How Fathers Shape Habits that Help Prevent Cancer

he statistics are sobering: 1 in 2 men will develop some form of cancer in their lifetime; 1 in 8 will get prostate cancer; 1 in 16 will get lung cancer; and 1 in 23 will get colorectal cancer.

No parent wants to imagine a cancer diagnosis—but that's exactly why these numbers matter. Early detection gives men the best chance to see their children grow up.

It Starts with Screenings

Unlike women, who routinely receive pap tests and mammograms, many men skip annual exams and are less likely to pursue cancer screenings—even when recommended. Maybe they think it won't happen to them. Maybe they're avoiding uncomfortable procedures. Or maybe they're just too busy.

If you're a woman, you might be rolling your eyes right now—juggling car line, dinner plans, and remembering your own eye appointment. But let's not be too

quick to judge. It's hard to keep track of suggested screenings, especially without regular visits to a proactive physician.

In general, men should be aware of three key screenings:

- · Colorectal cancer
- · Lung cancer
- Prostate/testicular cancer

The American Cancer Society recommends starting colorectal cancer screening at age 45, and prostate/ testicular and lung cancer screenings at age 50, depending on smoking history. Genetic or hereditary factors may shift these timelines.

Facing the Fear

If screenings lead to a diagnosis, there is hope. Locally, Adventist Health AIS Cancer Center offers board-certified oncology experts and advanced treatments to improve quality of life for survivors.

Dr. Luis Mariscal, medical director and radiation oncologist at AIS, uses highenergy radiation beams to treat various cancers—and it's not as scary as it sounds.

"People hear radiation and think of Chernobyl or nuclear bombs. That's not what we do," Mariscal said. "Think of



radiation therapy more like a lightsaber. We use machines that create beams of radiation that are highly focused and precise."

Kern County is also leading in surgical innovation with the Da Vinci 5 Robot, which boasts 10,000 times the computational power of its predecessor.

"Our investment in two DV5 robots—the only hospital in Kern County to do so—shows how much we value our patients and prioritize their well-being," said Daniel Ruiz, administrative director of surgical operations.

Family Support Matters

Support at home is just as vital as medical care.

"It's huge," Mariscal said. "Cancer treatment is stressful. Having people in your corner makes a difference. Patients with strong support systems tend to do better."

Family support also plays a role in prevention.

"There's no single cause of cancer," Mariscal explained. "Lifestyle choices—smoking, alcohol use, nutrition, physical activity—all have a big impact. A healthy diet, maintaining a healthy weight, and staying active can reduce your risk."

That's why Mariscal talks to patients about more than just treatment.

"I spend time helping people realize that while we're dealing with cancer, we also need to look at overall health. What can we do to improve your general wellness?"

It's a conversation worth having as a family. Because healthy choices lead to healthier lives—for everyone.

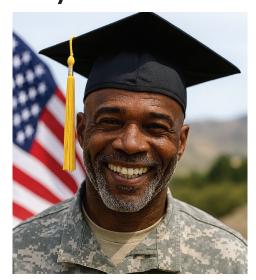


Groundbreaking Veterans CareerBridge Launches in Kern County

Kern County will launch a first-of-itskind initiative, the Veterans Career-Bridge, a structured, employer-driven pathway designed exclusively for the Veteran community. Supported by a Catalyst Fund grant through the Kern Coalition and California Jobs First, this program, which begins on January 5, 2026, aims to retain local veterans in critical roles.

By running bi-monthly cohorts, the program creates a predictable and sustainable model that not only retains veteran talent but also makes Kern County a destination for Veterans nationwide seeking meaningful careers. The program will provide veterans who have served honorably and utilized their GI Bill with a clear, structured, and predictable pathway to meet employers where they are, through training, matching, and paid internships that lead to real careers.

"This is a game-changer," says Kenny Spratt, Founder of TalentBase, retired Army First Sergeant, Ranger, Purple Heart, and Bronze Star Medal for Valor recipient. "Veterans CareerBridge isn't just another program; it's a movement.



It's the first time Kern County will have a direct, employer-backed pathway where veterans turn their services and education into real careers. Employers get leaders they can count on. Veterans get futures they deserve. This is how we win as a community."

J.R. Talks Health

Being a dad has been the prescription Andrew (J.R.) Flores needed for staying healthy.

"It wasn't until I had my daughter almost nine years ago, that I started going in for my annual physical," Flores admitted.

When Lilly came along, it opened his eyes to putting first things first.

"Not only as I've gotten older but since I've had my daughter, I realize I need to be healthy for not only myself now, but for her," Flores explained. "You don't realize how out of shape you are until you are chasing after a kid."

Flores is program director at KERN Radio & ESPN Bakersfield and host of The J.R. Show.

Although his job has him talking about things like current events, local government or sports, off air, he focuses on his most important job: being a dad-and that means staying strong for your family.

"I love my dad and want him to see me grow up," Lilly said. "He is the best dad and plays with me and studies homework with me. I try to make him eat healthy and drink less soda. I want my dad to live for a long time and be healthy."

But it doesn't necessarily come naturally.

"It's almost like it's a generational thing. We didn't see our fathers and grandfathers go to the doctors," Flores observed. "I think we men are prideful and there is still this thing about showing weakness-kind of that 'man up' mentality, 'We got this!'"

That's where Lilly comes in. Father and daughter enjoy outdoor activities and riding bikes.

And Flores hopes other dads find inspiration to keep an eye on their health.

"Take your health seriously. If anything, get your yearly physical," he said. "Know your numbers. Know your family's health history and when to get those screenings."

And one more thing the guy who talks for a living has to say:

"Remember that men's health isn't just about the physical—your mental health is just as important," Flores said. "Your spiritual health is equally important. If you aren't feeling like yourself, talk to someone about it. Getting involved in a church or men's group. The Influencers Men's group changed my life. Allow yourself to be happy, stop putting so much pressure on yourself. Learn to slow down, enjoy your family and be grateful!"

Risk Factors of Alzheimer's Disease

Dementia is a progressive syndrome caused by various brain diseases, most commonly Alzheimer's, that erodes memory, reasoning, and personality. As of 2025, over 57 million people worldwide live with dementia, and that number is projected to reach 139 million by 2050.

Alzheimer's disease deeply affects both patients and families. While aging is the strongest risk factor, several controllable risks that may help delay onset:

High Blood Pressure: Chronic hypertension damages brain blood vessels and accelerates cognitive decline.

Diabetes: Type 2 diabetes raises dementia risk by impairing blood flow to the brain.

Smoking: While research has shown mixed results, overall evidence links smoking to increased Alzheimer's risk.

Head Trauma: Serious head injuries, especially those involving loss of consciousness, are associated with higher Alzheimer's risk.

Alcohol Use: Heavy drinking may triple Alzheimer's risk, while moderate intake shows mixed findings—some studies suggest a slight protective effect, others warn of harm.

Promoting brain health through lifestyle changes—like regular exercise, social engagement, and managing chronic conditions—can make a meaningful difference.

Alcohol and Diabetes: Key Considerations



Managing diabetes requires careful attention to both food and drink choices-including alcohol. While there's no universal rule, the American Diabetes Association recommends discussing alcohol use with a physician due to several risks:

Blood Sugar Impact: Alcohol can lower

blood sugar by disrupting the liver's glucose release, increasing the risk of hypoglycemia—especially for those on insulin or certain medications. Symptoms include confusion, drowsiness, and difficulty walking.

Medication Interference: Alcohol may affect how diabetes medications work, potentially intensifying their effects and increasing hypoglycemia

Weight and Blood Sugar: Alcohol is high in calories and carbs, which can lead to weight gain and elevated blood sugar (hyperglycemia). Excess calories stored as liver fat may also reduce insulin sensitivity over time.

In short, alcohol can complicate diabetes management. Always consult a healthcare provider before drinking.

Q. Can You Catch Up on Sleep?

A. YES. Sleeping in on the weekend may help mitigate the nega-

> tive effects of losing sleep during the week. Scientists tracked people who averaged less than seven hours of sleep a night for 14 years and found that

those who got the most ZZ's on the weekends

(at least 1 ½ hours more than during the week) were about 20 percent less likely to have heart disease. While getting seven to eight hours of shut-eye nightly is ideal, the next best thing is to sleep in when you can. (Study: State Key Laboratory of Infectious Disease at Fuwai Hospital)

HELLO, HAPPY MAMA OF MANY KIDS

ove is what makes a family. That time-honored phrase, personified by families of all types, featured prominently on our embossed adoption announcement.

November is National Adoption Awareness Month and I always lead with "it's complicated."

Feelings around adoption are as varied as the individuals it involves, with many things that can be true at once: happiness to love a child, hope for their future, joy for progress and permanency but also grief for a birth family that could not find safety and stability.

My husband, Mario and I, adopted Abraham, age 2, in August. We were

his foster parents for almost two years before permanency became possible.

Married nearly 20 years, I work as a professional writer and Mario teaches Spanish. We own a translation business together.

When asked how many children we have, we hesitate. We are the parents of Samuel 18, Isaac, 13, Gabriel, 10, Jacob-Peter, 7, in addition to Abraham. A temporary infant placement is part of our household too, six boys total. We also hold in our hearts, if no longer in our arms, the many infants who have come through our doors and reunified with their birthparents. I think of them every day and hope they're doing well.

We have hosted four long-term placements, who stayed with us for months or years, and more than 20 short-term infants since 2021.

Foster care's goal is reunification with biological parents or other family members after safety can be established. Children need temporary alternate caregivers for many reasons, including substance use, incarceration and even parental illness or injury.

I think of foster care in simpler terms: I'll hold your baby while you make changes in your life. However long that takes, no matter the issue, my family and I will nurture the child. We maintain daily communication with biological parents, compartmentalizing the issues that brought them to this point, without judgment.

We are here through supervised visits, court hearings and medical appointments. Upon reunification, we will help arrange housing and utilities, adding in family outings when possible to try to ease the transition.

Statistics show that about 45% of foster children do go back to their biological families.

So far, only Abraham has needed to stay forever. What started as one weekend turned into a long-term situation after the Department of Human Services let us know finding another bilingual family for him would be difficult.

It was not lack of love that landed us here but rather, lack of resources, systemic failures and complex care needs.

When I spoke with Abraham's birthmother over legal, she said, "I am giving Abraham to you because I love him. I wish you had been my Mom, too."

I have yet to meet a mother in this situation who does not love her children.

Many families are living a nightmare. sorting out generational poverty, addiction, bad circumstances and worse luck. They must complete courtordered service plans, which can include programs and classes, to prove themselves safe and fit for a child's return. I do not envy the role of social workers and judges in making those determinations.

Over the past two years, we have

attended nearly 300 medical and therapy appointments for Abraham. Now, with the help of a team of professionals and many brothers to interact with each day, he does not qualify for special needs preschool.

I am happy to care for my son. I am sorry it was impossible for him to return to his biological family. Those feelings co-exist and through it all, our family will continue loving Abraham.

Q&A WITH CALLIE COLLINS

Q. What do you wish other families knew about adoption?

Adoption is not a rescue mission. It is part of our obligation to care for one another. I have worked as a translator and a journalist throughout my career, so seeing human struggle really wore on me and still bothers me a lot. Foster care, and now adoption, is one of the few ways I could find to make a direct impact on children in the community. I would not recommend foster care as a path to adoption, as its goal is reunification.

Q. How has foster care helped your children learn empathy?

Our children have gained an acute awareness of issues affecting their community, from how the justice system works to mental health and the effects of drugs. Ultimately, they see firsthand the importance of making good choices. having good friends. Our oldest son is now a pre-med student who hopes to work with a Medicaid-based population as a psychiatrist. They have learned to share toys, space and their parents' time. My youngest boys even share a birthday.

Q. What is your community PSA?

You only have what you give away. Everyone can help in some capacity.

Infant sleep safety: 8 tips every parent should follow

1. Always Place Your Baby on Their Back

You might think putting your baby on their tummy is safer in case they spit up, but here's the truth: Babies are actually better able to clear spit-up when on their backs. If they're face-down, spit-up can block their airway. Back sleeping is the safest position for every nap and nighttime sleep until your baby is strong enough to roll on their own.

2. Use a Firm, Flat Sleep Surface

Your baby should sleep in a safety-approved crib, bassinet or portable play yard with a firm mattress and fitted sheet. Avoid car seats, swings, couches or adult beds for sleep – these surfaces can put your baby in a dangerous position where they can't breathe properly.

3. Keep the Crib Clear

We get it. Cute blankets, pillows and stuffed animals feel comforting, especially when you're trying to make the nursery cozy. But here's the thing: Babies don't need them, and they can be dangerous.

You might think your baby is too young to move much, but it only takes one wiggle or squirm for them to end up with a blanket over their head, with their face pressed against a pillow or snuggled into a stuffed animal where they can't breathe.

4. Room-Share, Don't Bed-Share

We know how tempting it is, especially when you're exhausted, to keep your baby in bed with you. But the safest place for your baby is in

their own crib or bassinet, close to your bed. The AAP recommends room sharing for at least the first six months of your infant's life.

5. Be Mindful of Dozing Off With Your Baby

It happens all the time: You're lying on the couch with your baby on your chest, and you both start to drift off. The problem? Your baby could roll onto the cushions or get pressed against your body, making it hard to breathe. If you feel yourself getting sleepy, immediately place your baby in their crib or bassinet.

Keep Baby Comfortable, Not Overheated

Overheating is considered a risk factor for SIDS, so it's important to pay attention to how warm your baby's sleep environment is. Babies can't regulate their body temperature as easily as adults, which means they may become overheated without showing obvious signs. Instead

of blankets, dress your baby in a wearable blanket or sleep sack that keeps them warm without the risk of covering their face. A breathable crib mattress can also help.

The ideal room temperature is one that feels comfortable to a lightly dressed adult, typically between 68-72 degrees F (20-22 degrees C).

7. Pacifiers Can Help

Offering a pacifier at nap time and bedtime may reduce the risk of SIDS. Experts believe pacifiers can help by keeping a baby's airway open and encouraging a lighter stage of sleep, making it easier for them to wake if needed. If your baby is breastfeeding, it's usually best to wait until feeding is well established (around 3-4 weeks) before introducing a pacifier, to avoid any potential nipple confusion.

If your baby doesn't want it, that's okay – never force it.

8. Stay Smoke-Free

Smoking around babies is one of the biggest risk factors for SIDS. And it's not just about the smoke you see.

Secondhand smoke is what your baby breathes in when someone smokes nearby.

Both are harmful, and both raise your baby's risk of breathing problems and SIDS. If someone in your household smokes: Make sure they always smoke outside.

Wash hands and face before handling the baby after smoking.

When dogs bark, are they using words to communicate?

Does your dog bark a lot? Or is he one of those quiet pooches who barks only when things get really exciting? Most dogs bark at least a little.

Dog barks are not words. But although your dog will never tell you about his parents or the weather or the amazing bone he had yesterday, his barks still communicate important information.

Dog barks are much closer to the noises people make when they accidentally hit their thumb with a hammer – "Ow!" – or open a fantastic present – "Wow!" These sounds convey how someone feels, but not why they feel that way. When other people hear these kinds of sounds, they often come over to see what has happened: How did you hurt yourself? What is this wonderful gift you received?

All dogs, even the tiniest chihuahua, are descended from great grey wolves. Wolves almost never bark. They howl. Sometimes dogs howl too – but howling is rarer in dogs. Understanding why wolves howl and

dogs bark helps explain what barking is for.

A howl can be a beautiful sound – almost like a kind of music. And, just as group singing brings people together, so too does group howling help a pack of wolves feel united.

Dog barking also brings groups together – but it's not a beautiful sound. It is a much more urgent noise, just like the sounds you make when you are hurt or very pleased. Many smaller animals, like scrub jays, meerkats and California ground squirrels, make such noisy sounds. They do this when they feel frightened by something. In dogs, barking can bring a group together to defend against a danger that can't be coped with alone.

Wolves don't need to make sounds like this because they are big and fearsome and don't often feel threatened. Dogs, on the other hand, are much smaller and weaker than their wolf ancestors – and often need to call the group together.

This is why dogs bark. They are calling their group to get help with something they are not confident

they can handle on their own. This doesn't mean a barking dog is always frightened. He may just be very excited. He badly needs the family to know that there is a stranger coming to the door, or another dog coming close to the house.

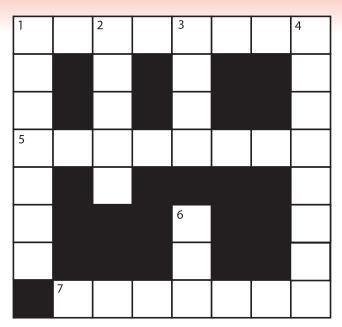
Your dog's barks may not be words, but he probably barks a little differently depending on what kind of thing has got him excited. If you listen closely, you may find you can tell the difference between a bark directed at a package deliverer and one directed toward a friend at the door. The bark to a passing dog may be different than the bark at a passing car

Your dog doesn't understand much of what you say, but he listens hard to try to make sense of human language. If you return the compliment and listen hard to his sounds, you may find you can also understand him better, and the two of you will have a richer life together.
