



Seniors Not Acting Their Age Stealing Away to Thief Island

Muscongus Bay in the mid-coast area offers some of the most challenging and intriguing sea kayaking on the Maine coast. A significant attraction is a myriad of islands that populate the bay. Located in the west central sector of the bay, remote Thief Island is one of the most interesting and scenic.

I stopped at Thief Island while kayaking with a group a few years ago. We had launched from the east in Friendship on a hurried, lengthy day-trip and didn't have time for an extended visit. I found it to be a fascinating island and have contemplated a return since. When that happened, I wanted to approach the island from the west while simultaneously completing a circumnavigation of substantial Louds

While discussing potential fall sea kayaking options with two frequent paddling companions who had never been to Thief, we decided on a trip to the tiny island. After communicating our intent to other friends, two more agreed to join us.

The small village of Round Pond in Bristol offers the closest public landing to Thief Island. Five of us met at the busy working harbor on a calm, partly sunny morning. Since it was shortly after high tide, we decided to take advantage of the outgoing flow by traveling south and completing a counter-clockwise circum-

navigation of Louds Island located opposite of Round Pond.

We launched from a convenient paved ramp in solo kayaks, maneuvered between a multitude of commercial and recreational vessels moored in the harbor and paddled out into Muscongus Sound. One of the first things paddlers notice when navigating the Muscongus Bay area is the abundance of lobster buoys. The bay offers ideal conditions for lobsters to flourish. Consequently, paddlers need to be alert for preoccupied lobstermen who often have difficulty spotting low profile kayaks.

We crossed the sound in gentle seas and kayaked south approximately three miles along the western shore of Louds Island. Conditions were superb as we rounded the southern terminus and navigated east through a narrow channel between Louds and Bar Islands.

We passed a cobblestone beach on the south shore of Louds Island where the 106-acre Elizabeth Noyce Preserve is located. Progressing beyond the preserve, we entered Muscongus Bay and began our paddle north along the east shore of the island.

When nearing Marsh Island, we opted to kayak west through narrow Marsh Harbor adjacent to the Louds Island coastline. Beyond the harbor, we persisted northeast to rugged Killick Stone Island where

a unique home perched on ledges at the north end captured our attention. Thief Island was soon visible beyond a collection of exposed ledges farther northeast.

Campers and visitors are welcome on Thief Island, where there are two authorized Maine Island Trail Association campsites. A large campsite is situated high on the north side and a smaller one on the rockbound southern end. Landing on the south shore appeared potentially hazardous, so we proceeded north where there is a much more accessible rocky beach.

We disembarked to reconnoiter the island and found the northern site was occupied. Two tents had been erected but no paddlers or boats were observed. We assumed they were exploring the bay.

A trail connects the two campsites. We hiked to the southern end where there are exceptional views of outer Muscongus Bay from giant boulders that enhance the dramatic beauty of the shoreline. I haven't found any information on how Thief acquired its name but there is little room for a brigand to hide on the 9-acre island.

After leaving Thief behind, we traveled northwest past Indian Island and kayaked through a halfmile passage between the northern end of Louds Island and Hog Island. Our adventure wasn't over. A feisty sea breeze had developed while we were investigating the sheltered east side of Louds Island. Strong winds and choppy waves were encountered on our port side while crossing Muscongus Sound towards Round Pond Harbor.


The entrance to the harbor wasn't obvious until we observed a lobster boat exiting through

the narrow opening. The seas calmed and winds diminished once we entered the enclosed harbor. We relaxed while passing numerous moored vessels to the landing. After loading our kayaks, we celebrated our completion of an exceptional sea kayak voyage to Thief Island in spec-

tacular Muscongus Bay.

Merry and Bright Parade escorts Santa to his workshop, Dec. 5

The Wiscasset community is invited to welcome Santa to the Village when a Merry and Bright Light Parade drops the rotund fellow off at his workshop, 7 Lincoln St., on Friday, December 5, around 5:45pm.

According to Wiscasset's light parade organizer, Lucy Oyster, the third annual light parade will be longer and more sparkly than ever, thanks to help from volunteers who have been recruiting more vehicles. People along the parade route will see decorated cars, trucks, and floats, including a wrecker with a car aboard, which might be carrying Santa. Along with the lights, there'll be blow-ups and costumed characters, and some surprises. Last year, one truck carried an 8' high globe, and the Alna snowmobile club's float included a real fire with live people sitting around it enjoying the warmth. Some vehicles trumpet seasonal music. "It's bright and beautiful," Oyster says, and expresses the wonderment of the holiday.

For best watching, the Merry and Bright Light Parade leaves Churchill St. at 5pm, goes down Hooper St., turns right onto Federal St., then left onto Route 1 north (Main St.), and turns right onto Water St. where

it disbands near the Wiscasset Yacht Club.

The parade is ephemeral, lasting only about 15 minutes, says Oyster, and then it's gone. But it's a magical experience while it lasts. Last year, she saw her husband and child sharing the same look of wonder when watching the Merry and Bright Parade pass by, and she wants to assure that all children have magic in their lives. "I can help provide this kind of experience to the whole community," Oyster says, both as a community volunteer and as a member of the Wiscasset Parks and Recreation staff in charge of Marketing and Sponsorships.

Even before the parade passes, the Block Parunderway at Scout Hall, the 7 Lincoln St. location for Santa's workshop. Indoors, children are treated to cocoa and candy canes and are encouraged to make holiday decorations to take home. Parents watch in the background offering encouragement and, cameras ready, record their children's handiwork. When Santa arrives around 5:45, he's greeted by children, eager to share their wish list with him.

Outside, families will find Byre Farm's sheep, gentle enough for petting and running fingers through their deep woolly coats. The farmers, Helen Costello and Jeffrey Patterson, bring 4-H Club members to help with managing the sheep and with introducing them to the kids. Also on the street is a carefully monitored fire pit where helpers prepare s'mores to order, and nearby, other food options are available including warm beverages that can be spiked for adults.

The whole block party experience, says Oyster, is meant to be full of merriment and magic. It's a time for families to come out and enjoy an evening together that doesn't cost a lot but gives them a magical moment together.

In addition to excelty, starting at 5pm, will be lent shopping, Wiscasset Holiday Marketfest offers free and low-cost experiences to the community. 

FAME shines spotlight on achievement at Showcase Maine

MAINE - The Finance Authority of Maine (FAME) celebrated the outstanding achievements of business and education partners at its annual Showcase Maine event at the Westin Portland Harborview Hotel on Monday, November 3, 2025.

Showcase Maine is FAME's signature event, bringing together leaders from Maine's business, lending, government and higher education communities to honor collaborative success. The evening was centered around a showcase of exhibits by FAME's business and education partners from across the state.

This year's award recipients included:

Business at Work for Maine Award - Roselyn North Academy was honored for its dedication to elevating early childhood education in Maine. The Academy's owner, Angela Garrison, said, "I feel like I was put on this earth to provide safe spaces for children to learn and grow. I truly feel like that is my calling and that is why I was put here." With eight early childhood and preschool locations across southern Maine, the Academy has 125 employees taking care of and teaching close to 450 students each day. The academy's mission is to care for and nurture children, families, and educators in their communities. Angela said, "It's very hard to start a brand new business, especially when you don't really have experience in that field.... We really find value in investing in each other and without FAME's support and investing in Maine people, I just don't think any of that would be possible."

Education at Work for Maine Award - Olympia Snowe Women's Leadership Institute's (OSWLI) was recognized for its impact on high school, and for building coalitions across political and geographic lines to help young women realize their dreams. Executive Director Christina McAnuff said, "Research shows that girls lose confidence three and a half times faster than boys. It is critical

that we stem the tide now That's what the program is designed to do." OS-WLI currently serves more than 620 students and is expected to increase that number to approximately 660 in the coming year. An alumna of the program, Tessa Solomon, said, "I have somebody to look up to. I have somebody that I can see myself in and that makes a huge difference." OSWLI provides concrete outcomes including college credits, training, mentorship and development to girls from 38 schools across all 16 Maine counties and continues to explore ways to expand their impact.

Education at Work for Maine Award - Betsy Mayotte, President of The Institute of Student Loan Advisors (TISLA), was honored for her commitment to empowering hundreds of Mainers every vear to navigate a complex student loan system and gain the confidence needed to build resilient futures. Martha Johnston. FAME employee, said, "Betsy is very passionate about making sure people have access to the right information at the right time so they can manage their student loan repayment." In the past year alone, over 600 Maine borrowers have registered for Betsy's student loan webinars and TISLA counselors have provided important support to 1,200 Maine borrowers. The impact Betsy is having is especially important given federal student loan debt in Maine is over \$6 billion. FAME has also directly benefited from "Betsy Briefs" updates that are critical to FAME's success in supporting Maine borrowers. Betsy said, "I really wish more states understood the importance of providing a resource like FAME does for Maine residents."

Partner at Work for Maine Award – Northern Maine Development Com-

mission (NMDC) The Partner at Work Award is a new award presented to NMDC in honor of its significant achievements in commercial lend- FAME to make 12 loans ing, strategic partnerships, for more than \$7.6 million, and economic development. Since 2020, NMDC retaining 74.

has become a cornerstone of rural Maine's economy. Over the last five years, NMDC has deployed nearly 1,000 loans totaling \$46 million, with nearly one third of this capital leveraging FAME funding. Two businesses that have been positively impacted by NMDC are Brassica Property Management, LLC and J. W. Raye & Co., Inc. The businesses received a \$305,000 SSBCI loan through FAME, and along with making repairs and centuries-old replacing equipment, the loan enabled Raye's to retain 12 employees and will allow the company to add up to three new employees in the next two years. NMDC is also a valued partner of the Maine Funding Network. which is a platform that allows Maine businesses to connect to many resources and alternative funding solutions

Lender at Work for Maine Award (over \$1.5 billion in assets) - Camden National Bank was honored for its valued partnership with FAME and its outstanding commitment to Maine people and businesses through innovative financial solutions and community engagement. Over the past year, in partnership with FAME, Camden National made 70 loans for more than \$12 million, creating 109 jobs and retaining 472.

Lender at Work for Maine Award (up to \$1.5 billion in assets) - Acadia Federal Credit Union was recognized for its strategic partnership with FAME and its exemplary commitment to the well-being of Maine's communities and businesses. Congregations host Transgender Day of Remembrance service

BRUNSWICK, ME - By a recent count, at least twenty-five transgender or gender variant lives have been lost in the United States since this time last year. Those are just the murders that have been made known, and in the context of the anti-trans focus of the current administration, we know that underreporting is a fact. Many victims of transphobic violence never have their deaths publicly acknowledged. With the recent bombardment of anti-trans legislation aimed to suppress the trans and gender variant community in this country, the acknowledgement of these tragic deaths is all the more critical. Now, more than ever, it is important to speak their names and honor their memories. To this end, local churches and nonprofit organizations are joining together to host a Transgender Day of Remembrance gathering in Brunswick on Thursday,

November 20. What is Transgender Day of Remembrance?

vocate Gwendolyn Ann Smith began Transgender Day of Remembrance (TDOR) in 1999. TDOR began as a vigil to honor the memory of Rita Hester, a transgender woman who was killed in Alliston, Massachusetts in 1998. The vigil also commemorated all the transgender and gender variant lives lost to anti-Trans violence in the time following Rita Hester's murder. Thus began an important tradition that has become the annual Transgender Day of Remembrance observed throughout the world on November 20th.

TDOR founder Gwendolyn Ann Smith says, "Transgender Day of Remembrance seeks to highlight the losses we face due to anti-transgender bigotry and violence. I am no stranger to the need to fight for our rights, and the right to simply exist is first and foremost. With so many seeking to erase transgender people -- sometimes in the most brutal ways possible -- it is vitally important that those we lose are remembered, and that we continue to fight for justice."

How can I get involved in the Transgender Day of Remembrance?

Join organizers from the Unitarian Universalist Church of Brunswick; First Universalist Church of Yarmouth; Beth Israel Congregation of Bath; First Parish Church in Brunswick; the Sexuality, Women, and Gender Center from Bowdoin College and the Brunswick Pride Committee in a service to honor the transgender and gender variant lives lost this year to transphobic violence.

This Transgender Day of Remembrance vigil will be held at 7:00 pm on Thursday, November 20 at the UU Church of Brunswick located at 1 Middle St. in Brunswick.

While this vigil is being held at a church, it is led and supported by both religious leaders and community members. This TDOR vigil is open to all who support the transgender and gender variant community.

NNEPRA announces major milestone in improvement project

WELLS, ME – The Northern New England Passenger Rail Authority (NNEPRA) has announced that Great Falls Construction has installed the new passenger platforms at the Wells Regional Transportation Center, as well as the structural steel to support elevator towers and elevated pedestrian bridge connecting the new platforms. These critical steps in the Wells Area Improvement Project (Project), sponsored by NNEPRA, mark visible progress toward improved and increased Amtrak Downeaster service throughout the region. The Project, designed by VHB, is being constructed by Great Falls Construction of Gorham, ME with oversight is provided by WSP.

"We're thrilled to reach another major milestone in the Wells Area Improvement Project," said Patrick Harrington, Project Manager at Great Falls Construction. "Placing critical structures using one of the largest mobile cranes in the state required detailed coordination and teamwork. Our project team, alongside our valued partners, executed this effort with precision and a shared commitment to safety. We're proud of the steady progress and the strong collaboration that continues to drive this project forward."

The Project, funded by the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA), the Maine Department of Transportation (Maine-DOT) and CSX Transportation, began in 2021 and includes a 6-mile extension of rail infrastructure, completed by CSX in December 2024, as well as expanded station facilities designed to increase operational efficiency. Once complete, the Project, in conjunction with signal upgrades, will enable Amtrak to operate an additional Downeaster round-trip between Brunswick and Wells scheduled to provide southern Maine commuters with car-free workday ac- as an incredible reminder cess into the Greater Port-





land region.

Quincy Henzel, Director of the Portland Regional Chamber of Commerce, noted the impact on economic growth, commenting that, "This project fuels regional growth by paving the way for expanded service that will benefit businesses, commuters, visitors and our communities across Greater Portland."

The Town of Wells staffs and manages the Wells Transportation Center per a lease agreement with the Maine Turnpike Authority (MTA). Town greatly appreciates the collaborative working relationship we have had with NNEPRA and MTA in the development and construction of this Project, which provides a fabulous opportunity to better connect Wells and surrounding communities to jobs, attractions, and schools between Boston and Brunswick," commented Michael Pardue, Wells Town Manager.

"Seeing the vision come to life on site serves of the transformative impact this Project will have on passengers and communities along the Downeaster corridor." said Patricia Quinn, NNEPRA Executive Director, noting that the new station platforms and facility are expected to be completed in 2026.

According to the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services (MBVS), Maine has a long-standing history of military service and despite it being a very rural state, it is home to over 106,000 veterans, roughly 10% of the state's overall population. In honor of Veterans' Day, the Maine Office of the State Treasurer (OST) is reminding Maine veterans about available resources, and sharing information about recent veteran-related activity in unclaimed prop-

OST runs the state's unclaimed property program, which currently holds over \$364 million in 6 million accounts of unclaimed property that belongs to Maine citizens. This includes money and other financial assets that are considered lost or abandoned when an owner cannot be located after a specified period of time of inactivity.

Treasurer Joseph Perry said, "Maine has a high population of veterans, and we are reaching out to them as part of Veteran's Day to let them know they may have unclaimed property in our care." In addition to \$364 million, the Treasurer's Office also has several military medals, pins, dog tags, and bars. "We'd love to these military items back into the hands of their rightful owners," Perry said.

In honor of veterans, OST recently scanned its accounts and found over 20 veteran-related/veteran-supporting organizations that have unclaimed property, representing well over \$30,000. Outreach to these organizations has been productive. "We've begun reaching out to these organizations to help reunite them with amounts as much as over \$6,000

and as little as \$25," said Treasurer Perry. To see if you or your organization has unclaimed property go to, www.maineunclaimedproperty.gov.

The Office of the Maine Treasurer also oversees Maine's ABLE Program. The ABLE ME Program is established and maintained by the Maine State Treasurer in accordance with Applicable Law and administered by Bangor Savings Bank. The ABLE ME Program (also referred to as "ABLE ME") is designed to help eligible individuals with disabilities save for certain qualified disability expenses on a tax-advantaged basis without jeopardizing eligibility for federal means-tested benefits, such as Supplemental Security Income and Medicaid. The ABLE ME Program is intended to operate as a qualified ABLE program, pursuant to Internal Revenue Code Section 529A, that was adopted as part of The Stephen Beck, Jr., Achieving a Better Life Experience Act of 2014, as amended. This federal law authorizes states and state instrumentalities, such as the Maine State Treasurer, to establish and maintain qualified ABLE programs. Effective January 1,

2026, the ABLE Age Adjustment Act will expand ABLE account eligibility for veterans whose disability began before age 46, a change from the previous age limit of 26. This change, which is expected to include about one million disabled veterans, allows them to save money in a tax-advantaged account while protecting benefits like Medicaid and VA payments. To qualify, veterans must meet the age of onset criteria and either receive Social Security disability benefits or provide a doctor's certification of a disability that began before age 46.

Maine author releases Here to Stay / Lives in 17th-Century Canada

MAINE – Known for writing his family stories, Denis Ledoux has now taken his family writing into the distant past with Here to Stay / Lives in 17th-Century Canada. In his latest book, he writes about four early family members from the 1660s, and by placing them in a vivid historical context, he has created a glimpse into the first century of Canada as Canadian settlers struggled against formidable odds to make a foothold on the continent. Here to Stay is a book filled with heroic effort, profound tragedy and perilous survival.

The exploits of these pioneer Canadians are clearly and compellingly portrayed. Here to Stay / Lives in 17th-Century Canada offers a readable account of the lives of the founding North American settlers.

"What I uncovered

was both heroism and a deep difference between these people and us. Their lives were much harder and certainly more precarious. Death—whether by disease, raids (both English and Indian) or childbirth—was always imminent."

Louis Guimont and Louis Gagné, both among my ancestors, were tortured by the Iroquois and burned to death; Marie-Marthe Pinson, with whom an ancestor lodged, died soon after childbirth, which was the case in one out of every eighty births. Since women had multiple pregnancies, the possibility of a birthing woman dying ran high.

"They were people who lived in a despotic regime that was what we would call today a dictatorship. The early Canadians also adhered to a religion that was rigid and in the service of the government.

Medicine was primitive. If you broke your arm, it was going to be "fixed" by one of your parents. No analgesics available!"

In Here to Stay, Ledoux presents the personal in the lives of four of his ancestors. Because New France was a royal colony. records were preserved in both France and Canada. This duplication provides a plethora of information. By following traces, Ledoux explored various individuals, noting their contracts—land holdings, employment, marriage, birth of children, lawsuits-and he was able to make reasonable guesses about relationships. In one case, he concluded that two men were best friends.

"How often do genealogists find that sort of personal detail?" he says happily.

Here to Stay dives deep below the facts and dates to offer a better understanding of early Canadians. "In all, I spent some ten years researching and writing. I grew to know more about Québec history than about the history of New England where I live."

While Here To Stay is structured around the lives of Ledoux's first four ancestors bearing his family names, it is written as an "everyman" and "everywoman" text.

"Whoever your early Canadian ancestors were," says Ledoux, "they were a lot like these people."

"Books such as my Here to Stay," continues Ledoux, "give voice to people overlooked by history. When you study Canada or the US, you get the names of the muckymucks but not of the average Joe and Jane—or Jeanne—who created lives that sustained the colony. These people were heroes, but they are often relegated to oblivion and so lost to history.

In 1990, Ledoux's short story collection, Mountain Dance and Other Stories, won the Maine Arts Commission's Fiction Award. In both 1992 and 1996, he won Individual

Writing Fellowships from the Maine Arts Commission. He has been helping people to write memoirs since 1989 via The Memoir Network. In 1996, the Association of Personal Historians named him Personal Historian of the Year.

Ledoux has studded this remarkable account with historical information that brings much of the past into vivid portrayal.

Soleil Press is the publishing arm of The Memoir Network, a company which helps people chronicle their lives via memoir writing. The Network has assisted thousands of individuals to start and complete their memoirs.



Legislation to support Maine caregivers

On July 1, Gov. Janet
Mills signed into law LD
815, sponsored by Rep.
Kristen Cloutier, D-Lewiston, which will fund the
Respite for ME Program
to support Maine caregivers. The legislation that
established the program
permanently within the
Department of Health and
Human Services (DHHS),
LD 709, was signed into

law in April.

This legislation is based on the success of a two-year Respite for ME pilot program which offered grants of up to \$5,171 over two years to Mainers providing care to loved ones at home. The evaluation results of the program, which concluded in September 2024, clearly demonstrated its success, with participants reporting that they felt better equipped and more resilient in their ability to sustain their essential caregiving roles

"Right now, nearly one in eight Mainers are providing caregiving support to a loved one, which could include taking care of aging parents, spouses or children with disabilities. Studies have shown that Mainers provide up to \$2.9 billion in unpaid care annually," said Cloutier. "This program will help give more of these caregivers the resources they need to be successful. Stakeholders like the Alzheimer's Association of Maine, the Maine Council on Aging, AARP and others who fiercely advocated for this program are the reason it is now a reality, and I am grateful for their support throughout the last few years."

LD 709 will permanently establish the Respite for ME Program. It directs DHHS to administer the program for the purpose of providing respite care

and supplemental services for family caregivers and older relative caregivers. Codifying this program permanently into state law is critical in order to utilize all available federal, state and local resources.

LD 815 will work in partnership with LD 709 and provide ongoing funding to the Office of Aging and Disability Services within DHHS for respite care and supplemental services for family caregivers and older relative caregivers

The new laws went into effect on Sept. 24, 2025.

Rep. Kristen Cloutier is serving her fourth term in the Maine House and represents House District 94, which includes part of her hometown of Lewiston. She is the House chair of the Taxation Committee and serves as a member of the Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee.

Fall enrollment up at Maine's Community Colleges

AUGUSTA, ME – Fall enrollment is up three percent at Maine's community colleges, marking another historic high enrollment for the seven colleges.

"This sustained enrollment growth is critical at a time when Maine's economy needs more skilled employees in a range of industries that we specifically target for high-quality, low-cost instruction – from construction to computer science. This ongoing demand is a sign that we are executing on our mission of providing an education that works for Mainers looking to find meaningful work and a better life," said David Daigler, president of the Maine Community College System (MCCS).

Significant initiatives at Maine's community colleges in recent years have played a large role in continuing the system's role as the state's premiere workforce training partner.

Recent changes include new transfer agreements with the University of Maine System and six independent Maine colleges aimed at making the four-year college pathway more affordable and seamless; Free Community College scholarships that cover 100% of tuition for the high school graduating classes of 2020-2025; expanded instruction hours and new remote learning options; new certificate and degree programs to meet market demands; and academic

initiatives that increase student success and improve the student experience. At the same time, the colleges serve as vibrant community centers with new housing options, new sports teams, and additional student events and activities.

As of October 15, fall enrollment was 15,833 students, up 3% from 15,366 students on the same date last year. Tuition and fees for a full-time in-state student are \$4,156 a year, the lowest in New England.

Starting this year, MCCS has changed the way it reports fall enrollment to exclude Early College students, who are high school students taking community college courses at their high school or at a college campus. The new reporting method aligns MCCS with the University of Maine System, which began excluding Early College students from its enrollment reports several years ago. The change also ensures transparency in the makeup of Maine's community college student body.

Using the new model, fall enrollment at Maine's community colleges has increased 20% since fall 2019 (the last pre-COVID fall class) and increased 13% since 2017.

Although official fall enrollment figures only capture degree-seeking students, MCCS has also significantly expanded short-term workforce training programs that take less than

a year to complete and are generally free for students. These short-term programs are coordinated by the system's Harold Alfond Center for the Advancement of Maine's Workforce. Since 2022, 45,000 people have enrolled in those programs, which focus on quickly and efficiently acquiring a particular skill - such as basic construction skills in 10 weeks, a three-week welding course with a weekly \$500 stipend, or a compact nine-month option for a medical assisting program.

MCCS is on track to train more than 100,000 students in short-term workforce training programs by 2030, the result of a historic five-year grant from the Harold Alfond Foundation. Graduates of the short-term program are eligible for scholarships toward a degree or certificate program.
