public comment period, the agency is ensuring everyone has a chance to share information relevant to the conservation status of the species, including the associated 4(d) rule and pro-

posed critical habitat designation.

The reopening of the public comment period for the monarch butterfly will publish in the Federal Register Reading Room. A reopened 60-day comment period will open on March 19, 2025, and will close on May 19, 2025. Information about how to submit comments can be found on regulations.gov by searching for docket number FWS-R3-ES-2024-0137.

Everyone can play a role in saving the monarch butterfly. Because of the species' general habitat use and wide distribution, all sectors of society have an opportunity to participate in a broad range of conservation efforts throughout the butterfly's range. 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

New Maine hearing loss support chapter wins national award

MAINE -- The national organization Hearing Loss Association of America (HLAA) has awarded the Downeast Chapter of Maine the "Up and Coming HLAA Chapter of the Year." Pat Dobbs began losing her hearing in her early 20s and now has a cochlear implant. She has been an HLAA leader for

over 20 years, founding the HLAA-Morris County New Jersey Chapter and earned a Peer Mentoring certification from Gallaudet University. She moved to Maine in 2019.

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

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Direct Support workers help Mainers stay connected to their communities

From her earliest memories, Kathleen's mother, Alice, has been independent. Having raised four children largely on her own, Alice worked until she was 85 and is a fixture in their island community.

But as Alice aged, her vision began to deteriorate. She wanted to continue living independently in the home and community she loved, but she and her kids knew that she needed a helping hand to remain safe and happy.

For the family, that helping hand came from Jim, a Direct Support worker, who lives nearby, and now visits Alice for a few hours, several days a week. He supports her with a variety of household tasks, including shopping and preparing meals. Often, the most valuable support is the conversation and camaraderie he provides.

"Jim is my godsend," Alice said. "I look forward to him every single week."

Jim is part of the growing field of Direct Support, ensuring that Mainers with age-related, physical, behavioral, intellectual and cognitive health needs have the support they need to stay safe, independent and empowered to achieve their personal goals.

For Jim, this is the ideal encore career. At 65, he retired from his full-time job; but after two years, he began to feel restless.

"If you have too much time you can overthink things and feel like you're missing out on something," he said. "But when you're helping somebody, it feels like you're in exactly the right spot. And that's such a good feeling."

For Dakota, 24, the steady presence of a Personal Support Specialist, Sonya, has made all the difference in the world. Dakota, who lives with

intellectual and developmental disabilities, says that Sonya's support has allowed him to gain the independence and a sense of connection to the community that he didn't have before. In addition to assisting with activities of daily living, her support allows him to go to the movies, go to bookstores and do many other activities he loves.

"It makes me feel so happy to be a part of society," he said. "With her support, I really feel like I've been able to flourish."
