elementary kids," continued Dehn. The state grant funded most of the project. WSD were picked as engineers and the scope of work bid awarded to DeChantel Excavating. The two firms also paired up for the Harrison project so they very experienced about how to work together as a team.

"We started with the road closing in early June right after school got out and it reopened the second week of August," said Dehn.

It was reported last winter when the project was approved by the city in partnership with the Brainerd School District, that no main detour would be signed. Rather, due to the unique driving patterns of the northeast area, it was anticipated that motorists would form their own detour routes.

The project opened with bright, hard-to-miss signs and the center median where pedestrians can stop, if traffic is busy. There is vegetation in the median and it is large enough for a wheelchair to stop there.

One of the best things to come out of the project is that traffic has indeed slowed

down near Lowell school crossings, Dehn enthused. Although they knew anecdotally, through chatting with neighbors and school staff, that the project near Harrison slowed traffic down there, at Lowell School the police took more scientific measurements. The ideal speed in a school zone is 20 mph. Before the H Street project, nonschool hour traffic in the area was at 35 mph average. After the project, the non school hours speeds reduced by a whole 5 mph — to 30 miles an hour. Dehn considers this a win for bikers and walkers and neighbors.

As for why the price of the project came in so favorably, Dehn observed that interest rates are down, as are paving costs due to low fuel costs. Also, they did budget on the high side because the state funding comes in a lump sum and can't be revised, so they can't take the chance of budgeting too low.

According to MnDOT, the Safe Routes to School program aims to improve safety, reduce traffic speeds and improve air quality near schools. The

Federal Highway Administration adds that the projects encourage more children to bike or walk to school while also improving the safety on the streets for those children.

Some of the observable safety improvements: The median on H Street is 8 feet wide to allow for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and ensure students of all abilities, including those using wheelchairs, have room to stop in the median before continuing to cross the street.

Based on requirements of state aid funding, the on-street parking lane on each side of H Street is 7 feet wide.

Two rectangular rapid flashing beacon systems are installed on each end of H Street, one just east of the intersection with Third Avenue and one just west of the intersection with Fourth Avenue. The flashing signs alert east-west traffic to pedestrians crossing H Street north and south.

With the bright signs, trendy medium and attractive design, the H Street project opened with both safety improvements and improved aesthetics for the Lowell School campus and Northeast Brainerd.







scouting. Central Minnesota: Productive herds

Central Minnesota continues to support robust deer

populations, and many permit areas now allow for multiple harvests—up to three deer, and as many as five in CWD management zones or the Twin Cities metro zone.

Wildlife officials are urging hunters to take advantage of antlerless harvests to keep populations balanced.

Hunters should note that


CWD sampling is mandatory during opening weekend in several zones, including newly redesignated DPA 601, which now has carcass movement restrictions and special disease management regulations. Additionally, the B season license has been eliminated; one statewide firearms license now covers both A and B seasons.

Northeast Minnesota: Scouting is key

In the northeast, deer populations remain low, particularly in the far northern reaches. The best hunting opportunities will be found in the southern portion of the region, especially in areas with mixed habitats—forest edges, open fields, and wetlands.

Antlerless harvest will be limited or restricted in several areas to allow populations to rebound. A notable change is



the splitting of DPA 183 into DPAs 153 and 154, reflecting population differences within the area.

CWD sampling is mandatory in northeast CWD zones (DPAs 604 and 679), as well as for Grand Rapids city hunts.

Northwest Minnesota: Mild winter rebound

Northwest Minnesota is rebounding after a mild winter, with many reports of twin and even triplet fawns this spring. A strong acorn crop and prolonged green forage through winter in excellent shape.

Many northwest DPAs offer two- or three-deer limits, although areas like DPAs 111 and 203 remain bucks-only. In some areas, restrictions remain to help herds recover from previous harsh winters.

CWD testing is required in eight DPAs in this regionfour management zones and four surveillance zones.

Know Before You Go

Before purchasing a license, hunters must identify the DPA (Deer Permit Area) where they'll be hunting and the fall have deer heading into check for CWD regulations,

sampling requirements, and carcass movement restrictions. These tools are available at mndnr.gov/deerhunt.

Hunters in CWD zones must have deer one year or older sampled during opening weekend (Nov. 8-9) and during late CWD hunts (Dec. 19–21). Mail-in kits and dropoff stations are available—visit mndnr.gov/cwd for details. of returning local deer herds to established population goals following recent severe winters.

Hunters should also know that CWD sampling will be mandatory during the opening weekend of the regular firearms deer hunting season in four CWD management zones (DPAs 661, 666, 671 and 684) and four CWD surveillance zones (DPAs 239, 262, 269 and 270).
