he community, many carrying flags, paid their respects during the funeral for United States Army Air Forces 2nd Lt. Robert T. McCollum on Saturday, May 3 at Oak Hill Memorial Park.





Robert T. McCollum was honored among family, friends and officials, including the divers who found McCollum's remains in the Baltic Sea near Denmark at Chapel of the Roses at Oak Hill Memorial Park followed by a public burial to be near his parents and sister.

The fallen soldier's remains were laid to rest at Oak Hill Memorial Park to be near his parents and sister with full military honors. The event included a Rifle Volley by the American Legion Post #419, bagpipes were played, including the song Amazing Grace by the Santa Clara County Sheriff's Office Pipe Band and a heartwarming and amazing dove release was provided by GoDoves. com.

The procession from the Chapel of Roses to the burial site was escorted by the Patriot Guard Riders and the Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association (CVMA).

City proposes \$5.57 billion budget following shortfall

Publisher hile the City of San Jose faces some future fiscal challenges, San Jose is proposing a \$5.57 billion budget for 2026 amid impacted city services and a short-staffed workforce. The City's shortfall for next year

is due to lagging sales tax revenue and increased costs.

The most recent projection improved slightly to \$35.6 million and the city filled the gap by again redirecting Measure E dollars from affordable housing projects to interim homelessness solutions. "We are proud to deliver the 2025-

26 proposed operating budget. which I believe is a very fiscally responsible and balanced budget

with minimal community or employee impacts," said City Manager Jennifer Maguire.

At that time, they could not guarantee avoiding layoffs while prioritizing investments in reducing unsheltered homelessness, improving safety and cleanliness, growing the economy and building more housing.

Deferred projects include the full activation of Fire Station 32 and the South San Jose police substation, but community services such as library hours, park maintenance, community centers and recreational programming or senior nutrition are not expected to be cut.

Evergreen Senior Citizen Property Owners Are Eligible for Measure X Parcel Tax Exemption

Evergreen property owners are eligible for an exemption from the annual \$125 Evergreen School District parcel tax in the 2025-2026 tax year if:

- You are the owner of a parcel within Evergreen School District (ESD) boundaries
- You are at least 65 years old as of June 30, 2025
- The parcel is your principal residence. Name must be on the Parcel Tax Form.

To request exemption, please submit the Online Exemption Form and upload the required documents through our District website at www.eesd.org. Submissions must be received no later than June 30, 2025

Those who have previously been granted an exemption from the Measure EE Parcel Tax, their exemption will continue to be automatically renewed each year as long as you remain eligible for the exemption.

Anthony Tordillos poised for runoff in San Jose special election

Strict 3 City Council special election and will head to the June 24 runoff.

A one-day recount Thursday appears to have affirmed Tordillos' six-vote lead for second place over Matthew Quevedo, deputy chief of staff for Mayor Matt Mahan. Official election results will be certified Monday, and they could send Tordillos to face off against Latina Coalition of Silicon Valley Executive Director Gabby Chavez-Lopez, who placed first in the special election. A total of 9,105 ballots were cast.

"While this has been a long process, with many twists and turns, I am very excited that our campaign will advance to the June 24th run-off election. I want to thank my team, donors, and the volunteers who all made this possible," Tordillos said in a statement claiming victory. "As we prepare for the next chapter of this campaign, I'd also like to thank Matthew Quevedo, Irene Smith, Adam Duran, Tyrone Wade, and Phillip Dolan for all stepping up and volunteering to serve our community in this turbulent time."

When reached for comment, Tordillos referred this news organization to his statement.

Quevedo said while the margin is small, the result is "clear."

"We are never going to stop fighting for the common-sense policies that will help end the era of street homelessness, create affordable housing where it makes the most sense, bring safe and clean streets to every neighborhood and make San Jose more small-business friendly so more families have a path to economic security," Quevedo told San José Spotlight.

The results are a discouraging sign for Mahan, who put the full force of his political machine behind Quevedo — who raised the most campaign cash. Tordillos and Chavez-Lopez are both backed by Mahan's critics in the Santa Clara County Democratic Party.

It's the fourth San Jose race to trigger a recount in eight years — highlighting the unique political environment around the nation's tech capital, which has become a microcosm for American politics in the digital age and heated issues such as homelessness and affordable housing.

1944, where he was serving in the U.S. Army Air Forces with the 565th Bombardment Squadron, 389th Bombardment Group.

On June 20, 1944, he was the bombardier aboard a B-24J Liberator (serial number 42-100351) during a bombing mission targeting enemy facilities in Politz, Germany.

While flying over the Baltic Sea near Langeland Island, Denmark, McCollum's aircraft collided with another B-24 in the formation and spiraled into the sea. Of the ten crew members on board, two survived, were captured, and later returned to U.S. custody. The remaining eight, including Lt. McCollum, were declared missing in action. After several unsuccessful searches, in May of 1950, McCollum's family was notified that Robert was deemed non-recoverable.


In 2019, Danish divers discovered a WWIIera aircraft wreck in the area where Lt. McCollum's plane was lost. After the site was cleared of unexploded ordnance, teams from the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA), the University of Delaware, and the Royal Danish Navy conducted an underwater survey. Human remains and other significant evidence were recovered, ultimately leading to the identification of Lt. McCollum. There was an overwhelming and undeniable abundance of evidence. A rosette has been placed by Robert's name at "The Walls of the Missing" Memorial in Cambridge, England to show that he has been accounted for.

Recovery operations continue for the remaining crew of airmen lost at sea on McCollum's plane.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony included remarks from Goodwill of Silicon Valley CEO Christopher Baker, District 7 Councilmember Bien Doan, and the Tully Road-Eastridge Business Association (TREBA) Board Chair Christina Bui.

The launch welcomed hundreds of eager shoppers to the new Tully Road location, which offers bulk shopping at deeply discounted prices.

"Outlet stores are proving to be a wise investment for Goodwill organizations across the country, and, in turn, a wise investment for communities," said Baker. "By donating and shopping, customers help fund vital programs like job training, reentry support, and

housing assistance, empowering individuals to achieve self-sufficiency and easing the burden on public resources. Patronizing the outlet store is an easy way to give back, reduce landfill waste, and save taxpayer dollars."

The 25,000-square-foot store at 1685 Tully Road is open seven days a week from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Goodwill Outlet stores offer deeply discounted secondhand items, with most merchandise sold by the pound or at low per-item prices. Bargain hunters can browse large bins organized by category that are refreshed hourly, uncovering a rotating selection of clothing and textiles, housewares, books, electronics, glassware, toys and furniture.

Goodwill of Silicon Valley's network of donation centers and retail stores fund essential job training, inmatereentry programs, and employment opportunities for those in need while also reducing waste in the region. Every donation and purchase directly supports workforce development for individuals facing employment bar-



At the Goodwill of Silicon Valley Outlet, furniture, bicycles, and oversized items will be priced individually at steep discounts, with a dedicated furniture section offering even more great finds.

Outlet stores typically have a lively, competitive atmosphere, with shoppers sorting through bins to uncover hidden gems. The store will have shopping carts, but there is a limited supply.

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Feds cut millions for San Jose community projects

By Vicente Vera San José Spotlight he federal government has

eliminated millions in potential funding meant for community projects in San Jose involving the Alum Rock business corridor, Happy Hollow Zoo and more.

Sarah Zárate, director of intergovernmental relations for the city, told councilmembers Tuesday that even though Congressmembers Ro Khanna, Jimmy Panetta and Zoe Lofgren requested \$5.5 million in federal funds — the government's continuing resolution, signed March 15, to extend spending through the rest of the year failed to include community project

There are five projects being deprived of funding: the Alum Rock business corridor improvement projects were counting on \$2 million; Cahalan Park upgrades were getting \$2 million; Yerba Buena Bridge reconstruction had \$1 million in potential funding; Happy Hollow's power grid was waiting on \$250,000 and Evergreen and East San Jose were on tap for \$250,000 for sideshow and street racing deterrence.

"Without these federal funds, efforts to address these projects and issues like sideshows and street racing may be delayed as we explore alternative funding opportunities," city spokesperson Demetria Machado told San José Spot-

Congressmembers will have the opportunity to request the funding for the following fiscal year, but

requests can change based on updated city priorities. Representatives may seek federal funding for up to 15 community projects, which are expected to be announced in the coming weeks.

"We've already issued over 30 legislative and funding advocacy letters advancing the city's (2025) priorities, and will continue to do so through the sessions," Zárate said at the meeting.

Mary Valderrama, chair of the Alum Rock Village Action Committee, said much of the country has been negatively impacted by federal funding cuts, and San Jose needs to stay resilient.

"What's so disappointing is that East San Jose never gets the love or respect that other parts of the city do," she told San José Spotlight. "It's so difficult to get city leaders, not our councilmember, but to get the city departments to pay attention to us — so getting funding would be fantastic."

City officials said the \$2 million in funding would've improved restaurants, streetscapes and revitalized a large commercial building in the historic Mayfair neighborhood. The funds would've increased capacity for local small businesses so new jobs and companies can sprout.

According to a May 7, 2024 letter from Lofgren, funding would've also helped retain four small businesses, 50 jobs and establish a "sorely needed" community cafe and food pantry in the area to offer affordable and healthy food options for Mayfair residents.

"Lofgren and Khanna have fought for this community for years, but with only one vote on the City Council (for East San Jose), sometimes there's nothing to show," longtime community advocate Danny Garza told San José Spotlight. "A lot of the businesses here don't own their building. We live paycheck-to-paycheck."

As the Alum Rock Santa Clara Street Business Association celebrated a \$100,000 grant from the city toward supporting the same business corridor late last year, leaders say the loss of more potential funding is deeply unfortunate.

"Still, the Alum Rock Santa Clara Street Business Association remains committed to working with our partners to support the growth and resilience of the communities we serve," Helen Masamori, co-chair of the association, told San José Spotlight.

Of the \$2 million in potential funding for Cahalan Park in South San Jose, the now-eliminated money would have gone toward building four to eight new pickleball courts.

The \$1 million in potential funding for the Yerba Buena Bridge reconstruction would have repaired a crossing over Yerba Buena Creek and connect neighborhoods to high-use areas in Evergreen.
