Investor purchases hundreds of acres in **Evergreen Valley**

Parcel of land could become part of large housing development

n investment group bought a large parcel of land in Evergreen Valley that may be joined with a property designated for a several hundred-unit housing project.

The business entity located in Orange County purchased 355.7 acres of land for \$5.5 million near the corner of Quimby Road and Mount Hamilton Road according to documents filed on July 15 with the Santa Clara County Recorder's

Plans are being proposed on 517.3 acres that include 320.8 acres of the property featuring 500 residential units of which 400 would be single-family homes and 100 would be accessory dwelling units, according to the county.

In addition to the potential of hundreds of residences, the developer is eyeing several other improvements on the 517 acres, county planning files show.



Salene Duarte is new head of Santa Clara County Fair who has deep roots in local agriculture

he Santa Clara County Fairgrounds
Management Corporation (SCCFMC)
recently appointed Salene Duarte as
its new Executive Director.

Duarte, a lifelong enthusiast of the Fair-grounds previously serving as the Santa Clara County Fair Manager until June 2024. She was then appointed Co-Interim Director alongside Armando Carlos. Her permanent role as Executive Director officially began this past June.

"Salene's deep-rooted passion for the Fair-grounds is evident through her history as a dedicated 4-H member, an active participant in Future Farmers of America, and a committed leader and volunteer. She brings a wealth of experience, a clear vision for the future, and an open mind ready to embrace new ideas," said SCCFMC Board Chair Vicky Bosworth. "We are confident that Salene will be an invaluable asset to our organization, and we look forward to the innovative direction she will lead us in."

Born and raised in Campbell, Duarte's agricultural roots run deep, stretching all the way back to the early 1800s when her ancestors immigrated from Switzerland and settled as dairymen near Mt. Shasta.

Duarte's mother's family owned and oper-

ated a trucking business in Campbell, hauling fruits, nuts, and vegetables throughout what was then known as the Valley of Heart's Delight. She joined the 4-H club as a young girl, showing her first sheep at just nine years old. As a high school member of the Future Farmers of America, she won her first Grand Champion title with her steer, Shiloh. Today, she and her husband, a high school agriculture teacher, run a 100-acre cattle operation in the East Foothills of San Jose, focusing on raising and selling high-quality show calves to local youth for county fairgrounds competitions.

Over the years, as a Fairgrounds volunteer and consultant, Duarte held many roles in Fairgrounds operations, including reviewing and formatting entry books, overseeing barn layouts, managing livestock operations, organizing Home Arts exhibits, and coordinating awards and judging.

Duarte was appointed Fair Manager in 2021, where she worked to revitalize the Fairgrounds by introducing youth and open livestock shows, reactivating underutilized spaces, and leading the return of a 10-day County Fair in 2023—the first in over 20 years. Under her leadership, the Fairgrounds expanded its agriculture education programming to include livestock exhibits, com-

petitive displays, historical presentations, and the establishment of the Junior Livestock Auction Buyers Coalition, further strengthening community engagement and participation. In addition to her role as Fairgrounds Executive Director, Duarte is also the current Vice President of the Santa Clara County Cattlewomen and works closely with the City of San Jose to ensure local youth have access to animal housing at Emma Prusch Park.

When asked what she loves most about the Fairgrounds, Duarte's response is simple: "The smile on people's faces as they enjoy the magic of this place. "As Executive Director, "My vision is to create a place where others can build lasting memories like I did. I remember the nerves and excitement of showing my first lamb and the pride I felt when my steer won champion honors—a moment I'll never forget. That's what I want to offer: a welcoming home for our community, a hub where everyone can celebrate what matters to them—through festivals, expos, sports, and more—in a way that's meaningful and memorable."

The Santa Clara County Fair is slated for July 30-Aug. 3 at the fairgrounds located at 344 Tully Road in San Jose.

San Jose highway could be named to honor Vietnamese community

bipartisan effort to honor San Jose's Vietnamese American community at the state level has passed a key milestone

The state Assembly has unanimously approved a bill authored by Assemblymember Ash Kalra to rename a stretch of Highway 101 in San Jose between the Story Road exit and Interstate 280/680 junction "Little Saigon Freeway." Supporters say renaming this portion of Highway 101, which is just shy of half a mile, is an important way to recognize the history and contributions of Vietnamese Americans. San Jose has the largest Vietnamese American population of any city outside Vietnam.

Kalra said this part of Highway 101 leads into the Little Saigon neighborhood, so renaming it will continue paying homage to the community.

"It gives an opportunity for folks that are coming to visit Little Saigon or those just passing through San Jose to understand the importance of the Vietnamese community to our city," Kalra told San José Spotlight.

The bill, known as Assembly Concurrent

Resolution 71, still has to pass the state Senate. Kalra said local state Sen. Dave Cortese will carry it through. Kalra doesn't expect the bill to run into any issues on its way to Gov. Gavin Newsom's desk by mid-September.

Costs aren't outlined in the bill, though it directs the California Department of Transportation to calculate the total cost for the signage. The bill suggests funding will come from "nonstate sources."

Santa Clara County District 2 Supervisor Betty Duong is the first Vietnamese American to serve on the Board of Supervisors. She said Kalra's bill recognizes the importance of Little Saigon not only for the Vietnamese American community, but all of East San Jose's immigrant communities.

"It's very special to anybody who identi-

fies with the Vietnamese diaspora, with the refugee community and with the San Jose community, that not only have we created new roots and a new homeland out of San Jose and Santa Clara County, but also that the community has accepted us as well," Duong said.

San Jose District 7 Councilmember Bien Doan, whose district includes Little Saigon, sent a letter of support for the bill during discussion on the Assembly floor. He highlighted multiple other efforts to recognize Vietnamese American heritage, including the push for a South Vietnam flag emoji.

"Little Saigon in San Jose is not only a local landmark, it is a cultural and social hub for Vietnamese Americans across the country and around the world," Doan said in the letter. "We are proud of what we have built." Philip Nguyen, executive director of the Vietnamese American Roundtable, said the organization supports the proposal, as there's a sense of cultural pride in creating this kind of landmark. He added it would be significant to rename the stretch of highway this year, which marks the 50th anniversary of the fall of Saigon, also known as "Black April."

Nguyen said it's commendable that the bill has received support from Vietnamese American communities across the state. The bill's primary coauthor is Assemblymember Tri Ta, who represents parts of Orange County — another enclave for Vietnamese Americans that includes the Little Saigon in Westminster. Other coauthors include Assemblymembers Stephanie Nguyen, who represents Elk Grove, and Patrick Ahrens, who represents Sunnyvale.

"I feel this is a step into that direction of recognizing the social, economic and political impact of the Vietnamese American community for the 50 years after the war," Nguyen said. "There's this almost unifying factor. ... It demonstrates a more positive direction." Nguyen is worried the recognition could bring unwanted attention, as Little Saigon faces multiple immigration raids. Despite his concerns, he said it serves more to commemorate the community's history and impact on the city rather than marking the neighborhoods negatively.

"If anything, it feels like it's time," Nguyen told San José Spotlight. "It's our turn to have this space for our community."


