Coalition Gets its 501(c)(3)

FLORENCE — The Shoals Spay and Neuter Coalition has reached a milestone with the confirmation of its 501(c)(3) nonprofit status.

Vice Chair, Chapel King, said in February that the coalition's plan involves building a spay and neuter clinic that can fix animals housed in the Florence/Lauderdale Animal Shelter before they are adopted.

King said the nonprofit designation will give the coalition the ability to accept tax deductible donations that will be used to develop the clinic.

"We needed that step in order to be able to make this work," King said. "We can't take donations or ask for grants without that nonprofit status. It's the icing on the cake."

King, the incoming District 6 Florence City Council member, also mentioned that the clinic will be available to the public in the Shoals and beyond.

The coalition will be accepting donations sometime in the near future to get this process

rolling.
Coalition member Cheryl Jones, director of the Florence-Lauderdale Animal Services, said renovating an existing building is more cost effective than new construction.

"There are a couple of buildings we're looking at," Jones said. "We want it to be in Florence because we want Florence to get the benefit of the revenue from people coming into town to get animals spayed and neutered."



The American Red Cross wants everyone to enjoy the festivities safely, so they offer tips on how to have a great Halloween and stay safe while doing so.

COSTUME SAFETY

Trick-or-Treaters need to see and be seen.

- Use face makeup instead of masks.
- Add reflective tape to costumes and trick-ortreat bags.
- Wear light-colored clothing if possible.
- Use flame-resistant costumes and wigs.
- Stay away from long trailing fabric so no one trips and falls.
- Avoid using decorative contact lenses to avoid vision issues
- If carving pumpkins, don't use candles to light them. Instead, try batteryoperated lights or glow sticks.
- Walk only on sidewalks, not in the street. If there are no sidewalks, walk at the edge of the roadway, facing traffic.
- Don't cross streets between parked cars, and don't cut across yards or use allevs.
- Drivers watch for children in dark clothing at dusk/sunset.
- Give trick-or-treaters a flashlight to light their

way.

- A parent or responsible adult should accompany young children
- Visit homes that have a porch light on to accept treats at the door
- Never go inside.
- Be cautious around animals, especially dogs. Walk, don't run.
- Check all goodies before the kids dig in. Remove loose candy, open packages, and any choking hazards.
- If you are welcoming trick-or-treaters at your place, light the area well and sweep leaves from your sidewalks and steps.
- Clear obstacles someone could trip over.

YOUR PETS AND HALLOWEEN

Make sure pets can't get at any Halloween treats – the treats can be toxic for animals. If you're considering a costume for your pet, make sure the animal is okay with the idea and that the costume doesn't limit their movement or hamper their breathing or sight. Halloween can spook your pets, causing them to run away. Make sure your pet wears a pet ID. If they are going out after dark, make sure they wear a reflective collar and are securely leashed.

Sugar-free candies, chocolates, Glowsticks, and fall plants pose risks to pets.

Even the most placid of cats might get anxious due to flashing lights, eerie noises, strangers dressed as characters, and the continuous doorbell. While chocolate is one of the more well-known dangers for pets, vets

highlight other common items that pose fatal consequences.

Like humans, dogs have taste buds that crave sweet foods. However, while sugar isn't poisonous to cats and dogs, it isn't healthy for them.

"Although sugars like honey, brown, and white sugar are generally safe for dogs and cats, foods high in sugar often cause vomiting and diarrhea in pets," said Dr Richards. "Watch out, particularly for sugar-free treats containing xylitol. This common ingredient is very dangerous for pets and can lead to sudden life-threatening changes in blood sugar and liver toxicity."

Pets can enjoy pumpkin this year without fear of poisoning. However, raw pumpkin is harder to digest and should be avoided for both cats and dogs. While decorating, Dr Richards encourages pet parents to be mindful of what plants are placed around the house. 'Mums' or chrysanthemums, holly and certain types of ornamental berries can all be toxic to pets with ingestion leading to vomiting, diarrhea, and skin irritation." she said.

One of the most common Halloween accessories used for children's safety and costumes can also be dangerous for pets.

The bright liquid inside glow sticks contains various chemicals that can be toxic to pets if ingested, especially for their digestive system.

Cocoa contains the compound theobromine, which is toxic to animals at certain doses. While most pet owners are aware that chocolate is dangerous for dogs, it's lesser known how dangerous chocolate is for cats.

Symptoms of toxicity vary from vomiting, diarrhea, hyperactivity, coma, seizures, or even death.

In addition to the potential health risks, pets may experience stress during Halloween. Costumed strangers, loud knocking, or a ringing doorbell can all cause anxiety or fear in dogs and cats. Normally

docile animals can turn defensive/aggressive in unfamiliar and often chaotic situations.

Probate V. **Administration**

When a loved one passes away, handling the business of the estate can be complex. Joel and I handle cases where people are killed in accidents and have to set up an estate to handle the lawsuit for the family. Those proceeds are distributed according to state law and not in accordance with any Will that may have been written.

There are major differences between handling estates that have valid Wills and estates that do not. Generally, a Will does not require

a bond or a formal inventory and is self-proving, meaning that there are two witnesses and a notary that witnessed the signing (execution) of the instrument.

With an administration, people must qualify and pay for a bond. Often people do not qualify for a bond. Credit issues, past criminal charges, and other problems can prevent a bond company from issuing a bond. No one wants to pay the cost of a bond. Most people want their property divided as they wish, and a Will avoids many of those problems.

That said, both administration and probate open a door for those who hold claims against the estate of the person who died (the decedent) for a specified period of time and then the opportunity to file a claim is closed. This allows for the transfer or sale of property and other items of the estate to be passed to third parties without the worry of claims being asserted against the property.

Before distributing assets or the money that is available through the sale of assets, the executor or administrator must ensure that all outstanding debts including taxes are paid from the estate.

With a Will, a person may designate to whom they want their property given and they may make specific designations of property such as items that have some sentimental value, usually guns or jewelry. Without a Will, the property or the proceeds of the property is distributed according to intestate succession which is the Will that the state wrote for you. It's not particularly complicated and it's reasonably well thought out, but it's generally not what people would choose, if given a choice.

Writing a Will begins with choosing who you want to handle your estate and how you want your estate to



LEARNING TO DELAY GRATIFICATION IS PART OF MATURING **EMOTIONALLY**

Dear Dave,

I know a big part of your teaching centers around the importance of learning to delay gratification. You seem to believe reaching a level of maturity where you can do this is essential to attain the things in life that are really important. But this can be hard sometimes, no matter how old you are or how mature you happen to be. Do you have any suggestions for someone struggling to reach this point?

Dear Brent,

You're right, it is ard. Sometimes it's it's hard. difficult to leave very the dinner table when



someone's asking if you want another piece of pie. And harder still to go from there to taking a nice, long walk instead. But learning to delay pleasure is part of the process when it comes to growing up emotionally.

When you've practiced it long enough, I think your mind starts to make the connection. You begin to realize that what's waiting down the road—if you'll just apply some forethought and discipline—is way better than whatever happens to be sitting in front of you at the moment.

Here's a quick personal example. The last thing I wanted to do today was get up really early, and go for a long walk. But the thing is, I know in my

mind that I feel so much better the entire day when I get in a little roadwork first thing in the morning. That's why I made myself get out of bed before 2005 DODGE CARAVAN SE, sunrise, and just do it.

I think the whole process starts in the brain, then works its way to the heart, where it promotes understanding-and mature actions. 



- On Oct. 27, 1873, Joseph Glidden, a farmer in DeKalb, Illinois submitted an application to the U.S. Patent Office for his new design for a fencing wire with sharp barbs. His version, using two strands of wire twisted together, was an improvement on the single-strand version created by Henry Rose and became the bestselling such wire in the country
- On Oct. 28, 1787, composer Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart worked all night to complete the overture of his opera 'Don Giovanni," which was scheduled to debut in Prague the next day. The orchestra had no time to rehearse, but sight-read it in the concert hall to a most enthusiastic response from the crowd.
- On Oct. 29, 1618, Sir Walter Raleigh, an English adventurer, writer and favorite courtier of Queen Elizabeth I, was beheaded in London under a sentence brought against him 15 years earlier for conspiracy against King James I.
- On Oct. 30, 1905, George Bernard Shaw's play "Mrs. Warren's Profession," which dealt frankly with prostitution and had already been banned

in Britain, was staged at New York's Garrick Theater, but was closed by authorities after a single performance. The next day the producer and players were arrested for obscenity, but no one (including Shaw) was convicted. The play would not be legally performed in Britain for another 21 years.

- On Oct. 31, 1950. 21-year-old Earl Lloyd became the first African American to play in an NBA game when he took to the court in the season opener for the Washington Capitols. While he would describe joining an all-white team as "intimidating," his teammates were welcoming, though not all fans approved.
- On Nov. 1, 1800, President John Adams moved into the newly constructed President's House, the original name for what we today call the White House.
- On Nov. 2, 2000, the first residential crew arrived aboard the International Space Station, marking both the beginning of a new era of international cooperation in space and the longest continuous human habitation in low Earth orbit, which continues to this day.

Medicare Minute Medicare Advantage Plans

Medicare Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) extends from October 15th through December 7th. This is the time of year you can sign up for or make any changes to your Medicare Advantage Plan (MA) or Prescription Drug Plan (PDP). Over the next few weeks we are going to look at MA and PDP plans and what to look for when choosing these plans.

Medicare Advantage Plans, or Part C Medicare, are offered through private insurance companies that Medicare approves. If you join a Medicare Advantage Plan you still have Medicare but will receive your Medicare Part A and Medicare Part B coverage through the private insurance company offering the MA plan you join. Medicare Advantage Plans are not Medicare supplements.

Here are a couple of rules to remember if considering a Medicare Advantage Plan. To be eligible to join a Medicare Advantage Plan you must be enrolled in Part A and Part B Medicare. You must also live in the service area of the plan. For example, if you live in Lauderdale or Colbert counties you are only eligible for plans that are offered in your county. Just because a plan is offered in Huntsville or Birmingham does not mean it's available in Lauderdale or Colbert counties. Also, you do not have to be 65 to join an Advantage Plan. If you have been on Social Security disability for 24 months and have Medicare you can join a plan.

Over the next few weeks we will begin to look at the six things to consider when choosing a Medicare Advantage Plan. Those six things are premium, copays, coinsurance, deductibles, provider networks and the drug formulary of the plan. We will also discuss the difference between your plan options such as a HMO and a PPO. In the meantime if you have any questions about Medicare Advantage Plans you can contact our office.





The church occupied by the Union Army to stable horses during the Civil War and was extensively damaged by the tornado that struck Tuscumbia in 1874. As a result, the building was reinforced with iron rods and the later addition of buttresses.

St. John's Church was closed for regular services in 1955 but remains of worship today. The church contains original furnishings with early stained-glass windows and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Everyone is invited to be part of this inspiring annual event.







How to Make a Home Safer and More Accessible as You Age

Dear Savvy Senior, What simple tips can you recommend for making a home age friendly? My husband and I are in our late-sixties and want to remain living in our home for as long as possible. Homebody Hanna

Dear Hanna.

Many older adults, like you and your husband, want to stay living in their own home for as long as possible. But being able to do so will depend on how easy it is to maneuver your iving space as you get older.

There are literally dozens of simple adjustments and modifications you can do to help make your home safer and more accessible for aging-in-place. Here's a summary of tips from the National Institute on Aging and AARP, which offers a free room-by-room guide with practical suggestions for older adults living independently.

ENTRANCE WAY:

Have at least one exterior doorway with step-free access. If not possible, consider a ramp.

Add a bench in the foyer to sit on when removing shoes or to set down items while locking or unlocking the door.

BATHROOM:

Install a walk-in shower with a bench and nonskid decals or mats to prevent falls

Add a hand-held nozzle to the shower head to facilitate rinsing off while

Install grab bars on the shower wall and near the toilet

Put in a taller toilet or add a toiler riser.

Consider plugging in a nightlight.

BEDROOM:

If stairs are too difficult to manage, create a bedroom on the main level by transforming a den or an

Make sure the bed is easy to get in and out of. Purchase bed risers, if needed.

Invest in an adjustable bed for extra comfort.

KITCHEN:

Purchase a stove with safety features that alert the resident when a burner is on or have automatic shutoffs.

Relocate major appliances to make them easier to reach.

Add slide-out drawers or trays to existing cabinets for better access.

Install a lever-style, light-touch or sensor faucet, which is easier to use than a faucet with turn-style knobs or handles.

FURNITURE & RUGS:

Get rid of furniture and clutter to make rooms easier to move around in.

Use chairs with armrests, which makes sitting and standing easier.

Avoid furniture with sharp corners, which can cause bruises and cuts when bumped up against.

Hide cords out of pathways — but don't put them under rugs.

Area rugs, if used, should be secured to the floor with a nonslip mat or anti-slip rug tape.

For more tips, get a copy of AARP's "HomeFit Guide" which is a 36-page fully illustrated guide and has more than 100 aging-inplace tips and suggestions that can be made to an existing house or apartment or incorporated into designs for a new residence.

It explains how a smartly designed or modified home can meet the varied and changing needs of its older residents. It also features easy-to-do, low-cost and no-cost fixes that lessen the risk of trip hazards and increase the safety of highuse areas like the bathroom, kitchen and stairway.

In addition, AARP also offer videos and a HomeFit AR app (available for iPhone and iPad) that can scan a room and suggest improvements to help turn your house into a "lifelong home," free from safety and mobility risks.

Visit AARP.org/HomeFit to order or download a free copy of this guide, or to watch their videos. You don't need to be an AARP member to access this content.

If you'd like more handson help, you could also hire an occupational or physical therapist that works with older adults. He or she can come in, evaluate your home and recommend aging-in-place solutions. And if you get a referral from your doctor, Medicare will usually cover a home walk-through.





HISTORY OF VINA

Vina was first known as Jones Crossroads, and later it was called New Burleson before the railroad came through the area. In the early 1900s, the Illinois Central Railroad was built through Jones Crossroads and the town's name was changed to Vina because an engineer on a train had a wife named Elvina that he called Viney. The first store was established by Weatherford and Wren in 1906. The first shipment of goods delivered by the train to Vina was in 1907. On January 10, 1910, the first passenger train came through Vina. The first post office was granted in 1907 with W. H. Weatherford as postmaster. Eighty acres of land owned by a Mr. Rollins and Mr. Wilson were purchased for settlement and is now the present location of Vina. The Town of Vina was incorporated in 1909 and the first ordinance on record was passed on November 2, 1914 with A. W. Wright as mayor and P. M. Spencer as clerk.

Location: 34.3768°N, 88.0587°W just N. of AL-19 on AL-23, Vina, AL

As the marker explains, the engineer on the Railroad that passed through Jones Crossroads, changed the town's name to Vina because his wife's name was Elvina and he called her Viney. The train brought growth to the town in the early 1900s. The population is 400 more or less.
