**Paid Parking Pause:** A time for peace... or to redouble opposition

Paid parking enforcement in downtown St. Joseph has been suspended for an undetermined time to deal with Americans with Disabilities Act compliance issues. While many downtown business owners are pleased with the pause, they remain highly suspicious about the City Commission's willingness to make significant changes to the paid parking plan-or to end it for good as many of the business owners would prefer.

When City Manager Emily Hackworth announced Monday night that she was immediately suspending the paid system because it failed to meet ADA standards, some of the business owners at the Commission meeting seemed almost disappointed that they had apparently won the battle. It seemed some might be looking forward to continuing to fight the war over parking. Some talked privately about filing lawsuits against the city for revenue lost since May 15, when the controversial plan began.

Some business owners questioned whether Hackworth had the authority as the City's top administrator to suspend the parking plan. They wondered aloud if there needed to be a formal Commission vote. There was, however, no resolution on which to vote.

It seemed clear to longtime observers of St. Joseph City Government that Hackworth had the authority to suspend paid parking operations when it became clear that the city's new parking kiosks were inaccessible to handicapped users. Why that fact didn't surface earlier in the City's planning for paid parking is NOT clear. It seems questions will be asked of the Engineering Department and others who had a role in installing the parking kiosks, which, even with the naked eye, are not handicap-friendly.

In her brief announcement to the packed chamber, Hackworth gave no hint of how long her paid parking pause might be. However, she suggested the time could be well spent getting all sides of the issue to the table for honest discussion and compromise. A few in the room applauded that 'olive branch', but many others scoffed at it, some yelling insults toward the Commission and Hackworth later in the meeting.

# **Cheetahs and Chilly Weather: Why** These Speedsters Prefer the Heat

Cheetahs, the world's fastest land animals, are built for sun-soaked savannas, not chilly climates. These sleek felines (Acinonyx jubatus) thrive in the warm, open landscapes of Africa and a small pocket of Iran, but cool weather? That's not their vibe. Here's why cheetahs and cold don't mix, sprinkled with fun facts about their heat-loving nature.

Cheetahs are creatures of warmth, evolved for the scorching grasslands where temperatures often climb above 90°F. Their slender bodies, designed for sprinting up to 60 miles per hour in three seconds, have minimal body fat, offering little insulation against the cold. Unlike leopards or lions, which can tolerate cooler climates, cheetahs lack a thick undercoat. Their short, spotted fur is perfect for dissipating heat during high-speed chases but leaves them shivering in chilly conditions.

In the wild, cheetahs avoid cold weather by sticking to habitats like the Serengeti or Namibia's arid plains, where daytime temperatures rarely dip below 70°F. In rare cases, such as during southern Africa's winter months, when nights can drop to the 40s, cheetahs adapt by hunting during the warmest parts of the day. Their daytime hunting habit, unique among big cats, aligns with their love for sunny conditions, as their keen eyesight thrives under bright skies.

Cool weather also affects their prey. Antelopes like impalas, a cheetah's favorite meal, may move less predictably in colder conditions, making hunts tougher. Cheetahs rely on explosive sprints, burning energy fast, and chilly temperatures can slow their recovery. Their large nasal passages, great for gulping oxygen during a chase, don't fare well in frosty air, which can irritate their respiratory systems.


In zoos, where cheetahs sometimes face colder climates, keepers provide heated enclosures or indoor shelters. For example, cheetahs in North American zoos, where winters can be harsh, are often seen basking under heat lamps or curling up in cozy dens. Even then, they're less active in cool weather, preferring to lounge until things warm up.

Fun fact: cheetahs' iconic "tear marks" help reduce sun glare in their hot, bright habitats, but they're useless in overcast, chilly conditions. Their semi-retractable claws, like cleats for traction, grip best on dry, warm ground-not muddy or frosty terrain. And those high-pitched chirps they use to call cubs? They're less frequent in cold weather, as cheetahs conserve energy when temperatures drop.

With only about 7,000 cheetahs left in the wild, their preference for warm climates makes habitat preservation in Africa's sunny savannas critical. As climate patterns shift, conservationists worry that unpredictable weather could further stress these heat-loving cats. So, next time you picture a cheetah, imagine it sprinting under a blazing sun-because that's where this speedster feels right at home.

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


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### Monterey Pop Still Copping Props

But surprisingly, the fest gets no more exposure than the 1900 opening of Monterey's first fish canning and reduction plant. Of course, compared to Monterey Pop, the fish canning plant generated way fewer complaints about odor.

Now you know that I'm a pretty sunny, "lookon-the-bright-side-there-must-be-a-bright-side-I'm-gonna-find-a-bright-side-if-it-kills-me" type person. But here's an irresistibly snarky and irony-drenched tidbit about the Monterey love-in, from the website of a photographer named Larry Keenan, who spent the festival snapping up-close and personal pix of the performers: "I had a backstage pass because I was exhibiting my work at the festival in a little pavilion; all my photographs were stolen."

Surprisingly, even The Beach Boys – who helped organize Monterey Pop -- robbed it of love: They cancelled their scheduled performance. Years later, it was revealed that one of the Boys opposed Coca-Cola's sponsorship of the show, saying it was, and I quote, "a plot to get the nation's youth hooked on soda." The Beach Boy who feared this? Mike Love.

But enough nattering... Monterey Pop still had a whole lotta love. For example, the event's proceeds were donated to charity, and there were no deaths or arrests (which makes Larry Keenan sorta grouchy). Monterey's Deputy Chief of Police was quoted as saying "We've had more trouble at PTA conventions." Which makes me think, wowie, Monterey's PTA meetings in the '60s must've totally rocked!

I've also read there were no drug overdoses during the Festival. Whaddya bet that's an unfinished sentence, that should've ended "Well, none that disrupted the event anyway."

Credit for this goes to Monterey Pop's volunteer first-aid team, which used sophisticated medical techniques such as, and I quote, "cooling out people who were freaking due to ingested substances."

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

With the nuts & bolts specifics of the paid parking issue having been repeatedly debated in earlier meetings, several of Monday night's comments moved on to the long-term impact of the parking controversy on St. Joseph as a community and its image as a weekend or vacation destination. Several merchants quoted out-of-town customers as being disgusted with the change in welcoming atmosphere, symbolized by paid parking. A couple of others pounded on the Commission for allegedly forgetting about senior citizens who can't or won't utilize credit cards and Smart Phone apps.

One speaker who said she worked in advertising suggested the city would have to spend far more to undo its new, negative image of greed than it could ever hope to get from paid parking revenue.

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So, for now, paid parking in St. Joseph is on hold. City Manager Hackworth told us she would promptly begin arranging meetings with all the factions to discuss what happens next, and when. Meanwhile, other city staff members will be trying to figure out how they missed the mark so completely on the issue of handicapped compliant equipment. And downtown business owners will be deciding whether to simply declare victory or begin planning for the next battle in the paid parking saga.

Legislation from state Representative Joey Andrews would allow certain erosion control measures taken in 2020 to prevent the loss of property along the Lake Michigan shoreline to remain in place indefinitely, and he's feeling optimistic about the plan's chances of success this year.

www.MailMaxOnline.com Last week, the Michigan House Natural Resources and Tourism Committee heard from Andrews that the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy is asking many shoreline property owners to remove sandbags they installed in 2020. Andrews tells us that would be expensive, and possibly a waste.

"We had a number of constituents all throughout the district -- I mean, Saugatuck, Bridgman, New Buffalo, South Haven --approach us over the last couple of years about the amount of money they spent putting the sandbags in," Andrews said.

Andrews says since we know the water level fluctuates over time, it's only a matter of time before those sandbags will be needed again. Therefore, he's proposing they be allowed to stay under the right conditions.

"The thing is, as long as they're covered, which our bill requires, they're not going to break down because really it takes exposure to



sunlight and the elements to break them down. So, we said if you can keep them covered, then we should be able to keep them. If they're exposed, that's a different story."

Andrews says the bags could prove useful the next time the Lake Michigan water level gets high.

Andrews introduced similar legislation last year, but says the session ended before it could get anywhere. He's hoping the second time will be a charm.



Dear Dave,

What do you think about the idea of taking money out of your emergency fund in order to pay off your home early? Evans

### Dear Evans.

Trust me, I understand how it can be very tempting to throw a bunch of money at your house, get rid of the mortgage payments and own it outright. Especially if you're plowing through the Baby Steps, and you feel like you're making great progress in terms of gaining control of your money.

But, I wouldn't drain my emergency fund to make it happen-even if it meant being completely debt-free sooner. To be honest, I wouldn't even deplete it to pay off the house. You know how life always seems to throw a curveball at you when you least expect it? The moment you write that big check and weaken your emergency fund, your car will develop transmission issues, the central unit will go out and your roof will spring a leak.

Okay, so maybe I'm having a little fun with you in order to make a point. But the truth is the only time I would even consider dipping into your emergency fund-for anything that isn't an actual emergency—is if your emergency fund has become way too big, and you have a very small amount left to pay on the house. Keep in mind, your emergency fund should be three to six months of total household expenses, not three to six months of income. Besides, paying off the house is nothing even close to an emergency. The fact that you have to make payments on your home every month doesn't catch anyone with a mortgage by surprise.

Remember Murphy's Law, and how it says if something can go wrong it will go wrong? Evans, when you do things like your suggesting, you're just begging for Murphy to come visit for long, long time. And buddy, that's not my definition of financial peace! – Dave

"This milestone gives us greater ability to serve our community and connect more people to the joy of cycling," said Greg Collins, President and Founder of the Pachyderm


Pedalers. "We're excited for what lies ahead."


