GOOD NEWS!! We are down to 42 active listings and up to 9 pending

sales. The summer real estate doldrums seem to be passing. There is movement again in The Villages real estate market. We still have high inventory, and the prices are a bit lower now, but the market sales have increased. The last summer vacation holiday is over, and the interest rates are down below 6.5% and going lower. It looks like the stars are lining up again.

Cribari sales are up. Even if slightly, it is good to see our Cribari homes going into contract. At the height we had 20 Cribari's competing against each other. We are half of that number now with only 11 active listings. The lower quantity of inventory was not created just from sales. Pending Cribari homes are at 3-4. There are fewer Cribari homes for sale due to several listings having been withdrawn and/or canceled. When a market gets so competitive and the prices start lowering, some sellers will choose to rent the property or even hold it off the market until the market turns around. One agent noted on the withdrawn listing that the property owner decided to fix up their place and it will be back on the market in the future. All good strategies.

Some positive news to brighten the scene. The Federal Reserve is still sitting on higher interest rates, but the 10-year bond market dropped to 4%. This is good news as it is the 10 year bond that moves the mortgage interest rates. We are now at mortgage interest rates between 6.25% and 6.50% and going down. If the Fed does lower rates as expected...look out.

Check out the VMA house tour in October. I sponsor and attend the VMA house tour event every year. This year my amazing clients the Edgerton's are opening their newly purchased home up for the tour. I sold their beautiful home outside The Villages and helped them purchase a beautiful home in Montgomery so that they can enjoy retirement with their friends in The Villages. Jan, is an artist and will have her colorful art on display in her home. What a wonderful way to participate in the community by opening their home up to their fellow Villagers. CSC Serviceworks, the current laundry room equipment vendor, will replace coin boxes with fully digital payment hardware on all machines. This will reduce vandalism, enable a more reliable digital payment processing experience and offer Villagers a variety of payment options including Apple Pay, Google Pay, Venmo, Pay-Pal, and credit/debit cards. This means Villagers can use an app-One Tap Away or a deb-it/credit card just as you would in a grocery or other type of store.




E-waste event coming Saturday, October 4

____ It's time to think about Medicare

Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) runs from October 15 to December 7 each year. This is when you can review your Medicare coverage and explore options that may better suit your needs. Changes made during the AEP will take effect on January 1 of the following year.

Start by reviewing your Annual Notice of Change (ANOC) from your insurance carrier to understand any plan changes for next year, including covered medications, doctors, and specialists. If you are satisfied with your current Medicare plan, you do not have to take any action during AEP.

For people with Original Medicare, it is recommended you check your Part D medication plan every year. Medicare Part D plan premiums and formularies can vary from year to year, and it is not uncommon to find and switch to a more affordable option. You may save money in premiums and/or prescription costs. You can check using a program called Plan Finder found on www. medicare.gov to see if a better Plan D option is available for you in 2026.

Don't want to tackle Plan Finder all by yourself? You don't have to do Medicare evaluations all by yourself. If you want to ensure that you are still in the plans most suitable to your circumstances, you can contact a HICAP trained counselor.

HICAP (Health Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program) is a non-profit volunteer-based counseling program to help seniors needing education and assistance with the complexities of Medicare, supplemental health insurance and Health Maintenance Organizations. HICAP is organized under the County's group called Sourcewise, which provides services for seniors and low-income residents. The HICAP volunteers are overseen by paid County employees.

We are fortunate that the HICAP counselor assigned to The Villages is Douglas Campbell. Doug's preference for contact is an email to dcampbell@mysourcewise.com. You can include your Medicare questions in the email. Doug will email or phone you back if the answer is short or arrange a telephone or video counseling session if the subjects are more complex. If you prefer to leave a phone message rather than email, his direct number at Sourcewise is 408-610-8059. There is no cost for this service available to you.

Note: The Senior Resource Services (SRS) office hours for drop-in assistance are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. The SRS office is in the Cribari Center across from the Post Office. You may also leave a message at 408-239-5253 or e-mail SRS at villagessrs@ sbcglobal.net. The purpose of SRS is to provide education and general business and financial information. All assistance is free and confidential. You should ask your professional advisor about your individual situation.







Sputnik. Explorer I. An incredible leap for mankind. These first satellites—one Russian, one American—threw open the doors to space exploration with great excitement and anticipation. But it was not long before space breakthroughs had a new mission as they began being employed for reconnaissance and photographic spying that continues to this day.

HEXAGON was the last film-based reconnaissance satellite used by the United States. Designed in the 1960s, 60 feet long and flying at 100 miles up, it enabled Nixon to sign the SALT Treaty and



required cooperation between the CIA and the Air Force. Its mission remained classified until 2011 when its story could be told. That story is being brought to you by Senior Academy from someone with hands-on inside knowledge and experience.

In the 1970s, Ricky Deutsch, a U.S. Air Force Captain, was Operations Director for HEXAGON at the Satellite Test Center in Sunnyvale. He is an expert on how Lockheed built HEXAGON, how it interfaced with six worldwide tracking

stations, how the CIA determined its photographic targets and most importantly, how it positively affected the outcome of the Cold War.


New Cribari exhibit to feature Pimei Huang's watercolors

Free Art Film: 'Yayoi Kusama: Infinity'





'Determination Wears the Crown'

There are countless times that people have made promises fueled by the hope of immediate and significant personal development. Those unhealthy habits of overindulgence or the lack of commitment to follow through are at the top of the list to address.

The reality is that some of us take a deep breath and plunge into the task with a fervor, at most, for a couple of weeks (before it becomes a habit). Then something comes up that changes our direction and focus. It's a fact that few smokers quit because of a single moment of resolve. Few obese people have become slim and healthy because of one dramatic moment of commitment. Few people who were deeply in debt have changed their financial situation because they resolved to do so. Few marriages have changed because of one dramatic resolution without continual efforts to improve and stay on task.

People say, "If it isn't broken... why fix it?" Is change important? Yes, it is essential for all of us. From the womb until we leave this life, change happens. Is commitment to change crucial? Commitment is critical and necessary to any personal change we attempt to make. We can create a list of all the changes in our lives that have occurred because of commitments.

When it comes to breaking those deep, habitual, and unproductive habits, change must originate within the soul of a person. The transforming grace of God enables a person to experience the most remarkable results in personal change, which comes through Him. Many people want to change but lack the motivation to make the necessary sacrifices and discipline to change.

I thought about my life as a young person desiring not to repeat my father's legacy, which was to run away from commitment when changes happened, and things became difficult. As much as I wanted to be different from him, I developed some unhealthy habits that took me away from what I desired in my soul. It was easier to give in to the weakness of my will than to resist and pursue what my heart desired.

It wasn't until I humbly asked God to help me break free of the things that were holding me back and apply the discipline that real change happened. There can be no change without the discipline of mind, spirit, and body to achieve your goals.

2 Corinthians 5:17 AMP Therefore, if anyone is in Christ [that is, grafted in, joined to Him by faith in Him as Savior], he is a new creature [reborn and renewed by the Holy Spirit]; the old things [the previous moral and spiritual condition] have passed away. Behold, new things have come [because spiritual awakening brings a new life].

PICKLEBALL

Pickleball History—The First Tournament

The sport's competitive era officially began in spring 1976, when the South Center Athletic Club in Tukwila, Washington, hosted the first known pickleball tournament.

The Players: Most competitors were college tennis players, confident that their racquet skills would give them an edge. Some reportedly laughed at the small paddles and perforated plastic ball, assuming the game would be too easy.

The Surprise: They quickly discovered that raw power wasn't enough. The locals, who had mastered finesse shots and the all-important dink game, dominated. The sport's emphasis on placement, patience, and soft touch caught many off guard.

The Outcome: Local pickleball pioneers, including Steve Paranto and his father Arlen Paranto, won doubles, while David Lester captured the singles title. Lester's adaptability and skill helped him triumph over more experienced tennis players, even though there is no public record confirming whether he had a tennis background prior to the tournament.

The Legacy: This tournament proved that pickleball could support competitive play and laid the foundation for national and international growth. It inspired the creation of standardized rules, formal leagues, and organized competitions in the years to come.

Fun Facts:

Early matches were played on chalk-lined on the gym floors, rather than permanent courts.

Players had to adjust to the quirky bounce of the Wiffle-style ball, which could behave unpredictably on wooden floors.

The event was family-friendly, with many kids and spouses watching and cheering—highlighting pickleball's early emphasis on community.

As we have now upgraded our Golf Genius account to the Premium Platform, we now have access to live mobile scoring. Golf Genius Live Scoring is a feature of the Golf Genius tournament management software that allows golfers to enter scores in real-time via a mobile app, which are then synced to live leaderboards that can be viewed both in the app and online. This provides a dynamic, engaging experience for players and spectators alike.

How it works:

Mobile App: Golfers use the Golf Genius mobile app (available on both Android and iOS) to enter their scores hole-by-hole.

Real-time Updates: As scores are entered, they are instantly updated on live leaderboards, which can be accessed by anyone with the app or online access.

Customizable Leaderboards: Golf Genius allows for customizable live leaderboards that can be displayed on TVs in the clubhouse, on social media, or in other locations.

Automated Calculations: The software automatically calculates results and statistics, saving time and effort for tournament organizers and staff.

Event Management: Golf Genius also offers features for event creation, including roster management, tee sheet creation, and printed materials like scorecards.

We will start with a "Soft Launch" meaning we will ask golfing groups and Clubs to use live scoring and introduce it to their golfers for a period of learning, trial and error. This will allow the members time to get acclimated with its functionality and purpose and for us to address any issues, concerns and to provide needed training.

The goal is that starting in January of 2026, we will be fully functional and will start using Golf Genius Mobile Scoring for every tournament we conduct.

Tips from the Pro-Keep Your Eyes on the Prize!

How important are your eyes in the game of golf?? The answer is that they are imperative! The ability of our eyes to gauge distance, see obstacles and recognize changes in the terrain makes them one of the most important tools in our game. But as we know, at address, our eyes are on the ball...so the timing of when to use our eyes to your advantage is the key! Remember that the ball is not the target, your landing spot or your putting spot is the TRUE TARGET.

Here's what I mean:

- 1. On the tee use your eyes to see the hole in its entirety. Stand on the tee box and look at any trees, hazards, and where fairway and rough merge
- 2. Use your eyes to choose a specific and small target to aim at from tee to green; such as a rooftop, a mountain, a patch of grass, or a tree in the distance NOT a general area
- 3. Use your eyes when chipping and pitching to determine the proper trajectory for the shot and more importantly the landing spot for the shot. Focus on the landing spot during your rehearsal swings.
- 4. Use your eyes when putting during your pre-shot routine. Look at the hole during your practice strokes and your eyes will tell your arms how hard or soft to swing the putter. Use your eyes to see the top line of the break of the putt and be sure to putt toward that spot.

In all cases your eyes are best employed from BEHIND the ball, using your eyes as a set of two, in line, using your binocular vision...it is NOT best to wait until you have addressed the ball to finally tilt your head and use your one-eyed peripheral vision. casion. Its name literally means "Head of the Year," and it marks the anniversary of the creation of the world, a moment of divine judgment, and a day of personal and communal reckoning.

The central mitzvah (commandment) of Rosh Hashanah is the sounding of the shofar, a ram's horn. The shofar's piercing, primal blasts are a powerful wake-up call, a spiritual alarm clock urging listeners to awaken from their complacency and begin the process of teshuvah (repentance). Each blast has a specific meaning and is meant to stir the soul, reminding us to examine our past actions and resolve to improve in the year ahead.

During Rosh Hashanah services, special prayers are recited, including the Unetaneh Tokef, a powerful liturgical poem that speaks of God's judgment and the fragility of life. This prayer encapsulates the holiday's central theme: that on this day, God sits in judgment, and all of creation passes before Him. While this can seem intimidating, it is ultimately a message of hope, reminding us that our fate is not sealed and that through teshuvah, tefillah (prayer), and tzedakah (charity), we can change the divine decree.

The 10 days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are known as the Aseret Y'mei Teshuvah, the "Ten Days of Repentance." This is a period of intense reflection and self-improvement, where individuals are encouraged to seek forgiveness from those they have wronged. Unlike sins against God, which can be atoned for on Yom Kippur, sins against other people require direct reconciliation and forgiveness from the offended party. This practice reinforces the importance of interpersonal relationships and the responsibility we have to one another.

Yom Kippur: The Day of Atonement

The High Holidays reach their climax with Yom Kippur, the "Day of Atonement." This is the holiest and most solemn day of the Jewish year, dedicated entirely to repentance and reconciliation with God. Yom Kippur is a 25-hour fast, abstaining from all food and drink, as well as other physical pleasures like bathing, wearing leather shoes, and marital relations.

The Yom Kippur liturgy is extensive and focuses on confession and communal atonement. The Vidui, a prayer of confession, is recited multiple times throughout the day, often in the plural ("we have sinned") to emphasize our collective responsibility. The Kol Nidre service on the eve of Yom Kippur is a deeply moving and ancient ritual, where we annul vows and oaths made in the past year, acknowledging our human fallibility and setting the stage for a day of sincere repentance.

The day concludes with the Neilah, or "closing the gate," service. This final, intense prayer session symbolizes the closing of the gates of heaven, offering one last chance to pray for a year of life and blessing. The final shofar blast at the end of Yom Kippur marks the end of the High Holidays, signifying that our period of atonement is complete and that we have been sealed in the "Book of Life" for the coming year.

The meaning of the High Holidays extends far beyond the synagogue. They are a profound and transformative journey that every Jew, regardless of their level of observance, can undertake. They are a time to ask: Have I been the person I want to be? Have I treated others with kindness and respect? Have I lived up to my potential?

In a world of constant distraction and instant gratification, the High Holidays offer a much-needed pause. They compel us to slow down, reflect on our lives, and make amends. They remind us that our actions have consequences and that we have the power to change for the better. Ultimately, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are not just about judgment; they are about hope, mercy, and the enduring belief in our capacity for growth and renewal. They are a powerful testament to the Jewish people's commitment to self-improvement and their unwavering faith in God's compassion and forgiveness.

The Roots of Evergreen series

The Roots of Evergreen installments will be published in *The Villager* the third week of every month and collected in *The Villager Online* under a new History heading.

This month's installment is about the origins of The Valley of Heart's Delight and Silicon Valley.

Evergreen: Riding on the back of a rising colossus—milestones from prunes to Apples

In November of 1777, 15 soldiers and settlers with their families were chosen by Spanish officials from the San Francisco and Monterey presidios to found Alta California's first civil settlement, the Pueblo San Jose de Guadalupe. The second and third civil settlements were Los Angeles in 1781 and Branciforte (Santa Cruz) in 1797. These three villages were designated to produce the food for the network of missions and presidios.

By 1841, under Mexican rule, the pueblo's population grew to 300.

In 1846, the flag of the United States was raised over San Jose by Thomas Fallon, later to become one of its mayors.

Continuing in its agricultural role, the town became known as "the Garden City," and in 1849, became the first state capital of California, hosting its legislative body. This brief change in status sparked San Jose's very first bout of land speculation, driving

capital of California, hosting its legislative body. This brief change in status sparked San Jose's very first bout of land speculation, driving prices of some town lots up to \$10,000—a trend that collapsed with the relocation of the state capital to Vallejo in 1851.

The Gold Rush brought a huge wave of settlers to California and after most of them failed to find their fortunes in mineral wealth, many made their way to the valley to prosper by growing crops in some of the richest alluvial soil and exceptional climate on earth. Alviso, Santa Clara Valley's port town, became the busiest port in south San Francisco Bay in the 1850s; it was the main link between northern and southern California. As San Francisco became the economic and cultural center for the West Coast, San Jose with its "sunshine, fruit and flowers" became known as the "loveliest inland city of California." The nineteenth century was all about agricultural production, and the remote village of Evergreen was a participant in the bigger picture of that blossoming economy.

Father Junipero Serra, founder of many of the California missions, is said to have brought apricots to California from his native Spain. Apricots were seen growing at missions Santa Clara and San Jose as early as 1792. California's first orchards were planted at the missions and tended by the monks and mission Indians.

In 1856, Loius and Pierre Pellier brought prunes from France to the valley. Conditions were ideal for stone fruit such as prunes and apricots—and most other agricultural products as well.

The completion of the Transcontinental Railroad in 1869 radically transformed access to fruit, vegetables, grains and livestock in the west, opening new markets for produce, thus creating significant opportunities for local growers.

As more and more orchards covered the flat land surrounding San Jose, the valley became a spectacular vision of Paradise during the blossom season. The local boosters noticed and came up with the term "The Valley of Heart's Delight" to encourage more people to come to Santa Clara County. Valley towns held blossom festivals and local trolley lines began giving "blossom tours." By 1920, Santa Clara County grew one third of the prunes in the world. In 1870, the valley had 300 acres in prune orchards and by 1900 it was up to 90,000 acres—not to mention the other orchards with apricots, cherries, peaches, pears and almonds. In the decade between 1880 and 1890, the number of fruit trees doubled to 4.5 million.

The proliferation of fruit and vegetables brought industrialization to the valley in the form of canneries. San Jose Fruit Packing Company opened in 1873, followed by many others, and, by 1885, more than a thousand workers were employed in canneries. The 1887 season produced \$1 million worth of canned produce and four million pounds of dried fruit. By 1893, the San Jose Fruit Packing plant was the largest cannery in the world.

Agricultural production continued at full throttle into the twentieth century with San Jose sitting at the center of it all as the state's largest canning region. Cannery work was seasonal, and 80% of cannery workers were women, most earning supplementary income for their families. In 1943, half of workers in San Jose were employed by the canneries.

World War II precipitated another vast transformation, as more wartime and post-war industry came to the Bay Area. The Homefront war efforts and the rise of the defense industry during the Cold War drove the growth of the Bay Area throughout the mid to late twentieth century. In the two years from 1948 to 1950, the population of the Santa Clara Valley tripled. In 1961 alone, 300,000 people moved into San Jose. From 1945 to 1965 the Santa Clara Valley population grew by 88%. In the first quarter of 1951, in San Jose, 13 subdivisions broke ground, and in 1958, more than 10,000 new homes were built.

When the Soviet Union launched the first satellite, Sputnik 1, in 1957, the Space Race began bringing new industry to the valley. The economy was moving away from agriculture. Perhaps the last nail in the coffin of The Valley of Heart's Delight was driven by an energetic, pro-growth San Jose City Manager, A. P. "Dutch" Hamann. He held the San Jose City Manager position from 1950 to 1969. His tireless expansion policies soon swallowed Evergreen and other outlying communities. Under Hamann, such terms as "strip annexation" and "cherry-stem annexation" were added to the city planning lexicon. A 1965 Haman quote was prophetic: "They say San José is going to become another Los Angeles. Believe me, I'm going to do everything in my power to make that come true." Some local examples of his influence included Eastridge shopping center far distant from San Jose, and the uncompleted I-280/US 101 overpass that towered over the junction of those two roads for years. Early on, Hamann predicted that San Jose would become the largest city in the Bay Area, and it happened in 2020 when Census figures listed San Jose's population at 1,013,240 overtaking that of San Francisco. During Hamann's tenure, San Jose expanded from 17 to 149 square miles.

As The Villages, a new wrinkle in urban living, began its build-out in 1967, a massive change was brewing in the suburbs of Sunnyvale, Mountain View, Palo Alto and Menlo Park, driven in large part by Stanford University—the birth of Silicon Valley. Early on, the origin of Hewlett-Packard began in 1939 with Bill Hewlett and David Packard in Packard's Palo Alto garage.

The electronic transistor was developed and perfected by the Shockley Semiconductor Lab, mostly developed by Frederick Terman and William Shockley—who was considered the "father of Silicon Valley," as he chose silicon for use in transistors.

Two employees of Fairchild Semiconductor, Robert Noyce and Gordon Moore went on to found Intel corporation, which made astounding advances in computer chips and microprossers.


In 1975, the first meeting of the Homebrew Computer Club—a group of hobbyists—met in a Menlo Park garage. In attendance were Steve Wozniak and Steve Jobs who formed the People's Computer Company, later known as Apple Computer. Bill Gates also attended those meetings before founding Microsoft and developting operating systems and computer programs.

Personal computers were developed in the 1980s with Apple and IBM as the primary drivers. And at the Stanford Research Institute the Arpanet was developed by private companies and the military. We know it now as the Internet.


The mid-1990s saw the expansion of the dot-com bubble in Silicon Valley, which resulted in yet another bout of unprecedented real estate prices. Sand Hill Road in Palo Alto became the most expensive commercial real estate in the world. And companies like PayPal generated a re-emergence of consumer internet companies.

Through all its ups and downs, the Santa Clara Valley maintains its status as one of the top research and development centers in the world, as the region is likely on the cusp of another tech tsunami—artificial intelligence—Al and robotics.

What now? When you take a seat on the bench near the upper gardens in The Villages and see the Santa Clara Valley spread out before you—the result of a couple centuries of unbridled prosperity—ponder this question: "Is there anyone out there who knows how to pick prunes and cut 'cots?



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
