#### Preparedness starts at home: Get ready for emergencies now

So far this year, the Red Cross has responded to more than 180 disasters across Maine. The vast majority of these emergencies were related to home fires. In fact, our disaster action teams have assisted nearly 600 Mainers after home fire in 2025 alone. River and coastal flooding – as well as destruction from winter storms – also pose disaster threats to Maine residents.

"National Preparedness Month is a great time to ask whether your family would be ready if something unexpected happened tomorrow," said John Montes, regional disaster officer, Red Cross Northern New England Region. "It's not about being scared; it's about being smart and looking out for the people you love. Taking a few simple steps now so that you have a plan can make all the difference when it matters most."

READY Disasters don't wait for the "right time" — they can happen in the middle of the night, during your commute or while your kids are at school. Protect your family by making a plan to stay safe, gathering important supplies and knowing how you'll stay connected by taking these steps:

Depending on the emergency, you may need to stay where you are or go somewhere else to stay safe. If you may need to leave, think about where you'll go, how you'll get there, where you'll stay and what you'll take with you. Plan well in advance if you'll need help leaving or use public transportation.

Next, gather and organize critical supplies — like food, water and medicine — into a go-kit and a stay-at-home kit. Make sure to include backup batteries and chargers for your devices (cell phone, CPAP, wheelchair, etc.), a battery-powered or hand-crank radio, and critical personal records.

Your go-kit should include three days of supplies that you can take with you. Your stay-at-home kit should have two weeks of

food and water, and a onemonth supply of medications, if possible.

Customize your kit to meet your household's specific needs. If you have young children, don't forget formula and diapers. If you have pets, include leashes, carriers, food, bowls, litter and a litterbox.

Finally, make a plan to reconnect with loved ones if you are separated or if the phone or internet is down. Write down important phone numbers on a contact card and carry it with you.


Download the free Red Cross Emergency app for weather alerts, safety steps for different emergencies and expert advice in both English and Spanish. Don't forget to sign up for local government emergency alerts to get critical local information — like evacuation notices — during an emergency.

People can also help their community be better prepared for disasters by giving blood, taking a class in lifesaving skills like CPR, or becoming a Red Cross volunteer. Visit redcross.org or call 800-RED CROSS (800-733-2767) to learn more today.

"Whether it's a fire in someone's home or a storm that destroys an entire town, disasters can happen anywhere, at any time," Montes said. "Taking a few minutes now to get ready will help you protect your loved ones if the worst happens."

## Gorham's Nick Phinney protects the net in Wheaton victory

NORTON, MA – Junior forward Declan Rhatigan (Holderness, N.H.) netted a pair of goals as one of eight different goal-scorers to lead the Wheaton College (Mass.) men's soccer team in a 9-1 rout of visiting University of Saint Joseph (Conn.) this afternoon at Keefe Field on the Wheaton campus in Norton, Mass.

The Lyons improve to 2-0-1 and are unbeaten in their first three matches to begin the season for the first time since 2014 when they did not drop a game through their initial 10 contests. The Blue Jays dip to

Wheaton matched the school record for goals in a game set against Lasell University on September 30, 2000 to mark just the second time in school annals that the Lyons have netted nine markers in a game. The margin of victory was the largest for the Blue and White since an 8-0 triumph over Curry College on September 4,

Wheaton held a healthy 35-10 shot advantage, including 19-4 on frame and 14-2 in the opening half of play. The Lyons were awarded eight corner kicks, while Saint Joseph received one.

Rhatigan records his second multi-goal effort of the season for Wheaton and now has five goals through the first three games to become the first player with that many scores in three matches since Amara Sesay also scored five times in the first three contests during the 2017 campaign.

midfield-

ers Aidan Doyle (Kingston, Mass.) and Baden McLaughlin (Yarmouth, Maine) each registered three points in the game with a goal and an assist for the Lyons, while sophomore forward Gael Vera (Westminster, Mass.) notched a pair of assists.

Wheaton senior keeper Michael O'Gara (Ardmore, Pa.) stopped two of three shots in the opening 72:43 of play, before yielding to junior Nick Phinney (Gorham, Maine), who turned back the only shot he faced in the final 17:17 of action.

Sophomore midfielder Elis Sulollari (Cheshire, Conn.) scored the lone goal for Saint Joseph. Sophomore starting goalie Will Slayton (Manchester, Conn.) turned away four of six shots in the first half, before senior Andres Diosa (Cheshire, Conn.) stopped six of 13 tries in the second

The Lyons' first tally came in the 10th minute of play when junior forward Avery Dinham (Coral Springs, Fla.) served a cross from the left side into the left slot, where Rhatigan re-directed the ball into the back of the net with a header. Wheaton's only other goal of the half was scored in the 15th minute of action. Doyle lifted a cross from the right sideline into the box, where junior defender Owen Kane (Pembroke, Mass.) connected for his first marker of the year and a 2-0 lead.

The Lyons wasted little time adding to their lead, scoring just 2:58 into the second half for a 3-0 margin. Vera carried the ball down the right side, before sending a centering cross to Rhatigan, who fired a shot into an open right side.

The Blue Jays cut the deficit to 3-1 when they got on the board in the 52nd minute in the second half. Senior forward Emmanuel Ofori (East Hartford, Conn.) sent a lead pass to Sulollari, who collected the ball and had the presence of mind to draw the Wheaton keeper out, before lifting a shot into the upper right corner for his first goal of the season.

Wheaton answered almost immediately, scoring just 23 seconds later when senior Joey Everett (Danbury, Conn.) converted a penalty kick into the left side of the net to restore the Lyons' three-goal advantage at 4-1. From there, the flood gates opened for the home team, scoring five more goals to close out the

Doyle scored on a feed from Vera less than four minutes later and McGann tallied his first collegiate goal in the 69th minute on an assist from McLaughlin. Just 2:23 later, McLaughlin also recorded a successful penalty kick to give Wheaton a 7-1 advantage with 19:18 to play in the game. Junior midfielder Thomas Corridon (Westport, Conn.) netted the Lyons' eighth marker just 2:19 after that, before first year forward Tanner Rock (Clifton Park, N.Y.) capped the scoring with his second marker of the season on a feed from sophomore midfielder Noe Aguilar (Lawrence, Mass.) with just 51 ticks left in the

# Manhattan Short Film Festival to screen at The Public Theatre!







# Seniors Not Acting Their Age A Partial Kayak Circumnavigation of Deer Island in Passamaquoddy Bay

A group of friends and I were on the third day of a weeklong vacation on Deer Island in New Brunswick. Located in Passamaquoddy Bay just east of Eastport and northwest of another, more well-known Canadian island, Campobello, we were camping on Deer Island Point Campground at the southern end of the island.

On the previous day, four of us had kayaked the entire length of the eastern side of the island by embarking from the ferry landing next to the campground and ending at the ferry landing near the northern terminus. Our new goal was to complete a circumnavigation of the island by paddling the west side

A maritime anomaly called Old Sow was a potential impediment to achieving our goal. Old Sow is the largest tidal whirlpool in the Western Hemisphere and located off the southwest shore of Deer Island. The whirlpool is caused by the 20-foot tidal range between Passamaquoddy Bay and the Bay of Fundy coupled with topographical factors on the ocean floor.

Old Sow causes significant turbulence in the nearby waters. Experienced pilots operating large motorized vessels can usually avoid problems. However, the impact can be quite hazardous for small vessels, particularly those that are human powered. Several fatalities have been attributed to the treacherous whirlpool.

After some research and dire warnings from paddlers in the area, we decided our objective didn't warrant the risk. The most hazardous period for Old Sow is reported to be about three hours before high

tide. We opted to launch a little before high tide from a wilderness campsite on the west side of the campground a little north of Old Sow. Our plan left us about three hundred yards short of a true circumnavigation.

Skies were clear, winds light, and the bay mirror calm when four of us launched in solo kayaks below a steep embankment at campsite number 3. Angling northwesterly, we paddled close to the shore past Cummings Cove.

The United States coastline is remarkably close in this area. Quoddy Island near Eastport and the Passamaquoddy Indian Reservation at Pleasant Point about two miles west are clearly visible.

Progressing farther northwest, we passed the narrow entrance to expansive Clam Cove and rounded Clam Cove Head where we encountered the first of several stretches of towering cliffs. We had been impressed with the rugged shoreline on the east side of the island, but the west side is even more spectacular.

Beyond the head, we traversed the mouth of outer Northern Harbor to distinctive Gardner Point. The substantial harbor is home to Fairhaven, the largest village on the west side of the island. Shortly after, we stopped for lunch on a gravel beach located in a shallow cove.

Following lunch, we proceeded northeast where more imposing cliffs were encountered. This time, we found an impressive hole in the wall. The tide was too low to paddle through the arch, but we stopped to explore the unique natural rock formation. One member of the group climbed over seaweed and rocks to reach the opening.

After continuing northeast past the tallest cliffs yet observed, we progressed towards Lamberts Cove in the northwest corner of the island. The cove is home to a massive salmon farm; substantially larger than any of us had previously seen.

Beyond the farm, we entered a narrow channel that flows between elongated Pendleton Island in the north and the main island south. Our maritime chart indicated it was passable even at low tide. After carefully maneuvering through the attenuated twisting passageway, we turned Butler Point where we observed a ferry leaving the northern ferry landing.

Arriving at the bustling landing, we finished two remarkable days of kayaking along the Deer Island shoreline. Short by a mere few hundred yards, we had nearly completed a circumnavigation of the truly magnificent island located in one of the world's most extreme tidal basins.

At the campground that night, our group decided to take the ferry to Campobello Island the following day to take advantage of the exceptional hiking and biking trails in Roosevelt Park. While the kayaking along the coast of Deer Island is truly excep-

tional, we were disappointed with the lack of hiking and biking opportunities.

## Maine author confronts grief men carry after infidelity

PORTLAND, ME Emotional expression of men is relegated mainly to the golf course or the local watering hole. A stigma persists that men must suppress painful emotions and experiences to maintain an image of stoicism. A new release by author Dr. Elliott Kronenfeld hopes to flip this concept on its head.

Unspoken Loss: Men, Infidelity, and Disenfranchised Grief breaks through the silent barrier of how men heal and manage emotions. Licensed sex therapist and TEDx international speaker Elliott Kronenfeld provides groundbreaking insight into how men who cheat process the pain, guilt and grief of infidelity in isola-

"Even the strongest relationships will be tested from time to time," says Kronenfeld. "Men need to realize coping with grief after an affair isn't linear. Ignoring the pain risks missing the opportunity to fully heal and shine a light on the unique grief of every human being instead of triggering more emotional harm.'

The in-depth book examines how masculinity, infidelity and the idea of disenfranchised grief—emotional pain that lacks public support or acknowledgment—must be addressed together for proper healing to occur.

Unspoken Loss is divided into three parts covering the theory, research and interventions available to readers. From marital affairs to actionable pathways forward, Kronenfeld draws on vast clinical experience and research to outline an arc of infidelity recovery that supports long-term relational growth.

"Infidelity, despite its pain and complexity, does not have to be the end of the line for couples. In this book, Elliott offers a vision of a hopeful future to that couples can strive toward and attain healing," says Vicki L. Shemin, family law attorney and clinical social worker.

Readers are invited to reframe how the trauma of infidelity occurs, resulting in a potential turning point: one that can lead to deeper interpersonal understanding and renewed intimacy. The book is a powerful resource for men trying to navigate marriage and sex, evolving sexual relationships and coping with depression.

Unspoken Loss is the second book by Kronenfeld following Couples by Intention: Creating and Cultivating Relationships that Matter. It is available in paperback or as an eBook through SDP Publishing Solutions, Amazon, Barnes & Noble and retail locations.

The book provides a strong bridge for those looking to heal after the harm of infidelity in a relationship. Both partners are affected by betrayal, but the healing journey is possible if they work together to heal their different emotional wounds.

## Sen. Bailey to chair Commission to Expand Access to Dental Care

AUGUSTA, ME -Sen. Donna Bailey, D-Saco, was appointed by Senate President Mattie Daughtry, D-Brunswick, to chair the newly created Commission to Expand Access to Oral Health Care by Studying Alternative Pathways for Obtaining a License to Practice Dentistry, established under LD 1615. It was a bill that the sponsor brought to the Legislature's Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services, which Sen. Bailey chairs.

"In the Legislature, I am committed to addressing the workforce shortages that make it harder for Mainers to access the care they need, such as dental work," said Sen. Bailey. "We all know how frustrating it can be when we can't find a dentist who is accepting new patients or when the wait is months long. If we increase the number of licensed, trained dentists, then we can reduce the long wait times and serious health problems that occur from delayed treatments. Last year, I was appointed to chair a similar commission that made recommendations to increase the number of doctors in the state, so I am ready to get to work."

The Commission is tasked with studying how to integrate foreign-trained dentists and out-of-state dentists into the dental care workforce. It will review the best practices that other states have used to address the shortage of dentists in their states. As a result of its work, the Commission could recommend changes to state laws and rules that pose unnecessary barriers for these dentists to enter Maine's workforce. It will provide a report to the Legislature's Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services Committee no later than Dec. 10, 2025.

Appointees consist of a bipartisan group of lawmakers, dental care professionals and providers and a representative from the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, which oversees certification and licensing. The appointments are made by the Governor, Senate President and Speaker of the

LD 1615 received unanimous, bipartisan support in the Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services Committee and in the full Senate and House. Gov. Janet T. Mills signed it on July 1.

#### Fall outdoor power equipment tips to beat winter hassles

Prepare for the

seasons ahead.

Once the grass gets its final cut and the leaves are handled, it's time to swap out the mower, blower, and trimmer for the snow thrower, generator, and chainsaw. The Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI) says a little prep now means less stress-and fewer repair bills—later.

"Your end-of-season routine sets the stage for when the weather turns colder," says Kris Kiser, OPEI President and CEO of OPEI, an international trade association representing manufacturers and suppliers of outdoor power equipment, small engines, battery power systems, portable generators, utility and personal transport vehicles, and golf cars.

Here are OPEI's 8 quick tips for getting ready for fall and winter and storing warm-weather tools the right way:

- 1. Follow the manual. Review the manufacturer's guide (download it if you've misplaced it) and follow all safety stepsespecially how to shut down equipment quickly. Never disable or remove safety features.
- 2. Service before storage. Do all maintenance as directed by the owner's manual. Clean, change oil, swap filters, and handle any repairs before parking summer gear. Give winter equipment a once-over, too.



- Manage fuel smartly. Be sure to run tanks empty before storage. For winter equipment, use fresh fuel (most engines run on no more than 10% ethanol), add stabilizer according to manufacturer's guidelines, and use fuel within 30 days.
- Charge and store batteries right. Fully charge them, keep them away from metal, and store in a climate-controlled space.
- 5. Keep gear sheltered. Store summer equipment clean and dry. Keep winter gear handy but out of the weather.

- Clear the way. Make space in the garage or shed now. Remove yard debris, toys, and other hazards from the yard before snow hides them.
- Be genera-7. tor-ready. Stock heavy-duty, outdoor-rated cords long enough to run your generator at a safe distance from the house. Never operate indoors or near openings.
- Keep what's most important inside. When operating any outdoor power equipment, kids and pets should be indoors and supervised.


