MUSCLE SHOALS/ HELENA, AL - Fiveyear-old Cooper Nelson is capturing hearts across the country as he advances in the Next Junior Ranger Competition, a nationwide event hosted by Colossal in partnership with Ranger Rick Magazine. With his passion for nature and big heart for wildlife, Cooper has already made it to the quarterfinals — a remarkable feat for one of the youngest contestants in the competition. His father, Daniel Nelson, is a Muscle Shoals native, and so many of Cooper's relatives still live here.

purchase generated by the proposed Spring Valley Solar Project in Colbert County, along U.S. Highway 43. The DEIS includes two alternatives: a no action alternative and an action alternative.

• No Action Alternative: TVA would not purchase the power generated by the project under the 20-year PPÁ with Spring Valley Solar, LLC, and TVA would not be involved with the project.

• Action Alternative: Spring Valley Solar, LLC, would construct, maintain, and operate a 178-MW AC single-axis tracking photovoltaic (PV) solar power facility. The facility would occupy approximately 943 acres of a 1,629-acre Project Site.

To keep the community informed on this proposed project, TVA will host a public meeting from 6pm to 8pm CT on Tuesday, July 15, 2025, at Colbert Heights High School, 6825 Woodmont Dr. in Tuscumbia.

Comments must be received or postmarked no later than August 11, 2025, and the public is encouraged to submit comments in person at the public meeting or via email to nepa@tva.gov. RIVER ZURINSKY: An Undercurrent of Change for Florence - District 2!

My name is River to address this before Zurinsky, and I am asking children are killed while for your vote for Florence City Council District 2.

I'm running for office because I want to serve the citizens of Florence and inspire our next generation of leaders. I was born at Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital (ECM) in 1999 and have spent my entire life as a citizen of District 2, where I've lived in the McFarland Heights neighborhood for 26 years. I attended W.C. Handy Head Start, Kilby Laboratory School, Shoals Christian School, and graduated from Faith Academy. I'm a member of the Florence Beautification Board, a SKYWARN Storm Spotter, and an advocate for people with disabilities.

As the first person with autism to run for public office in Florence, Alabama, I believe that everyone should have the opportunity to have their voice heard and express their opinions. For the past three years, I've regularly attended and advocated for citizens of Florence at city council meetings and I'm one of only four private private citizens who submitted a redistricting proposal in 2023 to the Alabama State Legislature following the Allen vs Milligan Supreme Court decision in an effort to protect African American representation. In 2025, I was the only citizen in Florence who submitted a redistricting proposal to the Florence City Council as an alternative to NACOG's proposal which took away our only black majority district. 





Just hours ago, this nation was stunned to learn that prosecutors in Idaho have agreed with accused Bryan Kohberger to accept his plea deal to guilty of four counts of murder in exchange for a sentence of life in prison without parole. As is well known, Kohberger was charged with brutally murdering four University of Idaho students in 2022 in Moscow, Idaho.



Just Horsing Around

One of the best defenses to an on-the-job injury case is horseplay. The most common way that people lose their case is a failure to report an injury within the prescribed time. Often employers refuse to play by the rules and deny treatment and in some cases that's effective, even when it should not be.

The rules of the game in some ways favor the employee but also completely limit the recovery of the injured person. By that I mean this. If they deny a claim or don't pay the claim or pay too little or don't pay on time, there's nothing that an injured worker can do about it other than sue for the benefits that you did not lawfully receive. The employer/insurance company is protected from what would otherwise be a bad faith lawsuit.

The defense of horseplay deals with the concept of scope. Sounds fancy, but it's really simple. If you look at the job that the employee is supposed to be doing as if through a scope and what they are doing doesn't have anything to do with the job, they're outside the scope of their employment. Sometimes it's going outside to pick some blackberries (the leading case came out of Lauderdale County over some nice, ripe blackberries). Occasionally, it's a personal errand having to do with grabbing lunch.

What we really see in a few cases are acts that are defined as horseplay. We had a case a number of years ago where one guy picked up a cardboard tube and, using it like a sword, playing with his friend who fell off a curb and broke his ankle. We had to fight that case and eventually won because our guy was sort of the victim of the horseplay and not engaging in it himself. Obviously, if someone brings a curiosity into the workplace to show others, that's not within the scope of employment. Think about what the job is and the tasks that have to be done to accomplish it. That's the idea of scope. Horseplay is a very tough

Medicare Minute

"Signing up for Medicare Part 1"

The most common way to qualify for Medicare is when you are turning 65. You will have a specific time period, set by Medicare, to enroll in Part A and Part B Medicare. This is known as the Initial Enrollment Period (IEP).

If you are qualifying for Medicare by turning 65 you will have a 7 month window to enroll in Medicare. This window is based off of the month you turn 65. It starts 3 months prior to the month you turn 65 and extends 3 months past the month you turn 65. For example, if you are turning 65 in September your IEP begins in June and extends all the way through the month of December. If you are eligible, you may not have to pay a premium for Part A, but Part B will have a premium.

For those electing to sign up for Part B after their IEP a late-enrollment penalty may be assessed. This penalty can last as long as you have Part B and there may be a gap in your health coverage. However, one exception to this rule is being employed and having coverage through your company's group health plan. If this applies to you check with your benefit coordinator, Medicare or contact our office.

In most cases, if you are already drawing your Social Security or Railroad Retirement Board benefits you should automatically be signed up for Part A and Part B. If you are not drawing your Social Security or RRB benefits and want to sign up for Medicare you can do so by signing up online at ssa.gov, visit your local Social Security office or give our office a call and we can help direct you.

2024 Water Quality Report - Chisholm Heights Water Authority

the City of Florence Water Department monitors for contaminants in your drinking water. This report is designed to inform you about the quality of water and services we deliver to you every day. Our goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. We purchase our water from the City of Florence and redistribute in our area; Florence Water Department's water source is Wilson Lake and Cypress Creek. This provides an abundant supply of quality water for all customers.

We are pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and met or surpassed all federal and state requirements during 2024.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning the quality of your water you can contact our office number 256-718-0301. Members of the board are Trent Butler, Jimmy Risner and Steve Watkins. If you have problems or concerns you can attend our scheduled meetings. Please call the office to be placed on the agenda for the meeting.

The Board of Directors of Chisholm Heights Water along with the Florence Water Department monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The following tables shows the results of the monitoring by Florence Water from the period January 1, 2024 to December 31, 2024. It is important to remember that the presence of some contaminants

does not necessarily pose a health risk.

The Florence Water Department utilizes coagulation, flocculation, sedimentation, and filtration in their process. Also, chlorine is used for disinfection, fluoride for dental protection and lime for ph treatment.

In the testing that Chisholm Heights Water are required to do each month, total coliform bacteria, we did not collect all the samples in August 2024 and had a violation. CHW was late bisinfection By-Product Monitoring (DBP) done every 3 months, with no problems. Lead/Cooper testing was done in 2024. CHW was late sending in the Lead/Cooper service line inventory list. This was completed February 2025.

In 2014 Florence Water added the MIEX system as a simple

solution for meeting U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) disinfection by-product (DBP) removal by employing a continuous ion exchange process. The process removes dissolved organic carbon (DOC) allowing for improved drinking water quality and regulatory compliance.

Included are tables of the testing from Florence Water. What

do these tables mean? Our water is tested to assure that it is safe and healthy. The Table of Primary Contaminants provides an overview of some primary contaminants that are known to pose a health risk to humans. The Table of Secondary Contaminants is contaminants that generally pose no health risk, but are monitored for reasons of aesthetics. In the Table of Detected Contaminants. the column marked Amount Detected shows the highest test results during the year. Sources of contaminant level show where this substance usually originates. Columns headed MCL and MCLG refer to:

Maximum Contaminant Level or MCL: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal or MCLG: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below, which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Action Level (AL) - The concentration of a contaminant, which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements, which a water system must follow.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

AL = Action Level, Paci/l = Picocuries per liter, CL = Maximum Contaminant Level, **PPM**=Parts per Million, CLG = Max. Contaminant Level Goal. PPB = Parts per Billion.

NTU = Nephelometric Turbidity Units, TT = Treatment Technique, ND = Not Detected

UNREGULATED CONTAMINANTS

The Florence Water Department nor Chisholm Heights Water tested for, nor was it required to test, for Radon during 2024. However, there are other unregulated contaminants that were tested for in 2024.

ASBESTOS and DIOXIN

Based on a study conducted by ADEM with the approval of the EPA, a statewide waiver for the monitoring of asbestos and dioxin was issued. Thus, monitoring for these contaminants is

CRYTOSPORIDIUM & GIARDIA

Cryptosporidium and Giardia are microscopic organisms found in surface water throughout the U.S. Although filtration removes Cryptosporidium and Giardia the most commonly used filtration methods cannot guarantee 100 percent removal. Ingestion causes an abdominal infection. Symptoms of the infection include nausea, diarrhea, and abdominal cramps. Most healthy individuals can overcome the disease within a few weeks. However, immuno-compromised individuals, infants, small children and the elderly are at greater risk of developing

life-threatening illness. We encourage immuno-compromised individuals to consult their doctor regarding appropriate precautions to take to avoid infections. Cryptosporidium and Giardia must be ingested to cause disease, and it may be spread through means other than drinking water. Florence Water currently monitors for Cryptosporidium and Giardia and is removed and/or treated by effective filtration and disinfection processes.

<u>LEAD</u>

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health roblems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Chisholm Heights Water is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but can not control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead.

LEAD AND COPPER RULE MONITORING

Lead and copper Rule (LCR) was developed to protect public health by minimizing lead and copper levels in drinking water. The LCR established an action level of 0.015 mg/l for lead and 1.3 mg/l for copper based on the 90th percentile level of tap water samples collected. Lead and copper are sampled on a mandated three-year testing cycle with sampling conducted at customer's tap. Our 90thpercentile for lead was 0.005 mg/L. Our 90th percentile for copper was 0.102 mg/L.

REQUIRED ADDITIONAL HEALTH INFORMATION

To ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes limits on the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, and wells. Contaminants that may be presenting the source water include:

INVESTING OR STUDENT LOAN DEBT?

I want her to start investing at some point down the road, but she's just not in a good position to be an investor right now. She needs to pay off all those student loans. And the second after she pays off those student loans, she should get to work on *saving* a pile of money,



so she can complete her studies without racking up any more debt!






