Local student honored at Skills-**USA Workforce Development**

ATLANTA, GA -Career and technical students in Maine won one of the nation's highest awards at the 2025 SkillsUSA Championships, held in Atlanta, on June 25-26. More than 6,500 students competed at the national showcase of career and technical education. The SkillsUSA Championships is the largest skill competition in the world and covers 1.79 million square feet, equivalent to 31 football fields or 41

First place state winners were invited to the event to demonstrate their technical skills, workplace skills and personal skills in 114 hands-on including competitions robotics, automotive technology, drafting, criminal justice, aviation maintenance and public speaking. Industry leaders from 850 businesses, corporations, trade associations and unions planned and evaluated the contestants against their standards for entry-level workers. More than 1,200 industry judges and technical committee members participated this



A total of 1,250 gold, silver and bronze medals were presented to students on Friday night, June 27 at the SkillsUSA Awards Session. Many winners also received industry prizes, tools of their trade or scholarships. The medalists also received a Skill Point Certificate representing workplace readiness in the student's occupational specialty. Students can add the certificate to an employment portfolio. As an indicator of proficiency, Skill Point Certificates were awarded to national contestants who medaled or who met a threshold contest score for their event.

BBB: Tips to be aware of scams

Every day, businesses juggle dozens of tasks. From supervising employees to balancing books, days are jam-packed with details large and small.

Since 2022, Better Business Bureau® (BBB®) has received over 3,600 reports from businesses encountering scams in the course of everyday business.

Stories ranged from light nuisances such as incessant spam emails, to complete disruption, such as scammers holding data for ransom. In nearly every report, fraudsters show little regard for how their schemes could affect the livelihood of countless business owners and their employees.

And the cost is high. Federal agencies report that billions of dollars are lost each year, and the methods used grow in sophistication and number each year. Many businesses expressed dismay when encountering scams, especially those that cost them significant amounts of money. However, there are ways to fight back against scammers.

To help protect businesses, BBB's International Investigations Initiative put together "BBB Study: How impostors, stolen data, and fake services cost businesses billions."

This study is intended to give businesses, news media, researchers and regulatory agencies an in-depth understanding of:

How these scams work

The most common types of business scams.

What businesses can do to protect themselves.
Red flags for busi-

One business owner in Nebraska, David, was looking to buy some equipment for his gas pump repair business. He found a reputable-looking site and decided to purchase over \$20,000 in equipment, including a skid steer and a

bobcat.

Once the money was wired, the seller disappeared. When researching online, he found that the scammer had stolen a real company's website. David never recovered his money.

Linda, another busi-

ness owner in Mississippi, runs a commercial cleaning business with her husband. Someone contacted them, attempting to hire them for a job. The duo agreed, and the customer sent them a check, which they deposited in their bank

Before the job started, the customer asked whether the money had been deposited. When Linda told them it was currently held at her bank, the customer asked for a deposit slip and their banking information to ensure she had actually attempted to deposit it. At this point, Linda knew it was a scam, which was confirmed when the check bounced.

Red flags: Learn these signs

Unknown businesses, government agencies and big-ticket buyers.

Invoices from unexpected emails.

Odd behavior from "known" vendors or businesses.

Requests for gift cards or pre-paid debit card payments.

Urgent demands to renew or obtain licenses or trademarks.

Claims about expiring domain names.

Consultants making big promises about helping your business.

Train employees to recognize scams.

Double-check invoices and payments before sending.

Verify vendor contact information.

Establish payment procedures.

Avoid wire transfers, pre-paid debit cards, and gift cards whenever possible.

Search process for next Lewiston Police Chief begins

LEWISTON, ME put session hosted by City - Lewiston City Administrator Bryan Kaenrath outlined today how the city will begin its search for a new police chief, a process that will include a broad search, community participation and guidance from a community advisory com-

"We are committed to transparency in fulfilling this very important position," Kaenrath said. "As a part of that commitment, we are adding a public input session to this very important conversation." Kaenrath noted that community input plays an important role in shaping the qualities and priorities sought in the next top law enforcement official for the City of Lewiston.

Another key component to the search will be the driven by a five-member Advisory Search Committee. Representing the Advisory Search Committee will be the City Administrator; a representative of Lewiston Public Schools; a representative with a law enforcement background; and two community members reflective of the city's diverse population. The committee will be tasked with helping to review applications and provide feedback throughout the

"As we look ahead, we intend to cast a wide here in Lewiston -- to find a leader who will bring in-

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tegrity, compassion, and sound judgment to the role," said Kaenrath. "One who can further strengthen the trust between the department and the commu-

The decision to name the new Lewiston Police Chief comes at a time when Chief Dave St. Pierre announced his retirement after serving 33 years in the department. "Chief St. Pierre served with great distinction," said Kaenrath. "As Chief St. Pierre concludes his tenure, we are committed to selecting a Chief who can continue advancing the department's work and continue strengthening its role in serving Lewiston."

Under Lewiston's City Charter, the city administrator appoints the police chief.

Seniors Not Acting Their Age **Exploring the Georges Islands by Kayak**

Several years ago, I launched with a group of kayakers from Port Clyde. Parking was a significant problem so I wrote it off as a starting point for kayak trips despite the presence of a couple of exceptional paddling opportunities in the area.

In June, I met a kayak guide who reported that Port Clyde had built a new landing with plenty of parking. I immediately began planning a kayak trip to take advantage of the new facility.

Two outstanding kayak trips conveniently begin from Port Clyde. The first is a traverse north from Port Clyde along the shore and through a series of coastal islands to Spruce Head or possibly beyond. The second is an out-andback paddle through an archipelago called the Georges Islands that extends several miles south towards Monhegan Island.

After identifying a late-July day with light winds, gentle seas, and partly cloudy weather predicted, I extended an invitation for either of the two trips to several of my frequent paddling companions. Nine enthusiastic paddlers quickly responded in the affirmative and expressed a preference for an exploration of the Georges Islands. A trip was on!

When the ten of us met at the spacious new boat landing on a cloudy morning, the weather forecast had worsened overnight. Rain showers were predicted to begin midafternoon followed by steady rain. Fortunately, unlike a common coastal theme this summer, fog was not expected to be in the mix.

Another unexpected obstacle, parking was limited to four hours. We spoke to the harbormaster who graciously agreed to grant us a short exten-

sion but returning within five hours was necessary. We now had a heightened sense of urgency.

Paddling solo sea kayaks, ten of us departed from the landing in calm seas with light winds out of the north. Our immediate goal was to proceed west across Port Clyde Harbor to substantial Hupper Island where the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, John Roberts, currently has a summer home.

After connecting with the Hupper shoreline, we rounded the northern terminus and traversed open water for a long mile to Teel Island. Continuing west beyond Teel, we turned south and passed the small scenic islands of Stone, Ram, and Seavey while enjoying a light tail-

We progressed farther south against an incoming tide maneuvering between McGee and Barter Islands on our right and the rugged Inner Shag Ledges immediately left. Sizeable Thompson Island was next.

Following a substantial channel crossing, we began navigating along the irregular Thompson Island shoreline. A member of the group suggested stopping for lunch at a beach on a tiny islet south of Thompson and north of Davis Strait. Leaving Thompson behind, we weaved through a collection of small islands in narrow twisting channels

until locating the well-concealed beach which was ideal for a respite.

At lunch, we added rain jackets for protection from the expected showers and the light headwind. Emerging west from Davis Strait, we turned north and rode the incoming tide along the west side of Thompson while enjoying views of distant Eastern Egg Rock and Franklin Island in the west.

Once our entourage reached the southern tip of Barter Island, we speculated on whether or not the tide had risen sufficiently to allow us to pass through the attenuated gut between Barter and McGee Islands. The collective decision was to take the gamble. Good fortune was on our side as the eastern end of the picturesque narrows was just filling in when we passed through.

From the gut, we backtracked through the northern Georges Islands while proceeding into a stronger headwind. The first mildly choppy seas of the day were encountered while crossing the wide channel between Teel and Hupper Island.

Once past Hupper, the seas in Port Clyde Harbor were calm for our return to Port Clyde. Showers were just beginning when we disembarked at the landing completing an exceptional day of paddling in one of Maine's most spectacular archipelagos.

country's best actors in its productions.

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Thrills, laughs lurk in Waterville Opera House's Deathtrap


WATERVILLE OPERA HOUSE

WATERVILLE, ME - The Waterville Opera House (WOH) raises the curtain on Deathtrap August 29. The darkly funny thriller by award-winning writer Ira Levin—author of Rosemary's Baby, The Stepford Wives, The Boys from Brazil, and A Kiss Before Dying—dials up the mystery with shocking twists and perplexing turns, and crisp dialogue as razor sharp as the weapons peppering the set.

"At first glance, Ira Levin's Deathtrap is a sharp, witty thriller—a play about a playwright plotting the 'perfect' play. But beneath its clever twists and rapid-fire humor, it's also a sly conversation about ambition, trust, and the blurred line between truth and fiction," said Beth Lambert, returning to the director's chair at WOH after the sold-out spring run of Roald Dahl's Matilda the Musical. "Keep your eyes open, your wits sharp, and enjoy the ride—because in Deathtrap, the moment you think you've figured it out... you haven't."

Deathtrap premiered on Broadway in 1978, receiving four Tony nominations. To this day, it holds the record for the longest-running dy-thriller in Broadway history. Fans of Levin's work or of previous WOH thrillers like Clue, Miss Holmes, and Murder on the Orient Express will have some idea of what they're getting into. Just as Waterville audiences prepare to settle into the routine of a new school year, the Opera House is ready to pull them back to the edge of their seats.

"Bringing Deathtrap to the stage has been a joy," Lambert said. "Our cast has embraced the balancing act this play demands: keeping the tension razor-sharp while savoring the humor woven through every scene. Our crew has worked magic with sets, costumes, and lighting to create a space where





The Waterville Opera House is continuing to up the ante for its community theatre productions. Deathtrap is the third show in the 2025 season, which began with crowd-pleasers The Cottage in January and Matilda in the spring, and concludes in November with a three-week run of Irving Berlin's White Christmas. As WOH prepares to announce its 2026 season, which will include a world premiere as part of the American Association of Community Theatre's NewPlayFest, the cast and creative team reflect on the latest peak in the Opera House's continuing upward trajectory.

"I said at my first rehearsal how impressed I was by the level of professionalism that the Opera House brings to the table," said actress Cherie Champe, playing the role of Helga in Deathtrap. "It's been many a curtain, many a year, since I've actually been on that stage, but the Waterville Opera House now in 2025: This is professional. It's legitimate. It's as real as it gets. What an honor."

that she could never could have imagined. Emily went on to become a Licensed Clinical Social Worker, get her Doctorate in Social Work, and teach college classes, all as a mother of three. Today, as the Principal Investigator for Behavioral Health Workforce Initiatives at the Catherine Cutler Institute at the University of Southern Maine, Emily oversees MHRT-related certifications and training initiatives across the state. As she reflects on her path, she sees her time as an MHRT-I as pivotal.



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
Low Tide: Landscape paintings by Clara Yim Bolduc

LEWISTON, ME-

If art is simultaneously a process of creating and exploring, Auburn artist Clara Yim Bolduc leans towards exploration. Painting, she says, is an act of discovery for her, less about self-expression and more about her efforts to understand the world around her. Visitors to Lewiston's LA Arts Gallery will undoubtedly feel a sense of intimacy as they seek meaning in the familiar yet arresting images that comprise Yim Bolduc's Low Tide, an exhibition of landscape paintings opening on Friday, August 29th.

In this debut exhibition, Yim Bolduc presents 17 new paintings that challenge the traditional representation of the Maine landscape. Primarily utilizing a large scale (36"x48") vertical format, and a contrast of textures, media, and styles within each piece, she invites the viewer to experience each painting with the excitement and immediacy of a newly discovered landscape.

"Maine landscape painting has an extensive, rich history, and this creates baggage, both for the artist and the viewer. You go somewhere beautiful and iconic, like Acadia National Park, and your experience is shaped by the images you've already seen, prob-

ably mostly photos online, and everything about these images – the lighting, the composition, the color palette - is shaped, in turn, by this long artistic tradition of how we see the Maine coast.

"I want my viewer to escape all that, and to feel the thrill of discovery; the feeling that they're seeing something for the first time, and really experiencing it, without the integrating effects of a camera filter or the unifying effects of a computer screen." – Clara Yim Bolduc
