Coyote season brings safety advisory

s coyote sightings are expected to rise in the Bay Area during warmer months, the East Bay Regional Park District has issued safety tips for visitors, including staying in groups, keeping pets leashed and children close, remaining alert, sticking to trails, and never feeding coyotes.

 $Encounters\,among\,local\,wildlife$ become more common in summer as more people visit parks and young coyotes become more active.

The advisory, created with help from park biologists, urges reporting any sick, injured, or aggressive coyotes to park dispatch at (510) 881-1833.

Experts urge maintaining proper distance and walking calmly, away if approached.



East San Jose cultural district nets \$50K grant

Heritage Plaza is gearing up to launch San Jose's first distinct cultural district. Housing Trust Silicon Valley, a nonprofit com-

munity development group, recently announced it will award a \$50,000 grant to the School of Arts and Culture at Mexican Heritage Plaza. As the plaza celebrated 25 years in San Jose, school leaders said they want to bring health care, affordable housing and economic development to the Mayfair neighborhood through "La Avenida," a cultural district meant to attract development.

'We recognize that the strength of our region's affordable housing ecosystem is rooted in the capacity of community-based developers who are deeply connected to the neighborhoods they serve," Housing Trust Silicon Valley CEO Noni Ramos said in a statement.

School of Arts and Culture representatives said they have raised more than 90% of La Avenida's \$30 million goal - but need community help filling the gap. The \$50,000 grant

will be used to purchase a mostly vacant property on 1747-1785 Alum Rock Ave., directly across from Mexican Heritage Plaza.

The district is envisioned as a 6-acre mixeduse development with affordable housing, local businesses and social service providers. The projects aim to address threats of displacement in the Mayfair neighborhood and greater East San Iose.

"A fully developed La Avenida would be a major win for East San Jose and for the city's broader economy. With major events coming in 2026, we need to invest in our cultural, business and entertainment districts beyond downtown," San Jose

Chamber of Commerce CEO Leah Toeniskoetter told San José Spotlight, referring to Super-Bowl 60 and the FIFA World Cup. "This project brings investment, local ownership and jobs to a historically underserved corridor — and helps to position San Jose as a city that grows inclusivelv."

SV Creates CEO Alexandra Urbanowski, also a School of Arts and Culture board member and San José Spotlight columnist, said the \$50,000 See GRANT, page 3

Continued from page 1 Mayor Mahan, Councilmember Candelas and City Administration moved quickly to keep the Lake Cunningham show on track with drones.

The free celebration at Lake Cunningham featured live music, dancers, food vendors, and the first ever drone show.

On Wednesday, July 2, the City of San José was informed that the fireworks reserved for the second annual display at Lake Cunningham were destroyed in a tragic warehouse explosion in Yolo County. City leaders acted swiftly, securing an alternative vendor to produce the drone show. As a result, attendees at Lake Cunningham enjoyed the first-ever drone show in San José, while safely celebrating the Fourth of July.

"The show must go on," said San Jose Mayor Matt Mahan. "I want to thank Councilmember Candelas and

City staff for finding a solution in less than twenty-four hours that ensured families in San Jose can celebrate American independence and the innovation that keeps us on the cutting edge with a drone show at Lake Cunningham."

Candelas issued this statement the day prior to the event: "The tragedy in Yolo County has affected multiple fireworks displays across the state," said Councilmember Domingo Candelas. "While we had to cancel the fireworks, the celebration is still on. Families are welcome to come to Lake Cunningham to enjoy everything we have planned: food trucks, performances, and activities. Our hope is to still unite our community in



celebration but also deter the use of illegal fireworks in our neighborhoods."

"I am grateful to the City team responsible for finding a safe and fun alternative on short notice so our families can enjoy a new form of entertainment this Fourth of July," said Assistant City Manager Lee Wilcox.

At a press event on July 3, Fire Chief Sapien and Deputy Police Chief Sanchez reminded residents about the dangers of illegal fireworks. The police department will use drones to monitor activity and will issue fines of up to \$50,000 for selling illegal explosives.

The Mayor and Councilmember Candelas acknowledged the tragedy in Yolo County and expressed their hopes for the swift and safe recovery of the missing workers.

munity health, social cohesion and economic vitality," Urbanowski told San José Spotlight.

City officials voted last month to add La Avenida to the list of entertainment zones with reduced alcohol consumption restrictions ahead of the 2026 Super Bowl and World Cup events.

"The grant will help the school build its infrastructure and capacity to provide equitable access to arts programming for residents, pay to local artists and resources for all the smaller arts organizations that call the Mexican Heritage Plaza home," Urbanowski said. "What a nice message today to counter recent federal funding cuts to the arts."

Santa Clara County property values up while growth slows

Santa Clara County property values are seeing their lowest growth in more than a decade due to economic uncertainty and stalled development.

Yet the total net assessed value of all real estate and personal property – known as the assessment roll – reached a new height of nearly \$726 billion, County Assessor Larry Stone announced Wednesday. Home sales increased by 3% and accounted for 86% of roll growth.

This year marks Stone's final assessment roll before he steps down on July 7 – marking an end to one of the county's longest serving public officials.

"Just a few years ago, office buildings were the darling of commercial real estate investment. That's not the case anymore," Stone told San Jose Spotlight.

"Foreclosures are almost weekly — hotels, office, some industrial. They're just throwing the keys and giving them back to lenders."

Stone said several significant commercial development projects have stalled due to high interest rates, surging construction cost and sinking demand for office space. Google's "Downtown West" project in San Jose was

slated to begin in 2023, but remains in limbo. Stone also pointed to "The Rise" development at the former Vallco Mall in Cupertino, a planned mixed-use development that required a redesign and cutbacks before it could move forward. The 240-acre mixeduse development, known as "Related Santa Clara," is another significant project facing construction delays.

Surging vacancies, dropping rental rates, a shortage of big leasing deals, and the continuation of hybrid and remote work have kept the office vacancy rate in Silicon Valley at roughly 20% for the past two years, according to the assessor's office.

Stone said office buildings are being sold at major discounts. He points to VTA's purchase of Sobrato Office Tower at 488 Almaden Blvd this year. Stone said VTA paid 61% of the assessed value. He said he doesn't expect the commercial market to turn around for another few years.

Elsewhere, Stone said Silicon Valley is experiencing different trends compared to the rest of the nation.

"Job growth throughout the country is pretty good. Around here it's not. The high tech companies have jettisoned about 11,000 jobs this year," Stone said. "Silicon Valley and Santa Clara County are experiencing a different level of trends related to property values than you're finding in other parts of the state or country."

The assessment shows that while home sales are slow, the residential market is still strong.

Brett Caviness, a local realtor and former president of the Silicon Valley Association of Realtors, said the current market has opened new opportunities for potential buyers who felt priced out due to more aggressive competition in prior years.

"We're seeing more people able to access homeownership than they were to before. That's a bright point," Caviness told San Jose Spotlight. "The takeaways for me are it's still a good time to be selling and an even better time to be buying."

Changes in ownership and new construction added \$16.1 billion and \$3.8 billion to the total increase, respectively. Business and personal property values added \$1.8 billion. Nearly 8,700 properties remain in declining value due to Prop. 8, which allowed temporary reductions in assessed value in cases where real property suffered a decline in value.

Prop. 13, which restricts property taxes, added \$14.4 billion to the assessment roll. But Stone said it continues to come at a cost to schools and local governments who depend on property tax revenue to support essential services.

Slow home sales and stalled construction will likely continue to lag assessment roll growth in the years ahead, Stone said. But he's optimistic about the region's long-term outlook, as some of the world's largest tech companies – Apple, Microsoft and NVIDIA – are still concentrated in Silicon Valley.

"We still lead the country in the amount of venture capital investment and a lot of it is based on Artificial Intelligence," Stone said. "It doesn't mean we aren't facing trends that are pretty discouraging right now. But I think the future is bright."

• Local choice: Jurisdictions can encourage local designers to add their plans to CPC's database and grow their local ADU marketplace.

• High-quality website for the public: Homeowners can easily filter the gallery to find and compare designs, then explore images, floorplans, estimated costs, and more for each plan.

• Cost and time savings for homeowners: The ADU Plans gallery offers a variety of styles, sizes, and budgets, empowering homeowners to find the right ADU solution for their property – saving months of time and thousands of dollars as compared to a custom design process.

"The launch of these ADU Plans Galleries showcases the commitment of Mountain View and other cities across Santa Clara County to innovative housing solutions," said Christian Murdock, Community Development Director for the City of Mountain View. Central Bikeway secures \$14 million in state funding

he Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority's (VTA) ambitious project to provide a fully-separated east-west protected bikeway across Santa Clara County is one step closer to existence.

The California Transportation Commission (CTC) approved \$14 million in STIP (State Transportation Improvement Program) funds on June 27, 2025, to advance VTA's Central Bikeway project.

The funding will allow VTA to complete environmental clearance for the planned

ten-mile bikeway, a major step forward for one of Santa Clara County's most ambitious active transportation projects.

The Central Bikeway aims to create a 10mile, fully separated, low-stress, high-quality, east-west bikeway, connecting Berryessa BART in North San José to the Santa Clara/Sunnyvale border. The alignment will follow El Camino Real in the City of Santa Clara and Hedding Street, The Alameda, Taylor Street, and Mabury Road in San Jose.

The project builds on the 2022 Central Bikeway Feasibility Study, which engaged thousands of community members and identified a preferred alignment based on feasibility, safety, and connectivity.

Environmental clearance is expected to begin in early 2026, with additional phases of design and construction pending future funding. If total funding of \$213 million is secured, the project could open in 2033.

Bill addresses exploitation of individual's name, voice or likeness for commercial purposes

tate Senator Dave Cortese's bill, which provides swift legal remedies for indi-**D**viduals who have had their privacy rights violated by the unauthorized use, has unanimously passed by the state Assembly Judiciarv Committee.

Senate Bill 683, which now goes to the state

Assembly floor for a vote, is written to protect a person's name, voice, signature, photograph or likeness for commercial purposes. The bill is intended to address and prevent exploitation, particularly in situations where individuals' personal information or images are used without their consent.

SB 683 is designed to expediate the removal of the unauthorized materials while legal proceedings are ongoing. Specifically, it allows individuals to seek the immediate removal of the materials within two business days.

"SB 683 strengthens existing privacy protections by encouraging individuals to seek a temporary restraining order for the removal of their name, voice, signature, photograph, or likeness if it's being used without their consent." said Cortese.

alifornia State Senator Dave Cortese's housing legislation that would change the structure of hous-✓ ing finance in California by using the state's credit to increase the housing supply faster passed the Assembly Housing Committee and was sent to the Assembly Judiciary Committee.

Senate Bill 750 (The California Finance and Credit Act) is part of a two-bill package that includes a 2026 constitutional amendment, which will apply the "full faith and credit of the State of California" to loans and municipal bonds for housing construction.

The bill essentially allows credit strapped private investors to unlock hundreds of thousands of shovelready homes now stuck in limbo by using the full faith and credit of the state to back the financing for the housing projects.

'Cities throughout California cannot solve this housing and homeless crisis alone. So we are going to the voters asking them to change the constitution to empower the state to use its good credit to help solve this problem for the first time in the state's history," said Senator Dave Cortese.

Developers and housing advocates throughout California support Senator Cortese's bill.

Santa Clara County homelessness hits a new high

omelessness has increased in Santa Clara County which now has 10,711 homeless residents, up \mathbf{I} 8.2% from two years ago, according to preliminary results from this year's point in time count.

Despite funding through Measure A, a \$950 million affordable housing bond approved by voters in 2016, housing investments and the construction of more than 1,300 affordable apartments, the number of homeless has increased.

The county has assisted in moving more than 8,000 people from homelessness to housing between 2023 and 2025.
