Molly Vouk, 44, Aitkin, is the director. "I have lived in Aitkin for two years," she said to Aitkin schools. I have been acting on and off since high school." Her son Tyce is a ninth grader at Aitkin and daughter Kennedy is a recent graduate.

Different than past years, the leadership for the spring Aitkin High School Musical is broken up into three parts. Vouk is the director. Jennifer Johnson, the AHS choir director, is the musical director. Loren Vonasek, longtime art teacher, is the set designer. The many dances are designed by a contracted choreographer —Ann Borash of Brainerd.

By the time the musical is on stage, staff, cast and crew have put in hundreds of hours working on it over the winter.

"We have put in a lot of time on this," explained Vouk. "The auditions were held the second week of January, right after Christmas break. Monday, January 13, was the first read through. Then the leads met every night from 6 to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday. Starting on Feb. 22, the ensemble came into the rehearsals"

Extra work is done on the weekends, with one weekend devoted to learning dance numbers and another to painting sets.

"We work during students' homerooms, after school and in the evenings. It is a busy, busy time." is helping with costumes."



Special elections set to fill vacant Minnesota Senate District 6 seat

Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz has called for a special election in April to fill the vacant seat of Senate District 6, formerly held by Sen. Justin Eichorn. Eichorn resigned after being arrested and charged for allegedly soliciting a 17-year-old girl.

The Special Primary Election will be Tuesday, April 15 for the vacated seat. The Special General Election will be Tuesday, April 29. District 6 covers most of Crow Wing County as well as parts of Cass and Itasca Counties. Minnesota Statute 204D.19, requires a special election be held within 35 days. mn.gov/statutes/ cite/204d.19

The candidate filing period for vacant Minnesota Senate District 6 seat opened March 26 and runs through Tuesday, April 1.

To run for office, a candidate must meet all of the following requirements:

- Be a citizen of the United States
- Be an eligible voter
- · Must be a resident of Minnesota for at least one year before the general election
- Must be a resident of their district for at least six months before the general election
- Must be 21 years or older upon assuming office
- Must have maintained residence in their district for at least 30 days before the general election
- Pay all filing fees or present a petition in place of filing fee as allowed by statute
- Complete and file an affidavit of candidacy
- Complete and file campaign finance reports

Current candidate roster:

As of press time, nine candidates have filed to compete for the Minnesota Senate seat left vacant by the resignation of Sen. Justin Eichorn, R-Grand Rapids.

Emily LeClaire (DFL)

Among those entering the race is Emily LeClaire, a Brainerd DFLer who quickly announced her candidacy following Eichorn's departure. LeClaire, who previously ran for the Minnesota House District 6B seat in 2024, now seeks the Senate seat covering portions of Cass, Itasca, and Crow Wing counties.

Nicky Hardy (DFL)

Nicky Hardy is the second DFLer to announce her candidacy. Hardy is a native Minnesotan, mother, scientist, and substitute teacher with a passion for education and community service.

In the Republican field, a diverse group of candidates have emerged, including former Republican Party chair and Nisswa Mayor Jennifer Carnahan. Carnahan, who led the Minnesota GOP from 2017 to 2021, emphasizes her experience in both politics and business. She is committed to addressing the rising costs of living and advocating for stronger communities.

Steve Cotariu (Republican)

Steve Cotariu, a U.S. Army veteran and businessman, has also thrown his hat in the ring, pledging to bring practical solutions and leadership to the Senate. Cotariu, a graduate of West Point and the Wharton School of Business, supports job creation, tax cuts, and reduced regulation.

Josh Gazelka (Republican)

Brainerd resident Josh Gazelka, son of former Senate Majority Leader Paul Gazelka, entered the race after encouragement from community members. A former cider business owner, Gazelka aims to address regulatory burdens on small businesses.



Better treatments urgently needed for Guillain-Barré Syndrome

Five-year-olds can be goofy. That was my first thought several years ago when my son stumbled and fell to the ground.

But when he failed to get up and told us that his legs hurt, my husband and I grew worried. By the time we got him to a doctor, his mystery sickness had progressed. He couldn't walk down the hall to the exam room without bracing himself against the wall.

It's difficult to describe the sheer terror I felt in that moment. His body was seizing up, but he remained aware of his surroundings. Worst of all, there was nothing I could do to fix it.

Eventually we learned that we were among the thousands of American families affected each year by Guillain-Barré Syndrome, or GBS — a rare, debilitating neuromuscular condition that can strike anyone at a moment's notice.

Despite GBS's life-altering impact, treatment options today are limited, outdated, and often inadequate. Developing more effective therapies for this terrible disease should be an urgent public health priority.

Just diagnosing GBS is a challenge. An initial battery of tests on our son revealed noth-

ing. His paralysis progressed The two commonly used to rapidly — within hours he could not stand or lift his arms above his waist. A spinal tap 24 hours after the onset of symptoms showed elevated protein levels. At that point, our doctor knew it was GBS.

GBS doesn't discriminate. Everyone from young children to the elderly can fall victim. GBS typically strikes without warning and moves at lightning-fast speed. Some patients experience only mild to moderate symptoms, while others lose the ability to chew, swallow, or even breathe without a ventilator. Ultimately, about one in 20 people with the condition die from it.

Since the disease moves at such a fast clip, it's critical to identify and treat it promptly. Sadly, however, patients who show up at the emergency room with symptoms of GBS are often told that they're suffering from stress or dehydration and sent home. In many such cases, the muscle weakness keeps intensifying, and patients end up back at the hospital practically paralyzed.

Despite abundant progress in many other disease areas in recent years, there is still no therapy approved specifically for GBS in the United States. treat GBS - intravenous immunoglobulin and plasma exchange — have to be administered in a number of courses and can take weeks to take effect.

With the current standard of care, 40% of GBS patients will still need to be admitted to the ICU. One-quarter will require mechanical ventilation. Close to one-fifth can't walk within one year of treatment, and about half experience pain for upwards of three years following recovery.

The good news is that scientists could be on the verge of a paradigm-shifting breakthrough. As we speak, researchers are working overtime to develop therapies that, for the first time, specifically target GBS. One experimental treatment has shown the potential to cut total recovery time, and thus the amount of time the disease has to progress, in half.

Change to State telework policy

Governor Tim Walz announced on Tuesday, an update to the telework policy for state employees, requiring most state agency employees to work in-person for at least 50% of scheduled workdays beginning June 1. Around 60% of state employees already work in-person and did so throughout the entirety of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"This approach balances the flexibility of telework with the workplace advantages of being in office," said Governor Walz. "Having more state employees in the office means that collaboration can happen more quickly and state agencies can build strong organizational cultures more easily."

The policy change provides an exemption for employees who live more than 75 miles away from their primary work location, helping the State of Minnesota benefit from top talent in every corner of the state.

This policy change supports the economic vitality of office districts like downtown Saint Paul, bringing foot traffic back to businesses and public spaces. Many major Minnesota employers are also now requiring in-person workdays for their employees.





RONALD EDWIN KAATZ

Arizona, and Arkansas. At 18, Ron joined the U.S. Marine Corps. He served three years, leaving as a Sergeant, chief of a radio communications unit. Ron then used the G.I. bill and hard labor as a construction worker to enter the University of Minnesota and study economics, probability, and statistics. He graduated and walked out of the University right into a job at the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis. There he was rapidly promoted into management and retired more than 30 years later as a Senior Vice President. He served as Chairman of the Board of the First Unitarian Society of Minneapolis. In 1971, Ron bought 80 acres near the town of Aitkin. The place had swampland and trees, but no house, only a small "shack" with no water, no electricity, no insulation, a wood burning stove, and a 2-seater outhouse. Ron loved it. Weekends year-round for nearly 20 years were spent there with his family and friends. In 2000. Ron moved from Minneapolis to live at The Swamp full-time. He bought 40 more acres of natural swampland, which he left undeveloped intentionally. On the 80, he spent time planning, building, remodeling and landscaping. To help him (and to do the real work), he hired talented locals who turned into friends: Dave Paulson, Charlie Jackson, and Toby Gabrio.

broken noses and injured knees. Not to mention the grueling hours and commitment it takes to pull off a great show. And we have just that... a great show!

"Most people don't understand how many hands and jobs there are in a full production of a musical. There are many moving parts, and I am blessed to have worked with such a great team." summed up Vouk.

Set Designer Loren Vonasek is a longtime Aitkin art teacher who has worked on designing sets, running the technical booth and handling other duties for 60 local productions over 30-plus years, including The Aitkin High School Choir Spring Musicals, AHS one-act plays and community theater productions.

"The vibe we are creating

for the sets for Footloose is contemporary," explained Vonasek. "We are achieving a 1980s ambiance through the use of grid patterns and a subdued color palette. Set pieces are moved around to highlight the different venues featured in scenes: such as the gas station and the burger joint. We illustrate the scenes more by projecting images on a backdrop."

"I am so excited to be back at Aitkin High School this year," Musical Director Jennifer Johnson said. "This show is full of familiar tunes that the audience will recognize such as "Footloose." "Holding Out for A Hero," "Let's Hear It for The Boy," and "Almost Paradise." There will also be several songs written specifically for the stage musical that will be new to the audience but will play a huge part in telling the story. Several musical numbers include our entire 49-member ensemble and others will be sung by specific characters throughout the show. There is a ton of energy, dancing, and joy in this show, and we hope that the audience leaves feeling that. We also hope that they will leave having felt inspired by the story that we are telling. It's a story about finding joy even in the midst of tragedy. It's about listening to the voices of young people, accepting differences, and standing up for what you believe in. It's about learning from each other and it's about a community coming together to celebrate life—just like our community coming out to our show!"

Johnson explains that her role is primarily to teach students the music, both in choir class and after-school rehearsals. We rehearse the full ensemble music in choir class daily and, in addition to learning to sing our vocal parts, we also learn how to add dynamics, use good diction, get into character, and how to effectively breathe, so that we can sing while dancing our choreography —not an easy task. Students with lead or supporting roles also have several individual or small group numbers that they learn both on their own and in after-school rehearsals with me. All of us work together on many aspects of the show, but we all have our focus and that is what makes us a strong team."

"These kids have worked so hard to put this show together and we truly can't wait to share it with you,"Johnson said. "We hope that you will come out to support our fine arts students and their incredible talents. These are the best kids, and I promise you won't want to miss it."
