



# RIDING IRISH LUCK TO CONTENDED OF THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPER

Cavender was named the 2024 World Grand Champion, guided by Tim Smith, a two-time Trainer of the Year.

E VERY EYE was on the center ring. The floodlights overhead, which had previously illuminated the arena for dozens of Tennessee walking horses (TWH) and their riders, switched off. A subtle hush fell over the crowd as a single spotlight zeroed in on Cavender and his trainer, Tim Smith. This wasn't Cavender's first ride beneath the spotlight reserved for winners, but this time, he had earned the title of World Grand Champion at the 86th annual Tennessee Walking Horse National Celebration (TWHNC).

Was it the luck of the Irish, the blood of champions flowing through the stallion's veins, or the perfect balance of knowledge and dedication from his rider, who had been voted Trainer of the Year twice? Perhaps it was the combination of all three.

Smith recalled his first impression of the chestnut colt, sired by the legendary 2016 World Grand Champion Honors and out of Jose's Cafe Au-Lait. Smith and Knox Blackburn were in Mississippi for the Abernathy Stables Colt Preview in February 2021 and admired the "high-headed colt."

"I called Bruce MacDonald and said, 'If you want him, you've got to buy him now," Smith said. "The youngster was under the direction of Cottonwood Farm in Kentucky and was raised by Brenda Corey with the help of Martin Cox."

Over the last 30 years, Bruce and Robin MacDonald have been the proud owners of several horses who have left their mark on the TWH industry, including John F.K.'s Pusher, The Titleist, Prime Poison, It's Taboo, Busted At Pebble Beach, and Georgia Florida Line. Robin and Bruce have both successfully shown Uptight Jose and Mr. Heisman, as well as others. So when Smith contacted them about the colt, they knew he'd chosen another winner.

Robin named him Cavender, which is Irish and means bold and brave. Later that year, Cavender won blue ribbons at Thor-Sport Spring Fling in Murfreesboro, and as a 2-year-old, he won another at the Spring Fun Show in Shelbyville.

"The more I rode him, the better he got," recalled Smith. Each time Cavender entered the Celebration show ring, the audience and judges adored him. "As a 3 and 4-year-old, his World Championships and World Grand Championship wins were unanimous."

Several more wins included the Money Tree Classic, Division C World Championship, and the unanimous choice as the 4-yearold World Grand Champion. The team also won the Money Tree Classic and the Marshall County Horseman's Association.

During the first Saturday night of the TWHNC, they topped the A division of the Aged Stallions class, which features stallions age 5 and older. They also won the Canter class unanimously. Their top recognition came on Aug. 31, when they were named World Grand Champion — also by unanimous decision.

When Cavender isn't showing off, he has a sweet tooth like many of us. He loves to nibble on apple oat horse cookies, vanilla wafers, carrots, and even peppermints.

Smith grew up outside of Birmingham, Alabama. When he turned 18, he applied for his trainer's license. "I grew up around horses as my dad, Tex Smith, was a trainer, and I really began my love for horses with my first pony, Domino. In high school, I played football and trained horses with my dad after school. At that time, we owned the horses that I showed on the Alabama circuit, and we had a few outside customers."

He credits his love of the TWH breed to his dad, but says his mom, Joan, supported both of their dreams. "My dad doesn't miss watching a show online now. My in-laws, Becky and Walter Nichols, and a lot of my wife's family come to the shows to cheer me on. And, although we compete on the weekends, many of my fellow trainers are good friends. We bounce things off each other and really lean on each other. And then, there are the great customers that I have, and have had, over the years. Their trust in me with their horses really means a

lot and keeps me wanting to do the best job I can all the time."

Tim's wife, Sarah, is a Shelbyville native. "In 2002, thanks to a mutual horse industry friend, I met my wife. I moved to Tennessee in the spring of 2003, and we married the next October."

The Smiths have three children: Abi, Lexi, and Andy. "My wife, as well as our girls, have also won World Grand Championships at the Celebration. Andy loves horses and going to the shows, but he is really into basketball, so his focus is on that."

When it comes to Cavender, Tim said, "Cavender has been special since day one. He has the best personality. He just wants to please. He is truly a talented animal." GN

## UNFOLD'

URRICANE HELENE dumped an astonishing 30 inches of rain on portions of Tennessee and Western North Carolina, triggering deadly landslides. Scenes unfolding across social media showed utter devastation. Entire chunks of Interstate 40 were missing, and so were dozens of homes, businesses, and people.

"I was scrolling through Facebook," recalled Julie Graham. "I saw a horse owner from East Tennessee reaching out for help during the flood. I decided that we, as the Tennessee walking horse (TWH) industry, had to do something to help on an emergency basis. I didn't know how much we could do, but the need was immediate. I made a phone call to a couple of trainers. I thought maybe we could take one to two horse trailers. I called my daughter, Aimee Campbell, and from there, it exploded."

Graham has been involved in the TWH industry for over

25 years and is the host of the Walking for the Angels show, which provides Christmas gifts for hundreds of children in Bedford County.

Her daughter, Aimee, said, "Until my mom told me about the Facebook post, I had no idea how unfathomable the devastation really was, but when I saw there were children they were trying to feed who had lost their homes, well, as a mom, that broke me."





As Shelbyville natives, Aimee and her mother had witnessed the community rally to help others in crisis before, but this was different. Those affected were strangers living hours away. Would the community help? They placed the first horse trailer at Edgemont Baptist Church on the corner of Fairfield Pike and Deery Street, and New Covenant Christian Bookstore on North Main Street.

"I can remember setting up that first trailer, thinking I could load one trailer by myself. I made a Facebook Live saying we were set up and asked everyone to bring donations. It was unlike anything I'd ever seen before," Aimee recalled.

What happened next was also unfathomable. Like the dams that burst in the mountains following the Category 4 hurricane, what started as a steady trickle of donations erupted into more than they ever imagined. Bottled water, toilet paper, pet food, horse feed, clothing, nonperishable food, and hygiene supplies were being unloaded, sorted by a dozen volunteers, and packed into the horse trailer.

When the last pair of red taillights exited the parking lots, they made an amazing discovery. The 50-foot horse trailers were packed so tightly their doors wouldn't bolt.

"Shelbyville showed up in huge ways to help. It was an act of faith that we could do something, and God just handled the rest — from donations to volunteers to people offering to drive the trailers. It was remarkable how our community and the TWH industry responded to such a terrible event. We hoped to fill one or

two trailers with supplies, but in the end, we left with 10 full trailers. The first bunch of supplies was dropped off at a school in Greenville. It was like a distribution hub. From there, people in that community were able to fill up their four-wheelers and go into disaster areas that we couldn't get into," Julie said.

"It was humbling to see the people lined up for help, but it was also devastating to see just how badly the supplies were needed. It's one thing to say, 'let's help,' but it's another to see the faces of people who have lost absolutely everything," Aimee recalled.

They partnered with Layne Leverette from Layne Leverette & Sons Stables and over a dozen other volunteers. Aimee said, "The day I got home from the first trip, I immediately began to plan another. I kept telling others, 'You just can't understand the devastation until you see it.' I received a call from Layne because he wanted to go and feed people. I said, 'Absolutely, but if we're going back to feed people, let's also take donations.' I made another Facebook Live. For three days, we gathered donations and left with 16 to 17 vehicles. Some of those were 18-wheelers loaded down with supplies, some were people hauling heavy equipment, and others were trucks loaded with food."

Volunteers distributed donations in Greenville, Black Mountain, and Asheville, North Carolina, and Erwin, Tennessee.

Aimee said, "I have never been through a natural disaster, so honestly, I couldn't

quite comprehend what devastation really looked like. This experience changed my perspective and has given me a true passion for helping others. It truly changed my life and who I am as a person. When God tells you to move, that's exactly what [you] need to do. You can't be worried about how it's gonna happen, or what if this, or what if that. When God tells you to go, you go."

The Bible verse Isaiah 6:8 has become Aimee's motivation: "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send? And who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here I am. Send me!"

Her mother, Julie, said, "We're all given opportunities to be a helping hand to others. Never let fear hold you back. Step out on that faith and watch it unfold." GN






























# THE HOME TEAM

TIFFANY WOOSLEY transferred from Moore County and started her freshman year at Shelbyville Central High School (SCHS). This decision proved to be a game-changer for Woosley. She rose from an Eaglette to a Lady Vol at the University of Tennessee through tough work and perseverance. Then she signed with the Women's National Basketball Association as a guard for the Houston Comets.

"Community and competition were at the heart of everything in Shelbyville," Woosley said. "Basketball wasn't just a sport here; it was a way of life. I fell in love with the game early and poured everything into it. The structure, discipline, and teamwork I learned through basketball shaped not just my interests, but my approach to life."

She learned from the best while playing for Rick Insell at SCHS and Pat Summitt at the University of Tennessee. "I was blessed to play under legendary

coach Pat Summitt and Rick Insell, which was a tremendous honor. Being part of such a storied program taught me excellence and accountability. Now, being featured in this magazine and having built Homeland into a growing business is a new kind of proud moment for me, one rooted in impact beyond the court."

As one of the most influential coaches in basket-ball history, Pat Summitt led the Lady Vols for 38 seasons, leaving a permanent mark on the sport with her demanding yet supportive coaching style and countless victories. HILE HIS mother earned a nursing degree from Motlow State Community College and worked full time to support her family, Chris Fritz watched with silent admiration. "I'll never forget waking up at night when I was in elementary school and seeing her studying or doing homework," recalled Fritz. "She worked her tail off to provide Hamburger Helper for dinner. She read to me every night and made sure that I believed academics were a way to change my life."

His mother's dedication to earning a college degree, coupled with a string of teachers pushing Fritz to give his best efforts, molded him into a teacher, soccer coach, and mentor who prioritizes investing in his students and players.

"I had a long line of exceptional teachers that helped me mature by investing in me as a person first. I wasn't the easiest student by any means. Ann Spencer, Ardis Rittenberry, and Marla Agee were a few, but these aren't all of the teachers who helped shape my personality. One of my current best friends, coach Neal Gordon, was my chemistry teacher, and he allowed me to flourish in his class," Fritz said.

After graduating from Shelbyville Central High School (SCHS), Fritz earned a degree in criminal justice from Middle Tennessee State University. A chance encounter with coach Gordon changed the trajectory of Fritz's life when he encouraged him to pursue teaching.

"Within a year, I was working at the high school as a teacher, and coach Gordon took me under his wing as an assistant coach. He showed me how rewarding both responsibilities can be when you truly give yourself to the kids. I've been blessed to know a man like coach Gordon. He taught me how to reflect, own my mistakes, and be true to myself."

When done well, coaching and teaching students in the classroom can have similar outcomes. According to Fritz, "Both require you to pour into people, be passionate, and focus on the growth, not the outcome. I love watching people develop grit and self-confidence to achieve in ways that surprise themselves. That carries over to the classroom with some of the difficult or hard-to-reach students. The 'light bulb moment' is a real thing in a good teacher's classroom; it's a lot slower than most people realize, but when it happens, it's immensely rewarding."

When it comes to sports, Fritz vividly recalled the financial struggles his single mother faced. "I don't take coaching fees for the youth soccer teams that I coach. That's nine different age groups of boys and over 130 little guys that I've coached over the past decade. I have strong opinions about affordable sports for our community and free public spaces for people to gather and play sports. It's also the same philosophy we had with the Bedford County elementary league. In trying to give as many kids the opportunity to play as possible, we even ran our camp last year for free."

Fritz taught history and math at SCHS for 16 years and has coached soccer for 17 years. While teaching, he also became a student, earning a master's degree in school administration from Arkansas State University in 2018. Because of the investments he continues to make in the lives of countless students, the board of education promoted him to dean of students. He faithfully served in this capacity while also teaching. The board expanded the position for the 2024-2025 school year, so Fritz now mentors full time at all three high schools.

He is a devoted husband to his wife, Misty, and the father of three sons, Mason, Callum, and Rory. "My wife is a nurse in Lynchburg. She has been my rock, and honestly, I look up to her. She is the most optimistic and caring person I have ever known. She helps me work through the ups and downs of the coaching world. She even coached alongside me when I was coaching the girls. She will tell you that coaching has made me a better father and husband. Our three sons have lost a ton of 'dad time' to



FTER DRU McCormick graduated from Louisiana State University with a psychology degree, she traded tantalizing French beignets, Cajun and Creole cuisine, and the cypress-lined bayous of "Fisherman's Paradise" for Middle Tennessee. But her love for Shelbyville — the "Tennessee Walking Horse Capital of the World" — had begun much earlier. From the age of 10, she'd spent every summer here competing with her best friend — her Tennessee walking horse.

Though Dru and Mickey McCormick grew up together in the Tennessee walking horse industry, their affections blossomed while Mickey worked as an assistant trainer at the barn where Dru's family boarded their horses. With so many common interests, including their shared love for the breed, they married and have spent the last 27 years working as a team.

"Neither of us remembers a time when we haven't been involved with Tennessee walking horses," recalls Dru.

Their daughters, Bailey and Morgan, share their parents' love of the breed, and through the guidance of their parents, both girls have competed in the Tennessee Walking Horse National Celebration (TWHNC).

"One of the greatest experiences of our lives is when they both won the World Grand Championships in 2011," Dru said. "For me, my greatest experiences have been watching Dru and my girls win championships at the Tennessee Walking Horse National Celebration," said Mickey.

Mickey, who is a graduate of Cascade High School, has been training Tennessee walking horses professionally since 1978. Over the years, he has become a respected leader in the industry, known for excellence and integrity in both training and breeding. He is the proud owner of Mane Motion Stables on Highway 64 West, which has a proven track record for training winners. Their barn has been a part of 106 World and World Grand Champion-

ships. Outside the show ring, Mickey has served as the president of the Tennessee Walking Horse Trainers Association twice, and in the ring, he has won numerous championships.

"We love for people to come by Mane Motion Stables for a visit," Mickey said. "Once you do, you understand our attraction as the horses themselves are the best ambassadors of their breed. I started with probably five horses and have been blessed through the years to have some of the best owners in the industry who brought fantastic horses to me. I love to put amateurs in the ring and have prepared horses for riders from 6 to 76 years of age. Today, we have about 35 show horses."

Dru said, "Mane Motion Stables is a business, yet we feel like we are actually a barn family. We know we are blessed to have had such a huge success and owe it to our wonderful customers we've had throughout the years."

Like her husband, Dru also spends her days working in the equine industry. She has been the operations liaison at Equine Services LLC since 2011. During the 2024 TWHNC, Dru took home top prizes in two categories: World Championship on TN Lineman in the Amateur 15.2 Mare and Gelding category and the World

Grand Championship in the Amateur Mare and Gelding category.

"The versatility of the breed is what I love most," Mickey said. "Not all of them are show horses, but all can find a place in the world. Any rider, whether 6 or 90, no matter the age, can ride them. Their temperament and willingness are outstanding. There is also a Classic Horse class for horses older than 15, and it's very competitive."

What is the McCormicks' secret to training scores of Tennessee walking horses that reach the top tier in competitions? Mickey said, "You must devote lots of time and patience. You'll also need to spend lots of time in the saddle, 'listening to the horse.' It's so rewarding to see a young, unbroken colt progress to become a show horse."

For those interested in becoming trainers themselves, Mickey said, "Starting out, work under trainers who can teach you and who love their job. Just like any job, get good experience. As a rider, take your time, listen to your trainer, and enjoy yourself. Win or lose, you will have fun!"

Because of trainers and breeders like the Mc-Cormicks leading the local industry, the future of the Tennessee walking horse shines brighter than the noonday sun perched high atop the show ring of the TWHNC.










