Youth Around the Country Mow Lawns Free of Charge Through Innovative Nonprofit

Rodney Smith Jr. came to the U.S. from Bermuda when he was 16 years old to attend a school in upstate New York for children with learning disabilities. He later founded a nationwide initiative that encourages youth to give back to their communities through acts of kindness and service.

Raising Men Lawn Care Inc., a nonprofit founded in 2015, and Raising Men and Women Lawn Care Service, founded in 2018 to include women, promote kindness and volunteerism.

“Through it, we inspire kids and teens across the country to give back by mowing lawns for free for the elderly, disabled, single parents, and veterans. It’s about teaching responsibility, leadership, and the importance of service,” said Smith. “Raking leaves and shoveling snow is also included.”

Once a child accepts a 50 Yard Challenge by signing up on Raising Men & Women Lawn Care Service’s website, he or she receives an official t-shirt, safety glasses, and ear protection to get them started. The challenge is self-paced with no deadline.

“As they complete milestones—10, 20, 30, and 40 lawns—they earn new t-shirt colors, each representing their progress. When they reach all 50 lawns, I personally travel to meet them and present them with brand-new lawn care equipment: a mower, weed eater, and blower,” Smith added.

Youth ages 8-17 can sign up to volunteer. They must reside in the U.S. to participate. To date, over 6,000 kids have participated across all 50 states. The majority of program participants begin their volunteering journey by using family equipment. When they

complete the 50 Yard Challenge, Smith personally delivers a new lawn mower, weed eater, and blower to them as a reward and tool to keep serving others in need, free of charge.

“All services are 100% free for the elderly, disabled, single parents, and veterans. We believe in giving without expecting anything in return,” Smith confirmed.

Individuals who fit into the nonprofit’s demographic can request service through www.WeAreRaisingMen.com. Smith mentioned that referrals are also provided by various insurance companies.

“Kids from across the country sign up to volunteer and are responsible for finding lawns to mow in their own communities. When someone submits a request on our site and we have a participating child in that area, we forward the request directly to them. We operate nationwide—anywhere in the U.S. where we have kids signed up is eligible,” Smith added.

Smith, who is based in Alabama, mows lawns for free in Huntsville daily. During the summer, local children often join him. Other youth in Smith’s program mow lawns free of charge in

their own communities.

Smith is not a U.S. citizen yet, but he is working on it.

“I’m currently on an O-1A visa while I wait for my green card,” Smith explained.

He holds a master’s degree in social work, and he earned a bachelor’s degree in computer science from Alabama A&M University in 2016.

Smith continues to show youth the difference that they can make in someone’s life by showing a simple act of kindness, such as mowing a lawn for free.

“It builds compassion, discipline, and leadership,” Smith stated.

The ambitious do-gooder has authored three children’s books. They promote kindness, service, and making a difference in communities.

Jan Bush, an elderly resident of Huntsville, Alabama, stated that Smith and youth have been mowing her lawn since 2018.

“I’m no longer able to mow my lawn myself, and hiring someone regularly just isn’t in my budget. Their help has taken a big weight off my shoulders and given me peace of mind. It’s also reminded me that there are still good, caring people in the world,” she explained while expressing gratitude.

Lamar Knight, a 19-year-old college student from Alabama has been a program participant since 2017.

“Being in the program since 2017 has taught me a lot about giving back, staying committed, and helping others without expecting anything in return. It’s shown me the value of hard work and how small acts of kindness can make a big difference,” he said.

Youth who live in Maryland are encouraged to volunteer and take the 50 Yard Challenge so that local elderly; disabled; single parents; and veterans can receive support through Raising Men & Women Lawn Care Service. 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Global Positioning Systems (GPS) Primer Part 1: The Marvel of Location Tracking

Once upon a time if you lost your keys, you'd spend minutes, maybe even hours, frantically looking for them. Often, you didn't even realize they were misplaced until you were headed out the door, and there you were, frantically scrambling around your home trying to find them. Well, today that scenario might play out differently. Instead of immediately becoming frantic, you might just whip out your smartphone and ping the lost item.

Believe it or not, the technology that enables the example above has its roots in the development of Global Positioning System (GPS) technology, which began in the 1950s! Scientists at the time, who were studying the Soviet Union's Sputnik satellite in 1957 realized they could determine locations through the Doppler effect of radio signals. This ultimately led to the development and launch by the U.S. Navy in 1960, of the world's first global satellite navigation system. The first GPS tracking devices were invented around 1968 and development progressed through the 60s, 70s, and 80s when commercial GPS technology became a reality.

The technology experienced another "growth spurt" in the 2000s when the U.S. Federal Communications Commission in 2002, mandated location features in mobile phones for emergency services to locate 911 callers. In 2004, Qualcomm successfully completed tests of live assisted GPS on mobile phones, allowing cellular and GPS signals to combine for better location accuracy. By 2015, 64 percent of adult Americans owned a smartphone, up from just 35 percent in early 2011, making location tracking

widely accessible to consumers.

It's now become so ubiquitous that you can find location tracking devices and apps just about everywhere for just about everything. They're in cars, smartphones, wearables, smart home devices and stores. They take the form of trackers, apps, AirTags, and monitors. Familiar examples include Google Maps, Apple Find My, Apple Watch, Fitbit, Garmin, Tile, AirTag, OnStar, FordPass, Alexa, Google Home, RFID tags in retail, asset tracking, and more.

Thanks to this technology, we are becoming more interconnected than ever before. The way we navigate, communicate, and interact with the world around us has totally changed as it has become easier, thanks to continued development in GPS technology. For example, we are now able to support loved ones to live independently longer through elder care monitoring. We can get to places quicker with navigation systems that provide real-time route optimization and turn-by-turn directions. We can monitor our fitness and health to track our steps, routes, and exercise intensity. We can use this technology to help locate missing persons, pets, lost phones, or stolen vehicles.

As location-tracking technology has become more powerful and convenient, it's clear that we're living in a time where finding things—and even people—is easier than ever before. What was once the stuff of science

fiction is now part of our daily lives. Whether it's pinging our keys from our phone, tracking our teenager's whereabouts, or getting turn-by-turn directions to a new restaurant, location tracking has revolutionized how we move through the world. It supports safety and independence for the elderly, helps parents keep an eye on their kids, and gives peace of mind to travelers and commuters alike. Businesses benefit too, using the technology to manage deliveries, track assets, and improve customer experiences. With more devices and apps using location services, the integration of GPS, Bluetooth, cellular signals, and Wi-Fi has created an ecosystem of tools designed to help us live more efficiently and stay connected. There's no denying that location tracking has become an essential part of how we function in our homes, workplaces, and communities.

But for all of its advantages, location-tracking technology isn't without its drawbacks—and those are just as important to consider.

This partnership is grounded in shared values, spiritual conviction, cultural empowerment, and an unwavering commitment to truth, justice, and progress.

Heart Failure Survivor Raises Awareness About Organ Donation, Honors Transplant Donor

Bill Soloway had been an avid bicyclist since his teenage years until 2013. He regarded bicycling as transportation, exercise and therapy. Two years before his heart transplant, he biked in charity rides for causes such as multiple sclerosis, diabetes and cancer while raising money for them.

"I was always one of these guys who wanted to help people in need. Then, suddenly, I was diagnosed with congestive heart failure. I couldn't walk three steps without getting winded. It was just like climbing Mount Everest. I never dreamt I would ever be back on my bicycle ever again," Soloway recalled.

The heart transplant recipient had been diagnosed with a life-threatening heart arrhythmia known as ventricular tachycardia in 1996. This started his transplant journey, and Soloway's experience with heart issues was not an isolated incident. His brother died at 27 years old from a genetic heart defect, hypertrophic cardiomyopathy, an abnormal thickening of the heart muscle. Modern medicine helped Soloway in ways that it had not yet been available to his brother in the eighties.

"When I got diagnosed and a cardiologist said, 'Hey, you have the same thing that your brother died from, it was a very sobering thing,'" Soloway explained.

The Pennsylvania resident shared that in 1996, his first defibrillator (also known as an ICD) was implanted in his chest.

"So, that was really the start of my journey," said Soloway.

Soloway's condition was managed by a team of specialists. He was still able to bike and conduct life tasks.

"I also took different kinds of heart medication. Then, things got progressively worse as I got closer to my heart transplant in 2013," Soloway added.

Prescribed medications and procedures that Soloway underwent became ineffective. He was then diagnosed with congestive heart failure and would need a heart transplant.

His 10-year heart anniversary was on June 17, 2015. James E. Zimmerman, Jr., a generous heart donor, gave Soloway a second chance at life. He was in the small percentage of organ recipients who found out who donated the organ to him, and Soloway had an opportunity to meet his donor's family members. Soloway penned a letter to the donor's parents, Jim and Charlotte Zimmerman. They elected to connect with him before Charlotte passed away. However, Soloway and Jim remain in touch.

"We actually do things. Jim's a part of my family," Soloway explained. "We get together throughout the year."

Jim continues to cheer on Soloway at bike races and supports things he does as an organ donation ambassador. Soloway's advocacy work for Donate Life also spans to their organ procurement partners. Donate Life Maryland (DLM), the state-authorized nonprofit organization, is responsible for managing the Maryland Donor Registry. DLM saves and enhances lives by registering organ, eye and tissue donors in Maryland. However, Infinite Legacy, the nonprofit organ procurement organization, facilitates organ, eye and tissue donation in Maryland and the Metro DC area.

A part of James Jr. lives in Soloway—a man who honors and respects his donor's legacy. Soloway rides a high-wheel bicycle as a hobby.

"No matter where I go or what I am doing, it also comes up that I am a heart transplant recipient," he added.

Soloway, a member of The Wheelman nonprofit organization, and the state captain for Pennsylvania

and New Jersey chapters, recently rode atop his high-wheel bike in a Donate Life biker's outfit. He participated in the National Clustered Spires High-Wheel Race on July 12, 2025. Jim Zimmerman attended the race.

"I've been in this [National Clustered Spires] High-Wheel Race in Frederick, Maryland for six years now. The race organizers allowed Infinite Legacy to set up a tent in honor of my tenth-year heart transplant anniversary. I had my bike on display when I was not racing. Infinite Legacy had organ donation trivia and prizes in the tent. People could sign up to become organ donors in Maryland," Soloway stated.

According to Donate Life America, more than 100,000 people are waiting for lifesaving organ transplants. Donor Alliance reported that 59% of the adult Maryland population is registered as organ donors although around 40% are not registered.

"The name of the game is to get more people registered to become organ donors," Soloway concluded.

An All-African Women's Race Team to Compete, Further Expanding International Baltimore's Reach

BALTIMORE, MD (July 29, 2025)

— The 2025 Maryland Cycling Classic is gearing up to be one of the most exciting sports events in Baltimore's recent history. Set for Saturday, September 6, 2025, the race will not only debut a brand-new 17.9-mile circuit entirely within Baltimore City but also mark the first time men's and women's professional races will be held on the same day — a momentous occasion— made even more significant by the participation of a groundbreaking all-women's team from Africa.

Accompanied by his wife, First Lady Hana Scott, Mayor Brandon Scott announced the course at a press conference on Wednesday, July 23.

“We're excited to welcome the Maryland Cycling Classic back to our city this September. This year's event is going to be better than ever, not only because it features a new women's race, but because the entire course is officially within Baltimore City limits. It's a special opportunity for folks here in Charm City to see free, world-class racing—and folks all around the world to see our beautiful city. I hope to see everybody out there cheering this fall,” stated Mayor Scott.

Adding to the theme of diversity and inclusivity is the arrival of the all-women African team — a bold and inspiring milestone. The team, composed of elite riders from across the continent, embodies the spirit of unity, perseverance, and global sportsmanship.

“This is a significant cultural and athletic moment. To host an all-women's African cycling team on a course that is authentically Baltimore signals something far bigger than just a race. It's a symbol of inclusion, global respect,

and community celebration,” said Kireem Swinton, Interim President and CEO of Visit Baltimore.

Promoting Baltimore's Beauty, Unity, and Community

Race Director Jim Birrell emphasized that the decision to move the race fully into the city was intentional. “Baltimore is a city of great neighborhoods. We wanted to highlight Baltimore's famous and beautiful waterfront while telling the story of the city's rich history. It's blending the old and new of one of America's most diverse cities.”

“It's been a team effort working with the mayor's office, Baltimore Police, and city departments to bring this course to life,” said Terry Haseltine, President of the Sport & Entertainment Corporation of Maryland. “We believe the new route and the addition of the women's race — especially welcoming an all-women African team — will open up a whole new level of engagement and excitement.”

The inclusion of the African team also resonates deeply with Baltimore's own global identity and cultural heritage. Their participation brings international attention and a sense of pride to communities across the city and beyond.

Race Highlights: From Cobblestones to Climbs

The race opens with a bang through the 550-yard granite cobblestones of historic Fells Point — a section known to fracture race fields early. Riders will pass through the neighborhoods of Canton and Mount Vernon, glide by the 1829 Washington Monument, and charge into Patterson Park, one of America's oldest urban parks, before scaling the race's most decisive point, the climb near St. Mary's Seminary.

The final stretch down East Pratt Street—a fast, flat, 1,000-yard sprint—will bring the peloton back to the Harbor, where thousands of fans are expected to witness an electrifying finish.

Fan Engagement, Community Celebration, and People Power

The event organizers are focused not only on athletic excellence but also on community excitement. Several Fan Zones will be set up throughout the course — including Harbor Point, Thames Street, Patterson Park, Mount Vernon, and East Pratt — offering free cowbells, thunder sticks, and live big-screen coverage to pump up the crowd and support the athletes.

Another highlight of this year's event will be an expanded outreach and community celebration presented by Kaiser Permanente Mid-Atlantic. The “In the Community 2025” program will engage area schools, businesses, and civic associations to bring the fun and excitement to people and spaces commonly overlooked by events of this nature. This effort will enable opportunities for greater appreciation of the economic and social impact the race will have on Baltimore's neighborhoods and the region by offering unique on-ramps for participation.

This year, as in 2023, the Maryland Cycling Classic will be supported by hundreds of volunteers. From corporate sponsors to community groups, from teens to older adults, people power will provide the energy that takes this event over the finish line. There are dozens of roles to be filled in a wide range of activities throughout race day and the weeks leading up to August 6, 2025. Volunteers are actively being recruited to lend a hand.

Kayla Adams, a parent of a four-year-old and 11-year-old, looks forward to attending Moon's Barbershop's Back to School Backpack Giveaway on Sunday, August 3, 2025. Moon's Barbershop is a small business known for lending a hand to families and students during a free event.

"Receiving backpacks and school supplies for my children has been a huge help for my family. It ensured that my children started the school year prepared and confident," Adams stated. "Moon's Barbershop and Team Moon have been around for years. I was once a recipient myself, and I remember attending this annual event with my parents for a day of fun to help me prepare for the upcoming school year."

Adams reminisced about the community event while recalling that she noticed the smiles on children's faces who engaged in various activities.

"It's also nice to see everyone coming together as a community so that the children know they have people they can go to," she added.

Moon's Barbershop has been in business since 2002. Colleen Moon and Edward Moon are Annapolis, Maryland residents who continue to support families before school doors open. Having a village-minded mentality, the couple promotes community volunteerism and investment in school-age young people. While attending the Back to School Backpack Giveaway, youth can select necessary school supplies to get their

school year started while having a little summer fun, food and drinks. There are no residency requirements for youth to receive items.

"The only requirement to receive a backpack is that the child must be present," said Colleen.

The owners of Moon's Barbershop will return to Wiley H. Bates Boys & Girls Club, located at 121 South Villa Avenue in Annapolis on Sunday, August 3, 2025 from noon to 3:00 p.m. to lead the Back to School Backpack Giveaway in partnership with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Annapolis & Anne Arundel County and TUWA Temple 228. Four thousand young people have been served through their previous back-to-school events, according to Colleen.

The children who attend the event receive more than just bookbags. "It places the child in the presence of many volunteers with the necessary resources as we build social connections and friendships. This also increases awareness in community engagement and allows the volunteers to see what else is needed in the community. This is more than just a one-day event for Team Moon; we are in local churches, Moon's Barbershop, and the community, engaging and building community resilience."

We have been doing the Back to School event since the summer of 2009. We started hosting the Barbershop location in the parking lot, but we soon outgrew the space in a few years. We are currently partnering with the Boys & Girls Club of Annapolis & Anne Arundel County and use their big field and parking lot. This larger space has allowed us to provide more activities for the children, such as pony rides; face painting; balloon twists; and a moon bounce."

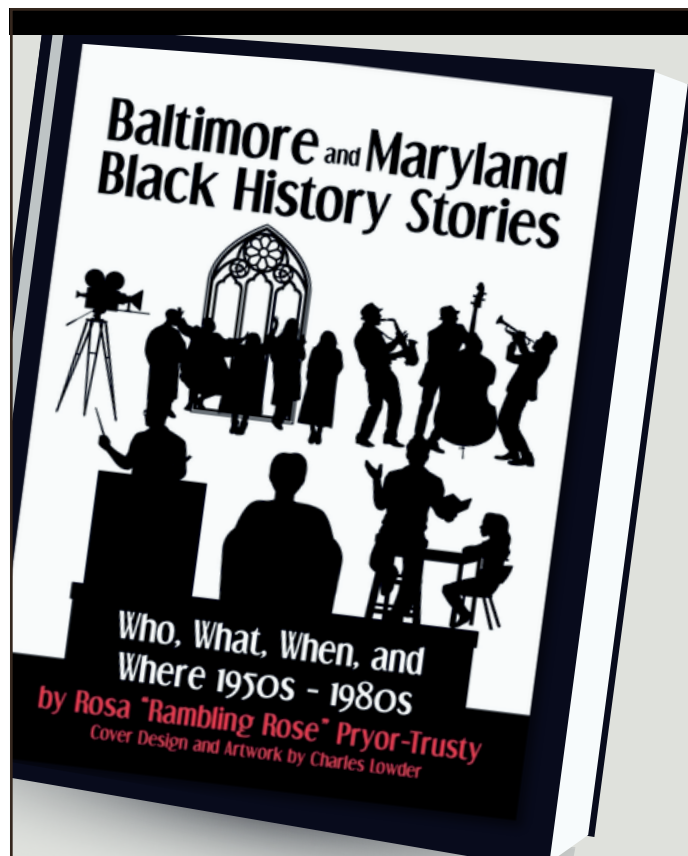

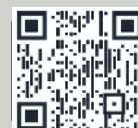
