



ABOD President's Message—August 26, 2025

Welcome everyone to the Association Board of Directors August 2025 meeting. I would like to thank all the DACs for the excellent turnout for the All-DAC meeting last Monday as well as the individual DAC landscape meetings last Wednesday through Friday. A special thanks to Vice President Pat Reardon for attending all 11 meetings over those three days and for knowing everything there is to know about the 32 landscaping and fire hardening projects being done in The Villages. While I only was able to make it to seven of the meetings, it was eye opening to see the vast variety of differing concerns put forth by each DAC. Now the projects are resting in the hands of Ryan Bell to firm up the details and move them along in the process.

Good news for three of our residents. They were able to obtain the needed insurance coverage for their solar systems so all three can move along and hopefully start their installation. What used to be easy is now much more difficult due to changes in the insurance market. If anyone is thinking of installing solar, please contact Elissa at the corporation yard and she can give you the information needed in order to obtain the proper insurance coverage. It may be the most difficult step in the process so be sure to seek that coverage first before signing an installation contract with a solar company. We are still looking forward to trying to come up with other alternatives but for now the insurance requirement is still in place.

One thing I would also like to point out is if anyone is installing a video doorbell or installing a charging station for their car, even in their own garage, both installations require approval of the Architectural Committee in advance. If you have already done either of these without approval, you can file a retroactive application in order to get properly approved. Video doorbells are reviewed for privacy concerns and charging stations are reviewed for proper installation by a licensed electrician.



Bylaws Committee—Key Initiatives

The Villages needs additional revenue just to maintain existing Club facilities. To address this need, the Club Board formed the FY26 Ad Hoc Bylaws Committee to review and propose updates to the Club Bylaws. The current bylaws have remained unchanged since 2006. The revised bylaws may include a Club Initiation Fee that will be paid by new buyers to reduce future dues increases. Without

new revenue we will pay our bills through increases in Club dues, special assessments, and/or loans, paid by current residents.

The committee plans to address the following major issues to bring our bylaws up to date with current law and governance best practices. All proposed amendments will be subject to a vote by the membership.

BYLAWS

1. Terminology

The Club collects Dues for operation and capital expenses not Assessments.

2. Definition of Capital Expenses

Clearly define the difference between Capital Improvement and Capital Replacement.

3. Electronic Voting

Allow electronic voting to save money, time, and trees.

4. New Source of Revenue

Allow the Club Board to create a new source of revenue to keep our monthly Dues as low as possible. One possibility is to require a Club Initiation Fee paid by buyers when they purchase a home at The Villages.

5. Capital Fund Limitations

Simplify the capital fund program. Replace the existing limitations on capital improvement funding with specific criteria of a Membership vote on major new facilities and refurbishments.

Club Board President's Message—August 26, 2025

This month brings together two major milestones: the conclusion of our Residents/Member Survey and the release of our Capital Project Plan.

Management expert W. Edwards Deming aptly said, "Without data, you're just another person with an opinion." Guided by this principle, the primary goal of the survey was to gather meaningful feedback on residents' preferences and expectations for both the Club and the wider community.

In collaboration with the McMahon Group, an established private club consulting firm, we conducted seven focus groups, each lasting 90 minutes, involving more than 140 Villagers. Their input helped shape the survey's focus areas. The questions themselves were developed by independent experts to ensure objectivity and neutrality throughout the process.

To everyone who participated: Thank you. Your responses are critical in shaping our priorities and ensuring our actions are aligned with the community's collective interests.

The newly published Capital Project Plan compiles information from a range of sources, offering a clear overview of upcoming projects, estimated costs, and expected timelines. We hope you find it both accessible and informative. Please note that this document will continue to evolve as we incorporate new insights from the survey and conduct further reviews of our infrastructure.

We are aware of recent claims linking increased Club dues to a rise in home listings within The Villages. However, the data tells a different story. According to Realtor.com, the San Jose-Sunnyvale-Santa Clara metro area has experienced a 39% year-over-year increase in active listings, with homes now spending an average of 34 days on the market, the second highest figure since 2016. This trend reflects broader market dynamics seen across the state and nation, not just within our community.



Annual Association Smoke, CO Detectors and Insurance Compliance

Starting the first week of September, we will be conducting the annual Statement of Compliance for Association policies. This is a routine but critical safety measure to ensure homes are equipped with working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and insurance. The completed form may either be mailed or be dropped off into the deposit box located in the parking lot just outside of Building A. The deadline to complete and return the Statement of Compliance form is on or before October 10, 2025. (See article page 30).

The Violation Process: What to Expect

When a potential violation is identified, our process is designed to be fair and simple. Here's a breakdown of the steps:

- 1. Notification: If your unit is found to be in violation of a community standard, a formal notice will be sent to you. This notice clearly outlines the specific violation, references the relevant rule, and provides a timeframe for you to address the matter. Contact information is also provided so residents can easily reach out with any questions.
- 2. Ample Time to Address: The initial timeframe provided is designed to give residents plenty of time to resolve the issue. Whether it's relocating an item from the common area or removing storage from a carport, we want to give you a reasonable opportunity to address any violations that have been observed.
- 3. Extensions are Available: We understand that sometimes the unexpected occurs and you might need more time due to personal circumstances. If you need more time to resolve a violation, please don't hesitate to reach out. I am always happy to work with you to provide an extension. The sooner we connect, the better we can find a solution that works for everyone.

Changes coming to laundry rooms in Cribari, Montgomery and Hermosa

The Villages was informed that CSC ServiceWorks, the company that provides the laundry room machines, will be making technology updates to the washers and dryers over the next few months.

As part of these improvements, the machines will no longer use coins. Instead, CSC is upgrading its mobile app to make it easier to use. However, you do not need a smartphone to do your laundry.

For those who prefer not to use the app or do not have a smartphone, a simple pay station will be added in each laundry room. This pay station will allow you to use a credit or debit card to start the machines—just like using a card at the grocery store.

These updates are designed to make doing laundry more convenient. More information will be shared as the changes get closer.

Are your assets in your Trust?

Recently, a Villager (V) sold his vacation home and received a hefty check from the title company. He took it to his primary bank and the bank refused to accept the check for deposit to his account. In a huff, he took it to a credit union where he has another account. Again, the deposit

Why would financial institutions refuse a deposit? It was refused because the check was made out to the Villager's Living Trust and both bank accounts are in his name alone - not the name of his Living Trust.

V took the check back to the Title Company and requested a new check made out to him personally. The Title Company refused because the deed to the vacation home had been in the name of the Trust - i.e. the Trust had been the owner of the property and was the seller.

SRS inquired what property the Villager had put into the Trust and got a blank stare. His Living Trust provisions apply only to property that is actually owned by his Trust. His attorney had changed the deed to his condo and his vacation home making the Living Trust the owner. Along with the Trust document, the attorney had included written instructions to V about changing the title to his brokerage and other financial accounts. V meant to follow the instructions, but never got around to doing it.

If you have paid to create a Living Trust, have you followed through and made sure your financial assets are in your Trust? If you can answer "Yes" - great job.

If you haven't gotten around to doing it, what does all this mean for you?

Under current California Probate law, if the total of real and personal property (not including motor vehicles, motor homes, and certain other items) owned by only one individual is more than \$184,500, then a Probate proceeding is required in order to pass one's estate to heirs after death. V's bank and stock accounts amounted to more than \$1,000,000. Unless ownership of these assets is transferred to the Trust while he is still alive, part of his estate will have to go through Probate.

Remember, one of the purposes of creating a Living Trust is to simplify and avoid the cost and time of probate. In V's case, if he does not move his assets into his Trust, upon his death there will be two tax entities created: a Trust for the real estate and a probate Estate for the brokerage and bank accounts. This will require two tax identification numbers and two 1041 fiduciary income

Remember the old Doublemint Gum jingle, "Double your pleasure, double your fun?" The tax and legal people will go around singing "Double the clients, double the fees." You don't want this to happen to your estate.


Opera Lovers to return in September with 'Porgy and Bess'





Senior Academy: See another side of the City by the Bay



If you have ever left your heart in San Francisco (and even if you haven't), you're sure to enjoy Senior Academy's first presentation of "The Fall, The Star, The Saint and The City-How Sam Brannan's Newspaper Heralded the Gold Rush and Created San Francisco."

It is a little-known factual account of how Sam Brannan led Mormon refugees to California in 1846 and colonized Yerba Buena (which they renamed San Francisco), how his newspaper—The California Star—broke the news about the discovery of gold at Sutter's Mill, and how he argued that San Francisco should become the Mormon capitol instead of Salt Lake City and instigating a contentious relationship with Mormon leader Brigham Young. There is an additional focus on the historymaking Sam Brannan, little-known and largely overlooked in the incredible story of California.



PICKLEBALL

The History of Pickleball—Backyard Beginnings

Pickleball, the quirky game invented on Bainbridge Island, Washington, in 1965, has exploded into one of the fastest-growing sports worldwide. What started as a summer boredom hack has become a global cultural and athletic phenomenon.

Backyard Beginnings—In the summer of 1965, friends Joel Pritchard, Bill Bell, and Barney McCallum improvised a game using ping-pong paddles, a perforated plastic ball, and a badminton court. The goal was simple: keep their kids entertained. The inaugural match happened in Joel's driveway using chalk lines.

What's in the Name?—The name "pickleball" sparks debate with two competing origin stories: The Pickle Boat Story: According to Joan Pritchard (Joel's wife) the game reminded her of a "pickle boat," a term used in crew racing for a boat filled with leftover rowers.

The Dog Story: Barney McCallum insisted the game was named after the Pritchards' family dog, "Pickles," who supposedly kept chasing the ball. (Truth bomb: Pickles didn't join the family until years later)

From Chaos to Rulebook—For the first decade, games were casual and rules were flexible—often changing from one backyard to another. That changed in 1972, when Pritchard, Bell, and McCallum established a corporation to protect pickleball's creation. By 1976, the first known official rulebook was written by Bob O'Brian and Marchia Collier. This was a turning point, because standardized rules meant the game could be played—and judged—consistently anywhere.

The Montana State Department of Fish and Wildlife is advising golfers to take extra precautions and be on the alert for bears while playing on Gallatin, Helena, and Lewis and Clark National Forest's golf courses.

They advise golfers to wear noise-producing devices such as little bells on their clothing to alert, but not to startle the bears

They also advise golfers to carry pepper spray in the case of an encounter with a bear.

They say that it's also a good idea to watch for signs of bear activity on the courses. They recommend that golfers be educated so that they can recognize the difference between Black bear and Grizzly bear droppings.

Black bear droppings are smaller and contain remains of nuts, berries and possibly squirrel, rabbit or gopher fur (sadly, no Canadian geese).

Grizzly bear droppings have small bells, golf gloves, sunglasses and other similar golf items in them and they usually smell like pepper spray.

As we have now upgraded our Golf Genius account to the Premium Platform, we now have access to live mobile scoring. Golf Genius Live Scoring is a feature of the Golf Genius tournament management software that allows golfers to enter scores in real-time via a mobile app, which are then synced to live leaderboards that can be viewed both in the app and online. This provides a dynamic, engaging experience for players and spectators alike. How it works:

Mobile App: Golfers use the Golf Genius mobile app (available on both Android and iOS) to enter their scores hole-by-hole.

Real-time Updates: As scores are entered, they are instantly updated on live leaderboards, which can be accessed by anyone with the app or online access.

Customizable Leaderboards: Golf Genius allows for customizable live leaderboards that can be displayed on TVs in the clubhouse, on social media, or in other locations.

Tips from the Pro – Gordon Gekko said "greed is good" in the movie Wall Street...but greed is not always good when playing golf

Have you ever heard the term "sucker pin"? Well it's a common golf term used for a hole location that is cut near the edge of the green, or just over a bunker or body or water. The term means that aiming at that hole is a risk, as it brings the trouble into play. We have many such instances that can occur here at The Villages.

Here are some classic Villages "sucker pins" and Tips to avoid high scores

Front right on Hole #3 – brings the bunker into play – play to the left side of the green Far right on Hole #4 - brings the huge greenside bunker into play - play to the left side or enter of the green.

Right on Hole #5 - brings the short right bunker into play - play to the left side or center of the green.

Middle/Back left on Hole #7- brings the back left bunker into play – play to the front of the green. Front on Hole #9 – brings the stream into play – play long to the center of the green Front left on Hole #11 – brings the left bunker into play – play to the right or center of the green. Back on Hole #13 – brings the back left bunker into play – play short to the middle of the green. Left on Hole #15 – brings left bunker into play – aim to the center of the green.

Front on Hole #18 - brings the stream into play - play long to the center of the green.



'A Different World is Possible'

Lately, I have been drawn to watching YouTube videos reporting on the Catholic Church's Jubilee of Youth held on the outskirts of Rome Italy, from July 28 to August 3.

Coming from 146 countries around the world, over 1 million young people camped out for a pilgrimage of faith. Under the blazing sun, skirting water cannons to keep cool, they slept in tents under an open sky, and lived on pizzas and gelato. It was like the Woodstock of the '60s, the Coachella of the Catholic Church!

Pope Leo XIV flew to the site via a helicopter and then cruising in his popemobile, greeted the crowd. At one point, the Pope caught a ball thrown to him. The Holy Father welcomed them with the words of Jesus, "You are the SALT of the Earth, the LIGHT of the World." In an historic moment, Pope Leo led a procession carrying

the cross while everyone followed.

Bishop Robert Barron from the United States gave an electrifying keynote address to the U.S. youths on the adventure of following Jesus. Citing the journeys of Abraham, Jacob, Saints Peter and Paul, he said, "Listen to God, God has an idea of the saint you were meant to be."

Makeshift confessionals were set up for everyone to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation in Circo Massimo, an open field. As the night fell, Pope Leo led an evening vigil featuring music, singing, Scripture readings, and Eucharistic Adoration.

Pope Leo participated in a digital Q and A session, on friendship, life choices and encountering Jesus. Pope Leo answered each person in Spanish, Italian and English. Will, a 20-year-old from the U.S. posed the final question: "How can we truly encounter Jesus? Even in the midst of trials and uncertainties?" In reply, Pope Leo said, "Reflect on your way of living," "seek justice," "serve the poor," and "adore Christ in the Blessed Sacrament."

At Sunday mass, Pope Leo sent forth his message of hope to the Gen Z. "You are a sign that

a different world is possible: a world of fraternity and friendship, where conflicts are not resolved with weapons but with dialogue." He reassured them, "Yes, with Christ it is possible, with his love, with his forgiveness and with the power of his Spirit."

This Sunday, in Luke's gospel (Luke 14:25-33), Jesus teaches us that true discipleship requires wholehearted commitment and the sacrifice of carrying one's cross. With the new generation of young Catholics, I believe that a different world with Jesus Christ is indeed possible!



Mulching

-On July 29, the Association Board of Directors resolved to not apply any mulch within the first five feet of the perimeter of the condominiums. Mulching will be suspended while Management partners with the vendor to discuss how the remaining mulching will be applied.

· Verizon Cell Tower

-Work began on the cell tower project this week of August 4th, 2025. Work will be coordinated with tournaments. No work will occur while a tournament is occurring. This needed to be done as the contractors needed a specific additional area of clearance on both sides of the path to trench and perform other work.

-Week of 9/1

• There's cows in "them thar hills!"—The Villages will have cattle on site from June 16 through November 2025. The cattle will be grazing in the hill lands to help mitigate fire risks. There will 50 animals with colored ear tags to help distinguish them from Richmond Ranch Cattle.

- Admire the cattle with your eyes and from a distance. Do not attempt to approach or interact with the animals.
- Always keep dogs on leashes.
- Cattle do not like loud noises. If a cow seems aggressive, which is very unlikely, yell or make a loud noise to deter them from approaching you.

"King of Ashes" by S.A. Cosby. Publisher's description: "When eldest son Roman Carruthers is summoned home after his father's car accident, he finds his younger brother, Dante, in debt to dangerous criminals and his sister, Neveah, exhausted from holding the family—and the family business—together. Neveah and their father, who run the Carruthers Crematorium in the run-down central Virginia town of Jefferson Run, see death up close every day. Association Annual Statements of Compliance

Arriving in September for residents of The Villages Association (condos) are the annual Association Smoke, CO Detectors and Insurance Statements of Compliance.

Association (Condos Only) Smoke, CO Detectors, and Insurance Statements of Compliance: In order to fulfill the requirements of The Villages Association Policies APo 408 Smoke Detectors Installation, Maintenance, Repair and Replacement, and APo 410 Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detectors, each resident is required to inspect (or have inspected by a third party) his/her condo/villa on an annual basis to ensure their detector(s) are in working order, and in addition, all Association residents (renters and owners) must provide a certification of insurance that complies with the Association CC&Rs and Association Policy APo 409 Home Owner & Resident Insurance Requirements and Verification.

State and local laws require a smoke detector in each sleeping room and in the hallway and a carbon monoxide detector be installed outside of each separate dwelling unit sleeping area. Per the policies, the replacement of smoke detectors is required every ten years and replacement of CO detectors is required every five years. In addition, a statement of compliance shall be demonstrated annually.

Moreover, all Association condo owners must maintain property and liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO6) plus loss assessment coverage and renters must maintain liability coverage (commonly referred to as HO4) and property coverage in an amount deemed appropriate by the renter. Both parties are required to provide a certificate of insurance that complies with the CC&Rs.


