

The Costs of Maintaining Quality Drives Bylaw Changes for Villages Golf & Country Club

The Villages Club Board of Directors established an Ad Hoc Bylaws Committee at the July Board Meeting. The General Manager, executive staff, and a specially appointed Bylaws Committee will meet bi-weekly to hammer out the language for the revised Club Bylaws.

Club Board President Andy Altman says, "Updating our Bylaws is essential to the long-term stability of our community. The current 2006 version limits our ability to build adequate financial reserves that we need to address aging infrastructure and rising operational costs. We expect significant increases in insurance, water, and labor costs—none of which are optional. The current Bylaws also limit new revenue opportunities, leaving increases in Club Capital dues, special assessments, or loans, to address budget shortfalls and Capital needs. To responsibly manage these challenges and secure our future, we must update our Bylaws."

Beginning in 2023, the Club Board recognized the need for updates in the bylaws. Working closely with legal and financial counsel, the Club Board and General Manager defined essential changes. They also met with the Homeowners and Association Boards to apprise them of the updates. Heeding the feedback from these Boards, the original group expanded to include five more Bylaws Committee members. They are Michael Schwerin (ABOD), Brooks Fuller, Jim Murphy, Larry McNary (HBOD) and Julie Wash. Past Club Board President Richard Zahner (CBOD) also serves on the Bylaws Committee. Judy Owen, past Club Board Vice President, serving her fifth year as a Club Board director, is Chair of the Bylaw Committee. Owen says, "We are focused on putting these changes into place in the beginning of 2026. As a community, we must be proactive to protect the value of our homes by maintaining The Villages infrastructure and beauty."

Sellers are looking for maximum returns: There is a Cribari upstairs unit that had an extreme makeover and is currently for sale for over \$600,000. It hasn't moved. I have told you that buyers pay a lot extra for a remodeled home when moving to an adult community. Often when you are over 55 years of age, time is more valuable than money. Buyers do pay more for a remodeled home, which means less time spent working on a home, freeing up precious time.

This is a truism, however, there is a point of diminishing returns when re-selling a remodeled home. Too much investment of time and energy in a property will leave you with little profit left over. But if you want to spend the money on pure luxury for a high-end remodel and don't mind the cost, just know that you may not get your money back when you go to sell. Of course, it is also important to buy low and sell high, which has a lot to do with the timing of the market. But for some, living luxuriously everyday may be your top priority. I say splurge if that is your end game.

The Bottom Line:

- Buyers: you currently have more choices and a bit more leverage-use it wisely.
- Sellers: the market is still currently on your side, but timing and strategy is everything.
- Use the most hands-on and service-oriented agent, inside or outside The Villages for the best results.

When: Friday, August 22

Time: 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. (No early drop-offs, please)

Where: Location Change—lower driving range parking lot What: Household batteries only (A, AA, AAA, C, D, 9-volt, and button batteries).

- Corroded batteries must be bagged in plastic.
- Residents are encouraged to bring their batteries directly to the collection events
- · No e-waste or general rubbish

What: Light Bulbs

Recycling Limits:

Fluorescent Tubes:

Up to 4 feet long.

Must be unbroken and taped together.

• CFL Bulbs (Compact Fluorescent Lightbulbs):

Must be unbroken, sealed in paper with tape or in a sealed bag.

• LED Bulbs:

Must be unbroken, sealed in paper with tape or in a sealed bag. Light bulbs must be sorted by type and sealed in paper or in a plastic bag.

Changes in Inherited IRA distribution rules can significantly impact your beneficiaries

Recent legislative changes involving required minimum distributions (RMDs) from inherited IRAs directly impact retirement savings plans, including 401(k), 403(b), IRA, Roth accounts and, in some cases, associated tax benefits.

Previously, beneficiaries could extend inherited IRA distributions throughout their lifetimes. However, a "10-year rule" now applies to many beneficiaries of inherited IRAs who will face annual required distributions during a 10-year period. The RMD amount each year can vary based on several factors, including the beneficiary's age, relationship to the deceased and the value of the inherited account. Rules differ depending on whether the original account owner had begun taking RMDs. If they took required distributions before they died, the beneficiary usually needs to continue taking annual distributions while complying with the 10-year rule (if applicable).

"Eligible Designated Beneficiaries" (EDBs) categories that can still extend the distribu-

EDBs have more flexibility in how they withdraw funds from an inherited IRA. They include the spouse or minor child of the deceased account holder, disabled or chronically ill individuals, and individuals who are not more than 10 years younger than the IRA owner or plan participant.

Given all the recent changes, you and your named beneficiaries may benefit from consulting a tax adviser regarding their situation.

A recent Times article reported that overuse of cell phones and other technical devices distracts students and diminishes critical thinking skills. Interestingly, when the use of cell phones was restricted in school, students adapted well to the restriction, engag-

ing more in face-to-face conversations with their peers. None of the students voiced concern that the policy was an overreach by the school or the government.

The second topic tackled was homelessness in San Jose, where approximately 6,500 people are without housing. While more units have been built, the shortage remains critical. The group debated whether it's reasonable to criminalize homelessness when adequate housing is lacking. The conversation touched on current legal challenges, with some legislators working to block such laws.

The session closed on a positive note: stories of Villagers making a difference. One resident has quietly delivered supplies to the homeless for years, while another Villager organized donations for a Title 9 school in urgent need of classroom materials.

The next News Real gathering will be held **Tuesday, September 9 at 1 p.m.** in the Sequoia Room, continuing the conversation by exploring how other countries address homelessness.

More birdhouses for the golf course

Former Villager Sean Kelly recently gifted The Villages with unique hand crafted birdhouses before moving overseas. The birdhouses will find a new home on The Villages golf course. These birdhouses have a story going back decades.

A former Golf Course Superintendent Brian Bagley developed an Audubon Golf Course Sanctuary program at The Villages. He worked with a resident birding group and had several bird houses installed on the golf course. This is where Sean Kelly enters the picture as he was instrumental in providing some of those original birdhouses. The birdhouses were a product of his Public Benefit Company at the time P2P Rescue. After the 2004 tsunami in Sri Lanka, Kelly traveled there and began his work for relief efforts. He provided tools, training, and jobs to more than a dozen Sri Lankans. They created unique handcrafted birdhouses called Waveworks Birdhouses. The houses were made from salvaged "tsunami wood" recovered from pieces of door panels, window frames, boat decks, furniture and the like that was nearly destroyed and no longer useful for their original purpose. P2P Rescue sold the handcrafted birdhouses and donated 90% of the net proceeds of sales to fund construction of 140 new homes for families in the devastated area. The remaining 10 percent of P2P's net proceeds from birdhouse sales paid for artificial limbs for people of all ages throughout Sri Lanka. Some lost limbs due to land mines while others from diseases such as polio.

Please watch for these unique birdhouses coming to the golf course soon.





Among the Catholic prayers that I learned as a child was the "Prayer to My Guardian Angel." On the other side of the prayer card was an illustration of a boy and a girl playing near the edge of a lake, each being closely watched by a couple of winged, human-looking figures. Presumably, these were the children's guardian angels.

It has been believed in our tradition that God assigns each of us a guardian angel at our conception and Sacred Scripture reveals to us that we can communicate with them. The interaction between Mary and the angel, Gabriel, is a good example of this (Luke 1:26-38). Angels can relay messages through our dreams, just as the angel did to Joseph, telling him not to be afraid to take Mary to be his wife (Matthew 2:13-19) and twice again to assure the child Jesus' safety (Matthew 2:13-19). They can also speak to us through a human disguise just as the angel Rafael, masquerading as a relative, did in the Book of Tobit.

My daughter several years ago desperately struggled to free herself of her constant anxieties that negatively affected her physical health and mood. The bubbly, chatty little girl became a sluggish, exasperated teenager. After trying out a few professional therapists and doctors, we finally found the ones my daughter felt comfortable with and best suited her needs. The woman pulled herself toward my daughter and with an austere look, said to her, "You are going to be OK". Without saying anything more, the woman turned herself around and veered to the opposite direction. All of us were rather taken aback by that incident. Later that day, it came to me that the woman could have been my daughter's guardian angel in disguise.

With the right professional help, moral support from family and friends, and with her own internal strength and determination, my daughter is now enjoying life as any young healthy adult should. She travels, hikes with friends, has parachuted from an airplane and enjoys painting again. She is employed as the marketing director for a prestigious law firm in San Francisco. Her positive energy and outlook are signs that her guardian angel continues to protect and guide her. Our own guardian angels never give up on us, either. After all, they have been sent by God, and God never gives up on us!

Golf Genius Live Scoring is a feature of the Golf Genius tournament management software that allows golfers to enter scores in real-time via a mobile app, which are then synced to live leaderboards that can be viewed both in the app and online. This provides a dynamic, engaging experience for players and spectators alike. How it works:

Mobile App: Golfers use the Golf Genius mobile app (available on both Android and iOS) to enter their scores hole-by-hole.

Real-time Updates: As scores are entered, they are instantly updated on live leaderboards, which can be accessed by anyone with the app or online access.

Customizable Leaderboards: Golf Genius allows for customizable live leaderboards that can be displayed on TVs in the clubhouse, on social media, or in other locations.

Automated Calculations: The software automatically calculates results and statistics, saving time and effort for tournament organizers and staff.

The dreaded **slice**. It starts out OK but takes a right turn in midair and flies headlong into whatever trouble is lurking down the right side, usually a lake or a grove of trees. A **slice** happens when the clubface at impact is open to the path of the swing. The **slice** is more about the open clubface than it is about improper path. You can use your wristwatch to eliminate a slice. If you're wearing a watch on your left wrist (right wrist for left-handers), you have the key to squaring the clubface. On the backswing rotate your hands counter clockwise so your watch pints to the ground, this will keep the clubface from opening too much. On the downswing, Swing out to right field, and as your club is approaching the ball, focus on rolling your watch face over or counter clockwise so it's pointing to the ground in the follow-through. Tiger calls this "left knuckles down"...This will get you to rotate your forearms and close the face enough before impact to beat that banana ball **slice**.



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

The Roots of Evergreen series


The Roots of Evergreen installments will be published in *The Villager* the third week of every month and collected in *The Villager Online* under a new History heading.

This month's installment is about Rancho Yerba Buena - Antonio Chaboya's Mexican land grant.

Yerba Buena—Antonio Chaboya's big rancho

The present-day footprint of The Villages in its entirety is a small part of the huge Rancho Yerba Buena—located almost in the center of the former 24,332-acre land grant first bestowed upon Francisco Xavier Antonio Chaboya (1803–1865), a son of a Spanish soldier, Marcos Chaboya, who was part of the De Anza Expedition.

In 1775, Spain began granting huge tracts of land in Alta California and Baja California to retired soldiers as inducements for them to settle in the frontier. Spain was seeking settlers and natives converted to Spanish citizenship by the missions to legitimize its vast land acquisitions. In Alta California, Spain led a fast-paced land grab to prevent the English and Russians from claiming the coastal regions of California. Under Spain, rancho land holders (Rancheros) did not own the land because the concessions remained the property of the Spanish crown upon the death of the recipient.

After Mexico's independence from Spain in 1810, it began granting Alta Cali-

fornia ranchos to soldiers and other favored perons. (The September 16 Mexican Independence celebration, a popular holiday in California, commemorates the Treaty of Córdoba that released Mexico from Spanish rule.) The Mexican land grants conveyed actual ownership to both native-born and naturalized Mexican citizens. These grants were usually two or more square leagues—14 square miles—in size. The majority of the Mexican land grants were located along the coast around the San Francisco Bay, inland along the Sacramento River and in the San Joaquin Valley—some very prime property by today's standards. In 1833 Mexico secularized the missions, transferring about a million acres per mission to the pool of land available to grantees. By 1846, the former mission lands and livestock was transferred into the hands of the Californios—they collectively owned about eight million acres of land. The missions only retained their buildings and the priests' gardens.

In 1833, Antonio Chaboya (Chabolla) was among the favored few to receive his grant of Rancho Yerba Buena, also known as Rancho Socavre.

Chaboya's grant was both a blessing and a curse, because maintaining control over such a huge tract of pastureland was nearly impossible for a single family. The rancheros needed many male children, and numerous trusted ranch hands in addition to the reliance upon indigenous native people trapped in a peonage system (a form of slavery) to operate their huge ranchos. The rancho model was functional until the 1846 Bear Flag Revolt when a small group of American settlers in Sonoma proclaimed California an

independent republic and raised the first bear flag over California. This revolt culminated in the Mexican-American War, which Mexico lost and agreed to the terms of the 1848 Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, which transferred California and much territory in the Southwest to the United States.

Mexico lost its control over Alta California, and the era of the huge ranchos was coming to an end.

Unlike most of the rancheros, Chaboya was able to keep control over his tract of land, and the new United States government honored his title to the land, but

it didn't mean he would get the protection he needed to hold on to the land. He filed a claim for Rancho Yerba Buena with the Public Lands Commission in 1852 and received a patent for his property in 1859.


The Chaboya family enjoyed a wealthy lifestyle for a number of years, as they were producing and selling cattle hides for the world wide leather market.

Antonio had a brother, Pedro, who also had a neighboring rancho—not as big—and served as one of the first lawmen in the area while it was under Mexican control.

All bets were off for the Californios and native people when gold was discovered in the Sierra Nevada foothills, an event that brought down the whole Spanish/Mexican system, and created the worst of all conditions for California's indigenous people.

As word of the gold discovery spread round the world like wildfire, tens of thousands of gold seekers and immigrants wanting land overran the Gold Country as well as the coastal



(Continued from page 25) and Bay Area regions. After most of the 49ers failed to make their big strikes, they sought more conventional ways of living - mostly through farming. Huge numbers of white Americans came into the area and tried to buy land. When none was available many squatted on the land of the rancheros. This situation spelled disaster for the Chaboyas.

Even though the Chaboya family had a legitimate right to their land, it meant nothing to the squatters who occupied parts of the rancho. Chaboya tried to follow the proper legal channels to fight the interlopers, but without support from the sheriff and local government, he lost ground and was forced into selling much of his holdings to avoid extended legal battles and to pay the bills for the legal services he needed to defend his right to his property. All together it spelled the end for his rancho.

The tension between the Californios and the new settlers heated up and escalated into a "settlers war" here in the Santa Clara Valley. The Chaboyas had more that 500 squatters on their rancho and Antonio followed the proper legal channels to evict them through the court system. One of the defendants (among some 13 families listed) was John Aborn (Aborn Road), a veteran of the Mexican War as well as the Civil War-and a

very popular man. Among the other squatters was John Tully (Tully Road), who was taken to court by Chaboya in front of Justice McKee (McKee Road). Tully had to pay a \$900 fine and in 1861, was able to purchase some of the Yerba Buena land.

Although the court ruled in favor of the Chaboya family, the squatters organized and protested the evictions. The sheriff, John Murphy, and some 600 deputies were tasked to enforce the removals. All of the deputies refused to take up arms and force the farmers off the Chaboya property. Sheriff Murphy excused them all from their duty, leaving Chaboya high and dry. The protests continued. The Evergreen farmers marched eight miles to San Jose and gathered in St. James Park to contest the evictions. Citizens of Santa Clara County began to come out in support of the squatters and another attempt at eviction created a massive turnout in favor of the "squatters' rights."

The Chaboya family con-

tinued to fight, but the legal expenses mounted and the family had to sell off land to pay for the legal bills. They were land rich and cash poor and had to face the reality and give in to the pressure, avoiding any bloodshed. Antonio Chaboya died in 1865 and his descendants inherited what was left of Rancho Yerba Buena.

In the scheme of things, Chaboya was the exception to the rule because he was able to hold on to his rancho well into the 19th century. Most of California's huge ranchos were chewed to dust by the social changes brought about by California statehood and the Gold Rush.

The Chaboya family remained in the Evergreen area, eventually profiting off the sale of their land by 1875. They took up farming along Quimby Road and lived in peace with their Evergreen neighbors.

The Smith and Stevens families—among the early pioneers of the village of Evergreen-purchased Chaboya's land, sold to them by some of the lawyers who received his land as payment.

And Sheriff Murphy found his reward in marriage to a lovely girl named Maddie—the daughter of John Aborn.

There were descendants of the Chaboya family-Arthur and Mary Chaboya-living in The Villages for almost four decades. Mary recently died, preceeded in death by her husband.

Landscape Maintenance

General Maintenance Schedule (General weeding control, pruning, and cleaning)

A high-level map and up-to-date outline of the vendor's various activities for August can be found at The Villager Online: news.thevillagesgcc.com. The schedule reflects days for mowing, combined mowing/cleaning, cleaning, and detailing. Detailing includes pruning, pulling weeds, and detailing plant material. The contractor has also provided hard pruning maps, which show the locations of different plant material to be hard pruned.

Pest Control

-Treatment for voles, moles, gophers and squirrels—Village Del Lago, Village Sonata, Village Montgomery will occur on 8/25.

Mulching

-On July 29, the Association Board of Directors resolved to not apply any mulch within the first five feet of the perimeter of the condominiums. Mulching will be suspended while management partners with the vendor to discuss how the remaining mulching will be applied.

Fertilizer

-This week the BellaVista Team is applying a fertilizer treatment to the turf areas throughout the community. The fertilizer has been coated with a pre-emergent herbicide, which means it not only nourishes the turf but also helps to prevent the germination of unwanted weeds. Fertilizer provides essential nutrients that support strong root development, improved color, and overall turf health. The added preemergent helps stop weeds before they start, reducing the needs for future treatments and keeping lawns looking neat and uniform.

There will be temporary signage at village entrances where product is being applied.

Association Maintenance

If your village is not listed below, there is not a large-scale project occurring within your community. However, Public Works continues to address ongoing standard maintenance and landscape requests within each village.

Club Maintenance

· Verizon Cell Tower

- -Work began on the cell tower project the week of August 4. Work will be coordinated with tournaments. No work will occur while a tournament is occurring. You may have noticed that a large section of plant material has been removed. This needed to be done as the contractors needed a specific additional area of clearance on both sides of the path to trench and perform other work.
- -Week of 8/18 and 8/25
 - Trench Fiber conduit along the maintenance road.
- Bore PG&E conduit across golf course to point of connection in street.
- Beginning of Verizon Construction (foundations, power, cabinets, fencing,etc.) This will continue through September 19.
- Will not work the days of the tournaments such as August 21.
- There's cows in "them thar hills!"—The Villages will have cattle on site from June 16 through November 2025. The cattle will be grazing in the hill lands to help mitigate fire risks. There will 50 animals with colored ear tags to help distinguish them from Richmond Ranch Cattle.

- · Always keep dogs on leashes.
- Cattle do not like loud noises. If a cow seems aggressive, which is very unlikely, yell or make a loud noise to deter them from approaching you.


