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
A Fair to prepare and why you should care

Where: *Location Change*—lower driving range parking lot What: Household batteries only (A, AA, AAA, C, D, 9-volt, and but-

- Corroded batteries must be bagged in plastic.
- Residents are encouraged to bring their batteries directly to the collection events
 - No e-waste or general rubbish

What: Light Bulbs

ton batteries).

Recycling Limits:

• Fluorescent Tubes:

Up to 4 feet long.

Must be unbroken and taped together.

• CFL Bulbs (Compact Fluorescent Lightbulbs):

Must be unbroken, sealed in paper with tape or in a sealed bag.

LED Bulbs:

Must be unbroken, sealed in paper with tape or in a sealed bag. Light bulbs must be sorted by type and sealed in paper or in a plastic bag.

Important Update for DACs in 2025:

- No appointment needed!
- A 25-pound limit per collection date applies.
- DACs handling large quantities should take them to the County Hazardous Waste Drop-Off site (appointment required).

Do you need an alternative drop-off time?

If the scheduled dates do not work for you, contact the Santa Clara County Hazardous Waste Drop-Off Site at 408-299-7300 to make an appointment.

Designed with our residents in mind, the portal offers easy access to important community information, helpful resources, and updates all in one convenient location. Once you are logged in:

Bulky Bin service to return August 12

The Bulky Bin Service on July 22 received an overwhelming response and the bins reached capacity within 30 hours. As a result, many residents were unable to utilize the service. To accommodate the de-



mand, Sustainability Services has arranged for two additional Bulky Bins to be delivered on **Tuesday, August 12**.

Location: Lower Driving Range Parking Lot

Availability: Until bins are filled

Scheduled pickup: Thursday, August 14

Please note: This service is exclusively for Villagers' personal use. Contractors and service providers may not use the Bulky Bins to dispose of debris.

Important Guidelines

All items must be placed inside the bin and pushed to the back. Do not place items outside the bins or toss them over the top. Improper disposal creates safety hazards and increases staff workload for cleanup and hazardous waste removal.

Restricted Items—Do not dispose of the following:

- Concrete, dirt, tires, engine parts, oil
- Televisions, refrigerators, freezers, washing machines, dryers, and other appliances
- Chemicals of any kind
- Propane tanks and other combustible materials
- Medical waste or hazardous substances (e.g., paint, antifreeze, motor oil, pesticides)
- E-waste (e.g., computers, monitors, chargers, keyboards, printers, laptops, electrical components)

Garbage is not allowed in bulky bins.

Any boxes contaminated with garbage will not be removed until all trash is properly disposed of.

In July, one bin could not be collected as scheduled because of overfilling and contamination. Staff were required to manually sort and remove the contents, delaying service and increasing costs.

This valuable community service depends on everyone's cooperation and respect for the rules. Thank you for doing your part to keep the program safe, efficient, and accessible for all.

SRS SENIOR RESOURCE SERVICES

Property Tax Assessment

You should have already received your 2025-2026 Notification of Assessed Value from the County Assessor, showing the assessed value of your home as of January 1, 2025. This assessed value is used to calculate your property tax due in December 2025 and April 2026. Be sure to open the notice and review your numbers.

Your "Total Assessed Value" for property tax is located just above "Homeowner Exemption" in the upper right corner. Your annual property tax is calculated using this value, less your homeowner's exemption if applicable. If you have lived in The Villages for several years or more, this value should be no more than 2% higher than last year's value. Also, if this is your primary residence the Homeowner Exemption line should read \$7,000. If it does not, read the article below on how to apply.

If you are new to The Villages:

- And you are qualified to make the election to transfer your previous California home's tax base (Factored Base Year Value) to your Villages' residence, check to be sure it has been transferred. If it has not been transferred and you filed your election for transfer more than six months ago, give the County a call or send them an e-mail. The phone number and e-address are on the Assessment notice. Your transfer value will be applied retroactively, and you will receive a refund if you have overpaid.
- And you do not qualify to make the election for transfer basis, your assessed value should be what you paid for your property. If it is substantially less, you will receive a supplemental notice of additional assessment bringing it up to your cost.
- Your assessed value may be more than what you paid for the property because the County Assessor believes you did not pay full value. This happens occasionally because the county uses square footage to determine the value, but your property might have been substantially distressed. If so, you have until September 15, 2025 to request an informal review. A formal appraisal or photographs and bills that support the necessity of the expense to make the property reasonably habitable are helpful.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253 or e-mail SRS at villagessrs@ sbcglobal.net. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.

SRS Alert:

Do you have the Homeowner Exemption?

If the property you own in The Villages is your primary residence, you are entitled to a \$7,000 exemption on your property tax. If you are a new resident or have changed your title for some reason, such as changing the title to a Living Trust or removing a joint name, you likely need to reapply for the exemption. You may file online by going to www.sccassessor.org and clicking on the Homeowner Exemption box on the left side of the home screen. Or call the Assessor's office at 408-299-6460 and the county will mail you the simple application. Or you can request the form by email at Exemptions@asr.sccgov.org. Include the property address and assessor parcel number in your request.

If you don't understand your assessment, stop by the SRS office with your notice and a volunteer will explain it to you.

- Rider must not receive sedation at appointment
- Drivers cannot provide riders with physical assistance i.e. help with walkers or wheelchairs
- Maximum four rides a month per rider
- Schedule rides no earlier than four days in advance and no later than two days in advance
- Office is closed on Fridays, best to schedule a Monday or Tuesday appointment the previous week
- Driver will give you a two-hour window which includes the pick-up/wait/return
- Distance is restricted to no more than a 20-mile radius.

Shopping:

- Driver will take resident to neighborhood stores i.e. Lucky and CVS
- Driver will wait for resident
- Resident must be able to shop on their own.
- Offered once a week

Medical Equipment:

- VMA offers a variety of walkers, wheelchairs, canes and commodes (no return on commodes) and other equipment, please call the office before you buy!
- Volunteers will deliver/pick up the equipment which is stored in a separate unit.

Do not bring items to the VMA office!

Incontinent Supplies

- VMA offers an assortment of items which are provided by other villagers who have received items in excess.
- -Sizes and types vary please do not rip open bags to check on type it is on the package
- VMA does not deliver these items—please come to office to check

Medication Disposal

- no longer needed prescription and non-prescription medications should be returned only during office hours. Place in appropriate locked box.

Never place any medications in the mailboxes located across from the VMA office or hang them on the VMA door! Items happily accepted at the VMA office

 -Unopened incontinent supplies, glasses, contacts lenses, hearing aids, cell phones



'My Grace is Enough for You'

When my youngest child graduated from high school, I was excited at the opportunity of having more time for some of the things I didn't do much of while raising a busy family—taking classes, painting, travelling with my spouse, spending quiet moments alone. But that all changed when my mother was diagnosed with Parkinson's and the dementia that is associated with the disease.

Despite her physician informing me what to expect as my mother's illness progressed, I was not prepared for the difficult journey ahead. I found my patience being tested as my mother began to ask the same questions over and over again, on an average of every three to five minutes. Her doctor suggested I take her on outings frequently to stimulate her senses and to help increase her serotonin levels, however, it was often frustrating convincing her to go out with me for a meal or for a simple leisurely drive around town as her desire to leave the house diminished. My mother now needs assistance with walking, showering, feeding herself, going to the bathroom, changing her clothes, putting on her shoes, and with getting up and out of bed. Tasks that were once routine and easy for her have become foreign. Her hallucinations became more frequent, and her piercing screams would have me running to her room typically five times per night. Sleep deprivation took a toll on me. Days off from work were spent at doctor's appointments rather than on rest. I realized that the mother who once cared for me as a child was no longer. She had become a vulnerable, helpless, infantile stranger in my mom's shell.

When God called me to care for my mother, I never dreamed it would be this difficult. Often, I would ask God to take this cup from me, just as Jesus had asked before he was to suffer. After persistent requests, it became apparent that God would not allow me to surrender the cup. One day, however, a friend recommended a caregiver who had cared for her mom during her last days. I was hesitant to contact the caregiver because I didn't know how my mom would take to another person's caregiving, but eventually I reached out to my friend's recommendation, and it was a blessing that I did. The caregiver turned out to be a great match for my mom. With the caregiver's help, I am able to provide better care for mom as her extra hands relieve some of the stress of caretaking. I am also able to get a day or two away to decompress and enjoy several moments of solitude, which gives me a greater appreciation of time with mom. As I continue to hold on to the cup, I know that God is beside me, supporting my arms, when it the cup becomes too heavy. As my journey continues, I keep in mind that God did not let Jesus' cup pass either, and because He didn't, the Resurrection and eternal life is ours to embrace.

Let's All Get Together Now—Be a part of our "Culture of Care" and follow these simple Golf Course Etiquette Guidelines...

We can all participate in keeping our golf course beautiful by observing these **NINE simple acts of care:**

- 1. Follow the 90-degree rule (longer hitters) or the Entrance Gates (shorter hitters) when entering the fairway
- 2. Drive the cart from shot to shot keeping the cart in the fairway as you play the hole... please avoid driving in the rough as much as possible to maintain the integrity of the rough
- 3. Do not drive within 30-feet of the greens defined by the yellow painted ground lines in front of each green
- 4. EXIT every hole through the EXIT GATES please do not drive on the mounding around the greens and proceed

from hole to hole using the cart paths

- 5. Respect any roping, cart directional signs and Ground Under Repair
- 6. Fill all divots with sand mix

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- 7. Repair pitch marks on the greens
- 8. Smooth out the sand in the bunkers with the bunker rake and return the rake at a right angle to bunker edge placing the head of the rake in the sand and the handle of the rake on the bunker edge. Do your best to push the rake instead of pulling the rake ...we don't want the new sand to build up on the edges of the bunkers.
 - 9. Knock the sand off your shoes before walking on the green

Let's all make it a goal to leave our golf course in better shape than we found it, every time we play.

Villages Tee Monuments Updated

The next time you are playing golf, take a closer look at the Villages Tower Tee Monuments on each hole of the 18-hole course. They have been repaired and repainted and the old bells have been replaced with new brass bells that are actually real bells. These unique monuments add a touch of class to The Villages golf experience. Thank you to the VGC, Director of Golf and especially Ryan Bell and Trent Alameda for spearheading the refurbishment of our tee monuments. This will be an ongoing process as needed.



Tips from the Pro-Lean Back...

Want to drive it further? Lean the shaft back with your driver for a better angle of attack! Forward lean in the shaft (toward the target) promotes more downward movement in the clubhead through impact, which is ideal for an iron, but bad news for the driver. With the advent of trackman radar and video technology, we now know that the optimal shaft angle for a driver is a backward shaft lean at impact creating a low spin, high launch ball flight.

Here are some tips to get that shaft leaning back at impact with the driver...

Try to set up with your hands more neutral with your driver, even with your belt buckle. Set up with the shaft more straight up and down (i.e., neutral) to leaning slightly back, so that your hands are in line with the clubhead and not pressed ahead. Tilt your left shoulder up just a bit to help promote an ascending blow. Set up with ball position more forward, even with your left shoulder or left foot, this will help you make contact at the ascending point of the swing. The goal is that the clubhead should be fairly level to the ground or slightly ascending through impact. Relax your left hand so the tendency to pull the shaft into a forward lean position is negated. If you do all this successfully, you will be surprised how much higher and further it goes.



Inventory of homes for sale in The Villages is staying in the range of 54.

At this writing we are still sitting at the highest ever homes for sale at 54. There are now 11 homes pending. That is up from a month ago.

Cribari Village is having a time with their sales but they are improving. There are now 5 pending sales but 17 active listings. Prices range from 465K to 648K for the single-story units.

Larger homes are starting to move again. Just a few weeks ago, larger homes were also sitting on the market longer than usual. Selling my McCarty Ranch listing seemed to create movement in that larger home market again. Now there seems to be 2 homes on and 2 homes off. It is a bit of a tough market, but markets change quickly. The prices in March are not the same as the prices in July. Sellers tend to remember the house down the street selling for that high price in March. That same model is now selling for less. It is a tough pill to swallow if you do not hit the market timing. Usually in past years, homes sold faster and for more money in March through May. From late September through mid-November the market gets moving again.

Why should interest rates make a big difference in our adult community?

About one third to one half of all sales in The Villages are purchasing with a loan. Interest rates are not just important for the future Villagers trying to sell their home outside The Villages, but sellers have not been willing to sell their home when they have a 3% mortgage interest rate. Both the lack of buyers waiting for an interest rate drop and the sellers not wanting to lose their rates have caused a lack of inventory moving outside The Villages. If the interest rates were to drop substantially, I would imagine that many homeowners would sell, creating more inventory. Buying and selling would increase tremendously. For now, if I prep a house well, stage it nicely and price it correctly, my listings sell. I can sell a home in any market. Call me anytime for any of your real estate needs.


