From Classroom to Champions

Chaboya Middle School's Black Team Dominates Northern California Science Olympiad; Chaboya Black Team secures 360 medals

haboya Middle School's Science Olympiad Black Team delivered an outstanding per-■ formance at the Northern California State Finals, held at California State University East Bay, earning an impressive 4th place overall.

Throughout the season, the team amassed a remarkable 360 medals across 23 events, showcasing the ongoing excellence and scientific prowess of Chaboya students in these rigorous, multidisciplinary competitions.

80 Chaboya students participated in a diverse and dynamic lineup of tournaments, spanning mini, satellite, in-person, and virtual formats from September 2024 to April 2025. These competitions took place in numerous locations across the country, including Cummings and Marietta (Georgia); Boyceville (Wisconsin); Tallahassee and Miami (Florida); Sugar Land (Texas); West Chester (Pennsylvania); Mason (Ohio); Brooklyn and Chappaqua (New York); Apple Valley (Southern California); and sever-

al cities in Northern California such as Sacramento, Cupertino, Milpitas, and Hayward.

The Science Olympiad, a renowned nationwide program founded in 1984, features more $than\,6,\!600\,teams\,competing\,annually\,across\,all$ 50 states. The events challenge students to master scientific concepts, apply analytical thinking, and develop creative solutions to complex problems in real world contexts.

Chaboya's students have long embraced the rigor and excitement of this multifaceted program, consistently qualifying for the Northern California State Competitions. The 2025 season kicked off with a record number of student signups, leading to the formation of six teams. 
Celebrate the Fourth of July with fireworks and community spirit

San Jose bans homeless people renting RVs

he San Jose City Council voted 9-1 last week to approve the "vanlording" policy to ban advertising and renting out of RVs to homeless residents. The new law's intent is to discourage the use the recreational vehicles as homes.

The new law, which goes into effect in August, prohibits individuals in RVs from parking and sleeping on city streets and private property. District 2 Councilmember Pamela Campos was the sole "no" vote.

The policy comes on the heels of the city's RV tow-away zones program. San Jose plans to select up to 30 temporary tow-away zones and 10 permanent sites to clear RVs for street sweeping and cleanup. Implementation is scheduled for this year.



San Jose cancels Almaden Lake Park 4th of July festival

an Jose resident Cathie Bacosa woke up around midnight last year to a fire ravaging her backyard in the neighborhood she's lived in for 28 years. She thinks it was likely from fireworks. It was July 4, and more than 30,000 people had crowded into the small neighborhood to watch the annual Almaden Lake Park fireworks display near her home.

The fire destroyed Bacosa's kitchen and backyard, forcing her and her family to live in a hotel for five months. She's one of dozens of residents glad local officials have canceled the annual fireworks display this year, despite it being the 10th year of the lakeside festivities. The celebration included an afternoon festival and a night-time fireworks display.

"I'm very fortunate. My family got out," she told San José Spotlight. "We were safe. Our dog was safe, but it's the scariest thing that we've ever had to go through in our lives."

Councilmember George Casey, who represents District 10 where the park is located, announced in a communitywide email Monday that San Jose had canceled the festivities due to safety concerns — and won't utilize the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds as an alternative location.

Casey said emergency officials had a difficult time responding to calls last year due to the crowd and hundreds of cars blocking the streets, including a hillside fire that took three hours to put out and burned between 5 and 10 acres.

"There are no fiscally responsible options to mitigate the safety concerns this year," Casey said in the email. "Holding a safe event for attendees and surrounding neighbors is of paramount importance and guided our decision to postpone the event while we work to identify a more suitable venue."

San Jose Police Department deferred comment to Casey's office. Casey was not available for comment.

A San Jose Fire Department spokesperson said they didn't have additional comments beyond what Casey's email said.

The annual festival and fireworks also brought foot traffic to local nearby businesses, including Vanshu 24×7 Liquor Store in the Old Almaden Plaza.

Owner Sumit Maan said his liquor store always gets an Independence Day boost as people flock to the area to celebrate. He's worried about the dip in business he may see due to this year's cancelation, but said safety must be the priority. He'd like to

see it come back to Almaden Lake Park in the future if the event can be better contained.

"If the San Jose Police Department and other communities participate and they're managed good, then we will be happy," Maan told San José Spotlight.

"The last couple of years, we saw there is no good management (of the event)."

San Jose is still hosting other fireworks shows on July 4, including one with a waterfront view at Lake Cunningham Park on the East Side. Other cities, including Sunnyvale, are experimenting with drone

shows that limit fire risk.

Michael Ross, a lead communications volunteer with neighborhood group Almaden Valley Community Association, said it's a shame the show had to be canceled because he enjoyed it every year. But he understands the risks outweigh the benefits.

"The fact that it's not going to be held is disappointing, as I'm sure it is to many people," Ross told San José Spotlight. "Everybody likes fireworks, especially good ones, big ones — not wildfire-starting fireworks."

1. Create Defensible Space:

Begin by meticulously clearing any combustible vegetation and debris near your home. This includes removing dry leaves, twigs, and overgrown brush and relocating firewood to a minimum distance of 30 feet from your structure. Instead, consider cultivating fire-resistant landscaping with native plants that require less water and are less likely to ignite, such as succulents and ornamental grasses, to form a protective barrier around your property.

2. Harden Your Home:

Invest in fire-resistant materials to transform your home into a defensive stronghold against wildfires. Opt for Class A roofing materials, such as metal or tile, and use non-combustible siding to minimize fire risk. Additionally, install double-paned tempered glass windows and reinforced metal mesh screens to prevent hot embers from penetrating your home during a wildfire.

3. Establish Firebreaks:

Two exhibitions planned for July 11 opening at San José Museum of Art

wo interesting exhibitions are opening July 11 at the San José Museum of Art.

Pao Houa Her's practice engages with the legacies, potentials, and aesthetics of landscape and portrait photography traditions through works that examine the complex intertwining of desire, homeland, and artifice.

Pao Houa Her: The Imaginative Landscape (detail, below) is the first survey of Her's practice. Spanning nearly 20 years of work, it connects California agricultural landscapes to the jungles of Laos, poppy fields in Minnesota, and beyond.

Though specific to her own Hmong American experience, The Imaginative Landscape explores constructions of homeland that resonate across diasporas.



Young bay mud (detail, below) —a scientific term for ecologically rich and water-saturated deposits that are less than ten thousand years old—underlies much of the San Francisco Bay Area.

Inspired by the ways young bay mud shapes our experience of and interaction with the region, this exhibition highlights artists with local ties who are using mud to explore ecological entanglement



and belonging in the Bay Area. These artists invoke indigenous, ancestral, sensorial, and multispecies knowledge to propose alternative ways of relating to our immediate environment.
