Pheasant numbers surge in Minnesota to a 50 percent rise from last year

Pheasant numbers are soaring, which is great news for Minnesota's hunters and wildlife enthusiasts. According to the 2025 Minnesota August Roadside Survey, the state's pheasant population has jumped nearly 50 percent from 2024, a welcome boost for the upcoming hunting season.

State wildlife experts are attributing the increase to a combination of milder winter conditions, which helped hens survive the

cold months, and a drier, warmer spring that created ideal conditions for nesting and brood-rearing. The statewide pheasant index for 2025 stands at 75 birds per 100 miles of roads driven, up from 51 in 2024, signaling a remarkable recovery. But it's not just the overall numbers that are impressive. Every region in Minnesota saw a significant increase in pheasant populations, with the Southeast region leading the charge — up by

a staggering 189 percent. miles), and West Central (76 The Southwest region also saw a sharp increase of 86 percent, followed by strong gains in the East Central (82 percent), South Central (40 percent), and Central (33 percent) regions.

For many Minnesotans, this means a better chance to spot those iconic, colorful birds as they take to the fields. According to the DNR, the regions with the highest pheasant numbers include the Southwest (152 birds per 100 miles), South Central (82 birds per 100 birds per 100 miles), areas that are already popular among hunters.

As hunters prepare for the season's opener, it's important to remember the regulations. Hunters are allowed to use shotguns with no shell limit, but only .22 caliber rimfire rifles or handguns are permitted for pheasant hunting. Also, hunters 16 and older — both residents and non-residents — must possess a valid small game license to hunt pheasants, while residents and non-residents between the ages of 18-64 also need a pheasant stamp.

If you're 65 or older, good news: residents don't need the pheasant stamp but do need a small game license (which is available at a reduced price). Non-residents aged 65 and up need both a pheasant stamp and a small game license.

The season officially kicks off at 9 a.m. on Saturday, October 11. Whether you're an experienced hunter or new to the sport, it's shaping up to be a great year in the fields.

For those looking to dive into the details, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has released a full report of the August roadside survey, along with a pheasant hunting prospects map. You can check it out at the DNR's pheasant hunting page: DNR Pheasant Hunting Information.

As pheasant numbers rise across the state, hunters and nature lovers alike can look forward to another exciting season of bird watching, hunting, and appreciating the state's vibrant wildlife.

Cottontail rabbit numbers jump in Minnesota

Cottontail rabbit numbers in Minnesota are experiencing a significant surge. According to the 2025 August Roadside Survey, the state's cottontail rabbit population has boomed, with the rabbit index rising to 15 rabbits per 100 miles — nearly double last year's count of nine rabbits per 100 miles. And that's not all: this year's numbers exceed both the 10-year and long-term averages, which sit at just six rabbits per 100 miles.

For hunters and nature lovers, this means plenty

furry twitchy-tailed creatures across the state.

Minnesota's rabbit population has been on the upswing, and this year's data is particularly encouraging. The East Central region leads the pack with an impressive 42 rabbits per 100 miles, a number that's sure to excite hunters in the area. But the rabbit boom isn't limited to just one region the Southwest, South Central, and Southeast regions are also showing strong rabbit numbers, each reporting over 17 rabbits per 100 miles.

For those looking to ven-

conditions are prime for both hunting and wildlife watching.

Experts point to a combination of factors contributing to this year's surge in cottontail numbers. A mild winter likely helped boost survival rates for young rabbits, while favorable spring weather created ideal conditions for breeding and raising young. Healthy habitat, including abundant vegetation and food sources, also plays a critical role in supporting rabbit popula-

The result? A thriving rabbit population across the state, ready for hunters when the season opens.

Rabbit hunting season is open throughout the state, and this year's increased rabbit numbers promise to make for a more successful and enjoyable experience. While hunters prepare for the season, it's essential to follow all state regulations to ensure a safe and sustainable harvest. 

Hunters to help track game birds

The Minnesota Department itoring programs. of Natural Resources (DNR) is encouraging hunters to voluntarily log details about their outings for species like ruffed grouse, woodcock, pheasants, prairie chickens, and partridge. It's part of an ongoing effort to collect real-world data directly from the field to complement the DNR's regular wildlife mon-

Hunters who participate are asked to log key information from each hunt, including: date, species pursued, if the hunter was using a dog, total hours hunted, number of birds flushed, number of birds harvested, and ages of any pheasants harvested. Hunters are also asked to report the location of their hunt including: the county and if the hunt was on a wildlife management area, a hunter walking trail or a Walk-In Access program area.

Logging your hunt is simple. Hunters can use the DNR's online field log, accessible via web browser or mobile app. dnr.state.mn.us/ wildlife/sightings/uplandfield-log.html

Senate's violence prevention group

Recently I was asked to take part in two meetings of the Senate's violence prevention working group that the Democrat co-chair described as, "...not an official body of the State Senate...It's an ad-hoc creation...it's not defined by statute or at the directive of any legislative proposal...no quorum is necessary, and no official action can be taken." Unfortunately, the chair's own statement leads me to believe it was created and called purely for political reasons.

We heard from the parents whose children experienced the horror at Annunciation church and school. Their words were heartbreaking, and their testimony has been seared into me. One mother described sprinting toward the school after hearing the shots, praying her children were alive. Another father shared that his daughter still carries bullet fragments in her head. Others spoke of fear that now shadows their families in everyday life. I could not hold back my tears. I admire their courage in speaking out.

I went into these hearings hoping that we could set aside politics and focus on finding common ground about how to make our schools safer. Instead, the hearings showed how divided we remain. Democrats put forward a long list of proposals, most of them focused on new gun and gun ownership restrictions. When Republicans raised questions about the legality, Constitutionality, or effectiveness of these ideas, or when we suggested other approaches, our motives and sincerity were ques-

That was disheartening, because I do believe evervone in the legislature wants safe schools and safe communities. Where we differ is in how to get there. Unfortunately, some of those exchanges had a "my way or the highway" feel to them; as in, if you don't support banning certain weapons or limiting the second amendment rights of law-abiding citizens, you don't care about kids.

Nothing could be further from the truth. There are a lot of ways we can keep kids safe. If you need convincing, look no further than what happened in 2023.

Minnesota Catholic bishops wrote a letter to Gov. Walz pleading with him to allow nonpublic schools, like Annunciation, to receive school safety aid. Senate Republicans tried to expand safe schools funding to nonpublic schools in 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2023.

Senate Republicans proposed providing \$300 million for all Minnesota schools to make critical safety upgrades.

There was a proposal to create a \$50 million school building and cyber security grant program that would help keep schools safe.

Unfortunately, Democrats and Gov. Walz rejected these common-sense ideas. The legislature did create the school building and cyber security grant program, but at about half of the requested funding level and they excluded nonpublic schools.

But that is not the end of this story. We have a new opportunity to do the right thing. Revisiting the Catholic bishops' request can be an easy first step toward finding more common ground. We should do that right away next session, and prioritize proposals that should be bipartisan: strengthening school safety, providing funding for School Resource Officers, expanding access to mental health care, and ensuring violent criminals face seri-

ous consequences. This could be a transformational moment for our state and for the safety of our children. But we have a choice: we can continue with hearings primarily conducted to score political points and proposals that clearly and obviously do not have enough support from either side of the aisle. Or, we can come together. We can use this moment to find areas of agreement. We can forget the extreme proposals and prioritize ideas we can get done that will actually keep kids and families safe.

Every child deserves to feel safe in the classroom, and every parent deserves peace of mind when they send their child to school. That will remain my focus, and I will keep working for solutions that protect families across Minnesota while also protecting the rights of law-abiding gun owners.

Put safety first this fall

The leaves are turning, the mornings are crisp, and outdoor enthusiasts across Minnesota are gearing up for their favorite fall traditions — hunting, fishing, and off-highway vehicle (OHV) riding. But as excitement builds for these seasonal pastimes, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is sending a clear message: make safety your top priority.

With many hunters already in the woods, anglers still taking to the lakes, and OHV riders hitting the trails for both recreation and access to hunting grounds, Col. Rodmen Smith, director of the DNR Enforcement Division, is encouraging everyone to stay alert and make wise decisions.

"These next couple months are the highlight of the year for many people," Smith said. "Whether you're fishing, hunting or riding, the opportunities to enjoy Minnesota's outdoors are abundant. But people need to remember that no trip is a success if it doesn't end safely."

So far in 2025, the good news is that are zero firearms-related hunting fatalities reported this year — matching 2023 and improving upon 2024, which saw one fatality.

Boating fatalities are also trending downward with five reported so far, putting the year on track to reach a historic low (compared to nine in both 2024 and 2023).

However, OHV-related fatalities remain a concern, with 16 deaths reported already in 2025. That's an improvement over last year's record-setting 30 fatalities, but still higher than some recent years (15 in 2023).

The DNR urges everyone heading outdoors this fall to take personal responsibility for their safety — and that of others. Start with these essentials:

Hunters—Always treat every firearm as if it's loaded.

Control the muzzle at all times and never point it at anything you don't intend to shoot.

Know your target and what lies beyond it.

Keep your finger off the trigger until ready to shoot.

Wear blaze orange or pink to stay visible to other hunters.

If using a tree stand, check all equipment, wear a safety harness, and move carefully in and out of the stand. Anglers and Waterfowl

Hunters— Wear a life jacket whenever you're on the water. Cold water can disable even strong swimmers in minutes.

Choose foam-filled life

jackets in fall weather — they offer more insulation than inflatable versions.

Don't overload the boat and balance weight evenly.

Monitor weather conditions closely — autumn can bring sudden changes.

OHV Operators—Wear a DOT-approved helmet — it's required for anyone under 18 and strongly recommended for all.

Buckle up if the vehicle has seatbelts. A new law now requires seatbelts to be worn by all occupants of Class 2 ATVs when traveling on public roads or rights-of-way.

Stick to designated trails and operate at safe speeds.

Always ride with caution — even experienced operators can get injured in a moment of distraction.

For Everyone Using Public Lands

Even if you're not hunting, wearing blaze orange or pink while hiking, walking dogs, or riding can help others see you. And with many trapping seasons now open, keep a close eye on pets — traps may be legally set on many public lands across the state.
