Dear Editor,

The beauty of Dickinson County is among nature's best. It has been a bit unsettling over the past few years to take in the sights and sounds of an increasing number of towering wind turbines and miles of highline wires. It has been a dramatic permanent transformation of our natural landscapes. We now have 146 wind turbine towers in our county. An out-of-state company, Invenergy and its Red Rock Energy Center, wants to plant more promising money and progress. How many more? We wish we knew. When will these out-of-state companies think Dickinson County has enough towers? Will 1,460 or 14,600 towers be enough? This letter is being written to hopefully **MOTIVATE** many of you to **ACT**, **COME TOGETHER**, and **HELP** determine when Dickinson County has had enough towers.

It is usually instructive to follow the money. It would be nice if we could, but there is little transparency. When you see those turbine blades moving, money is also moving - millions to out-of-state corporations. Much of the cash comes from government subsidies and tax breaks—our tax dollars, handed over to them along with taxes from every county in the USA. What do we get back? Relatively little it turns out. The tax revenue to the county they brag about is a sliver next to their haul. Our electric bills? Up 16% last year, even as these turbines occasionally spin. That power doesn't light our homes—it's shipped off to faraway grids. We're paying more for less. We need confirmation that our sacrifice is worth it. Currently, it seems like a raw deal. We know the vast majority of dollars in the "deal" don't flow here. Unfortunately, the "deal" can't be defined.

We know the landowners leasing their fields get a cut, and they deserve it—farming's tough. However, there are costs that all of us have to bear. Beyond the taxes paid to subsidize the corporations, our local taxes are increasingly consumed. Their heavy trucks tear up our roads during construction and we spend more on upkeep around their turbine sites. Jobs? A quick burst of itinerant workers comes and goes, leaving a handful of maintenance gigs. The "economic boom" sounds shiny until you see how little sticks around. Show us the numbers—how much have the current 146 towers brought to local wallets? More turbines do not feel like a win for the residents of Dickinson County.

There are costs we can see with our own eyes. This is information we can trust. During the day, our horizons are forever carved up by towers and at night previously pure skies are dominated by blinking lights. The proposed next generation of towers, at nearly 600 feet tall, would be visible from over 17 miles away, well over halfway across Dickinson County. Look at old wind farms worldwide: useless towers litter the land, boneyards filled with blades, the unfulfilled promise of a short term "clean energy" rotting away. They are not recycled. Dickinson County will be no different.



Why do we want more wind towers? Can a convincing argument be made for us to bear these costs and compel us to leave our kids a county that's louder, uglier, and poorer in spirit? Once these giants rise, there's no undoing it—the bell's rung and the damage done. A few decades from now after their purported productive lives are spent, the weathered towering eyesores won't look any better.

Farmers should decide what's best for their land, no question. But when turbines roar and pollute our views, it doesn't stop at the fence line. We best know our land's worth and need to protect its beauty and strength. Wind turbine projects trade our heritage for a quick buck that skips town. We've hosted 146 towers already. We think that is enough for now. And again, what potentially would be enough if we do not get involved? Until we can determine if the sacrifice of our lands is worth some greater good, until we see the costs we bear bring about lower electric bills with substantial revenue staying local, 146 is enough. If the facts can be discovered and show real gain for Dickinson County and our environment –not just distant shareholders–we're all ears. But right now, it's a lopsided deal: the out of state corporation gets rich due to our sacrifices.

We are not against progress—we're against being played. Take the time to attend meetings. Watch for notices of public hearings, contact your local board of supervisor representative, and share your concerns with state officials. Demand the full financial breakdown including corporate profits —where's the money going, and what's it doing for us? Support our local leaders so we can together best determine if additional wind turbines could help our wallets and protect our lands. If towers can't do that, tell them no more, 146 is enough.







and overnight stay at Milford Sunday, July 20. They have set a fundraising goal of \$50,000 to assist with expenses expected to be incurred with this visit. Several ideas were brought to the table but perhaps the most interesting and most entertaining idea will be the opportunity for people to "Adopt A Port-a-Potty." With 20,000 plus riders expected, there will be 100 port-a-pottys throughout the city. This is where the meeting and the people on the committee got a little crazy.



Remember their second goal is to have FUN, FUN, FUN. The rules of this fundraiser are simple. For \$25 each, a person can adopt one or more of 100 port-a-potties for this event. On the front door of the potty, a photo and/or a message will be printed on a laminated poster. This is a fun way to welcome riders to Milford with your message, say Happy Birthday to someone, advertise your business or use one of many message possibilities. The committee reserves the right to make sure messages are not vulgar or political in nature, harming anyone, and the right to reject any message we deem inappropriate. You may submit a photo or have a staff photographer take the photo. Volunteers will randomly hang the posters as soon as the potties arrive. Locals may find it fun to travel around to view the posters. The committee expects to raise \$2,500 toward their \$50,000 goal with this project as well as experience a whole lot of fun throughout the ordeal. Milford Mayor, Steve Anderson, eagerly paid his \$25 to be the first to adopt. His photo and message, as shown, will be seen on a potty probably placed close to City Hall. To date, 10 adoptions have been made by members of the budget and fundraising committee and even a Waukee, Iowa, resident. There are only 90 spaces left.

To get on the adoption list, please call Susan Reiser, 712-320-2584, and start the process. Unlike regular adoptions, this will be fast and to the point. Help the Millford RAGBRAI Committee reach their \$2,500 goal for this idea. Their budget and fundraising committee will also be reaching out to the community for larger donations toward the event. The fundraising levels are: \$500 -Kickstand Sponsor; \$1,000 - Spoke Supporter; \$2,500 - Gear Grinder Sponsor; \$5,000 - Chain Reaction Sponsor.

Beyond the Bracket: Final Four Musings

You couldn't have had much more polar opposite games for the Women's and Men's NCAA Final Four games this past weekend. The Women's Championship saw two lopsided games on Friday night with South Carolina beating Texas 71-57 in a SEC matchup, and UCONN drubbing UCLA 85-51 in the nightcap. UCONN continued their dominant NCAA Tournament run on Sunday night in the Championship Game, taking down the defending National Champions, South Carolina 82-59 in a game that was controlled by the Huskies from start to finish. This is UCONN's 12th national championship, but their first since 2016. While I like to see new teams win the title, I was happy for Huskie standouts Paige Buekers and Azzi Fudd, who have both battled through major knee injuries to reach this plateau with their teammates. Fudd finished with 24 points and earned the Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four award while Buekers added 17 points. It was also nice to see a team with mostly original players on their roster win the big game.

The Men's games on Saturday night were both hard-fought battles that came down to the wire. In another SEC matchup, Florida rallied from an eight-point half time deficit to beat Auburn for the second time this season, 79-73. Gator senior guard Walter Clayton, Jr continued his NCAA Tournament brilliant play with a 34-point performance, including five three-pointers. Clayton became the first player to score over 30 points in Elite Eight and Final Four games since the legendary Larry Bird in 1979. The nightcap was another thriller, with Houston rallying to take down Duke 70-67. The Cougars came back from a 14-point deficit with just over 8:00 remaining, ending the game on an amazing 9-0 run in the final :33. Houston pulled out the improbable win the same way they have won all season, with their stifling defense. The Cougars limited the high-scoring Blue Devils to just one basket in the last 10:00 of the game, including a 1-9 stretch in the final four minutes with the game on the line. Senior L.J. Cryer had a sensational game for Houston, finishing with 27 points while senior big man J'Wan Roberts added 12 rebounds and 11 points, including two big free throws with :16 left to give the Cougars a one-point lead. While the over-the-back call that led to those free throws may have been questionable, one could not question that Houston deserved to win this game with how they stayed the course of playing their style with constant ball pressure that just wore Duke out. Houston and Florida should be a great game on Monday night (we go to press Monday afternoon so as you read this you will know who won). I think Houston's defense will give Florida problems and the Cougars will pull out another close game, winning their first National Championship 71-68.

While the SEC was the most-talked about men's conference all season long, the Big 12 has shown once again in this NCAA Tournament that they are one of the best leagues in the nation. Heading into the National Championship game, the Big 12 has the best record at 14-6, an impressive .700 winning percentage, the SEC is second at 21-12 (.636) with the Big 10 third at 13-8 (.619). One thing has held true in both Final Fours, experience and culture matters as both teams playing in the National Championship games are dominated by juniors, seniors and fifth-year graduates, which is great to see in this new NIL and Transfer Portal world!





Mike Fergen followed up with another world class presentation of why the (fiscal year 25/26) General Levy must be reduced to 2.45.

A citizen - a little person - said he was making \$32,000 a year - that he was financially being eaten alive with higher and higher real estate tax and rising insurance costs. And he and his wife didn't want to be forced out of their home. He reminded the Board of Supervisors that last year two Supervisors were voted out of office and that "could happen to you, too."

But the County Bureaucracy was prepared to strike back: Yes, yes we over-tax and have a huge reserve. But you must know we failed to match our bond portfolio maturity dates to our own cash flow needs. Because of our failure to match our bond maturities to our needs, we can't cash in our bonds without a loss.

1/2 of the reserves as they are specifically allocated by law and can't be touched.

In other words, you must be eaten alive financially and may lose your house and have to move to a senior home but our bureaucratic needs are more important than yours.

And then to sum it up, Steve Clark: Yes, yes we have overtaxed with the highest levy we could get by with. We can't help it if someone goes to Arnolds Park and buys a little house for \$267,000 and rents it out. We can't help it if someone buys a lake home for millions of dollars - and the assessment goes way up. That's just the way it is, people want to live here and they are paying higher and higher prices to do so. And if you can't afford to live here you may have to move - as many people before you have had to move. Get used to it.

The real estate tax is the cruelest of all taxes and the most regressive of taxes, and not based on your ability to pay and must totally be eliminated.

Property tax is an outdated system. It punishes people simply for owning something - a home - regardless of their income or life situation. Just because a neighbor renovates their kitchen, builds an addition, or rents their property doesn't mean YOUR tax burden should go up. But under this system, it often does. Property taxes are based on assessments that don't reflect actual income, and they assume you can afford ever-increasing costs simply because you live somewhere. This isn't fair and it doesn't make sense in today's world. The little person should not be penalized because someone down the road decided to invest money into their own home. One person's upgrade shouldn't dictate another person's hardship.

New Bike Trail to Connect Milford, **Enhance Community Connectivity**

Anew initiative, the Milford West Okoboji Bike Trail Project, is underway, aiming to provide safe and accessible cycling routes

When finished reserving items, click "LOG OUT" in the upper right-hand corner. Wait for the notification (text, email, or phone call) that your order is ready to be picked up. We will put a wrapper around your order and place it in alphabetical order by last name in the entryway of the library. Curbside items are available to pick up Monday through Thursday, 8:15 a.m.-6:00 p.m.; Friday 8:15 a.m.-4:00 p.m; and Saturday 8:30 a.m.-2:00 p.m.

You will have three days to pick up your reserved materials. Don't have time to pick them up? Ask us about how to suspend your reserves. If you have any questions, please call us at (712) 336-2667.

The Roman Emperor Marcus Aurelius (121 - 180 A.D.) acknowledged this with the simple statement: "What stands in the way, becomes the way". Others, like Jack Canfield, have expressed it in a formula. The formula reads "Event + Reaction = Outcome" stressing that without a reaction no outcome can be determined. It also means that no event by itself has any meaning until you attach your reaction to it. So how you react to setbacks in your life is key to finding the meaning of things that happen to you in life.

Below are 6 steps that I've found are helpful when dealing with setbacks.

1.Accept it. Acceptance can take time and be difficult. Spending energy on complaining, wishing it wasn't happening, or other negative thoughts is just wasting time and energy. Begin by acknowledging the reality of the situation and you will be a lot better off.

2. Stay positive. We have choices to make in life. A relatively simple choice we have in life that can have a major impact is to simply choose to be a positive person. Choose to assume good intentions in others. Ask yourself, what can I learn from this experience?

3. Take action. Setbacks can sometimes paralyze us and stop us in our tracks. It's OK to step back and think for a bit, but do not let inaction set in. Take a small step to act in a positive and constructive way. If you find yourself in this situation, the first step is the hardest. Find a way to move in a positive direction. Once you start, you'll find and build upon your own momentum.

4. Talk about it. Find someone you trust to have a conversation about it. Another option is to write about it. There is something magical about talking through an issue with a trusted friend or placing your thoughts down on paper. It clarifies things and often things are not nearly as bad as what you might have thought. Pro-tip: It's easy to want to shut down and isolate yourself. However, walling yourself off to the world is one of the worst things you can do. We all have people in our lives that want to help us - spouses, family, friends, clergy, professional colleagues. Find someone and talk to them. Get over your fear, self-loathing, apathy, or embarrassment and reconnect with those you love and the world around you.

5. Learn from it. No matter what comes your way in life, there are silver linings to everything. We must activate our sensory perception to see them. This is one of the hardest parts of dealing with setbacks – looking for the positive outcomes that can be brought into your life no matter how major the setback is.

6. Have faith. Trust that everything that happens to you happens for a reason, and sometimes we can't always make the pieces fit together and understand why. When you are in this situation, trust that a higher power is in play for the good of your life. When you've met the ends of your road with science, technology, and other worldly things, invite a bit of faith in your life. Have faith that your life is headed in the right direction no matter how dire things may seem.

At some point in every challenging circumstance, there comes a point when you must face how much you are going to allow this situation to change you. Are you open to revisiting long held beliefs? Are you open to allowing new relationships to be created? Are you going to accept that what happened to you is happening for a reason, even if you don't know or understand what that might be at the moment?

I recommend being open to grow, change, and become better in the future. The alternative is to get stuck, potentially bitter, and closed-minded about the world around you. Choose the positive and constructive route, even though it may be hard to do so at the beginning.

REAL ID Enforcement Dates Approach

The REAL ID Enforcement date is Wednesday, May 7, 2025! On May 7, 2025, a REAL ID-compliant driver's license or identification card or a US Passport will be needed to board domestic commercial airflights, and to enter most federal buildings or nuclear facilities. REAL ID cards are issued through driver's license stations.

In Iowa, nearly 75% of all driver's licenses and IDs are currently REAL ID-complaint. A REAL ID card has a gold star in the upper-right corner. To get one in Dickinson County, contact the Dickinson County Driver's License Station at the Courthouse in Spirit Lake for an appointment. It is open Monday through Friday from 8 am until 4:30 pm. Set up an appointment by calling 712-336-6333 option 3.

Documents that prove your identity, date of birth, social security number and Iowa residency and residential address will be needed. A checklist of what to bring can be found on the Iowa Department of Transportation's website at this link - *https:// iowadot.gov/mvd/realid/success.aspx*.

Dickinson County Treasurer Kris Rowley says, "Not everyone needs a REAL ID driver's license or identification card. The non-REAL ID cards will work to drive and prove age or identity for most situations. But if you are planning to fly or enter federal buildings or nuclear plants, a REAL ID driver's license or identification card will be needed unless you present a passport."



These five entrepreneurs had first shared their ideas with the public through a video. These videos were submitted for public voting in February,



Awarded first place and receiving a prize of \$5,000 was Cody Fuller with Fuller Radiance, LLC out of Storm Lake. Fuller Radiance produces customized gift items including lamps, fidget toys, and centerpieces.

Second place awarded \$3,000 to Cayden Fischer of Storm Lake for his business, Outlaw Kicks. Fischer designs and sells custom painted shoes to athletes and other individuals who want to express themselves through their apparel.

Third place winning \$1,000 was Jack Bauermeister with Glacier Made in Arnolds Park. Glacier Made designs sustainable and durable lake wear from swimwear to shirts, and sweatshirts to sunglasses. Glacier Made will soon be opening a physical storefront in 2025.

Honorable mentions and awards of \$500 each went to Vanessa Moore with the Spencer Create Catalyst, and Jeff Krage with Boji Bites.

The Spencer Create Catalyst is a program to connect rural small businesses that need marketing and social media support with local students to give experience to young designers and provide affordable marketing opportunities for small businesses.

Boji Bites is an idea to deliver food directly to boats in the Okoboji area to deliver boaters with the perfect day on the lake without having to leave the water by partnering with local restaurants.

a small amount of the dough in your hand. If the dough comes together and does not have any dry pieces it has enough moisture. If the dough is dry, add another tablespoon of cream. Mix and test again until the dough almost comes together in a ball. Line the tart pan with parchment paper and then place the dough on top. Preheat the oven to 350 F. Bake until the edges of the crust are golden brown, about 35 minutes. Remove and cool. In a bowl, gently combine the blackberries, sugar, cornstarch, and lemon juice. Spread the blackberry mixture evenly in the tart crust. To make the streusel: In a food processor, combine the flour, brown sugar, salt, and butter and pulse until the butter is the size of large peas. Sprinkle over the blackberry filling. Bake at 350 F until the streusel is browned and the fruit is bubbling, about 25 minutes. Let the tart cool until it can be handled, then remove the tart and place on a platter. Serve warm or at room temperature.



produce for up to 20 weeks, starting in May and ending in October The following are the CSA share choices:

CSA Mini Share: includes one monthly delivered box of locally grown produce starting in May - October which is a total of 6 times/boxes for the 2025 growing season. ACSA mini share is for a household of 1 to 2 adults/family.

CSA Bi-Weekly Share: which is delivered every other week for a total of 10 boxes of locally grown produce

CSA Half Share: includes a weekly delivered box of locally grown produce starting in May - October for a minimum of 17 weeks to a maximum of 20 weeks. A CSA half share is for a household of 1 to 2 adults/family.

CSA Full Share: includes a weekly delivered box of locally grown produce starting in May - October for a minimum of 17 weeks to a maximum of 20 weeks. A CSA full share is for a household of 3 to 4 adults/family.

We intend to deliver 20 weeks/times for your enjoyment of our boxed produce half or full share but wish to have an understanding that our growing season can be unpredictable and have included the 17 week minimum. Deadline to purchase a CSA share is May 1, 2025.

The following fruits and vegetables will be available sometime during the 2025 growing season in the CSA box share: apples, asparagus, beans-green, beets-red or golden, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage-green or red, carrots, cauliflower, celery, chard, cucumbers-slicers-burpless-pickling, eggplant, *garlic, kale, kohlrabi, lettuce-leaf green-red-romaine, onions-red-yellowwhite, peas-sugar snap, peppers-sweet bell-hot, pie pumpkins, potatoes-red-white-Yukon, rhubarb, radishes, rutabagas, scallions, shallots, summer squash-yellow, sweet corn, tomatoes, winter squash- 10 varieties, and zucchini.
