KCFM recently won two 2025 Best of the Best Awards from the Association of Community Publishers (ACP). Out of over 880 entries from 30 publishing members, representing 145 titles, KCFM received 1st place for the Andrew E. Shapiro Cancer **Foundation Cancer Awareness** Award and 2nd place for Best Front Page, Color, Glossy Cover. The judging was performed by students and faculty of Columbia State College in Columbia, Tennessee, using a combination of in-person and virtual judging, both in a group setting and individually.

"Any publication recognized in the ACP Best of the Best contest should be incredibly proud of their achievement," says ACP executive director Cassey Recore. "They are competing against the most talented writers, designers, and some of the most compelling special sections, covers, core publications, and from our entire membership and across the country. Earning that distinction is no small feat."

After nearly four years of meticulous restoration, the beloved Woolworth's lunch counter at 19th and K streets will make its triumphant return with a soft opening later this month and its grand opening celebration in October. Primary owners Emily and Sherod Waite have gone to extraordinary lengths to preserve the historic lunch counter in its original form, calling the project "our love letter to Bakersfield."

The iconic 75-year-old luncheonette, which has served countless burgers and milkshakes since 1950, will reopen alongside expanded dining options, including an additional bar, outdoor seating, and a basement music venue.

The Waites have followed the National Park's historic roadmap for every part of the renovation, ensuring preservation for this downtown landmark.

"We'll still be flipping burgers just a couple of feet away from customers," says Emily Waite. "From day one, making that happen has been important to us."

A soft opening is planned for late summer, with the grand opening celebration set for October 25th from 3-7 pm, featuring a block party and ribbon cutting ceremony.



Immunization isn't just for kids or teens -

Early Vision Screenings Matter for Kids



There is no definitive age when a child may need to get eyeglasses. However, the American Association for Pediatric Ophthalmology and Strabismus notes that children's visual systems are still developing during the first 12 years of their life, and during this period wearing

glasses can be important for normal vision development. Glasses can help straighten crossed or misaligned eyes, bolster weak vision caused by differences in vision between a child's eyes, and even protect the stronger eye.

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends children begin vision screening around age 3 and receive annual screenings each year at ages 4, 5 and 6. After that, screening is recommended when children turn 8, 10, 12, and 15. Of course, parents who begin to suspect their children are having trouble with their vision are urged to take the child to an ophthalmologist once such suspicions arise.

Some notable signs include inexplicable declines in academic performance, children sitting closer to the television than they once did and children's own remarks regarding their vision if they say anything at all.



Good News for Pasta Lovers

Opting for a cup of pasta instead of a cup of white rice, potatoes, or white bread can help you lose weight, suggests a study in the Journal of the American Nutrition Association. Those who made that trade dropped more than those who stuck to their usual "white carb" ways. Turns out pasta is lower on the glycemic index (GI), which means it doesn't raise your blood sugar as much. That's key since eating lower GI foods has been shown to speed fat burning.





HELLO, HAPPY INVENTIVE MAMA

From handmade earrings to soap with flair, this inventive mama, **Alex Lopez**, shapes Kern's creative scene.

uthenticity is the underpinning of the life and work of Alex Lopez.

An artist and entrepreneur, she is the Arts Council of Kern's Makers Market coordinator, a new initiative designed to showcase local artists and artisans.

Born and raised in Bakersfield, Alex and her husband, Angel, are the parents of Emiliano, 9, and Esteban, 5.

"They are rambunctious boys, very funny and the best part of me," said Alex, who has found balance with motherhood and her job.

Alex began making jewelry during the pandemic, which served as a creative outlet during that uncertain time.

"I experienced postpartum depression after having a baby in January 2020, as restrictions began in March. With everything going on in the world, I felt sad and scared," she explained. "I started making earrings and bows, just for friends and family. In May, I soft launched "Cowgirly Creations" and started going to pop-ups in 2021."

Alex was making jewelry at her booth in the space that would become the Arts Council of Kern, formerly The Brickyard, 1020 18th St., when Executive Director Jeanette Richardson came to tour and invited her to interview.

"The job really came to me," said Alex, who was already familiar with many local vendors from her attendance at other events and being part of the Kern County creator community.

"Our goal is to provide a space for makers, to support artists and artisans, advocate, educate and give access to the public to all of the art we have here in Kern County," said Alex. "Featured

artists are on a three-month rotation. We have participants of all kinds, from painters to writers, candlemakers and more."

Alex is also a Makers Market participant, so she knows firsthand how important sales opportunities and local support are.

"I am close to both sides of the family. They are all extremely supportive and always wearing my jewelry and reposting photos of my jewelry," said Alex, who can be found on Instagram @CowgirlyCreations.

When it comes to balancing work and family, Alex suggests all parents give themselves some grace.

"Some days are more work focused,

while others are focused on family. Take it day by day. There are life events a parent really can't predict and trying to predict can bring on unneeded stress. Sometimes, you have to take it hour by hour."

THREE QUESTIONS WITH ALEX LOPEZ

Q. What advice do you have for women going through tough phases of motherhood?

You are not alone. Any person who has been a mother has been through that phase of life, which can feel endless. Take real time for yourself. Tasks like running errands alone or cleaning the house in silence might feel like a break

Tips to Ensure a Successful Start to School for Parents and Kids

STARTING SCHOOL FOR THE FIRST TIME can be anxiety-provoking (for both kids and parents)—but it doesn't have to be. We talked to the pros to find out how parents can set their kids up for a successful start to preschool or kindergarten.

Make Learning Fun

As parents, we are our children's first teachers. Although this might seem like a lot of pressure, it's also an amazing opportu-

nity to present learning as something that can (and should) be fun. According to Lisa Stratton, the Educational Services Manager at TLC Learning Center in Longmont, Colorado, we can do this by encouraging our kids' natural curiosity. "For example if your child asks you, 'How do bats fly in dark caves without bumping into each other?', help them find the answer online or at the library." By encouraging your kids to go where their interests take them, says Stratton, "You will be teaching them that learning is fun without them realizing [it]."

Be Informed

As all parents know, kids are masters at picking up on their parents' emotions; if

we're anxious, they'll know it, and they may feel it, too. Parents can allay some anxiety by educating themselves. Shela Blankenship, the Early Childhood Coordinator at St. Vrain Valley Schools in Colorado, encourages parents to visit the school's website to learn about program information, hours, and dropoff and pick-up expectations. She also says parents can schedule a meeting with the teacher during Parent Orientation to forge a relationship with the teacher from the start. Blankenship emphasizes, "The more parents know in advance, the more comfortable everyone will feel on the first day."

Encourage Independence at Home

Parents can support the learning process by fostering our kids' independence with daily tasks. When kids can handle some of these basics, teachers have more time to focus on helping them develop academic and social skills. Stratton suggests teaching kids practical skills, like tying shoes, buttoning and unbuttoning clothing, and getting their own drink of water. "These day-to-day life skills and learning how to get along with others are more important at this stage than knowing how to write their ABC's."


Talk to Your Child


Shari Karmen, Therapeutic Services Manager at TLC, recommends parents let their kids know what to expect before

school starts. "Let them know they will be making new friends, playing with different toys, having new snacks." She suggests parents tell their kids what a typical day might look like or even visit the school in advance. "Telling children several times helps them to learn that a change and new routine will be happening. Include who will be picking them up from school so they know that they will see you again." Above all, she reminds parents: "Keep the 'story' positive and fun!"



Feelin' Peachy Keen: Sweet Shortbread Squares

OUR PEACHY KEEN SHORTBREAD SQUARES is the dessert your family didn't know they were craving—until now. Fresh-picked flavor meets buttery bliss in this easy recipe made for sticky fingers and sunset snacks.



California Cling Peach & Raspberry Shortbread Squares

Makes 20 to 25 squares

INGREDIENTS

For the Crust and Topping:

3 cups of all-purpose flour

1 cup sugar

1 tsp baking powder

½ tsp salt

2 sticks of chilled butter, cut up

1/3 cup pecans, chopped

For the Filling:

2 (15 oz) cans California Cling

Peaches, any cut, strained and diced (reserve juice)

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup peach juice (strained from the cans)

½ cup sugar

2 Tbsp cornstarch

1/4 tsp salt

½ cup raspberry jam

INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line a 13 x 9 x 2 inch pan with parchment paper.

For the Crust:

In a large bowl, mix together the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Cut in the butter using a mixer or pastry blender until it resembles large crumbs.

Reserve 1 cup of the flour mixture for the topping. Add the pecans to the topping mixture. Set aside.

Press the remaining flour mixture into the bottom of the prepared pan.

Bake for 12-15 minutes, until lightly browned.

For the Filling:

Drain the peaches, reserving ½ cup of the juice.

In a medium size saucepan, combine the peaches, the juice, sugar, cornstarch and salt.

Simmer over medium heat until the mixture thickens and the cornstarch is dissolved, about 8-10 minutes.

Pour the peach mixture evenly over the shortbread crust.

Spoon jam over peach mixture in little dollops.

Sprinkle with the crumb pecan topping mixture.

Bake for 20-25 minutes. The filling should be bubbling around the edges, and the crumb topping should be browning.

Cool slightly before cutting into squares. Store in the refrigerator for up to 5 days.
