Minnesota Governor Tim Walz is excited to celebrate the region's exceptional outdoor recreation, saying, "This region is known for its phenomenal fishing and outdoor recreation. It is also home to an incredible resort community, making Crosslake the perfect place to kick off summer."

On Saturday, May 10, fishing kicks off early at 5 a.m. with anglers casting their lines in the waters of Cross Lake and surrounding lakes. The Shore Lunch at noon for registered attendees will feature classic Minnesota fare like walleye and wild rice pinwheels, baked beans or coleslaw and chips.

Fishing and outdoor fun

The Crosslake area boasts some of the best fishing in the state, with opportunities to catch walleye and northern pike, along with unique native species like the greater redhorse and white sucker. Anglers of the Crosslake area can enjoy dozens of lakes, including the 14 interconnected lakes of the Whitefish Chain of Lakes, which spans 13,500 acres of water, 119 miles of shoreline, and countless islands and bays. As anglers gear up for the 77th Minnesota Governor's Fishing Opener, and the summer fishing season, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is reminding everyone to do their part in protecting the state's waters from aquatic invasive species (AIS). These non-native species threaten Minnesota's lakes and rivers, so it's crucial to follow simple steps to prevent their spread. Clean, Drain, Dispose-These three words should be top of mind every time you leave a lake or river. Whether you're an avid fisherman, a recreational boater, or simply enjoying Minnesota's beautiful waters, taking these steps

Minnesota's Governor's Fishing Opener in Crosslake Clean: Remove aquatic plants and invasive species from watercraft, trailers, and

Drain: Empty all water from boats, livewells, and motors. Leave drain plugs out during transport.

Dispose: Dispose of unused bait in the trash, and never release bait, plants, or aquarium pets into the water. Why does this matter?

Prevention is a shared responsibility. DNR Commissioner Sarah Strommen highlighted the importance of community collaboration, saying, "Minnesota is nationally recognized for its AIS prevention successes, and that's due in large part to the powerful partnership model we have in place in the state." Local governments, nonprofits, universities, and lake associations are working together to keep Minnesota's

Newly sworn-in Heintzeman brings real-world perspective to Capitol



Keri Heintzeman was sworn in Tuesday as the newest member of the Minnesota Senate representing District 6.

Just two weeks before the legislative session wraps up, Minnesota's newest state senator has officially taken her oath—and she's hitting the ground running.

Sen. Keri Heintzeman of Nisswa was sworn in Tuesday as the senator for District 6, following her April 29 special election win. The district spans parts of Cass, Crow Wing, and Itasca counties. A small business owner, mother of six, and now state lawmaker, Heintzeman says she's ready to bring a fresh dose of real-world perspective to

St. Paul.

"I'm deeply grateful to the people of Senate District 6 for trusting me to be their voice in the Senate," Heintzeman said following the ceremony. "I've run a business, raised a family, and dealt with the same challenges Minnesotans have been facing every day. That's the perspective I'll bring to St. Paul—practical, grounded, and focused on what actually matters to people."

Sen. Heintzeman and her husband, Josh Heintzeman who serves in the Minnesota House of Representativesown and operate a popular recreational rental business in Nisswa. Together, they've raised six children.

Her swearing-in comes at a whirlwind time. Lawmakers face a May 19 deadline to adjourn, and Heintzeman joins the Senate with a steep learning curve and little time to settle in.

Committee assignments for Sen. Heintzeman will be announced in the coming days, rounding out her role for the remainder of the 2025-2026 legislative session.

Still, she's already making clear that she wants to hear directly from her constituents.

Sen. Heintzeman encourages constituents to reach out with ideas, concerns, or questions any time.

Minnesota taxpayers' heavy burden

In this update, I want to share what's really happening in St. Paul, how we got here, and why I'm fighting for a leaner, more responsible government that puts the taxpayer first.

Unsustainable Growth

In recent years, Minnesota's state government has embarked on an unprecedented expansion, growing at a pace that threatens our long-term fiscal stability and burdens taxpayers. The numbers tell a stark story: over the 2023 legislative session, state government spending surged by nearly 40%, an \$18 billion surplus was largely depleted, taxes were raised by approximately \$10 billion, and a State Government Omnibus Bill in 2024 added roughly \$410 million in new spending above the base budget. As a state legislator, I believe it's time to reverse course, shrink the size of government (which employs nearly 60,000 employees, over 37,000 in the executive branch alone), and prioritize sustainable policies that respect Minnesotans' hardearned dollars. This is what I

am advocating for.

Missed opportunity

The \$18 billion surplus was a once-in-a-generation chance to deliver meaningful tax relief and invest in infrastructure without adding to taxpayer burdens. Instead, lawmakers spent nearly the entire surplus, allocating \$12.5 billion to one-time expenditures and committing the rest to ongoing programs. This surplus presented a golden opportunity to invest wisely, reduce taxes, and help build a resilient economy - to which I advocated for. Instead, the Democrat trifecta—controlling the governor's office, House, and Senate—opted for a massive spending spree, increasing the state budget to \$71 billion, a 38% jump from the \$52 billion budget of 2022-23.

Minnesota taxpayer funded

To sustain this expanded government, Governor Walz and Democrats raised taxes by approximately \$10 billion over the 2023-24 period, a decision that has sparked widespread criticism from taxpayers and businesses. While supporters argue these revenues fund essential social programs, opponents, including myself, contend that they worsen Minnesota's already heavy tax burden. Our state ranks among the top ten nationally for individual income tax rates, with a top rate of 9.85%, and leads the nation with a corporate tax rate of 9.8%. These high taxes strain job creators, small businesses, and families, driving wealth and opportunity out of Minnesota. Now, we are looking at a looming \$6 billion deficit.

2025 Omnibus bill

Serving as vice-chair of the State Government Finance and Policy Committee has been an eve-opening experience. The committee oversees constitutional and administrative offices. I knew Minnesota's state government was growing rapidly, but my committee work revealed the true scale of this expansion. The state government employs more than 50,000 individuals, making it quite possibly the largest employer in the state. This size is unsustainable and it's not right. Unlike private businesses, state government generates no income, it takes it from hardworking taxpayers and mandates away prosperity. Last biennium, the State Government Omnibus bill increased spending by \$410 million above the base. This year, the proposed budget bill adds another \$45 million. When will this relentless spending growth

As a legislator, I stand firmly against the ever-growing beast of government and will fight for a leaner, more accountable state government.



Aitkin School District makes solid plans for new elementary school

The Aitkin School District is proposing to construct a new preschool through grade 6 school to replace Rippleside Elementary. It will be presented to school district voters at the election on November 4, 2025.

While the plans are still in flux, the school would be located on 220 acres of land the district owns in south Aitkin, about 1.8 miles from from Rippleside and 2.3 from the current high school. It will cost at least \$64 million to build and grants are applied for totaling roughly \$13 million.

"I'm feeling pretty confident we would be awarded our grant requests," said Dan Stifter, superintendent of schools, in an interview. Requested

from the IRRB, state sales tax exemption for materials at \$3.6 million, \$24,000 and \$250,000 in wetlands and recreation grants, and 3.8 million in bonding for infrastructure.

"The city of Aitkin would seek the \$3.8 million in bonding to build the infrastructure," explained Stifter. "Ultimately, though, that is the responsibility of the school district."

The strategic plan calls for locating all district buildings and facilities to the property. Eventually, all the property and fields in town would be sold for housing or other development. That includes the high school and elementary school, a bus garage, old schoolhouse and various sports fields scattered about.

The ballot question will ask voters to fund a \$59.3 million elementary school and maintenance service center with a second question asking for approval of a community wellness center at \$6 million

"At the May meeting, the

are \$5 million board will decide whether to build a preK-6 or pre-K through grade 12 facility," said Stifter. A maintenance building is included, and a community center will be a separate ballot question. "Eventually, a preK-12 school would have shared spaces: gym, spaces, cafeteria, media center and common areas. "

> The new elementary building would have three sections per grade with modern classrooms, separate parents and bus pickup and drop off, dedicated special education rooms, small group work areas, media center and commons, two full-sized gyms, a kitchen and cafeteria, offices for the school nurse and other support services, a new playground, outdoor classroom and green space. If approved by voters, a community wellness site would be added.

parts, there are lots of problems with the older buildings that the public doesn't see." "A healthier and

safer space will improve and increase learning. We are learning well in our present space but there is a lot of retrofitting and making do. Our kids and community deserve better than just making do," Stifter said.

Benefits to the community? "A new elementary school will increase community pride and the community wellness center could benefit everyone. The new gyms will be great for spectators and there may be a new walking track. Every space will be handicapped accessible."

There is no set plan for disposing of the present properties: whether they will be developed into housing or businesses or torn down.

After the board votes on what type of school to be built, numbers can be crunched in earnest. Then the voters can find out the impact on their property taxes and make informed decisions for November's vote.

Dee Kotaska sees the world through the lens of her camera—first with a brownie camera, then her "big girl" SLR and now the iPhone 4. "I took a class from a National Geographic Photographer who used an iPhone 4-it blew my mind and I have not looked back." Kotaska, who lives in Mora, continued to study iPhone photography and now uses apps and dabbles in artificial intelligence (AI) to create interpretations of her original photos, adding more emotion and intrigue to her images. "The words of

my computer, 'I had to create an equivalent for what I FELT about what I was looking at, not copy it."

Gail Gates says that at this stage in her life, her journey with photography focuses on capturing emotions that weave the fabric between our environment and human stories. She became hooked on iPhone photography after taking a class, and started sharing ideas and work with Kotaska. "As an older woman, I seek simplicity, yet connection," said Gates, who now lives in Northfield. "I collect the unnoticed and transform the images into a kaleidoscope of questions. This is my humble

attempt to share and examine the emotions that make us delightfully different and divinely human."

Mike Gainor, Pine City, never saw himself as a visual artist, but by 2015 he says he had become a pretty decent photographer after years working for his local newspaper. At that time, new "Neural Style" software tools were just being developed that allowed one to combine a photo with another image, and he became fascinated with the possibilities. Starting with his original photos, he began making dozens of versions of each of them with tools like Dreamscape and then mixing those together until it turned into something

beautiful or disturbing or otherworldly. "It was a delight to make those images," he said. "That joy and wonder and sense of discovery are still what keeps me creating."





Public invited to weigh in on future of vital Pine River Watershed



Funding was provided by the Board of Water and Soil Resources through the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment.

The future health of one of Minnesota's most vital water systems is now in the public's hands—or at least their inboxes. The Crow Wing Soil and Water Conservation District

(SWCD) is inviting residents to share their thoughts on a proposed amendment to the Pine River Comprehensive Watershed Plan, an ambitious blueprint to protect and enhance a watershed that provides drinking water to more than 15 million people across the region.

Yes, you read that right—15

million people, from St. Cloud all the way down to Illinois, depend on the Pine River Watershed for clean drinking water. And now, anyone who lives within the watershed spanning parts of Cass, Crow Wing, Aitkin, and Hubbard Counties—is encouraged to help shape the plan that protects it.

The watershed, which boasts over 500 lakes and includes towns like Backus, Pine River, Breezy Point, and Crosslake, is being managed under Minnesota's "One Watershed, One Plan" initiative. The program water quality, reduce runoff, is voluntary and locally driven, but it's backed by serious expertise—and funding—from the Board of Water and Soil Resources, with support from the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment.

A 10-member advisory committee made up of local volunteers helped shape the proposed amendment. The plan focuses on measurable, trackable steps to protect and ensure the long-term sustainability of this extensive ecosystem.

waters healthy.

Taking extra precautions

In addition to the basic steps, anglers and boaters can go the extra mile by using decontamination stations—available for free on the DNR's website—or by drying their watercraft, trailers, and gear for at least five days before using them in a different water body.

When in doubt, report it

If you think you've found an invasive species that isn't already known in your lake, contact a DNR aquatic invasive species specialist.


