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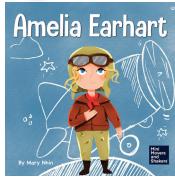

Uber & Lyft Expand Rideshare at Meadows Field Airport

Beginning on July 1, 2025, travelers flying in and out of Meadows Field Airport will have enhanced transportation options. The Kern County Board of Supervisors has approved a new agreement allowing Uber Technologies, Inc. to operate at the William M. Thomas Terminal, joining Lyft in providing rideshare services for passengers.

Under this agreement, along with the renewal of Lyft's existing 2018 contract, both Uber and Lyft will continue offering pick-up and drop-off services at Meadows Field Airport through June 30, 2028. These expanded rideshare options reinforce Kern County's commitment to convenience, flexibility, and accessibility for residents and visitors.

Nutritional Benefits of Watermelon

Watermelon is not only a refreshing treat, but it provides a host of additional nutritional benefits as well, making it an ideal food for your next backyard barbecue.

- Watermelon is low in calories. The Mayo Clinic notes that one cup of watermelon is 46 calories.
- Watermelon promotes hydration. The Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health notes that drinking enough water helps regulate body temperature, lubricate joints, prevent infections, and promote proper organ function. The Mayo Clinic notes watermelon is 92 percent water, which can help people remain hydrated on hot summer days spent outside.
- Watermelon is a good source of vitamins C and A. Watermelon contains 14 percent of the recommended daily value (DV) of vitamin C per USDA dietary guidelines, making it a worthy addition to anyone's diet. Watermelon also contains 5 percent of the recommended DV of vitamin A.
- Watermelon does not contain any fat, cholesterol or sodium. Unlike other popular desserts, watermelon contains no fat, cholesterol or sodium. Opting for watermelon over more traditional desserts can help people lower their fat consumption, reduce their cholesterol and avoid overconsumption of sodium.

Breakfast: The Heart-Healthy Habit

Experts agree that starting your day with a balanced breakfast—rich in whole grains, protein, and fresh produce—can set the tone for better health. Think avocado toast with an egg on wholegrain bread or oatmeal topped with berries and nuts—both delicious ways to fuel your morning.

Research published in The Journal of Nutrition, Health & Aging highlights the benefits of dedicating 20% to 30% of your daily calories to a hearty, nutritious breakfast. Participants who did so had lower BMIs, improved triglyceride levels, and higher HDL (good) cholesterol compared to those who skipped breakfast.

Stay Safe During Extreme Heat

Experts are warning that

Red Cross Central
California Region urges
everyone to take these
actions to stay safe.

What You Should Do to Avoid Heat Illness:

- Aim for a cup of water every hour and avoid sugary, caffeinated or alcoholic drinks.
- Encourage athletes and outdoor workers to take breaks in the shade and drink a cup of water every 20 minutes.
- Remember to wear lightweight, loose-fitting clothes in light colors.
- Never leave a child or pet alone inside a parked car, and make sure pets have access to fresh water and shade.

Heat Illness Signs & Actions:

Heat Cramps – Heavy sweating, muscle pain. Action: Rest in a cool place, sip water slowly. Avoid drinking if nauseous; seek help if cramps persist over an hour or you have heart issues.

Heat Exhaustion – Heavy sweating, weakness, cool clammy skin, dizziness, fainting, nausea. Action: Rest, sip water, loosen clothes, use a cool wet cloth. Get medical help if vomiting, heart problems, or symptoms persist.

Heat Stroke (Emergency!) – High body temp, rapid heartbeat, confusion, headache, dizziness, fainting, nausea. Action: Call 911 immediately. Move to a cool place, remove extra clothing, use wet clothes or a cool bath. Do not drink anything.

West Nile Virus: What You Need to Know This Mosquito Season

West Nile virus (WNV) is a mosquitoborne illness that survives in birds and spreads when a mosquito feeds on an infected bird, then bites humans or mammals like horses. It cannot spread from person to person. Most infected individuals (80%) remain asymptomatic, while 20% experience fever, headache. rash, muscle weakness, nausea, and vomiting. In rare cases (1%), neurological symptoms like paralysis, tremors, and confusion may occur. Fatal cases are uncommon. There is no specific treatment-most recover with supportive care.

While there is a vaccine against WNV for horses, there is no vaccine available for people. The best prevention against WNV is avoiding mosquito bites.

Here are ways to decrease your risk of mosquito-transmitted infections:

 Avoid mosquito-infested areas and use mosquito repellent on exposed skin.

- · Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants whenever you are outdoors.
- · Do not allow water to collect and stagnate in old tires, flowerpots, fountains, birdbaths, pet bowls, or other containers. These are prime breeding grounds for mosquitoes.
- Keep swimming pools operating properly; drain water from pool covers.
- Stock garden ponds with fish that eats mosquito larvae such as gambusia, goldfish, and others.
- · Empty and scrub the walls of birdbaths and wading pools weekly to remove any attached mosquito eggs.
- · Make sure that doors and windows have tight-fitting screens in good repair to keep mosquitoes out of your home.

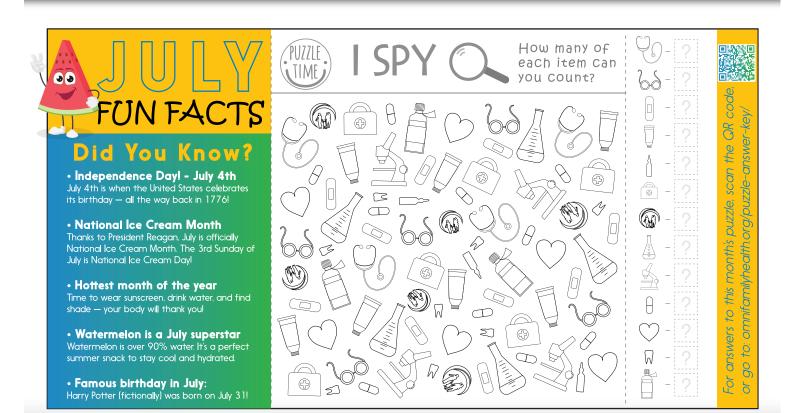

HELLO, HAPPY FAITHFUL MAMA

With a servant's heart and unwavering faith, **Timi Ann Mongold** pours her energy into what matters most —Christ, family, and uplifting her community.

ove speaks through Timi Ann
Mongold. Her commitments to
Christ, family and volunteering are
at the center of her life, facts she is
the first to affirm.

"Volunteering is my caffeine, like how some people say they have to have it to get through the day," she explained. "Serving others is my passion. Serving is my heart. Serving is who I am. Even as a young child, I served in convalescent homes reading to the elderly. I genuinely love making people smile and letting them know they are loved and that they matter."

Originally from Delano, Timi Ann graduated from California State University, Bakersfield. She taught elementary school before shifting to work in her husband's chiropractic practice, Alpha Omega Wellness Center.

Through a roundabout connection made while volunteering at Big Brothers Big Sisters, Timi Ann met her husband, Dr. David Mongold. They have eight children: Jordin, 35, Kahara, 31, Tristin, 27, Tommi Jo, 24, JoVi, 19, Luke James, 15, Faith, 13 and Levi, 8, with whom they volunteer.

"It is amazing to walk alongside your children and volunteer," said Timi Ann, who recalls serving the community while wearing a backpack and a front carrier to accommodate her then-baby and toddler.

A certified foster parent for more than 16 years, Timi Ann also speaks with an acute awareness of the broader community.

"My continued prayer is that everyone, specifically Kern County, would be educated and get involved with the foster care community, which in turn is also a part of homelessness, addiction, mental health, trafficking and so much more," said Timi Ann. "There are so many misconceptions about foster care but what a wonderful blessing it is to be able to bridge the gap and allow a child to come into your life and change it for the better. The fact is, the number of kids in foster care outweighs the number of open homes, forcing kids to be constantly bounced around, and I will never be okay with that."

Although adoption has been part of the Mongold family's story, reunification remains the primary goal of foster care and ensuring community resources are available also helps families meet that goal. Timi Ann expressed her belief that everyone can do something to help.

"Trust me when I say there is always time to volunteer! I am a full-time working mom with three littles still at home and at any given time during the week, you can find me serving at the Blessing Corner Outreach Ministries, The Mission at Kern County, Encore Boutique, Kern Bridges Youth Homes, Bakersfield Christian High School and dozens of others that I've been blessed to serve with while simultaneously sharing the love of Jesus Christ," she said. "There are so many tasks my 8 year and 13 year olds can do alongside me, from sorting socks at The Mission, to planting in the garden and making up baskets. My Mom is a senior citizen and she has some physical limitations but she can serve. I can bring tasks home to her, like stuffing envelopes or calling donors and sponsors. There are so many different capacities in which people can volunteer at all ages."

THREE QUESTIONS WITH TIMI ANN MONGOLD

Q. We often talk with mothers in phases of life that can seem lonely or isolating, especially as they raise young children. What advice do you have for women going through that phase of life?

If you're ever feeling lonely or isolated, you need to get out and serve others and if you have children, take your children with you to serve! There is one thing that we are all given the exact same of and that is 24 hours a day. The way you choose to use your 24 hours is up to you.

Serving others through the love of Christ is the best kind of medicine no money can buy. It will fill your cup, both mentally and physically!

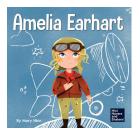

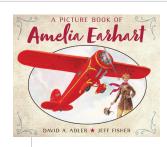

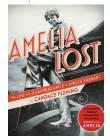

Know What's Safe & What to Avoid for Your Furry Friends!

Not all human foods are pet-friendly! Learn which snacks are safe and which can pose hidden dangers.

Safe Foods

Vegetables: Carrots, Green Beans, Sweet Potatoes, Pumpkin, Cucumbers

Fruits: Apples (seedless), Blueberries, Bananas, Strawberries, Watermelon (seedless)

Proteins: Cooked Chicken (plain), Turkey (without skin/seasoning), Eggs (cooked), Salmon (boneless)

Other: Rice (plain, cooked), Oatmeal (plain), Peanut Butter (xylitolfree), Plain Yogurt

Harmful Foods

Chocolate, Coffee & Caffeine: Can cause vomiting, tremors, and seizures

Grapes & Raisins: May lead to kidney failure Onions, Garlic & Chives – Can damage red blood cells and cause anemia

Xylitol (Artificial Sweetener): Found in sugar-free gum, baked goods, and some peanut butter; can cause liver failure and dangerously low blood sugar

Milk & Dairy: Can lead to stomach upset, diarrhea, and discomfort

Macadamia Nuts: May cause weakness, vomiting, and tremors

Alcohol & Yeast Dough: Can cause serious digestive issues and alcohol poisoning

Simple Steps to Keep Your Pet Safe

PETS BRING A LOT OF JOY TO PEOPLE'S LIVES. In fact, 97 percent of pet owners consider their pets to be family members. In addition to the financial investment associated with pet ownership, owners must devote time and energy into safeguarding the well-being of their pets. That includes reducing the chances the animal becomes lost. The Animal Humane Society says it's estimated one in three pets will go missing in their lifetime and many will not be reunited with owners. But people can do their part to protect pets from escaping or getting lost. Here are some proactive steps to take.

1

Get pet identification

Take a multi-layered approach to identifying the pet, such as name and contact information printed on a collar tag. In addition, have the pet microchipped. Pet parents should routinely check and update the chip data if they move or if there is a change in phone number or pet ownership.



Choose a well-fitting collar

A collar can be rendered useless if the pet is able to slip its head out. Harnesses may be even more secure for escape artists because they attach around the midsection rather than the neck. Another great tool is attaching a GPS-enabled device to a pet collar. In the event the pet cannot be found, pet owners can track the animal's location using a mobile phone. Always use a leash! Even the most well-trained pets may run off from time to time.



Secure the home and yard

Check for any apparent points of weakness around the home or yard. Is there a large gap between the bottom of the fence and the lawn that needs remedying? Is the gate latching securely or does it pop open? Are all window screens secure, or could they be pushed out from the inside? Securing the home can cut down on potential problems.



Utilize obedience training

Working with a certified dog trainer or cat behaviorist can teach the pet to curb an instinct to bolt. If they start to run off, training can help pets develop adequate recall skills to come back when called. Trainers also can teach techniques to quell pets' desires to dart when a house or fence door is open.

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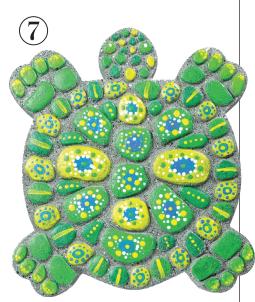

And when we finally made it to the exit, I was done.

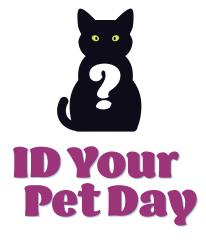
And that is why I have no clothes of my own.

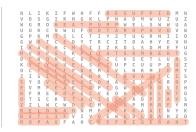

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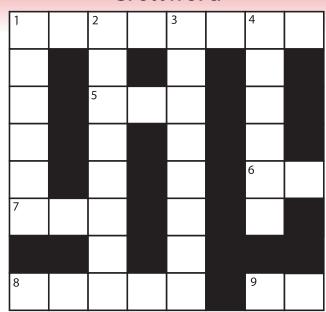
