# Famed MLB player and coach Dave 'Rags' Righetti to speak at Men's Fun Social Club luncheon

On **Tuesday, August 5**, Dave "Rags" Righetti will be the speaker at the Villages Men's Fun Social Club luncheon. Dave had a 17-year Major League career as a player and has coached for the Giants for 18 years.

Social Club members should make lunch reservations at least a week in advance on the website referenced in the monthly Social Club newsletter.

Non-member guests are invited to attend and should arrive at the Clubhouse by **12:15 p.m.** 



Dave began his baseball career here in San Jose, on the fields of Pioneer High School, where his teams went 34-2 during his time. He was Junior College player of the year at San Jose City College, leading to him being drafted by the Texas Rangers. Soon after, he was traded to the

New York Yankees where he became a starting pitcher and in 1981 was the American League Rookie of the year. On July 4, 1983, against the rival Boston Red Sox, Dave threw a no-hitter, striking out Wade Boggs to end the game. He was converted to a relief pitcher and became a dominant closer for the Yankees, winning the Relief Pitcher

of the Year award twice and was named to two All-Star teams.

In 2000 Dave became the pitching coach for the San Francisco Giants and worked under managers Dusty Baker, Felipe Alou, and Bruce Bochy. He managed a pitching staff that included Matt Cain, Madison Bumgartner, Tim Lincecum, Jeremy Affeldt, and was a mentor to catcher Buster Posey. Dave helped lead them to winning World Series titles in 2010, 2012, and 2014. He retired from full-time coaching in 2017 but remains with the Giants working with their minor league pitchers.

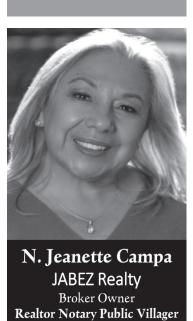

### Budget Town Hall questions...

(Continued from front page)

Q2. Where did the savings from canceling our earthquake insurance go? It was removed from our contract without our approval. Why didn't we get a discount on our HOAs then?

A2. The earthquake insurance coverage was discontinued in May 2022 as part of a collective decision by the Boards for FY2022-23. This decision followed multiple discussions among directors and staff concerned about the rapidly escalating cost of earthquake coverage. Premiums had gone up dramatically in the preceding years, jumping from about \$9.53 per million in 2018 to over \$100 per million by 2021. Even with minimal coverage and high deductibles (minimum \$250,000 per occurrence), the annual premiums exceeded \$250,000 for a \$2.5 million supplemental policy, which was viewed as providing limited benefit in the event of a major disaster.

At the same time, The Villages faced broader insurance pressures:

- · California's shrinking admitted insurance market forced many associations (including The Villages Association) into nonadmitted markets with higher rates and less flexibility.
- The insured value of The Villages rose to \$889 million, which increased base coverage costs proportionally.
- · Property and casualty premiums more than doubled across many layers of coverage.

The removal of earthquake insurance did not result in a discount to HOA assessments because the broader insurance portfolio skyrocketed in cost. What might have been "savings" was instead absorbed by these base premium increases. Keeping earthquake insurance would have pushed total premiums even higher.

This is why the Boards collectively, concluded that the coverage no longer offered a justifiable cost-benefit ratio.

Q3. The level of services from administration and maintenance has gone down in the last couple of years. How is this being addressed in the budget?

A3. To better understand this question, we need to know: Is this about the level of service being provided? If so, which specific services are you referring to? Or is this about services that were previously available but have now changed or been discontinued? If that's the case, please identify which specific services you're concerned about so we can address them directly.

Q4. How much are we spending on consultants for rebranding, etc.?

A4. The branding effort is modest in scope and cost:

- \$30,000 total over two fiscal years
- That is \$15,000 yearly or about \$4,285/month over 7 engaged months
  - It equates to about \$1.68 per unit

It is funded through the capital projects budget (not operating funds) and to clarify, this is not the first time The Villages has engaged in branding or strategic positioning efforts. Branding has long been part of The Villages effort to keep the community relevant and competitive:

- In 1992, and again in 2014, The Villages worked with Hamlin and Harkins on branding and strategic planning initiatives, spending \$30,000 each time.
- · In 2016, we partnered with the Northern California Golf Association to assess our market position and outreach promote The Villages, spending \$19,000.
- In 2021, the Marketing Committee led a refresh of The Villages website and launched the resident-only site (now called the Member Portal) to modernize our digital presence, spending \$11,000.

This current effort is a natural continuation of that work. It is not about renaming the community or introducing flashy marketing. Instead, it is about refining how we communicate the unique value of The Villages to new and prospective residents, as well as to ourselves.

### According to the National Association of Realtors, a group that lobbied for Real Estate Tax benefits from the recent bill that passed in Congress:

- A temporary (5-year) quadrupling of the state and local tax (SALT) deduction cap, beginning in 2025
- Protection for SALT deductions and 1031 like-kind exchanges
- A permanent extension of the mortgage interest deduction.
- Permanent improvements to the Low-income Housing Tax Credit to support affordable housing
- An increased Child Tax Credit of \$2,200, indexed to inflation, helping ease housing costs for families
- A permanent \$15 million estate and gift tax threshold, protecting generational wealth transfer.

These are just some of the real estate benefits that the National Association of Realtors lobbied for. Many of these laws benefit homeowners in the Bay Area due to our higher median price range.

I wanted to share the positive parts of the bill recently passed in Congress that will most likely impact Bay Area homeowners in the next 5+ years. I hope this is some positive news for you and your families.

### Bulky Bin service returns in July

Great news - Bulky Bin service is returning! Green Team is providing three dumpsters at the lower driving range parking lot (location change) for disposal of bulk items on Tuesday to Thursday July 22, 23 and 24. The bins are available from the time they are delivered on Tuesday, July 22 (between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.) until they are picked up on Thursday, July 24 (between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.)

#### **Important Reminders:**

No dumping of items outside the bins—all items must be placed inside the bin and pushed towards the back. Improper disposal leads to additional staff labor for refuse cleaning and hazardous waste removal.

Restricted items-The following items are not allowed for disposal at these dumpsters: Concrete, dirt, tires, engine parts, oil, televisions, refrigerators, freezers, washing machines, dryers and other appliances.

Medical waste or hazardous materials such as paint, antifreeze, motor oil, and pesticides.

E-waste (examples include computers, monitors, chargers, keyboards, printers, laptops, and electrical components). No garbage in bulky bins—Garbage is strictly prohibited in

the bulky bins. Contaminated boxes will not be removed from the premises until all garbage is removed.

# SRS: Answers to the Social Security quiz

An online poll about Social Security retirement benefits commissioned by MassMutual was conducted in 2024, among 1,500 Americans nearing retirement (age 55-65) who had not yet filed for SS retirement benefits.

There were 13 True/False questions. Five or more incorrect answers was considered a failure. More than 60% of the participants failed. We published the questions in the July 3rd edition of The Villager and challenged you to take the test. Below is the original quiz with the correct answers. How did you do?

- 1. In most cases, if I take benefits before my full retirement age, they will be reduced for early filing. (TRUE)
- 2. If I am receiving benefits before my full retirement age and continue to work, my benefits might be reduced based on how much I make. (TRUE)
- 3. If I have a spouse, he or she can receive benefits from my record even if he or she has no individual earnings history. (TRUE) 4. If I have a spouse and he or she passes away, I will receive both my full benefit and my
- deceased spouse's full benefit. (FALSE) 5. Generally, if I am in a same-sex marriage, there are different eligibility requirements when it
- comes to SS retirement benefits. (FALSE) 6. The money that comes out of my paycheck for SS goes into a specific account for me and
- remains there, earning interest, until I begin to receive benefits. (FALSE) 7. If I get divorced, I might be able to collect SS benefits based on my ex-spouse's SS
- earnings history. (TRUE) 8. Under current law, SS benefits could be reduced by 20% or more for everyone by 2035.
- 9. Under current SS law, full retirement age is 65 no matter when you were born. (FALSE)
- 10. If I file for retirement benefits and have dependent children age 18 or younger, they also may qualify for SS benefits. (TRUE)
- 11. If I delay taking SS benefits past the age of 70, I will continue to get delayed retirement credit increases each year I wait. (FALSE)
- 12. SS retirement benefits are subject to income tax just like withdrawals from a traditional IRA account. (FALSE)
- 13. I must be a U.S. citizen to collect SS retirement benefits. (FALSE)

\*Footnote: The Social Security trust fund is actually projected to run out in 2035, which could lead to a 17% reduction in benefits.

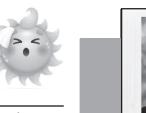

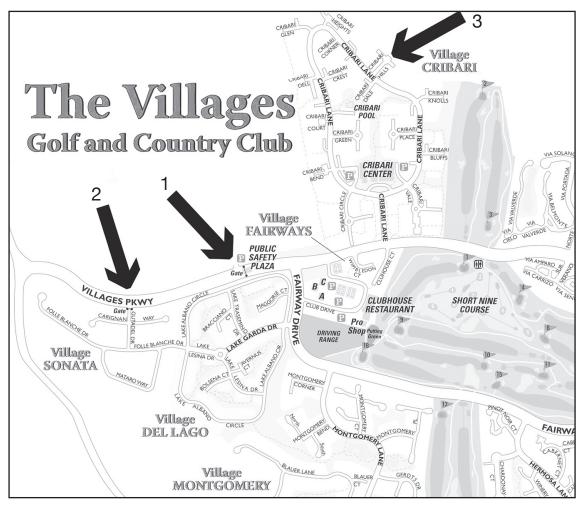

- 1. The main entrance and exit, which is Public Safety Plaza and front gate.
- 2. Sonata Gate—This gate is located on Gutadel Drive in Sonata. When driving towards the entry Plaza, on The Villages Parkway from outside The Villages, it is on your right.
- 3. Villa Vista Gate—This gate is located on Cribari Hills. The road is a one-lane road, which exits on to Yerba Buena near Evergreen Valley College.

As part of our 2025–2028 Strategic Plan, we are working with two firms:

- The McMahon Group, who is leading our resident survey and strategic planning process.
- · Sussner Design, who helps us build a consistent brand identity that reflects who we are and where we are going.

The Villages is not "rebranding" for the sake of change—we are aligning the way we present ourselves with the values, experiences and aspirations that define The Villages. This includes visual and verbal elements, such as how we describe our amenities, our lifestyle and our future vision.

Q5. Sidelining or ignoring the petition yesterday! Is this a legitimate/legal action on part of the Board? Transparency? Where is it?

A5. We understand the concern and appreciate the opportunity to clarify the Board's actions regarding the petition submitted May 5, 2025, calling for a member vote on proposed changes to Club Policy CPo 305.

After careful legal and procedural review, the following was determined:

• The Club bylaws do not allow members to call a vote on Board-adopted policies. Section 4.11.2 of the Club bylaws strictly limits member votes to specific actions, such as elections of directors, bylaw amendments and major capital projects. The investment policy is not one of those items.

· While Section 4.2 permits members to ask for a Special Meeting, the petition did not do this. Instead, it assumed a right to vote that the bylaws do not grant.

Despite this, the Club Board did not sideline the petition. Instead, the Board took additional steps to ensure transparency and public engagement:

- 1. A public study session was held June 17, 2025, in full compliance with CPo 113. This session included a presentation from the Club's chief financial officer and our investment adviser CS Capital, as well as an open Member Forum period where all signatories and interested members were encouraged to speak.
- 2. The Club Board voluntarily delayed implementation of the revised CPo 305 policy, even after it was formally approved, to make sure the petitioners and general membership had a full opportunity to review and engage.
- 3. The Club Board also formally responded to the May 19, 2025, follow-up letter signed by five petitioners. That response included an offer to meet directly with up to five of the signatories to discuss concerns in more detail. That meeting offer was not accepted or scheduled by the signatories.

To be clear: the petition was not ignored or dismissed. The Club Board exceeded its legal obligations by creating opportunities for direct input, dialogue and education on the policy.

### Context on CPo 305:

CPo 305 does not allow speculative stock investing. It permits the Club to assign up to 30% (previously 0%) into diversified, conservative vehicles like exchange-traded funds (ETFs), certificate of deposits (CDs) and U.S. Treasury securities (Treasurys)— tools designed to protect purchasing power.

· Had a responsible investment approach been implemented 10-15 years ago, even conservatively, the Club could have generated millions in compounded gains, reducing pressure on dues and strengthening long-term financial sustainability.

This policy is not about trying to "time the market." It is about prudent planning, rooted in the long-term interests of current and future members, much like the parable:

"An old man plants a tree, knowing he will never sit in its shade, but others will."

**Q6.** How do we move meetings to later in the evening 6, 7, 7:30 p.m.? For people who work (still).

A6. This is an important point, and it was also raised during the focus groups in early May. We have heard your feedback and have begun making changes. For example:

• This Budget Town Hall was scheduled at 5 p.m., specifically to make it more accessible to working Villagers.

 Both the Club and Association Boards have discussed this topic publicly and have committed to holding quarterly evening meetings to improve accessibility.

# 'Is Lazarus Out Shopping?'—Martha & Mary Revisited

On the July cover of "Give Us This Day," artist He Qi whimsically captures Martha's squinty-eyed, tight-lipped grumbling while hosting a dinner party for Jesus. Gripping a basket, Martha looks ready to smash her sister's head with the woven fibers. In contrast, her sister Mary sits in peace at the feet of Jesus. In case one misses the point, Qi adds a lotus flower on hearth above Mary's head. I laughed aloud seeing the cover. I recognized myself in Martha's "fussin' and fumin'", as my Mom used to say.

In another turn of fancy, Trappist monk Thomas Keating in his book "The Better Part: Stages of Contemplative Living" imagines the familiar Gospel story as a "household of persons in various stages of the spiritual life." No fussing or fuming, simply human beings seeking spiritual meaning amidst life's grit and glory. How do Martha, Mary, and Lazarus illustrate the three stages of the spiritual life?

Martha lives in the first stage of the spiritual journey, the Purgative Way. Keating wrote, "The Purgative Way consists of becoming aware how our unconscious needs affect ordinary daily life, including our service to God. It is unsettling for us to realize that mixed in with our good intentions are these infantile attitudes" to seek security, affection, and control. Simply put, Martha needs to let go of her attachment to results.

Mary is entering the Illuminative Way. Keating wrote, "In this state words and reasoning give way to intuition and the direct transmission of Jesus' Divine presence...Mary's love moves her faith to a deeper level of listening, and its fruit of interior freedom." Rather than results, Mary centers on the Divine Indwelling.

Where is Lazarus? Keating playfully suggests anxious Martha sent him shopping! In a more somber tone, Keating speaks of the mysterious silence regarding Lazarus. In Scripture less is often more. Is Lazurus ill? Disabled? Emotionally or mentally distressed? Keating suggests that later Lazarus in the tomb experienced willing surrender to the unknown. By letting go, Lazarus "is a paradigm of Christian transformation," the Unitive Stage of our spiritual life. With God's grace, we experience union with God.

Purgative, Illuminative, Unitive are not linear stages; we flit among them. Imagine where you generally land as you reflect on Mary, Martha, and the missing Lazurus. Fussin' and fumin'? Centered? Letting go and letting God?

# Etiquette Rules Review

While the weather heated up, the events on the course also increased the workload of the Pro Shop. This past week was a "no sweeps" day to allow Scott and the other members of our staff prepare for the Men's Evergreen Invitational.

I thought this might be a good time to review some golf etiquette rules, realizing that these steps make golf more enjoyable for everyone. (This is the first part of the etiquette rules. More rules will be included in a future Villager edition.)

#### **Preparing to Play**

It is important to follow proper golf etiquette when warming up on the putting green. Warming up should not be done with a bucket of range balls, but players should not use more than three of their own balls as this can confuse other players and disrupt their practice. Mark your ball before putting it on the ground—this way, it is easier to identify which ball belongs to which player.

Furthermore, golfers should be mindful of their surroundings when warming up and not putt or leave their balls in the way of other players. It may seem like a little thing, but an errant putt can cause serious consequences for the golfer executing the shot and any other players on the green. So, before you take your practice shot, ensure no one else is nearby, and you are not interfering with their practice.

Remember golf has always been a game of honor we all need to record a correct score on every hole including penalties, whiffs, etc. We all sometimes forget a shot and should never take offense if our playing competitors help us remember. Think of it as losing your sunglasses and someone reminding you, they are on your head. Life is sometimes very confusing.

- Play ready golf: When it is not your turn, make sure to do everything you can to be ready to play immediately when it is your turn. Find your ball. Identify the yardage. Pick a club. Eye up the shot. Take practice cuts.
- Limit mobile phone use: Keep your phone on silent or vibrate, taking only important/emergency calls. Limit how often you look at your phone for other purposes, including emails and other messages.
- Do not hit into groups in front of you: Yes, we are trying to keep up and keep moving, but do not do so at a pace that could injure or anger groups in front of you.
- Replace your divots: When you take a divot with your swing, particularly in the fairway, make sure to put that turf back into the ground after your shot and give it a good stomp to keep it in place. If you cannot replace the turf, make sure to put in some of the pre-mixed seeds that facilities will give you for your cart or bag.
- Rake the bunkers: When you have to hit out of the sand (sometimes multiple times in a row), make sure to clean up the bunker for the next person by using the rake to smooth out your divot and footprints, including your path to you shot in the bunker.
- Walking into the bunker: Try your best to take the shortest path to the ball in the bunker, making sure you do not walk down or up any steep bunker walls or slopes which will have to be rebuilt or raked and waste time. Take the rake in with you if it means a long walk back out to get it.

The next few months have several fun events planned, and the most important one is a Rules Seminar led by Susie Q Conklin. It will be held on **July 15 at 6 p.m.** at hole 9. We will cover many of the issues that arise while playing the 9th hole. Knowledge of the rules is helpful and often beneficial in posting your correct score on the course. Come out and join the fun and indulge in a beverage after discussing your newfound knowledge.

Remember our Whacky Wednesdays are fun evening events on August 6 and October 8 so mark your calendars.

**Let's All Get Together Now**—Be a part of our "Culture of Care" and follow these simple Golf Course Etiquette Guidelines...

We can all participate in keeping our golf course beautiful by observing these **NINE simple** acts of care:

- 1. Follow the 90-degree rule (longer hitters) or the Entrance Gates (shorter hitters) when entering the fairway
- 2. Drive the cart from shot to shot keeping the cart in the fairway as you play the hole... please avoid driving in the rough as much as possible to maintain the integrity of the rough
- 3. Do not drive within 30-feet of the greens defined by the yellow painted ground lines in front of each green
- 4. EXIT every hole through the EXIT GATES please do not drive on the mounding around the greens and proceed

from hole to hole using the cart paths

- 5. Respect any roping, cart directional signs and Ground Under Repair
- 6. Fill all divots with sand mix
- 7. Repair pitch marks on the greens
- 8. Smooth out the sand in the bunkers with the bunker rake and return the rake at a right angle to bunker edge placing the head of the rake in the sand and the handle of the rake on the bunker edge. Do your best to push the rake instead of pulling the rake ...we don't want the new sand to build up on the edges of the bunkers.
  - 9. Knock the sand off your shoes before walking on the green

Let's all make it a goal to leave our golf course in better shape than we found it, every time we play.

### Tips from the Pro-Uphill Battle

Playing uphill lies out of the greenside bunkers can be a challenge. With the awkward lie, stance and being in the sand, it can make for a difficult situation and hitting it thin and fat can be the result.

Follow these SIX tips and see if your uphill bunker shot results improve.

- 1. Position the ball back towards the middle of your stance
- 2. Tilt your right shoulder down so that your shoulders are parallel to the uphill slope (left shoulder for left-handed golfers)
  - 3. Assume a nice wide stance so that you keep your balance.
  - 4. Your weight will be back, more on your rear foot.
- 5. Throw the clubhead through impact, meaning let the clubhead pass your hands. You want to feel like the shaft is leaning back at impact. Forward shaft lean is *not* good for this particular shot. This is the hardest thing to accomplish as in most shots we are seeking forward shaft lean.
- 6. Don't worry about a long follow through as with the uphill lie the follow through will naturally be abbreviated.

# The Roots of Evergreen series

The Roots of Evergreen installments will be published in *The Villager* the third week of every month and collected in *The Villager Online* under a new History heading.

This month's installment is about the establishment and early years of The Villages.

# The early years of The Villages

In 1967 the concept of an active adult community was pretty much a new wrinkle. The Atkinson-Makay company, the developer of this new community called The Villages, was taking a chance that this "new wrinkle" would work in the rapidly expanding South Bay metro area years before the hi-tech revolution that established Silicon Valley. As early as the 1950s, the city of San Jose had big plans for expansion as it was pursuing a policy of "leap-frog development," rapidly expanding the city limits by including large tracts of agricultural land between the central city and distant developments—Eastridge Shopping Center being a prime example.

Originally The Villages was open to adults over age 45. Children older than 16 and out of high school could live with their parents. That rule changed in the 1980s when the minimum age requirement changed to 55.

The original village was Cribari with its large, new community center that included a large auditorium, administrative offices, a restaurant (now the Terrace Room) and multi-purpose rooms. There was even a pharmacy, medical offices and a bank branch in a temporary structure at the center.

The golf course officially opened in March of 1968 and the build-out was on! Home construction lasted well into the 1990s, as the single-family homes in Village Valle Vista were finally completed and sold.

A long-time employee, Theresa Jepson, was there in Cribari Center when the power and the telephones went live. She served as administrative assistant to several Villages general managers and pretty much knew just about every rule and minute detail about The Villages. Jepson searched her files and compiled the following article for publication in *The Villager* (which began publishing in a newsletter format in September of 1968) in commemoration of the 40th Anniversary of The Villages.

### **History of the Villages Management Corporation**

(Published in The Villager August 2, 2007)

### By Theresa Jepson

On August 21, 1967 the Villages Management Corporation moved from its temporary offices at 830 Menlo Avenue, Menlo Park, California, to its new offices at 5000 Cribari Lane in Cribari Village Center at The Villages.

Employees of the corporation were Robert A. Nelson, President; James D. Graham, Controller; Robert S. Condie, M.D., director of the medical center; Virginia Shore, nurse; and Theresa Jepson, secretary. Business was conducted without telephones or electricity. On August 25, 1967 the employees of the Villages Management Corporation and Atkinson-Makay gathered in the management offices to wish the success of The Villages.

On September 6, 1967 Curt Roebken began as Move-in Coordinator, becoming the sixth employee of the Villages Management Corporation.

On September 12, 1967 the electricity was turned on for the first time.

On September 21, 1967 the Villages Management Corporation was notified that, effective October 11, 1967, it would be responsible for the maintenance of the following areas:

Village Center (Cribari Center): a. Parking Areas, b. Areas adjacent to Bank of America Building (located at Cribari Center), c. Front of Building 7, d. Strip adjacent to curb from Building 7 to sidewalk on left entry

Model Complex: a. Back of Model 3, b. Between the carport and Model 2, c. Sod on curb line west side of Model 1

On Saturday and Sunday, September 23 and 24, 1967 the preview opening of The Villages was held. The number of visitors was 75 on Saturday and 1,150 on Sunday.

On September 16, 1967 telephone service began.

The first resident moved to The Villages on October 9, 1967. She was Lillian Ryan, 5520 Cribari Circle, B Unit, Building 160, Sequence 4. The first resident activity was held on October 27, 1967. A Halloween dinner/dance was held in the Community Hall for residents and their guests. Music was furnished by Ernie Heckscher and his orchestra.

The first "Fiesta Day" was held Thursday, November 9, 1967 at noon in the Ladies Lounge. There were eight residents present. After lunch, bingo was played. Mr. and Mrs. Gus Weinhauf won a steam iron. Mrs. Lillian Ryan won a bottle of champagne.

The first cultural activity at The Villages was held Friday, December 1, 1967 in the Community Hall. The Valley of Hearts Delight Recorder Consort, with Musical Director Jack C. Russell, presented a musical concert. Approximately 270 people attended. Cookies, punch and coffee were served to guests after the performance.

The first official professional resident activity of the Villages Medical Center was on November 12, 1967. Dr. Robert S. Condie made a house call to Charles G. Bennett at 5519 Cribari Circle.

The first formal consultation by appointment in the Villages Medical Center was on December 5, 1967 for Norma Harthun at 5549 Cribari Circle. The Terrace Room had a preview opening on Tuesday, January 2, 1968 for the personnel of The Villages. There were four customers for lunch. A total of \$7.16 was collected. The Terrace Room officially opened on Wednesday, January 3, 1968, at 11 a.m., with the hours of 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. There were 16 customers. A total of \$13.59 was collected.

The Villages golf course opened officially for residents and their guests on March 29, 1968, at 10 a.m. Mr. Jack C. Mackay hit the first ball—a golden ball. The first foursome was Mr. and Mrs. Gustav R. Weinkauf (Elsa), Mabel P. DuBois, and Paul J. Todsen. The Villages Pharmacy filled its first prescription March 28, 1968. Prescription #1,000 was made out to Mrs. George Greenwood, and was filled and delivered on March 28, 1968.

The Villages swimming pool opened Monday, September 16, 1968. The Vice President of the Villages Board of Directors, Charles W. Williams, officially opened the pool.

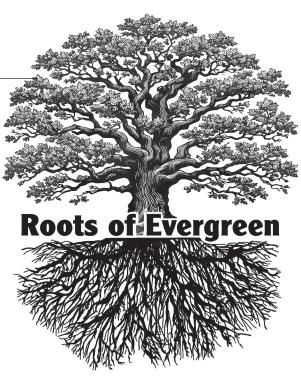
The Villages first church services were held Sunday, September 22, 1968 in the Villages auditorium. Rev. E.V. Steele, a former missionary and resident of The Villages, conducted the non-denominational Protestant service.

The first edition of The Villages newspaper, "The Weekly Villager," was published on September 6, 1968.

On August 24, 1968, the Terrace Room was open on Saturdays from 1 to 6 p.m. for residents and guests. New York steak sandwiches and hamburgers were featured.

The restaurant was open on Sunday, August 25, 1968. Dinner was served from 4 to 7 p.m.

(Theresa Jepson served as the secretary—executive assistant—to several Villages general managers and retired several years ago.)

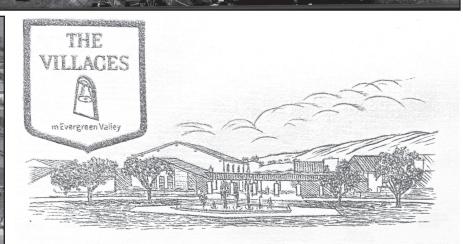
