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

There were two slates of candidates speaking at the forum: San Jose City Council District 8 and California Assembly District 27. The venue for the forum was the Evergreen Community Center, which was sponsored by District 8 Roundtable. The League of Women Voters determined the final questions and the order in which the candidates spoke.

San Jose City Council District 8

San Jose City Council District 8 candidates participating in the event included: Sylvia Arenas, Joshua Barousse, Denise Belisle, Jimmy Nguyen, and Pat Waite.

Here are the questions and answers for each City Council District 8 candidate. The responses are listed in the order in which they spoke, which was determined by Gloria Chun Hoo, representing the League of Women Voters.

The answers for each question are verbatim, without editing of syntax or grammar. The transcripts have been checked for accuracy by the staff of the Evergreen Times.

FIRST INSTALLMENT

Editor's note: This is the first installment of the candidates' responses. The second installment will be published in the April 29th issue of the Evergreen Times.

What do you think the City should do to improve traffic safety and congestion during commute hours? (Reminder: answers are unedited)

Joshua Barousse: "As I mentioned, my top priorities, when I mentioned education,

I've actually met with both the superintendents of both the Evergreen School District and the Eastside Union High School District. There are traffic



concerns at both these school districts. The first thing that both mentioned was to make sure we have mechanisms in place to enforce traffic around schools. Knowing that a lot of our schools, especially in front of Evergreen Valley High School, they are on main thoroughfares, and they finally put in a pedestrian crosswalk. It's a big issue making sure we're able to restore public safety and backfill the vacant positions in our police department. Once public safety is restored, we can restore the traffic enforcement unit, making sure they are out there enforcing traffic. Now, as far as traffic congestion, yes, the harsh reality is that Evergreen is so much a bedroom community, it is hard to get out in the morning and hard to get back in the evening and that's a major concern. It's important that we invest in metered lights

and extra lanes to help with the flow of traffic in order to plan for growth."

Jimmy Nguyen: "Walking the precincts, I talked to a lot of residents who complain

about the same thing, and I think most of you agree we have people who are speeding and driving recklessly in our district. You can also tell by the memori-

als that were victims that this is a huge problem in Evergreen. One of my team members found a statistic online that San Jose, excuse me, is it Vision Zero?...it's a traffic study by San Jose that found that roughly 50 kids under the age of 15 are either injured or fatally hit by a car every year in San Jose for the last 30 something years. You can also, like I said, all those memorials for people driving recklessly, all those victims of people driving recklessly. What we can do about it? Traffic enforcement. Because of our weak budget, the police are focused more on serious crimes and not ticketing people who are speeding in our neighborhoods. So that's one thing that I would make a priority.

Pat Waite: "One of the best things that we can do to improve congestion and traffic

around the schools is to get the School District to re-implebussing. ment There is a Conga line of cars around my neighborhood every morning to get the kids to



school, because Evergreen School District doesn't run busses for everybody. So, that makes for more traffic through there, and that's not a good thing. So, I would like to work with the School District to help them understand how they can better accomplish that goal and get the kids out of their parent's cars and into busses. Regarding the speeding and the deaths that are happening out there, we need to get the traffic enforcement unit expanded so that there are more officers out there to remind us what the legal speed limit is. Without that, we're going to continue to see cars crashing down Silver Creek Valley Road, and we're going to continue to see joggers run over by people speeding on Yerba Buena, because kids will be kids, and idiots will be idiots."

Evergreen School celebrates 60 year anniversary

Publisher Several hundred parents and students celebrated the 60th anniversary of Evergreen School on Fowler Rd. by traveling back in time, on Sunday April 10.

The event theme was exploring the 1950's, the decade the school opened, with interactive displays, activities, and performances provided by Evergreen students, staff, and families.

In 1955, Evergreen Elementary School opened on Fowler Road. The oldest school and namesake of the district, it was located at two previous locations in Evergreen Valley dating back to the 1800's.

Santa Clara County Supervisor Board President, Dave Cortese, spoke at the event explaining that he attended Evergreen School the year it opened on Fowler Rd.

Cortese presented a proclamation to the school from the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors, "recognizing Evergreen Elementary School for the significant impact in education it has made for the last 60 years, and will continue to make far into the future."

"I will be 60 years old this June and I attended this school when it opened as a kindergartener," said Cortese. "I'm impressed with all of the research the students came up with and the displays highlighting the 1950's, just like 'Back to the Future."

Cortese said that when he attended Evergreen School the buildings were sur-

Ashritha Eswaran of Evergreen competes in U.S. Women's Chess Championship

Vergreen Valley chess champion Ashritha Eswaran, 15, has been invited to the invitation-only 2016 U.S. Women's Chess Championship in St. Louis for the second year in a row this week.

Only the top 12 of the nation's best female chess players are invited to participate in the prestigious event. In 2014, she was the youngest player and won a prize for the Best Game of the Tournament, had three wins, and was the youngest and lowest-rated player in the tournament.

Eswaran began playing chess when she turned seven, and at 13, she received her National Master title. Her ratings have risen rapidly, in January 2010, she had a rating of 650 and by Feb. 2014, she became Candidate Master. She received training first at the NorCal House of

Chess and then with Bulgarian GM Dejan Bojkov.

In June 2015, Eswaran won first place in the U.S. Girls Junior Championship in Tulsa, Oklahoma despite being lowest seed. She won with a 6.5/9 and qualified to play in the 2016 US Women's Championship. The very next day, she flew to

Cali, Colombia for the 2015 Pan American Youth Chess Championship, where she tied for first place, but ended up getting the Bronze through a tie break in Girls Under 18 section.

In August of 2015, Eswaran won first place at the Pam Am in El Salvador, and received title of Woman International Master. This year in February, Eswaran played and came in an impressive third in the incredibly competitive American Continental Women's Championship in Lima, Peru.

Eswaran is also a part of the "Young Stars - Team USA" program which is sponsored by the Kasparov Chess Foundation (KCF) and the Chess Club & Scholastic Center of Saint Louis (CCSCSL). Other accomplishments throughout her career: All-Girls National Championship U12 (2012) and again in 2013 in U14 section. She played in the World Youth Championships four times from 2012-2015.

Hayes built a national staff of 85 to promote events across the land. April 22, falling between Spring Break and Final Exams, was selected as the date.

In these days and times, there is no excuse for littering or illegal trash dumping in developed countries. There are proper places and procedures in place to get rid of unwanted material and waste. Littering and dumping causes problems with groundwater contamination, animal poisoning, and brings down property values. It is an eye sore that clogs drainage systems, blocks walkways, and can create health and fire hazards. Litter can also hamper economic development of a community. When new businesses look for a dynamic growing community where their businesses can grow, they would hardly be interested in setting up new ventures, if they see a lot of litter around. Help us make Evergreen look like the place new businesses want to be! If you've never been involved with a litter

pickup, it's time to experience the pride you have in your community and join us! By

seeing neighbors working together, cleaning up their streets and neighborhoods, we show our community that we care what about what happens to our environment.

Many times illegal dumping happens when residents have large items they want or need to get rid of but don't want to pay dump fees. In case you didn't know, the City of San Jose has been conducting a pilot program for large item trash. The Large Item Collection Pilot Program allows a San José resringle femily home to schedule

ident in a single-family home to schedule one large item collection (for up to three items) at no extra cost through June 30, 2016. With large item collection, you may leave up to three items at the curb, which will be picked up by your recycling collection company. Large items include mattresses, sofas, refrigerators, tires, and more. To take advantage of large item collection, call and schedule a pick up date with your recycling collection company. For downtown, north, east, and south San José, call California Waste Solutions at (408) 213-7800.

This is a pilot program so make sure you take advantage of the benefit of a free pickup of large, unwanted items before the end date. The more items that are picked up, the more likely the pilot program will be considered a success and possibly continue as a regular program.

And in case you haven't uploaded the free San Jose Clean smartphone app for reporting blight, go to the app store and download it today. There are several categories of blight that you can report. Beginning with the graffiti options you can help describe and take a picture of the location of the graffiti. Under the park options, you can report problems with landscape maintenance, playground equipment, irrigation, lights, restrooms, drinking fountains or other issues. The litter option asks you to describe whether it is on private property, on the street, or a vacant lot. You can also select to receive a status update of your blight reporting and/or connect directly with any councilmember through the app. If you don't have a smartphone, you can still report blight to the Anti-graffiti and Litter Program by calling 408-277-3208 or toll free at 866-249-0543 or by email at antigraffiti@sanjoseca.gov.

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Animal Fund helps surrendered pets get needed medical care

Silicon Valley Pet Project has provided critical medical care for the rescue animals it fosters for adoption.

Now the nonprofit has a fund to provide for those animals most in need of healing.

The Animal Fund provides grants of up to \$500 for medical treatment of cats and dogs surrendered by their owners to the San Jose Animal Care Center.

The Animal Fund was set up in memory of Erik Fong's first dog, which was named after the character Animal on "The Muppet Show." Fong, a candidate for the District 6 city council seat, established the fund with a "generous gift," says Pet Project vice president Vivian O'Connell.

The first rescue animal to benefit from the fund is Cappucino, a 9-year-old male Pomeranian mix who was surrendered to the shelter with matted fur and a leg that was fractured two years earlier and never treated.

"When we had him examined by a veterinarian, we discovered he needed many teeth extracted and had really suffered from neglect," O'Connell says.

Since then, Cappucino has received the medical treatment needed to get in shape and be adopted.

Similar to the current program at Yale University, in which teachers from San Jose spend several weeks collaborating and training with university professors to develop content-driven curriculum, the local San Jose Teacher's Initiative will help Bay Area teachers develop a curriculum that will continue to revitalize and complement classroom instruction.

The program is designed to help teachers become core leaders within their schools and the school districts they serve.

Ms. Vitug and the San Jose Yale National Initiative Steering Committee are seeking partnerships with universities in the Bay Area to continue the Teacher's Initiative program and establish a local Teacher's Institute. Their goal is to bridge the gap between uni-

Evergreen Valley College drops housing plans

E vergreen Valley College threw in the towel last week wiping out its controversial plans to build up to 400 apartments on 27 acres of college land that local students and residents say should be used to improve academics.

An application was filed at City Hall to change the land use of the parcel -- from its "quasi-public" designation to neighborhood community commercial. The proposal is headed to City Council in the fall, although someone checked the wrong box designated "mixed use."

The land next to Evergreen Valley College, designated surplus by the college, is a part of a 27-acre parcel that is at the center versities and K-12 education with the support and assistance of university professors.

This has become a multi-district endeavor with support from Chris Funk, East Side Union High School District Superintendent, Juan Cruz, Franklin-McKinley School District Superintendent, and Nancy Albarran, San Jose Unified School District Superintendent.

"This would be a first in the West Coast, and we hope to partner with a university in the Bay Area to create the first Teacher's Institute on the West Coast," said Ms. Vitug, Yale National Initiative Fellow and San Jose Yale National Initiative City Representative. "There is so much interest from our local teachers and a real need to establish these valuable collaborations. I'm excited at the possibilities. Not only would our teachers benefit, but most importantly, our students would be the true winners."

of one of the hottest land-use battles in the city.

A majority of Evergreen residents and District 8 San Jose Council candidates oppose the project because they believe the proposal will have a negative impact on traffic, schools, and the morale of Evergreen Valley College students and faculty.

San Jose City Council candidate Pat Waite isn't pleased with the project. "There's a fundamental reason why 18,000 college students commute daily from Evergreen Valley to attend alternative colleges, such as DeAnza and West Valley," he said. "Until the College trustees offer a college that we can be proud of, the 27-acre property development proposal should be denied."

Without the housing component, the proposal stands a better chance of gaining approval by the council, but that is not a certainty. Republic Urban Properties was the lone bidder, which some say is unusual.

The development originally called for up to 250 market-rate apartments and up to 150 senior apartments, along with 40,000 square feet of retail, 40,000 sq. ft. designated for offices, gym and an aquatics center.

Please help Santa Clara County house its homeless veterans

ony Harrison served five years in the U.S. Army, and was stationed in the

U.S. and abroad, including Iraq. His life was going pretty well when he was discharged in 2006. He bought a condo and had a good job. And then when the economy crashed, everything started to unravel.

He had to short sell his home, he lost his job and, in his words, "things just crashed."

He rented a room for \$500 until the rent was raised to \$800, and he could no longer afford it. Even though he had a security job at the time, he had to start living out of his car. After he learned he may qualify for a

Veterans Administration housing voucher, Tony began to see a glimmer of hope.

His Veterans Administration Supportive Housing application was accepted, so armed with a monthly stipend, he began to look for an apartment. In two months, he filled out 26 applications. Some property managers put him on a waiting list, and 16 others charged a fee for processing the applications, ranging from \$25 to \$50 each. He was turned down 26 times.

In September 2015, the day before the voucher was to expire, a property owner rent-

ed him a two-bedroom apartment in South San Jose, providing him, "a place to come home to."

His experience as a homeless veteran also led him to his new job with the San Jose Downtown Streets Team, a nonprofit that helps homeless people get back on their feet through employment and housing. Part of his job is to approach landlords, talking to them about giving homeless people a chance to live under a roof and turn their lives around.

"When you've been through something like this and you have a chance to help other people, you're happy to do it," he said. "You've been there and you don't want anyone to feel the way you felt."

In November 2015, the County and the City of San Jose launched "All the Way Home," a campaign run by Destination: Home to house the 703 veterans who are without permanent housing, according to the 2015 Homeless Census. Like Tony, 260 of them have housing vouchers but, in today's competitive market, cannot find a place to rent.

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

For the nation, Tax Freedom Day falls on April 24, and it's the day in which we've earned enough to foot America's \$4.99 trillion 2016 tax bill (that's 31 percent of the national income), according to the Tax Foundation, a nonpartisan tax research organization.

In California, residents will earn enough to pay their tax bill on April 30. In some states -

including New York, Connecticut, New Jersey and Massachusetts - residents will have to work through May before they achieve tax freedom. That's largely because these are higher tax and higher income states. In others - like Mississippi, Tennessee and Alabama residents have already achieved tax freedom.

The earliest ever Tax Freedom Day came on January 22 in the year 1900, when Americans paid just 5.9 percent of their income in taxes. The latest was on May 1, 2000, when tax payers paid 33 percent.

many. And so I think we need to really adopt this "Vision Zero" which is an infrastructure that will do assists, incidents in fatalities that are optimum related to zero, optimum to zero. It doesn't happen quickly, but it is over time. And we can use smart technology that will let us know how to help mitigate traffic. We have "Walk and Roll" program in our schools...and they are really fantastic. We have healthy choice options in our schools, but we really need to look at infrastructure for traffic safety.

If elected, what changes would you propose to address the chronic homeless issue facing the city of San Jose? (Reminder: answers are unedited)

Jimmy Nguyen: "Currently the City of San Jose has gone a housing first method of addressing the homeless problem. It's where anyone whose homeless you try to house them first and then you send in social workers to find out what their problem is why they're homeless, where it be mental illness or some financial catastrophe, whatever it is. Housing first, stabilize them, and then help them get into paying jobs contributing members of society."

Sylvia Arenas: "This is such a huge issue and there's so many needs in our homeless community. You have vets to think about, there are folks who have mental illness issues. It's not just homeless. Being homeless is not the only issue they are facing. They are facing how to adjust medications, where to get medications, how to maintain a healthy mental health. So we really need to look at wrap around service, a comprehensive look. If you give somebody a home and they've never and they haven't been used to a home for a while, you really, we really could be setting them up for not the best success for the situation. So I think we need to have a multi-layer approach for homelessness. What we really need to look at what are the issues that our homeless community are facing. For example in our Evergreen School district we have folks that just cannot afford an apartment, so they are living in their cars."

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that it would be very important that we narrow our homeless issues that the police have to address and have to go out on calls. I think it would be very helpful to bring a county health worker, possibly a mental health worker to determine if they need mental health treatment or know so they are able to analyze and access what this homeless person's situation is and deal accordingly. So for example if they are in need of medications and they can't get medications then that social worker, that mental health worker will be able to work with the police, help train the police to understand the things that need to be assessed so they can decide what to do with this particular homeless person, whether it's mental, whether it's physical. So I see this as a full wrap around service approach where they can have case workers on site at these transitional housing facilities in order to provide services, and essentially serve as a "one-stop" to help them transition them back. I also support micro or container housing. This is housing that can be manufactured off-site and brought in to be used for transitional housing. And that's the approach I would use to transition homeless back into our communities."

Pat Waite: So, Josh correctly pointed out that it's a tragedy that one of the richest and most creative parts of the world we struggle with this, and it has been a struggle for centuries, it's not unique to us. What has been talked about are the band aids necessary to deal with it today, but that doesn't stop the staunch the bleeding that creates it tomorrow and the next, and the next century, and the next...and we need to focus on that too. We need to make sure that we're providing the kids and our school system, our children and our grandchildren, the opportunity to get the education that they need so that they can be

successful members of society, so they'll have the skills to participate in the job market of tomorrow. We also need to create a San Jose that attracts businesses instead of scaring them away....where it's easy to start a business and easy to hire people so that there's more jobs for the people who are capable...so that people who find themselves homeless because they have temporarily lost their jobs have another one to go to. We need to focus on the root cause as well as the outcome."

The land of Evergreen Valley College has been leased to a private developer for 95 years. (Reminder: answers are unedited)

Denise Belisle: "So you're referring to the 27 acres is that what the question is about? We'll you must all probably know, the 27 acres, it was decided that there was not going to be housing put on it and I know that that was very, very, very much a concern for everyone as far as they did not want housing on that property. I think that the school Evergreen Valley College in this district hasn't done a really great job of community outreach and I think there's a lot of misinformation out there. I think there's a lot of anger and resentment about what's going on in the school and at the board level. And I think that before I comment on what I think should happen, I think that the community needs to be more involved, and get more input and have some more information provided by the new Chancellor, because I think that I've heard good things about her and I heard she is trying to make everyone made aware of what the plan is which I think really nothing is written in stone at this point in time."

Pat Waite: "I think Sandi Randles put it best in an op ed that ran in the paper the other day. This community deserves a community college that we can be proud of. Now I don't know if that fits in the footprint we have now. I don't know if it needs another 27 acres. I don't know if it needs another 127 acres. But I do know that there's a reason that 18,000 kids a day drive out this area to go to DeAnza, or West Valley, or some of the other alternatives out there. So until the school can prove to the community that we have a program that we can be proud to send our kids to, and that the counselors at the local high schools can be proud to recommend their students go look at as an alternative, then no, they should not be doing anything with that property until that point in time. It's also a great way to reduce carbon emissions, get rid of those 18,000 commutes, and also to mitigate the cost of college. Community college is a great way to start your education.

Sylvia Arenas: "Open space is really important. It really adds to the quality of life of our families. It creates a sense of community for us. And so I think it is important to us to preserve it and protect it. I agree with Ms. Belisle I think there is some misinformation about what this development is going to look like. And I think we have a very strong community, a very strong voice than can provide the direction that we want. And I think there are two issues here. One is the issue of the open space and what to do with it, and should it be set up for retail. or not? And the other is the quality of education that the college is offering our students and why aren't more students attending school right in their backyard. So I think we should look at those issues and hold Evergreen accountable for both separately."

Jimmy Nguyen: "I've had some conversations with residents and there's one gentleman in particular back there, his name is Glen Wetzel. What do we do with this land? We have enough land to provide a quality higher education offering for our students in this area. I don't think so. Gentleman over here asked me how I feel about it earlier, and I didn't want to give him a final answer, but now I am on the spot. How much room do we have for retail? How much room do we have for higher education? So if I voted today, then no, I wouldn't allow the zoning to change."

Joshua Barousse: "I also believe that if there's any development on that parcel that it should be an extension of the college campus. I also see it as an equity issue. Why do 18,000 community college students here in our district that are residing in the Evergreen Community College district boundaries have to drive across town to attend community college classes? We should be investing in our local community, and also reducing our carbon footprint, and also invest in the enrichment of future opportunities for our students. And no, I currently oppose the current submitted application."

Do you support a Police Civilian Review Board for our City, and why? (LRQ) (Reminder: answers are unedited)

Pat Waite: "Yes, because I believe a certain degree of oversight is important to maintaining the safety of our community and the behavior of our police officers."

Joshua Barousse: "Yes, I already served on one and it's called 'independent police auditor advisory committee' and I served on it for the last four years and I think it's essential."

Denise Belisle: "Yes, I believe there needs to be more accountability and transparency in the process."

Jimmy Nguyen: "Yes."

Sylvia Arenas: "Transparency is important it creates faith in our police department.

Tell us your plans to stop Human Trafficking in San Jose? (Reminder: answers are unedited)

Pat Waite: "It's sad that we live in a society where people take advantage of others like that. All we can do is work very hard to enforce; you can do it through entrapment, you can do it through decoys, because it is unfair that people are being taken advantage of."

Joshua Barousse: "Right and I concur, as we need to add funding to the police department including the human trafficking unit as well. As right now there is only one officer who is actually in the human trafficking unit. There are two task forces working with Councilman Kharla. And the other thing about human trafficking in more recent times the new phase of human trafficking is wage theft. They are in the back of kitchens. They are not getting the wages they deserve, so we need inspections in these restaurants, and the police need more patrols."

Jimmy Nguyen: "I believe there's an existing human trafficking unit with the...in relation of what you said, as you said, the Super Bowl, the FBI, county sheriffs and other local law enforcement had success busting some people who traffic in humans. So, I don't think we need to reinvent the wheel we have the existing infrastructure for that and I think everyone here would agree we should support that instead of inventing a new solution."

Sylvia Arenas: Human trafficking comes in many different ways. This is an example of something that you would never think about as human trafficking. And we've all seen folks selling fresh produce on the corners, right, really love some of those Mangos, but unfortunately some of those workers are part of a human trafficking site. So they are forced to work and forced to sell produce and some of us really think they are there to make a living, but they are really there because they need to pay back housing or other expenses and I really think that it's an economic development issue that we need to offer a variety of options for or youth and for folks who are in the vocational settings as well as augment."

Denise Belisle: "I think again it all comes back to our police, our law enforcement. Having more funds to be able to hire, hire these kinds of units to be able to address this problem. I just think we don't have enough police, we just don't have enough people to help address these issues of human trafficking and prostitution and when it happens it's very sad and it's something that every city probably has to deal with but I especially think that it's something that we all need to pay attention to." California Assembly District 27 California Assembly District 27 candidates participating in the event were Coung Do, Esau Herrera, Ash Kalra, Van Le, and Madison Nguyen. (District 27 candidates Darcie Green, and Andres Quintero did not participate in the forum.)

Editor's note: Due to space limitations, here are the opening remarks from each of the District 27 candidates.

Coung Do – Do said: "We need to improve the job market, we need more public transportation, and we need affordable housing." Do is a software engineer.

Esau Herrera — Herrera said: "My platform is straightforward and far-reaching; Green jobs and more jobs, strong schools and safe neighborhoods. Green jobs will employ graduating students." Herrera is an attorney and also serves as a trustee for the Alum Rock Union School District Board.

Ash Kalra – Ash said: "Transportation is a major concern, housing needs to be more affordable, and we need to address homelessness in Silicon Valley." Ash Kalra serves on the San Jose City Council District 2.

Madison Nguyen – Nguyen said: "Education needs to be more affordable, including universal pre-K. "I want a UC campus to be located in San Jose. We need higher wage jobs, reduce regulations, and bring new businesses to California." Nguyen served on the San Jose City Council from 2011 to 2015.

Van Le – Le said: "Education including vocational training needs to be a top priority, and also safety. I want to give back to the community and that is why I serve on the school board." Le is a business owner and serves as trustee for the East Side Union High School District Board.



Evergreen students participate in reclassification celebration

Times staff reporter vergreen School District hosted its 10th annual district reclassification celebration at Quimby Oak Middle School on April 6.

The School District's re-classification program for English learners prepared hundreds of students to meet reclassification criteria.

The celebration marks the exit of the students from the English learner program and becoming proficient in English, their second language.

"We honored 539 students who have worked very hard to be reclassified as English Proficient students," said Denise Williams, Director of Instruction. "These students have demonstrated proficiency in reading and writing of the English language comparable to that of a native speaker in their same grade level. They now have a great advantage over their peers, bilingual, which makes them awesome kids."

The Reclassification Celebration not only is an opportunity for building the school community, and celebrating success, but marks the beginning for students to read, speak, and write about more contextualize concepts and topics and do so by using the more formal language structures and functions.

Each student must pass the California English Language Development Test, create a proficient writing sample, learn English Language Arts and English Language Development standards, have their report card grades reviewed, pass a standardized assessment determined by the district and be assessed on a language proficiency rubric.



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
