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More than 5,200 Franklin County residents cutoff from SNAP food assistance benefits due to shutdown

The ongoing shutdown of the federal government is now impacting more than 752,000 Alabamians who rely on Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits to purchase food each month.

As of November 1, 2025, SNAP benefits will cease indefinitely due to the federal government shutdown. Those benefits to Alabamians represent more than \$140 million in support each month.

Additionally, the SNAP supplemental program for Women, Infants and Children, known as WIC will also stop due to lack of funding.

There are more than 110.000 Alabama residents who participate in the WIC program.

SNAP is administered by the United States Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service. Individual states manage the benefits and eligibility for that state's resi-

According to the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, one in eight Americans rely on SNAP to afford groceries each month.

In Franklin County, 5,202 people receive SNAP benefits each month,

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

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Back to the Bible by Larsen Plyler:

Matthew 8:23-34

Jesus and His disciples got in a boat to go to the other side of the Sea of Galilee. A terrible storm blew up. Even the fishermen, who had experience on the sea, feared for their lives. Jesus was asleep. They woke Him in a panic. He rebuked them for their lack of faith. He had said they were going to the other side. Where was their confidence in Him? Calmly and confidently, He rebuked the wind and the sea. The wind stopped and the waves calmed.

The disciples marveled. Jesus spoke with such authority. They wondered, who could this be? The answer: "Yahweh made the storm be still, and the waves of the sea were hushed" (Psalm 107:28-31; see also Ps.65:5-7; 89:8-9; 93:4).

On the southeast side of the Sea, Jesus encountered two demonpossessed men. The demons recognized Jesus' power and their eventual torment. So, they requested to be cast into a herd of nearby pigs. Jesus granted their request. The pigs promptly ran off a cliff and drowned in the Sea. Herdsmen saw and reported what happened. Perhaps due to what the loss of these pigs cost the herdsmen, and the fear of what else Jesus might do, the people of the area asked Jesus to leave.

Lessons to Learn:

Jesus' power certifies His identity and His authority. Jesus demonstrated power over every aspect of existence.

First, He shows His control over the forces of nature. The disciples' question about the identity of a man like this makes us reflect. The Psalms described God as the One who had such power. That points to who Jesus is— God in the flesh (Mt. 1:23).

Then, He showed His power over the spiritual realm. The demon possessed men were coming out of the tombs and they were surrounded by unclean animals. But, the demons, even in an unclean environment, were no match for Jesus. This was a preview of His ultimate defeat of Satan and His forces (see Col. 2:13-15).

These events demonstrated His right to speak with such authority. Jesus has power over what seem to be impossible situations. The disciples were afraid for their lives. No one was able to go in the direction of the demon possessed man. But Jesus, by His word, demonstrated total control. If we are with Jesus, we have nothing, ultimately, to fear. To be sure, the storms we face may not be stilled. Satan still prowls like a lion seeking to devour. But, if we are in Christ we can be at peace no matter what the storms bring (Ps. 107:25; Phil. 4:6-7). And, if we will stand with Jesus, Satan will flee from us (Js. 4:7; I Pet. 5:8-9).

representing 16.3% of the county's population. That falls somewhere in the middle of the percentages of all 67 Alabama counties. Perry County has the state's highest percentage of SNAP recipients, with 44.5% of the population. St. Clair County, at only 5.4% of its residents participating, is the state's lowest county.

While some states have committed to continuing SNAP benefits during the federal government shutdown, that is not the case in Alabama. SNAP is administered through the Alabama Department of Human Resources. DHR will continue to process SNAP applications during the shutdown to determine eligibility but no benefits will be paid during

And SNAP recipients in Alabama must continue to recertify their benefits and report all required information to continue eligibility even though their benefits are suspended.

The reason for this is so DHR can submit each recipient's benefit file as soon as the suspension is lifted, allowing recipients to more quickly use SNAP funds to purchase groceries.

It's a serious problem that has reached all the way to Washington D.C., and Congressman Robert Aderholt, who issued the following statement last week after the announcement that SNAP benefits would be suspended: "Food assistance benefits through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program will lapse on November 1 simply because Washington can't keep the government open. This failure is completely avoidable. Working families should never be used as leverage in partisan battles. If Democrats wish to open discussions about Affordable Care Act subsidies, I say let's do that—but let's keep the government running while we talk. Let's not shut down vital services and leave millions of Americans wondering how they'll put food on the

The current government shutdown, which began on October 1, 2025, results from Congress' failure to pass appropriations legislation, simplified to mean a budget, for FY2025-26, which began that day. With Congress unable to approve a bill funding government services

for the new fiscal year, the federal budget essentially expired as of October 1st.

Democrats are advocating for an extension of tax credits set to expire that make health insurance cheaper for citizens and they want President Donald Trump's cuts to Medicaid rescinded.

Republicans, although they control both Houses of Congress, do not have the requisite 60 votes needed in the Senate to pass the spending bill without some Democratic support.

Trump has said he's not willing to rescind Medicaid cuts and Republicans say they are willing to discuss health insurance subsidies but only after the federal government reopens.

DHR officials are referring SNAP recipients who need additional food support during the shutdown to local food banks, including their local Feeding Alabama food bank. You can visit www.feedingalabama.org for information on what may available.

voices, aspirations and interests of each member of the community matter...Number three—embrace courage...The challenges we face will not be solved alone. Be courageous when difficult choices must be made. Fourth—accountability and results matter. Words are not enough. Your oath is a promise to act and deliver...When you make mistakes, be accountable. And when you make the right choices, always strive for continued improvement," Taylor added.

Taylor's challenge to Mayor David Grissom, and Councilmen David Palmer, Darren Woodruff, Gary Cummings, Lonnie Freeman and Jamie Harris followed some opening words of reflection from Russellville attorney Danny McDowell, who has served as Russellville City Attorney since 2008.

McDowell spoke about the city's veteran leadership. Grissom and Cummings were first elected in 2008, Grissom as District Five Councilman and Cummings representing District Three.

Four years later, Grissom was elected Mayor, Cummings was reelected, Harris was elected to represent District Five and David Palmer to represent District One.

Woodruff was first elected in 2020 to represent District Two, and Freeman won the District Four seat in August. And Grissom, Palmer, Cummings and Harris were reelected in 2016, 2020 and 2025.

"You don't have to look around too much to see what this council and mayor have done over their time in office," McDowell said. "They have spent millions for new fire trucks, police vehicles, equipping the Street Department and they've spent more on paving our streets than

"In 2008 they inherited a financial condition so bad they had to borrow \$500,000 just to pay the bills. The state (auditors) after their most recent audit said the City of Russellville has one of the strongest financial positions of any city in Alabama. That's good government, good management of city resources and good stewardship of the city's dollars," he added.

Grissom and each of the five councilmen were administered their oaths of office by Ret. Franklin County District Judge Paula McDow-

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Hester found incompetent to stand trial on vehicular homicide, assault charges

A Franklin County woman will not stand trial on criminal charges from a September 2023 two-fatality motor vehicle accident that claimed the life of a young mother and her 11-year-old child, after Franklin County District Attorney Jeff Barksdale conceded she was not mentally competent to stand trial.

Pam Hester, 67, was indicted by a March 2024 Franklin County Grand Jury on two counts of Criminally Negligent Homicide and two counts of Assault Third Degree. Each of the charges is a Class A misdemeanor.

34-year-old Jennifer Fretwell and her son died in the September 27, 2023, accident when Hester, traveling north in the southbound lane of Highway 43 around 10:15 p.m., with no headlights on, hit Fretwell's vehicle near the former Catfish Haven restaurant.

Two other teenagers in Fretwell's vehicle, her son and a cousin, were injured and transported by ambulance from the scene. Both teens recovered from their injuries. The two assault charges resulted from the injuries to the teens.

Russellville attorney Jeff Bowling, who represents Hester, filed a motion asking Franklin County Circuit Judge Brian Hamilton to order a mental evaluation of Hester to determine her mental state at the time of the accident and whether she is competent to assist in her defense at trial.

Hester, who resides in a dementia care facility in the Shoals, was evaluated by a State of Alabama Mental Health examiner who found that 'based on Hester's cognitive impairment, it is improbable she could become competent with treatment within a reasonable

could become competent with treatment within a period of time.'

The examiner determined Hester's mental competency to be 'unrestorable.'

After the evaluation, Barksdale's office filed a motion asking the Court 'to find Hester mentally ill and that her mental illness, diagnosed as dementia, poses a real and present threat of substantial harm to herself and/or others.'

The State of Alabama, along with Hester's attorney, will submit to the Court a proposal for her continued mental health treatment that will likely remain in effect until her death due to the severe impairment of her cognitive ability as a result of extreme dementia.

The Code of Alabama, Sec. 13A-3-1, outlines a two-pronged determination to be made by the Court after a defendant's mental state is raised as a defense.

First, at the time of the commission of the acts constituting the offense, whether the defendant, by reason of severe mental disease or defect, was unable to appreciate the nature and quality of his or her acts.

Secondly, a determination must be made whether the defendant, as a result of severe mental disease or defect, is unable to understand the nature of the charges against him or her and unable to assist in his or her defense.

The burden under Alabama law falls on the defendant to prove, by clear and convincing evidence, he or she has a severe mental disease or defect.

After losing two family members, Fretwell's family has been frustrated about the legal process with Hester from the outset, including the fact she was only charged with misdemeanors resulting from the fatal accident.

They channeled that frustration into a movement to see legislation that revokes the driver's license of anyone who is diagnosed with dementia. Additionally, they want to see mandatory reporting by family members and/or doctors to the Alabama Department of Public Safety in such cases.

They created a petition following the fatal accident and gathered more than 1,500n signatures to submit to legislators. The petition can be found on www.change.org and searching 'mandatory reporting Alabama dementia law.'

Although Alabama does not have a law automatically revoking a person's drivers license after a diagnosis of dementia, the Alabama Administrative Code states that drivers cannot have dementia that is unresponsive to treatment and must not have judgment impairment that interferes with safe driving.

Additionally, a physician can report a driver with a condition like dementia, triggering a review of the driver's medical information by the state. This can lead to license suspension or revocation.


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Pace turns passion for antiquing into new business

Russellville-based Synergy South has big plans for city, local schools as part of company's growth

The Russellville Electric Board's largest off-peak customer is a business you've likely never heard of in a location you've probably never noticed.

But what Synergy South is doing within the data center/AI and Digital Asset Mining, or Bitcoin, industries, must be working because the company wants to increase its monthly electricity consumption to between 10-15 megawatts.

Synergy South is located on the south end of Jackson Avenue on property it leases from the REB, just south of the Corridor V (Alabama Highway 24) overpass.

These industries are growing exponentially and use a massive amount of electricity. A key way they keep costs down is to maximize use during off-peak periods, where demand for electricity, as well as the cost, is lower. By doing so, they provide a steady source of demand for electricity during times when excess power is available, primarily late at night or early morning when usage drops off.

The company consumes this surplus power that otherwise might remain unused, which helps to stabilize the power grid. And that 'stranded' energy may then be used in various AT data center industries, as explained by Kar Sola, one of two Synergy South co-owners along with Eddie Cloud.

Bitcoin mining involves the process where transactions are 'officially entered' on the blockchain, and is the way new Bitcoins are launched into circulation.

The complicated process involves Bitcoin 'miners' like Synergy South using massive hardware and software to generate cryptographic numbers that do not exceed a number set by the Bitcoin network's algorithm.

Still confused? You're not alone.

Essentially, the first 'miner' who finds a solution receives Bitcoins as a reward, and the process begins again. The Bitcoin rewards are a the motivation for miners to assist in primary purpose of mining, to earn the right to record transactions on the blockchain for the network to verify and confirm, according to www.investopedia.com.

It's a pricey competition with an ever-growing number of competitors all working toward the same goal. And miners use application specific integrated circuits (ASICs), custom-designed single use electronic circuits, in order to be competitive in the process.

The equipment necessary for Bitcoin mining is expensive and expansive. Synergy South's mainframe computers are housed in storage containers located on the South Jackson Avenue property.

A second Digital Asset Mining industry is in the process of setting up in Russellville once it obtains approval from the Tennessee Valley Authority after an interconnection study, a prerequisite for customers who make large electricity load requests, is completed.

Synergy South has big plans for its growth, and to expand its involvement in the Russellville community. In May 2025, Synergy South, in partnership with REB, funded digital scholar awards for two Russellville High School graduating seniors. The male and female recipient each received a \$2,500 scholarship based on GPA, extracurricular, academic/personal accomplishments and a personal statement paper.

And as Synergy South grows, so will the scholarship recipients. The company will award two digital scholar awards for every 10 megawatts of power provided to the DPS data center.

Additionally, Synergy South, through its Digital Asset Work Guild Program, will employ at least four students per 10 megawatts of power provided, with no cap to the potential number of student employees.

The increased power access will increase the opportunity for students and provide a greater diversity of skills learned through energization of additional cutting-edge data center technology.

These commitments were presented to the Russellville Electric Board at one of the board's business meetings earlier this year, as part of a Digital Assets Scholarship and Training Program.

"This is truly a partnership with the Russellville Electric Board," said REB board member Nick Willis. "You're located on our property using our product and scholarships will be presented on behalf of both of us. We appreciate you being a part of our community and your giving back to the community from the start of your locating in Russellville," Willis said.

Sola described another advantage for his company with the partnership. As competition in the 'global arms race' in the Datacenter/Al and Digital Asset Mining industries increases, his company will require new employees with specialized skills at a rate faster than the educational system can keep up with.

And nationally, if the United States is to keep pace with the digital arms race, there must be training for top students to become leaders or innovators in the industry.

The company also plans to create a cooperative work program for students to learn skills needed in the data center and in hardware maintenance and repair, HVAC and cooling systems, cybersecurity and networking, software design and construction/engineering.

The company will pay students who participate in the co-op work program.

And this is just the beginning of Synergy South's impact in the community, Sola explained.

"This is an up and coming industry that is very competitive and we want to be a leader in this," Sola said. "This is the type of vision that made America great and there are opportunities for rural communities to participate in this industry—the only requirement is electricity.

"We want to focus around the local school and will offer jobs for students. That's really our vision, And through our co-op program, students will come in and learn different facets of our industry. We are definitely looking to fill more jobs with local students and graduates," he added.

Coach of the Year: Madison Lamon, Russellville

The Franklin Free Press is happy to announce its 2025 All-Franklin County Volleyball Team. The team was selected by the FFP staff based on nominations and information provided by the coaches and/or school administrators. The Coach of the Year was voted on by the coaches.

All five varsity volleyball teams in the county had at least three players land on the First Team, Second Team, or Honorable Mention.

This year's FFP All-County First Team consists of three Belgreen players, three Russellville players and one Red Bay player.

For Belgreen, it was a senior trio that landed on the First Team. Carson Hovater led the Lady Bulldogs attack with 276 total kills, recorded 43 service aces, finished with a 97.1 serve percentage, and added 19 assists. Hovater also did her part defensively with 124 digs and 22 total blocks, including 18 solo blocks.

Libero Bryn Scott led the Lady Bulldogs in digs with 572—second most in the county—and helped offensively with 16 assists and 13 kills. Setter Alayna Tate led the county in assists this season with 611, good for an average of 18.5 assists per match. Tate also had 28 service aces, 23 kills, and 267 digs.

Russellville's three First Team selections consisted of two seniors and a sophomore, all of whom broke program single-season or career records during the course of one of the program's best seasons ever.

Senior outside hitter Laila Hill finished with a team-high 450 kills this past campaign, setting

pleted an eight-play, 74-yard drive with a Hayston Scott 46-yard touchdown run on fourth down. The two-point conversion failed, and the Bobcats led 12-8 with 10:48 left in the half.

The first half offensive show didn't slow down as the Bobcats marched down the field, aided by two Red Bay personal fouls that kept the drive alive. Phil Campbell faced a fourth and five from the Red Bay 27, and Logan Cooper's nine-yard run gave the Bobcats four new downs with 6:08 left in the half.

After an incompletion on first down, another Red Bay personal foul gave Phil Campbell first and goal at the seven.

Scott scored again on second and goal from the three, making it 18-8 Phil Campbell. The third two-point conversion was the charm, as Scott connected with Chandler Benford to give the Bobcats a 20-8 lead with 5:08 left.

Red Bay was driving again, but Phil Campbell's Hagen Raper intercepted Jeremiah Thorne in the end zone and raced 77 yards on the return to the Tigers 23. Scott scored his third first half touchdown on the next play. The two-point try failed and Phil Campbell led 26-8.

Vinson took over from there for Red Bay, and finished the quick drive with a 51-yard touchdown run for the Tigers with 1:55 left. After a failed PAT,

the new score was 26-14 Phil Campbell.

A 30-yard completion from Scott to Austin Elliott was negated by a Phil Campbell holding penalty, and the Bobcats faced a first and 17 at their own 13. That crippling penalty triggered the Tigers' first defensive stop of the half, as the teams went into halftime with Phil Campbell leading 26-14. On its first play of the second half, Phil Campbell had a big pass completion from Scott to Raper, but he fumbled at the Red Bay 44 and the Tigers took over.

The Bobcats' defense stiffened and after a three-and-out and a Red Bay punt, the Phil Campbell offense started at its 14 yard line. Five plays later, Phil Campbell's Logan Motes punted for the first time. Red Bay took over at its 40, trailing 26-14 with 8:57 left in the third.

A 41-yard completion from Jeremiah Thorne to Davien Colburn gave Red Bay a first and goal at the Bobcats' one, after another penalty was assessed against Phil Campbell. The Tigers scored on the next play, and the two-point conversion run by Joshua Thorne was good.

With 6:00 left in the quarter, Red Bay now trailed 26-22. The Tigers converted two of their three two-point conversions.

Sensing the urgency of getting a score, Phil Campbell head coach Jacob Hamilton decided on his team's next possession to go for two fourth down attempts on the next drive, including a fourth and 11 from the Phil Campbell 46 and a second fourth and 11 from the Red Bay 43. And his team responded in the clutch.

A 12-yard completion to Cooper kept the drive alive and four plays later, from the Red Bay 43, Phil Campbell executed a double flea flicker to perfection, resulting in a 43-yard TD reception, again by Cooper.

Phil Campbell failed on its fourth two-point try of five attempts, but led 32-22 after three quarters.

Red Bay converted a key fourth down of its own on the next drive, on a Thorne keeper that gained seven on fourth and three.

With first and goal at the Phil Campbell two-yard line, Red Bay drew closer with 6:45 remaining with a Thorne sneak into the end zone. Thorne then hit Colburn for the two-point conversion and it was 32-30 Phil Campbell with 6:43 left in the game.

Phil Campbell needed a lengthy drive to hold onto its lead, and got good field position after a short kick, starting at the 40-yard line. Scott picked up 17 on the first play, giving Phil Campbell a first down at the Red Bay 43.

Ayden Pruitt tackled Downey for a two-yard loss on first down, then Scott followed with a five-yard run, setting up third and seven at the 40. Chandler Benford hauled in a laser pass from Scott, good for 10 yards and a Bobcat first down at the Red Bay 30, with 4:24 left.

Cooper picked up another Phil Campbell first down on a 13-yard run to the Red Bay 17, with 3:24 remaining.

Downey picked up seven yards on the next play, down to the Tigers' six. Scott found the end zone for the fourth time, giving Phil Campbell a 38-30 lead with 2:49 remaining, setting up a massive two-point try. Phil Campbell was flagged for an illegal block, erasing a successful conversion and forcing a failed retry from the 18 yard line.

Red Bay remained with one score, down by eight, as the Tigers' offense began at their 35-yard line.

An 12-yard completion from Thorne to Colburn gave Red Bay a first down at its 47, with 2:30 left. After dropped passes on first and second down, Phil Campbell's Cooper made the defensive play of the drive, snuffing out a sweep for a five-yard loss.

Red Bay's fate came down to a fourth and 15 from its 42. The Tigers went old school with a successful hook-and-lateral for 53 yards to the Phil Campbell five with 1:58 remaining.

Joshua Thorne picked up two on first down, as the clock ticked down to 1:15. On second down, another Jeremiah Thorne QB keeper up the middle brought Red Bay within two at 38-36, with 1:03 remaining.

Phil Campbell was called for offsides on the two-point try, giving the Tigers an easier attempts from just outside the one. Joshua Thorne took it in easily and the offensive showcase was tied 38-38, with the Bobcat offense set to take the field with 1:03 remaining and the drive beginning at the Phil Campbell 38.

After an incompletion on first down, the Bobcats were flagged for delay of game on second down. Scott picked up eight of the 15 yards needed, setting up a big third down and seven from the Phil Campbell 41 with :44 left. On third down, Scott evaded the Red Bay rush for more than 15 seconds before hitting Benford all the way to the Red Bay 34 as :20 remained on the clock.

After Scott dropped the snap, he regained his composure and threw a perfect strike to Austin Elliott in the end zone with :09 remaining. The two-point was good, and the Bobcats led 46-38.

The final seconds ticked off on the ensuing kickoff, and Phil Campbell survived a furious Red Bay rally to close the regular season with a win.

Next Friday, Phil Campbell, 6-4, travels to 3A Region 6 champion Piedmont for a first-round playoff game, and Red Bay, 8-2, will host Sand Rock in its playoff opener.

a new single-season record in that category. Those 450 kills were also the most in the county. Hill also did her part defensively with 15 blocks and 195 total digs.

Fellow senior Fatima Ramirez also set a new program record for the Lady Golden Tigers recording 576 assists, the most any RHS player has had in one year. Ramirez's contributions included 337 digs, 27 total blocks, 108 kills, and 61 service aces, as well.

Sophomore Bri McCulloch is the third First Team selection for RHS. The libero finished with an historic season, setting single-season and career records for digs with 894. That number is not just the best total in the county, it's the most digs in the state and third most in the country according to MaxPreps.com. McCulloch also contributed offensively with 47 service aces, 79 kills, and 139 assists.

Rounding out the First Team was Red Bay freshman outside hitter Kamryn Kuykendall, who did a bit of everything for the Lady Tigers and was the team's most dangerous offensive threat this year. Kuykendall finished with team-high 258 kills (fourth most in the county) and recorded 72 service aces, as well. Defensively, the freshman added 30 blocks and 112 digs.

On the Second Team, Belgreen and Russellville added one player, Red Bay had two and Tharptown had three players chosen. The Honorable Mentions consisted of three players from Phil Campbell; one from Belgreen, Red Bay, and Russellville; and two players from Tharptown.

The Franklin County Coach of the Year, determined by votes from the county coaches, is Russellville's Madison Lamon. In her second season leading the program, Lamon took the team to new heights: the Lady Golden Tigers set a new program record for wins in a season with 41, won the area regular season title, won the program's first area tournament championship, and finished the year in the second round of the Class 5A North Super Regional tournament, the furthest RHS has advanced since the late 1970s.
