





GATE C

Emergency Personnel Only

GATE D

Handicap parking, handicap license plate or placard required to enter through this gate. Special passes are also permitted. Livestock truck and trailers, dog show exhibitors exit. Only vehicles containing livestock, rabbit/poultry entries, or dog show entries will be allowed through this gate. Due to space limitations any support vehicles not containing animals will be directed to general admission parking.

If you need assistance getting from your parking spot to your fair destination, please call the **Fair Office (931) 684-0760** and we will provide any available assistance.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Event Directors and Departments

- 1. Each event director of any department will have the arrangement and supervision of all articles and animals in his/her department and is responsible to the Board of Directors.
- 2. Each director will afford the Judges every facility for examination, affix the ribbons, and when the Judges are not on duty, take charge of the lists.
- 3. Each director is expected to exercise great care of preserving and returning the lists of the awards and upon no other authority can premiums be paid.

Visitors and Patrons

The Association will endeavor to make all visitors and patrons comfortable and pleasant. Each officer desires to render his/her services to any visitor or patron, should occasion require it, and any misconduct on the part of anyone should be reported to the President immediately and appropriate action shall be taken.

Exhibitor Rules

- 1. Every article and animal on the grounds shall be under the control of the Board of Directors during the Fair, and every possible precaution will be taken for safekeeping of same, but the Association will in no way be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.
- 2. The Director of the Event or Department in which all exhibits are entered will make designation of space for exhibition.
- 3. All exhibits entered for competition will be under control of the Director of said event. The Association will furnish security and every precaution will be made against loss or damage to any exhibit.
- 4. All entries not claimed by 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 20, 2025 will become the property of the Fair Association of Bedford County, Inc. Exhibitors having objections to any judge or judges shall make their complaint to the Secretary of the Association, in writing, stating the grounds of the said objection.

Judges

Judges will be particular to observe the following rules:

- a.) Blue ribbon designated for 1st place
- b.) Red ribbon designated for 2nd place
- c.) Ribbons shall be affixed by the Director under the direction of all Judges at the time of the award on all articles exhibited and animals in the ring.

2024 Bedford County Fairest of the Fair Allie Byrom represented Bedford County beautifully in the State Pageant competing against 47 other talented young women.






Stanley Smotherman December 8, 1953 - February 6, 2025

Exhibition Schedule and Rules

Rules and Regulations

- All Bedford County residents, Bedford County FCE members and Bedford County 4-Hers are eligible to enter items in the Fair Exhibition. In the Creative Arts Department A, members of the Happy Hands Quilt Guild, Fleece on the Duck Fiber Arts Guild, Bedford County Arts Council, and Cheekwood Embroiderers' Guild are eligible to enter, regardless of residency.
- Only one entry per lot per person is allowed.
- Unless noted, entries must be made or grown by the exhibitor since August 2024.
- Each lot in Departments A-D will have categories for:
 - Youth 5 years old to 8 years old Youth 9 years old to 18 years old Adults 19 years old and over
- All items must be left on display until released by the Fair during official pick-up times as listed below.
- See also any special regulations under each Department and Class.
- Reasonable precautions will be taken, however, the fair board and/or University of Tennessee/Tennessee State University Extension will not be responsible for the loss or damage of any article.
- Any article left after 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 20 will become property of the Fair Board.
- The Fair premiums will be paid at \$5.00 for first place with a blue ribbon, \$4.00 for second place with a red ribbon, and \$3.00 for third place with a yellow ribbon.
- A Champion rosette will be awarded to one entry in each Class except for Department E (Beekeeping) where one champion rosette will be awarded to one entry in the Department.
- All decisions by fair judges are final.

Entry Process

• Decide which lots you will be entering. Remember only 1 item can be entered in each lot.

You may fill out the tags in the book by listing the lot number and checking Youth 5-8, Youth 9-18 or Adult. Attach tag to item using pins, tape etc. on the left hand edge of the tag. Bring all items to the Covered Show Ring behind the Exhibition Room (Main Building) at the Agriculture and Education Center at 2119 Midland Road at the entry times listed below. You will be entered into the computer and be given tags and a sheet of sticky labels with your name printed on it to attach to the labels at that time. If you would prefer to pre-register and skip the label line, please fill out the Fair Exhibition Entries pre-registration form and drop off or mail to the extension office by Wednesday, July 9 (UT/TSU Extension, 2105 Midland Road, Shelbyville, TN 37160). Labels will be pre-run to pick up when you arrive with your items.







MEMORANDUM

TO: Fair Officials, Rodeo, Livestock and Poultry Exhibition or Show Managers

- FROM: Samantha Beaty, DVM State Veterinarian
- DATE: February 21, 2025

Enclosed is a summary of Tennessee regulations and health requirements for livestock and poultry at fair shows, exhibitions, other shows and rodeos.

Special Comments:

- It is expected that all exhibitors bring only healthy animals to fairs and exhibitions. Although state and federal animal health officials will be performing as many inspections as possible, <u>fair officials are responsible</u> for ensuring that all animals entering fairs for exhibition are in overall good health and are accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. Animals showing clinical signs of contagious disease should be sent home immediately. Violations should be reported to the state veterinarian or her agent.
- 2. Certificate(s) of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) are to accompany all animal(s) to the respective shows with the exception of in-state Tennessee equine and poultry. In-state Tennessee equine six (6) months of age and older must have a negative Equine Infectious Anemia test within the preceding twelve (12) months. Poultry assembled at shows or exhibitions should be accompanied by evidence of a negative test for Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days or **be tested on-site prior to exhibition following strict biosecurity procedures or** originate directly from a flock which has been certified as Pullorum-Typhoid Clean under the Tennessee Poultry Improvement Plan. As part of increased awareness and surveillance for Avian Influenza and other poultry diseases, the physical appearance of all birds should be assessed at the time testing is conducted.
- 3. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection issued in satisfaction of these Tennessee Fair Regulations shall be good for <u>90</u> days for Tennessee livestock only.
- 4. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection demonstrate that the animal showed no signs of contagious disease at the time of veterinary exam and CVI issuance. Animals developing signs of disease after inspection but during the period the CVI is valid are still subject to rules refusing entry of animals with contagious diseases to exhibitions and shows.
- 5. Please note that exhibition requirements for out-of-state livestock are the same as regular import requirements.

- 6. Warts, ringworm, scabies, contagious ecthyma (sore mouth), foot rot, cutaneous fungal and bacterial infections (i.e. club lamb disease, caseous lymphadenitis, pink eye/conjunctivitis) are considered contagious and infectious diseases and are NOT permissible.
- All out-of-state poultry must originate directly from a Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock and a H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock or be accompanied by evidence of a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within ninety (90) days and a negative official Avian Influenza test within twenty-one (21) days.

Also, please note that if highly pathogenic avian influenza is detected in Tennessee or a neighboring state, commingling of poultry at fairs and exhibitions may be suspended.

Event Biosecurity

Below is a summary of recommendations for fair management by the National Assembly of State Animal Health Officials and the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians to better protect fair attendees from disease:

- Provide easy access to hand washing stations.
- Post informational signage that includes the following messages:
 - No eating or drinking in the animal areas.
 - Wash hands frequently.
 - No pacifiers, sipping cups or strollers in the animal exhibition areas.
- Discourage sleeping in the animal exhibition areas.
- If human or swine influenza-like-illness is associated with the exhibition, animal health and public health officials should be notified immediately.
- People who have influenza-like illness should leave the exhibition immediately and seek medical care. They should advise their health care provider about their fair attendance.
- People at high risk for developing severe complications from influenza should limit their exposure to swine.

Also, be aware of the potential exposure of fair attendees to Salmonella and E. coli 0157 from animals exhibited on the fairgrounds.

Please retain this material for reference during the remainder of the 2025 fair season.

TENNESSEE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE DIVISION OF CONSUMER & INDUSTRY SERVICES ANIMAL HEALTH

SUMMARY: LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR FAIRS AND EXHIBITIONS

I GENERAL:

- A. All stalls, pens, chutes, etc. located on the grounds of fairs and exhibitions shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected with a disinfectant approved by USDA, APHIS between each scheduled fair or exhibition.
- B. All livestock (except poultry and equine) which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with individual permanent identification. Certificates for this purpose shall be valid for ninety (90) days from date of issue. (Tennessee livestock only – out-of-state certificates are valid for thirty (30) days from the date of issue)
- C. No animal showing clinical signs of infectious or communicable disease shall be allowed to enter or remain on premises of fairs or exhibitions. It shall be the responsibility of the manager of each event to assure prompt removal of such animals.

II LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY ORIGINATING WITHIN THE STATE OF TENNESSEE [Certificates of Veterinary Inspection Valid for a Period of Ninety (90) Days]

A. SWINE:

All swine which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with individual permanent identification or sufficient description to identify each animal.

B. CATTLE:

All cattle which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with individual permanent, official identification. Lactating Dairy Cattle residing within Tennessee and moving to an exhibition, show, or sale within Tennessee (intrastate movement) do not require pre-movement H5N1 testing.

C. POULTRY:

(1) Sponsors of poultry shows or exhibitions shall notify the Tennessee Department of Agriculture at least thirty (30) days prior to show or exhibition.

(2) Poultry found not to be in apparent good health shall be removed immediately from any show or exhibition.

D. HORSES & OTHER EQUIDAE:

Horses and other Equidae six (6) months of age and older must have a negative Equine Infectious Anemia test within the preceding twelve (12) months.

E. SHEEP

 (1) All sheep imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
 (2) All sheep that move within the state, with the exception of wethers under the age of 18 months that are produced for slaughter only, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

F. GOATS

(1) Goats imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

(2) Goats imported into Tennessee for immediate slaughter to an approved slaughter establishment or to an approved livestock market for sale to a slaughter establishment shall only be required to have a transportation document and be in compliance with Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

(3) All registered breeding goats, goats that have been commingled with sheep, goats for exhibition and dairy goats that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

G. CAMELIDS: Camelids must have an official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection as provided in Rule 0080-2-3-.01 (1).

H. CAPTIVE CERVIDAE: Captive Cervidae must have an official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection as provided in Rule 0080-2-3-.01 (1).

(1) CWD susceptible species must have two forms of identification (including official USDA ID)

(2) CWD susceptible species must not move from a CWD affected County to a non-CWD affected County.

III LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY ORIGINATING OUTSIDE THE STATE OF TENNESSEE

Livestock and Poultry entering fairs and exhibitions from areas outside the State of Tennessee shall be subject to current Tennessee import requirements. Please contact the state veterinarian's office regarding questions or recent changes to these rules. These interstate requirements are summarized as follows:

A. ALL SPECIES (except poultry):

Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection valid for thirty (30) days and individual permanent official identification, except for equine. Equine must have sufficient description to identify the animal.

B. CATTLE:

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and additional requirements as follows:

(1) Tuberculosis: No requirements except for cattle originating from regions not considered free of tuberculosis.
 (2) Brucellosis: No requirements except for cattle originating from regions not considered free of brucellosis. Test eligible cattle – Intact male or female cattle eighteen (18) months or older. (Vaccinates and non-vaccinates) (3) Per the USDA Federal Order, all lactating dairy cattle originating outside the State of Tennessee must have a negative H5N1 test within seven (7) days of interstate movement. Lactating dairy cattle can move back to the state of origin within ten (10) days of test.

C. SWINE:

No testing requirements for swine unless originating from a region not considered free of Brucellosis and Pseudorabies.

D. HORSES AND OTHER EQUINES:

Animals six (6) months of age or older - negative equine infectious anemia (Coggins) test within twelve (12) months.

E. POULTRY:

Originate directly from a Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock and an H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock or be accompanied by evidence of a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within ninety (90) days and a negative Avian Influenza test within twenty-one (21) days.

F. SHEEP

(1) All sheep imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

(2) All sheep that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

G. GOATS

(1) Goats imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

(2) Goats imported into Tennessee for immediate slaughter to an approved slaughter establishment or to an approved livestock market for sale to a slaughter establishment shall only be required to have a transportation document and be in compliance with Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

(3) All registered breeding goats, goats that have been commingled with sheep, goats for exhibition and dairy goats that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

- H. CAMELIDAE: Same requirements as for cattle.
- I. CERVIDAE:
 - Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and additional requirements as follows:
 - (1) Brucellosis: Same requirements as for cattle.
 - (2) Tuberculosis:

(a) All cervidae shall originate in herds which have had a negative herd test for tuberculosis within twelve (12) months with a USDA approved single cervical test and individual imported animals shall be negative to the single cervical test within thirty (30) days of entry; or

(b) Animals not originating in tested herds as described above must test negative to two (2) single cervical tests at least ninety (90) days apart, the second test conducted not more than thirty (30) days prior to entry.

- (3) Two forms of identification (including official USDA official ID)
- (4) CWD:

(a) CWD susceptible species must be from a CWD Certified Herd

NOTE: (Contact an accredited veterinarian for further details of import rules).

IV Fair association or exhibition or management shall inform exhibitors of the rules of this chapter and shall notify the State Veterinarian or her agent of any violations. Exhibitors shall present evidence of compliance with this chapter to the State Veterinarian or his agent upon request.

These rules constitute a minimum legal standard and in no way restrict the right of fair and exhibition managers to establish additional or more stringent requirements.





- 1. Competition is limited to 4-H and FFA members from counties in the Tennessee Extension Central Region.
- 2. 4-H and FFA members are required to have been enrolled in the fourth grade on January 1 of the current calendar year in order to be eligible to exhibit their goats in this show and will become ineligible at the end of the calendar year following their graduation from high school or upon their 20th birthday, whichever comes first.
- 3. This show is open to any purebred breed or crossbred wether or doe. Animals having testicular tissue will be dismissed. Unhealed wethers will be dismissed. The judge will be placing emphasis on muscling, finish, structural soundness, carcass merit, balance and style.
- 4. Goats will be weighed and classes divided by weight and sex with no more than 12 animals per class at the discretion of the Fair. This does not apply to registered does, who will be shown by age breaks as decided by show manager.
- 5. All animals must be of weaning age. Does can compete in only one category described below.
- 6. There will be four divisions shown. A market goat division is for wether or doe kids raised for slaughter. All animals must have their kid teeth to show in this division. A commercial doe kid division is for doe kids that are raised for replacement breeding animals and must have all of their milk teeth to compete in this division. A commercial yearling doe division is for does raised as replacement breeding does that have lost any milk teeth but have no more than two sets of adult teeth. A registered doe division is for any registered doe of any meat breed.
- 7. All does with more than four permanent teeth will be grouped in one class and ineligible to show for Champion.
- 8. Each exhibitor may enter a maximum of eight (8) goats but show a maximum of five (5) goats.
- 9. All goats should be dehorned or have horns tipped or covered to prevent injury.
- 10. All market goats and commercial does **MUST** have a special Tennessee Junior Livestock Program ear tag in order to show. Ear tags will be sent to exhibitor's county Extension office. Extension agents or agriculture teachers MUST supervise the tagging of each animal. This does not apply to registered does.
- 11. Due to limited space no tack pens will be allowed. All pens are designated for animals. Exhibitors will provide their own feed/water pans and feed/hay. Pens are bedded with wood chips.
- 12. Exhibitors will be released after the show is completed.

- 6. Add on weights are allowed. Tractors must weigh within limits of each class (100 lb. tolerance) (See class specific rules for weight bracket requirements)
- 7. Gas or diesel fuel only no turbos allowed.
- 8. No differential or driveline alterations. WHEELIE BARS REQUIRED ON ALL TRACTORS.
- Clevis or ring hitch with 3" hole no more than 1" thickness on rear of hole. No ball hitches allowed. No spring hitches. Two-point hitches must be stationary in all four positions. (See class specific rules for hitch position requirements)
- 10. Tractors must start pull with a tight chain.
- 11. Driver must remain in seat during pull with at least one hand on the steering wheel. NO BOUNCING and NO RODEOING!!
- 12. Each puller has two attempts to pass the 40 ft. mark. Pull is official after 40 ft. mark is passed. Pull is over when forward
- motion of sled is stopped or red flag is dropped. Footage will be stopped when tire or any part of sled touches boundary line. 13. Front tires may not leave the ground more than 18" during the pull.
- 14. Any weight or object falling from tractor during a pull will result in disqualification.
- 15. No one is allowed on the track except pullers and officials during pull. One adult is allowed on track with child or inexperienced driver. Person under age 15 must have track official, guardian, or parental approval before pulling. Kill switch is MANDATORY for all persons under the age of 15.
- A protest must be filed within weight class before next class begins. Any tractor found illegal by track officials will be disqualified. Protestor's tractor will be checked first.
- 17. Puller will be disqualified for refusing to comply with rules, unsportsmanlike conduct, intoxication, or failing to stop when red flagged by track official.
- 18. Track officials have the authority to approach any noticed violation to rules and advise procedure to correct.
- 19. Tractors will reweigh immediately after each pull and have drawbars and RPM's checked.
- 20. All pullers should read and familiarize themselves with rules and classes before entering the pull.
- 21. TRACK OFFICIALS DECISION IS ALWAYS FINAL.
- 22. NO ALCOHOL ALLOWED ON GROUNDS.

"ANTIQUE" CLASS SPECIFIC RULES

- 1. Factory high R.P.M.'s only 20% override allowed.
- 2. Tractors may run MSD type ignition systems.
- 3. Cut tires are allowed 18.4 factory molded rubber allowed in all weight classes.
- 4. Front weight bracket may extend 11ft. from center of rear axle.
- 5. Clevis or ring hitch must extend 18" from center of rear axle and may be up to 20" high from ground.
- 6. 4 M.P.H speed limit.
- 7. All General Rules apply.

"FARM STOCK" CLASS SPECIFIC RULES

- 1. Tractors must have factory or factory replacement blocks and factory carbs as per tractor model.
- 2. Tractors shall not have MSD type ignitions but can run electronic ignitions.
- 3. Factory high R.P.M.'s only- 20% override allowed.
- 4. No fuel more than 93 octane allowed. Random fuel checks may be done at any time. If tractor has two fuel tanks one must be empty.
- 5. Maximum tire size in 3000-6500Ib classes is 15.S uncut factory molded rubber. Maximum tire size 7000Ib and up is 18.4 uncut factory molded rubber.
- 6. Front weight bracket may extend 10ft. from center of rear axle.
- 7. Clevis or ring hitch must extend 18" from center of rear axle and may be up to 18" high from ground.
- 8. 3 M.P.H. speed limit.
- 9. All General Rules apply.


