grown bigger and bigger.

Marvin's Supply and hear the "beep beep beep" of a forklift, there's a good chance you'll find Pettie behind the wheel. It's her second gardening plot, a place where she shares her passion for all growing things with the community.

"Shopping at Marvin's was the beginning of my own gardens and led to part-time work in 2017," she said. "Having the opportunity to care for, learn about, and assist customers gives me joy and a sense of being a part of my community while seeing others get involved with and excited about improving their own properties."







Fittingly, her work at Marvin's, where she's now full time, led to a third way for Pettie to share her ever-growing horticultural savvy.

"One of those customers, Vickie Small, told me about the Stone Bridge Garden Club," Pettie recalled. "Once I attended that first meeting in 2018, I felt I could become an even greater part of service to a community I now called home."

As the landscape committee chairman for the past four seasons, Pettie oversees the club's efforts to maintain plots at the Fayetteville-Lincoln County Museum, the public library, and Stone Bridge Park's welcome center. She shared the committee's goals of providing color and beauty while working to minimize watering and maintenance, making them all more environmentally friendly.

"Pollinators, native plants, and perennials are important in reaching our goal. Each of the past seasons, the club has focused on one of the plots. The 2021 focus was on the welcome center," Pettie explained, noting that the beds in front

of the park's log house were reworked to add new soil, edging, and replanting. The library was 2022's project, and in 2023, the group took on the museum's courtyard.

She added, "The feedback from the community has been very positive."

Feedback affirms the harvest of Pettie's hard work.


"The customers at Marvin's give me such joy and pleasure as they shop for their own gardens and landscapes. To hear a customer tell me, 'My friend or a family member told me to come see you,' tells me I'm doing something right."

Today, at 77, Pettie's still cultivating tomorrow's gardens.

"My days are driven by staying busy and what I can accomplish. As for my energy, I'm staying healthy at 77 to be around as long as I can to enjoy my 21 great-grandchildren," she reflected.

Don Counts:

ONE MAN, MANY MEMORIES

Through video and volunteer work, he ensures local history and heroism are never forgotten.


IFE TODAY is often captured with a cellphone
— snapped, posted, and stored in the Cloud. We
scroll through headlines, hobbies, and celebrity news,
intending to pass a few minutes. Instead, we often fall into what
some call "doomscrolling," wasting precious time.


Don Counts devotes much of his time to preserving pieces of local life that we might otherwise forget. As he carefully adjusts the lighting and camera angle, he understands the value of what's unfolding.

"I just enjoy hitting the red record button and capturing life as it happens," said Counts.

Life in our community fills his YouTube channel. It's packed with stories and images of our days, which might feel mundane in the moment. But when you take a step back, you find things you'd forgotten — events that no longer occur, faces of those who've passed, and memories that connect us.

"There's so much meaning in every video or photo. Every one has a story behind it," he stated. "A lot of what I record





might not seem important today, but I hope it will be meaningful to someone in the future."

An early radio career naturally transitioned into his current role as communication supervisor at Fayetteville Public Utilities (FPU), where he continues to record, edit, and preserve community life through FPU's Channel 6 programming and personal projects that document local history.

Recordings of veterans sharing stories of service, strength, and sacrifice sit along-side gospel singings, championship games, and snapshots of small-town life. The Lincoln County Warrior Exhibit initiated the series, but Linda Williams, president of the exhibit's board of directors, had questions and knew just who to call.

"She asked what kind of video camera she should get to record veteran stories. I told her it takes more than a camera — you need someone who knows what to do with the video once it's recorded. I offered to help, and it's been very fulfilling to hear the veterans' stories. It really makes you appreciate their service," Counts said.

He's noticed a commitment to service, something reflected in his life's work, too.

He shared, "It's made me proud to live in a country where so many step up to serve. One thing that stands out is how many veterans feel their role was small. But in reality, every job, no matter how big or small, plays a vital role in the bigger picture of our military."

Counts, too, is a man of service. When the tones drop, indicating a call to Flintville's volunteer fire department, he suits up and answers along with other members. Even here, capturing training sessions for the department sparked a desire to play a larger role.

"Knowing I can help people in moments when they really need it keeps me going," he said.

Helping people is at the heart of everything Counts does. His life is a snapshot of quiet service.

"I've always believed that one person can make a difference," he said with conviction. "Even when I've questioned it myself, the truth is — it always starts with one. As long as I'm able, I'll keep showing up." GN



HEY STEPPED onto the court believing, not in an easy win or in being the favored team; they believed in each other, in what they'd built, and in what they'd become.

When the Unity boys basketball team clinched the TMSAA Class A-Section 3 Tournament title, the roar wasn't just for a win but for a story years in the making. For coach Stephen Bryan, who guided them there, the journey was as meaningful as the moment.

"I told them before the game, 'Why not us? We're here.' I think they knew if they just believed in what we'd done all season, that we would be successful."

It was his third year as head coach, though he'd been the assistant coach, coached youth and AAU

teams for years, especially when his children took to the court. A former standout player at Lincoln County High School, Bryan's love for the game runs deep, but his deeper calling is teaching life through basketball.

"You owe them something more than just teaching them how to play basketball," he said, adding that he really wants to see them handling adversity the right way, being great young men on and off the court.

That shaping began long before their championship run. The team had grown together through disappointment, coming up short in prior years. "I told them last year, when we lost, that next season started that night," he said. "They remembered." "I'm glad I got to coach them. They deserve all the credit because they knew how to do it the right way. They're the ones setting the example."

What followed was a season of growth, skill, and maturity. The team took early losses hard, but learned from them. "After that," Bryan said, "they didn't take anything for granted."

Unity may be a rural school, but its spirit and ambition rival any powerhouse. Many of the boys had been teammates since elementary school, playing baseball and basketball side by side. Their chemistry showed in their play and in how they supported one another.

"Down the stretch, it was almost like you would have different kids stand out... one might not be having a good game, somebody else would step up, and then somebody else," Bryan recalled.

The championship game drew a crowd that surprised even Bryan. "People saw Unity playing one of the biggest schools in the division for the championship like David vs. Goliath. It felt like a win for not only Unity, but for Lincoln County."

When the final buzzer sounded, he was at center court, celebrating in awe. "I was out there acting crazy," he laughed. "And I go back and watch that video sometimes just to remember — yeah, we did that."

His pride isn't just in the win; it's in the young men his players are becoming. They're FCA leaders, Beta Club members, and peer mentors. "I'm glad I got to coach them. They deserve all the credit because they knew how to do it the right way. They're the ones setting the example."

This fall, with the help of his wife, Brooke, Stephen will coach both boys and girls, balancing the demands of farming, parenting, and coaching. His daughter will play for Union University on a basketball scholarship, his sons will suit up for high school, and his youngest daughter will play for Unity.

He doesn't know how long he'll keep coaching. But for now, he's leading a team that's not just leaving it all on the floor; they're carrying what they've learned far beyond it. **GN**

THE GYM fell quiet for a split second — just long enough for Olivia Honey's three-point shot to arc toward the basket. It was the kind of moment you dream about but also carry on your shoulders. When the ball dropped through the net, the crowd erupted. Honey had scored her 1,000th career point.

"I could've sworn it was an airball," she admitted, laughing. "I was just relieved. For so long, I had people telling me that my name was going to be the next one on the 1,000 point banner in the gym... I did feel a little bit of pressure." It wasn't just about the points. That shot marked years of discipline, resilience, and the steady resolve Honey became known for.

This year, her senior season at Riverside Christian Academy (RCA), Honey's hard work was recognized in a whirlwind of honors: Miss Basketball, valedictorian, and that milestone moment on the court. "I'd never heard of Miss Basketball before," she said. "I was honored — and a little confused." The valedictorian news surprised her, too. "I knew I ranked high in my class, but not at the top."

Though not one to seek the spotlight, Honey has led by example, both on the court and off. She's a quiet mentor to younger players — someone who shows up, pushes through, and encourages others to do the same.

"I just hope to have been a leader that others were proud to be led by," she said.

"RCA has helped shape me into the person I am today," Honey said. "It has been my source of growth emotionally, socially, and spiritually." She added, "Through Riverside, I formed relationships I hope to carry forever and discovered strengths I did not know I had." Her faith has guided her throughout. "My faith shapes how I approach school, sports, and leadership by reminding me that everything I do is for God, and those things should glorify Him."

Looking ahead, she plans to attend Middle Tennessee State University and pursue a degree in physical therapy, a field that ties her love for movement to her heart for service. "I've always been fascinated by the human body, especially in sports," Honey said. "This curiosity has made me want to further understand how the body moves and how to keep the body strong."

But more than titles or stats, Honey hopes she'll be remembered for something simpler. "I want to be remembered as someone who was genuine and stayed true to themselves," Honey said. "To my classmates, someone who had others' backs, someone they could come to for advice or just a good laugh; to my teammates, as someone who gave their all on the court...





They graduated with cheer scholarships in hand. According to their coach, Rose Murray, they were among some of the first in school history to continue cheering at the collegiate level.

"We met our freshman year," Pullen said. "But it felt like I knew her longer. She was the only person I trusted to put me up in a stunt."

That trust stuck. The pair's bond grew through long practices, high-pressure competitions, and everyday ups and downs in high school life. "I felt relieved that I would have someone I already knew and was close to on the team, and so happy for both of us," Hampton shared.

Their journey began in their sophomore year, a little later than most. But both quickly found their footing, and with it, a love for the sport, the friendships it built, and the coaches who believed in them.

"Cheer is an emotional and mental sport," Pullen said. "You constantly think everything you do is wrong or not good enough, so hearing that I had received a scholarship made me very excited."

They'll cheer this fall at the University of Tennessee Southern, bringing a deep gratitude for the team and town that raised them. One memory they both trea-

She hopes their story is just the beginning. "I pray they're not the last," Murray said. "Their achievements show younger cheerleaders at FHS that hard work, dedication, and teamwork pay off."

That message is already on Hampton's heart. "I feel honored. I want to set an example," she said. "I would tell younger cheerleaders to always chase their dreams no matter what. Don't base what you do on what other people are doing. Be yourself, and work hard to get what you want."

Pullen's advice: "Make the most of every moment. Show up, even when you don't want to."

HOPE MARCHES through Lincoln County

N MAY 7, the community gathered at the Lincoln County Fairgrounds for the 21st Annual Blue Ribbon Walk. This powerful tradition raises awareness for child abuse prevention and provides critical support for Junior's House Inc. This year's turnout proved once again that when a community stands together, real change is possible.

Junior's House is the only Child Advocacy Center in the 17th Judicial District that also serves as a Court Appointed Special Advocate program. Each year, the nonprofit sees more than 500 children and provides prevention education to more than 1,000 students. No family is ever charged for services, and community events like the Blue Ribbon Walk make that possible.

Despite the rainy weather, walkers of all ages showed up with energy and pride. Local schools, businesses, and churches joined forces to support the mission. Two churches even packed and provided lunches for student walkers. Sponsors, volunteers, and friends of Junior's House walked together to show their commitment to protecting children and preventing abuse.

The Blue Ribbon Walk is a public show of unity for children who have experienced trauma. Every step taken at this event helps fund therapy, forensic interviews, advocacy, and education. That support ensures that no child is ever turned away due to cost or capacity.

This year's walk also recognized a local hero. Ricky Pierce received the 2025 Humanitarian Award for his selfless service to Junior's House. His dedication and kindness represent the heart of the organization and the spirit of the community it serves.

One in 10 children will be sexually abused before their 18th birthday. Over 700,000 children are physically abused each year in America. Events like the Blue Ribbon Walk remind us that awareness saves lives and community action creates safe spaces for healing.

When people show up, children are seen, believed, and supported. That is the true power of the Blue Ribbon Walk. GN
