





# Comcast/Xfinity Service Disruption: Update & Repair Timeline

Thank you to everyone who reached out with questions and concerns regarding the recent Xfinity/Comcast service interruptions. We want to provide a clear update on what occurred and what to expect moving forward.

The initial outage on Tuesday, November 4, was caused by a line that was accidentally cut during work performed by the Verizon cell-tower contractor near Hermosa. This disruption affected portions of the community until Comcast was able to restore service.

Comcast has since installed a temporary above-ground fiber line to bring service back online as quickly as possible. They have confirmed that the permanent conduit repair is scheduled for later this month. As Comcast transitions service from the temporary line to the permanent one, there may be a brief interruption.

We will continue to monitor Comcast's progress closely and provide updates as we receive them.

Thank you for your patience and understanding as this work is completed.

# The Bylaws Revisions—Vote Yes and Pay Less Rising Maintenance Costs and Protecting Our Community's Future

Since The Villages' Bylaws were last revised in 2006, the cost of maintaining our buildings and amenities has risen dramatically. These increases affect roofs, painting, landscaping, and infrastructure repairs—and they are especially pronounced here in the Bay Area. It is time to revise the Club Bylaws to remove Capital Improvement limitations and add a Capital Fund Fee paid by new owners

For example, in 2005, replacing a 1,700 to 2,000 square-foot asphalt shingle roof typically cost between \$6,000 and \$12,000 (\$3.50 to \$6.00 per square foot). In 2025, that same roof may cost between \$15,000 and \$45,000, depending on materials and local labor rates. Building codes have also become more stringent, requiring Title 24 energy compliance and full roof sheathing for older tile roofs. These changes improve safety and energy efficiency but add cost to every major repair.

Labor costs have also increased sharply. In 2006, California's minimum wage was \$6.75 per hour. Today it is \$16.50 statewide and \$17.95 in San Jose—a rise of over 160%. Skilled trade wages have risen even more. These increases directly affect the cost of maintaining our shared amenities and common areas.

The current bylaws limit the amount of capital funds the Club can collect, hold and spend with annual increases based on the consumer price index, which has increased by only 60% since 2006. The key construction cost for our projects have increased from 200% to 300%.

Understandably, our residents living on fixed incomes are concerned about rising costs. The Board fully recognizes these concerns. Our goal is not to spend more, but to plan responsibly so essential maintenance is done when needed, preventing more costly repairs later. Deferred maintenance can lead to sudden, much larger expenses that burden everyone.

The Board and management team continue to review long-term maintenance schedules, seek competitive bids, and prioritize projects to minimize financial impact. At the same time, updating our bylaws and budgets to reflect current realities helps protect both property values and the quality of life we all enjoy at The Villages.

Thoughtful planning today ensures that The Villages remains safe, beautiful, and financially stable—for all residents, including those on fixed incomes.

The Club Bylaws Committee will be holding a second Town Hall style meeting on **Thursday, December 4** at **5:30 p.m.** in the Cribari Auditorium to present the proposed changes to the Bylaws and answer your questions.

# More birdhouses coming to the golf course

Villager Adrien Fournier has resumed his volunteer role of building birdhouses for the golf course. Years ago, he constructed the first set when the course earned certification through the Audubon Golf Course Sanctuary Program. Now, as part of the recertification process, Adrien has built eight new houses to support the program's Wildlife & Habitat Management efforts.

Local bird enthusiast Mary Fullerton advised that the houses will likely attract western bluebirds and sparrows. The main difference between the two designs is the entry hole: bluebirds need a round opening, while sparrows prefer a narrow, oblong one. To discourage other species from taking over, the houses were built without exterior perches.

Each birdhouse began as a 6-foot by 7-inch redwood board, fastened with glue and deck screws. Adrien refined the



process as he went—spending about an hour on the first build and less than 30 minutes on the final one. The finished houses include ventilation slots, drainage holes, and a side panel for easy cleaning, which is recommended twice a year.

The new additions are simple, durable, and designed to welcome feathered residents for years to come. Construction plans were adapted from the Audubon Spokane Chapter.

# 'A Thanksgiving Story'

In the late 1960s, my mother, sister, and I immigrated from the Philippines to join my father who had arrived in the United States several years before us. As we stepped into the airport terminal, I found myself awestruck by seeing people who looked different than what I was used to in my country. Furthermore, I couldn't understand what they were saying. As a young child, I was scared; I cried and desperately wanted to go home. But this new place was to be our home moving forward.

Over the years, I have seen the United States increasingly becoming a multicultural nation. During my elementary school years, there were students in my classes who were of Japanese, Filipino, and Hispanic ancestry along with those of European ancestry. By the 1970s, our school had its first Vietnamese students. When my own children were in elementary school, they had several friends who were of Indian (not native American) lineage. I am sure when these children arrived from their "home" countries, like I had, they were overwhelmed and afraid by the unfamiliarity of this new land.

Such was the case when the first European immigrants came to this country many, many years before. They were no longer on familiar territory. The other people they met were unlike all the other passengers on the Mayflower. Communication with these people was difficult. Yet during their most challenging time, the Pilgrims became friends with some native Americans who showed them how to plant corn. The following autumn, they reaped a plentiful harvest.

The pilgrims came to this land to find religious freedom, my dad, like many others, came for better work opportunities, some came to escape political turmoil. We all came for different reasons and from different countries along with our diverse traditions, languages, and cultures. However, despite our differences, we are all made in the loving image of God, which makes it possible for all of us to build good relationships with each other. The pilgrims can thank the native Americans for their survival. As a child, my best friend was of Caucasian ancestry. She introduced me to my first hamburger. At my birthday party, she had her first taste of lumpia, which is like a Chinese eggroll. Every year, I appreciate the bright and beautiful lights of Diwali that are displayed in my neighborhood and the delicious food shared by my neighbors of Indian heritage during their cultural festival celebrations. Our openness to connect with people who are different from us shows us a part of God that we would not be able to experience if we chose not to do so. The diversity of God's creation shows us how awesome God the creator is!

I think about how we all can get caught up in our own little world while the Lord tries to get our attention to help us, and we resist for whatever reason.



# Looking Back... Life during the Villages' Infancy

In searching through some old Alliance Club documents, I enjoyed reading Some histories notes about the early days in our Villages community. The Villagers Alliance was formed in the early 1980s. The mission of The Alliance was to attend board meetings and provide information monthly to all Villages' residents via a newsletter. Several of us were Alliance members for several years—until it was felt (in 2013) that adequate information was available then for Villagers with our weekly newspaper and later our website.

Alliance members were asked to describe what it was like when they moved to The Villages. According to a very early resident—Jean Donovan. The first residents moved into Cribari in 1967. She moved here in 1969 when Cribari was not yet completely populated. She recalled that Guy Atkinson (whose construction company built Cribari, the first village) had a vision of a community for couples whose children were grown, and were now ready to have a new lifestyle for the The Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA) "empty nest" years.

During a 2010 interview with Lou and Annette Rosenberg (a former Club Board President) she said that they arrived here in 1977 when the minimum age for residents was 45-she explained, "That's how we got in." Children over 16 and out enlisted the help of other residents to help with a monthly blood pressure clinic. In of high school could live with their parents in The Villages. That rule changed in the 1980s, when the minimum age changed to 55.

By 1980, only Cribari, Montgomery and Hermosa Villages were completed. Verano was about to be built out. There was no Corporation Yard — only temporary trailers, and the Rosenbergs had a clear view of the nearby Mirassou winery from their house on Claret Court in Hermosa.

In the beginning there was one Board for all the residents, not like today with three separate boards. The Board of Directors included two property developers and five Villagers. Instead of a general manager, The Villages were managed by a management company until 1978 when a GM was hired. Dick Nelson was the original GM for several years.

There was no Clubhouse—only a snack bar. There were no Buildings A, B and C or Corporation Yard for staff. Administrative offices were all in Cribari Center. The library was in the balcony of the Cribari Auditorium.

A small grocery store occupied one of the rooms that now make up part of the library. The Bank of America was in two "trailers" on a permanent foundation on the site of the Fitness Center. The bank trailers later became the Cribari Club Room when the bank moved outside the gates. A Villages computer and printer were located in the library for residents to use.

There were two doctor's offices across from Cribari Center, with a Dr. Condi and an ear, nose and throat specialist, plus a pharmacy. The Villages Medical Auxiliary (VMA) was organized in 1976 at the request of the doctor. He requested three things: A blood pressure clinic, transportation for patients to medical appointments, and a medical supply loan program. These three programs are still provided today by our amazing VMA organization.

Back in the day, there were no bar codes for vehicle access to The Villages. Public Safety officers checked Villagers' decals on each vehicle, and guests needed to be processed as they do today. Villagers and guests all used the same lane.

Fairway Drive was one lane and ended before Vineyard Center (which was not yet built). Villages Parkway stopped at Cribari. There were no white line "sidewalks" and no directional house-number signs. The Villages' garden site was moved two or three times. It started in Highland; then it was moved to the Olivas area before it was moved to the present area above Valle Vista (now joined by a second garden complex near the horse stables)

The two-lane road to The Villages was lined with orchards and farmhouses. Eastridge shopping center was on the drawing board and promised. There was no Evergreen College, and no Yerba Buena Road leading to it. The closest shopping was at White Road and Tully or out on Almaden Avenue and Blossom Hill Road. San Felipe Road was very narrow. Sometimes cars would go over the side of the bridge near the entry road to The Villages.

The Villages Activities Committee and the Arts & Crafts Association were the first groups to form. The Villages Amateur Theatre organized in 1974—originally under the wing of Arts & Crafts. The Camera Club was originated by Arts & Crafts as well.

The July Fourth parade and celebration began in 1970. The parade was strictly made up of golf carts and people walking. There was a fireworks display on the median strip of Cribari Lane for several years.

How did the VMA begin? At the beginning of time (Villages time), one of the first residents was a physician named Dr. Robert Condi. He practiced here for years and found that he could use some help with his ever-growing group of patients. He 1975, Villages management held a meeting in the auditorium where he presented his proposal for the auxiliary he envisioned. The Villages Medical Auxiliary was born.

In 1991 the VMA and another group of concerned residents attempted to interest a developer in building a "life care facility" in the neighborhood. During that time the VMA became aware of the concept of "life care without walls." It was then realized that the VMA could provide more services in order to help residents remain in their own homes until assisted living facilities were needed. In 1992, funds were raised and arrangements made with the Visiting Nurse Association to have a part-time nurse at the Villages. It soon became apparent that most of the work was assessing residents' needs, rather than providing care. Therefore, the VMA decided that a social worker might better provide these assessments.

The VMA contracted with the Northern California Presbyterian Homes to provide a full-time social worker to work with residents and their families to make recommendations. The VMA also offered weekly blood pressure clinics on Wednesdays and offered medical equipment loans to residents. The first Influenza Vaccination Clinic was held in 1976. Transportation to medical and dental appointments (within 20 miles) became an important part of VMA services and trips for grocery shopping and to hospitals and convalescent facilities were provided by volunteer drivers. From the very beginning the VMA was funded by donations and fundraising activities. All residents are members of the VMA.


#### Senior Resource Services (SRS)

The August 8, 2002 Villager announced the Club Board's approval of a service group called Senior Resource Services (SRS) to assist residents seeking information to plan for their futures. Such needs involved the use of financial resources, understanding insurance coverage, preparation for consultations with attorneys, etc. All assistance was (and is) free and confidential. The SRS motto was: "Villagers Helping Villagers." From 2002 to 2007, the SRS grew from five volunteers to more than 15 active volunteers. Their backgrounds were quite varied and included accounting, law, insurance, investments, banking and in antiques/collectibles. SRS received an office located near the Post Office in Cribari Center and began scheduled office hours. In 2007, SRS averaged between 60 and 90 office visits, telephone calls and home visits per month. The staff answered routine questions, gave out literature, and, when necessary, directed Villagers to paid professionals.

#### The Villagers Alliance (disbanded in 2013)

The Villagers Alliance was formed in 1980 by Bill Hurley. His stated purpose was to "further the common interests of all Villagers." He attracted a group of like-minded residents to join him. A committee from this group frequently met with the general manager to discuss the concerns of the residents and they also recruited capable people to become candidates for the boards of directors. With the formation of the district advisory committees (DACs) and nominating committees, it was no longer necessary for the Alliance to perform those functions. The group distributed a newsletter to subscribers to provide a summary of board There was no Vineyard Center or Foothill Center. The only pools were at Cribaria and management actions. The organization also conducted an annual "Meet the Candidates" night and urged all residents to to vote in all elections. Since 1990 the group made a gifts to The Villages or some Villages' organizations with their surplus funds. It contributed a portion or paid in full for the following: a piano for the Music Society, two picnic tables for Gazebo Park, the clock over the entrance to the Clubhouse, a microphone for meetings, the lighted sign at the Clubhouse entrance, the drinking fountains in the Cribari foyer, bocce courts, a defibrillator for the VMA, and an emergency generator and other supplies for the Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC). It established the Bill Hurley Memorial Scholarship program for employees or their children.

#### The Villages Amateur Theatre (VAT)

It was September of 1974 when an article appeared in the Villages' paper announcing that the Arts & Crafts Association was interested in forming a drama group. Six interested residents attended the first meeting. The membership was more than one hundred by 2007.

In 1974, the first performance of the Villages Theatre Arts was a comedy presented at the Halloween Black Cat Ball. In spite of the white box set, and the absence of sound equipment and theater lights, the actors gave a great performance—climaxing with a pie in the face of the bad guy! The group grew rapidly, and a 1975 variety show, "A Night at Minsky's," was enthusiastically received. The \$3 ticket included dinner, the show and dancing afterward! The first full-length play, "Curse you, Jack Dalton" was next in 1976. In 1980, the group became the Villages Amateur Theatre (VAT), when it "grew up" and became an independent organization. From 1974 to 2007, 47 full-stage productions were produced, including comedies, melodramas, variety shows, and several short plays. Other activities included plays for the Children's Easter Egg Hunt for eight years, and participation in the July Fourth activities and parade.

In 1993, the VAT Readers' Theatre was born. It presented its first mini-musical, take-off of a well-known Broadway show in 2002.

#### The Villages Library

The library at the Villages began quietly and gradually in 1967. It was housed on the mezzanine of the auditorium and the library collection was the result of donations by residents and the cooperation of the Seven Trees branch of the San Jose Public Library. The public library would make 150 to 200 books available each month upon the return of the previous month's supply. By 1973 the library offered books, magazines, jigsaw puzzles, games, records and paperbacks gleaned from donations. Educational films were borrowed from the public library on a monthly basis. As the supply of donated books accumulated, new shelves were added. Books and records were supplied to shut-ins. Signing for borrowed books was not required. Consequently, the number of books missing was excessive. A card catalogue was established in 1976. The public library participation was withdrawn in 1978. In 1983, a request for funding from the Villages was granted. The library's collection continued to grow with the funding available and the generous contributions from residents. In 2001 new steel shelves were installed. As part of the upgrade, the rugs and furniture were cleaned and the rooms were painted. In 2004 a program for selling books and audio-visual items began and was held every Wednesday morning. The proceeds were used to purchase library supplies.

#### The Villages Music Society

In October 1984, Marshall Dahneke, a retired music teacher, moved to the Villages. After 34 years of teaching high school and college music, he wanted to remain active. He ran a request in *The Villager* in 1985 inviting musically talented residents to meet with him to form a Village Orchestra. Eight musicians gathered in February in the Cribari Conference Room and formed an orchestra. In May, the new 13-member orchestra presented its first concert to a retired teachers' association. In December, a 35-member orchestra played two Christmas dinner programs to standing ovations.

A Villages Dance Band was formed in 1986, and played with five saxophones, two trumpets, a piano and—if lucky—a drummer. Enthusiastic and vigorous "conscription" brought the group to full strength by 1987 with 17 members plus a vocalist. Villagers enjoyed dancing to the music of the Swing Era.

Dahneke organized a band in late 1986. He reasoned that a band would be more appropriate for July 4 and Veterans Day and to present outdoor concerts in the summer, too. By 1990 the Concert Band reached a membership of 36.

In 1987, all these groups were under the new Villages Music Society.

In 1993 the first meeting of the future Villages Piano Club was held with Fredone Jones and Bobbie Cronquist as "ringleaders." When they outgrew private homes, the first Program for Listeners was held in the Cribari Conference Room in April 1994. The free Program for Listeners has continued over the years.

Earl and Kathi Levin formed a handbell ensemble in 1996. With Barbara Schultheis, they even bought the first four octaves of handbells themselves. Some of the first members were members of the Village Voices. In 1999, Dahneke moved away and the Concert Band was directed briefly by Frank Ybarra and Wendal Reid before Dr. Hal Peterson, a teacher, composer and director, was hired in 2002.

Ken Carter, a Villager with diverse solo, choral, and vocal performance background became the Village Voices director in 2000 with a group of 65 singers.

In 2001, a professional concert series was established through the VMS with international artists. The series featured various solo and chamber groups, opera singers, pianists and Broadway singers.

#### The Villages Hiking Club

Just ten years after the Villages were established, in 1977, Andrew Fischer put

an article in *The Villager* stating that a meeting would be held in the Sewing Room (now the Cribari Forum) to form a Hiking Club. Ten people responded and Andrew was elected president and he served in that office until 1985. Everyone met at 8:45 a.m. on Wednesday and Saturday mornings, hiked until noon, ate lunch, and hiked another couple of hours, returning around 3:30 or 4 p.m. The group thought 10 or 12-mile hikes were perfect. Until 1985, Andrew kept a notebook listing every hike, who attended, and how many miles were walked, but that history ended when he resigned as president.

The club's membership grew rapidly. Tom Richter pulled a bench behind his motorcycle to install at the top of the ridge in the Hill Lands and also installed the trailhead mailbox with a sign-in book. One of the trails now bears his name. Members took an active part in the maintenance of the trails. In addition to the Villages trails, the group regularly carpooled to many far-flung locations and occasionally chartered bus trips. Monthly potluck dinners were started early on, and the first annual St. Patrick's corned beef and cabbage dinner was in 1989. The annual Christmas party was first held in the Cribari Auditorium and later moved to the Clubhouse. The Hiking Club has relied on its members to volunteer for the many tasks involved in keeping the club going and Villages "active seniors" get great satisfaction in being part of a closely knit group with common interests.

#### **Arts & Crafts Association**

Many years ago, when the only villages were Cribari and Montgomery, the Villages Arts & Crafts Association was founded by Emma Pouch, Gertrude Thompson, and a group of friends. It not only included arts and crafts, but also the Dance Club, Camera Club, Music Club, Choral Society, Theater Arts, Medical Auxiliary, Bingo, Wood Shop, etc. In the early days, Villagers could take classes in oil and acrylic painting, watercolor, pottery and ceramics as well as classes in cloisonné, enameling, decoupage, lapidary, square dancing, Chinese brush painting and making Chinese jade trees. An annual sidewalk art sale was held in conjunction with the Hi Twelve June pancake breakfast. In the fall, the Boutique craft sale was a big hit. And each month there was a reception and an exhibit for an individual artist or for an instructor and students. The Association's Holiday Faire celebrated its 35th anniversary in 2007 with an annual crafts sale. Jean Sorenson and Ingeborg Larsen started the annual art exhibit known as Art in the Park. Both events continue to benefit Villagers and the artists and crafters exhibiting.

Rama Firth told some interesting stories about the early days when the Association sponsored concerts, exhibits, an Oktoberfest, a hula club and dances. She recalls Cribari Auditorium filled to capacity with the Saturday night dances when Cribari and Montgomery were the only two Villages that existed. Firth was the first president of the Village Voices as it broke away to form its own group. As interest and membership increased, each group broke away to form its own club. In addition to exhibiting arts and crafts, the Association continues to give back to the community by making donations to Villages groups. Instrumental from the earliest years were also Noreen and Paul Betten, who started the Villages Boutique—a gift shop in Cribari Center—in 1997 as a venue for Villagers to sell their arts and crafts.

#### The Senior Academy

Learning something new everyday keeps the "blue" away! The Senior Academy for Education was formed to help you do just that! In 2002, a group of Villagers decided that "An Active Senior Community" meant active minds as well as active bodies. A former Club Board President, Richard Harrington, gathered a group to discuss his dream of having an organization that would provide life-long learning opportunities for residents and the surrounding community. The Senior Academy for Education (SAFE) was then born. Initially, programs featured a seminar on interpersonal relationships, a music appreciation workshop, a lecture on the "Big Bang" theory and other topics. The Senior Academy brought in lecturers from the larger community—TV personalities, political analysts and other experts. The Senior Academy established ties with San Jose State University, hosting outstanding SJSU faculty presenting a variety of topics. A Partnership with the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at San Jose State University in 2005 marked the beginning of a major development for the Senior Academy, which negotiated a partnership with the Osher Institute at SJSU. Through this arrangement more interesting classes were made available to the Villages. In 2006, the Villages Board of Directors approved Club sponsorship of the Osher Lifelong Learning Program through the Community Activities Office. All the group's growth fulfilled the Senior Academy's mission: "To develop, promote, and support stimulating and provocative programs that contribute to the intellectual life of the members of the Villages Golf And Country Club and the surrounding community."

#### Tips from the Pro-Rain, Rain Go Away

If you endeavor to play in the rain or just after a rain event, here are some tips for playing on wet turf...

**Allow for less run** - When the ground is wet, the ball won't run as far. Obvious, we know, but this needs to be factored in to how you play. Less run off the tee may mean you can take more club on holes where you would normally hold back. Approach shots are more likely to stop dead on landing; chips and pitches are more likely to grab; and putts will be slower, meaning they need to be hit more firmly and will therefore take less break.

**Play the ball back** – It's easier to hit the ball fat with your short irons when it's wet. So move the ball back in your stance 1-3 inches to help contact the ball first. Also try to remove excess vertical action from the swing by keeping your wrists firm and the clubhead lower to the ground on the backswing.

Hit more firmly in the rough - Wet grass will grab the club much more than normal and slow the clubhead's progress. So keep everything firmer than usual through impact in wet rough to stop the grass grabbing the club...so grip the club a little tighter, swing firmly, and play the ball back in your stance 1-2 inches. # Keeping your home and

What happens upon your death if you own your Villages home in your name alone? Let's say you have a simple will, leaving your home to your two children. Upon your death, your home will require court probate to transfer the ownership. Current probate fees begin at 4% for the first \$100,000 of value, 3% for the next \$100,000 and 2% for the next \$800,000 and then become 1% after \$1 million. And this fee is usually charged twice, by both the court and the estate attorney.

Similarly, if your bank and brokerage accounts are in your name alone, they too must be accounted for after your death.

Probate fees can be avoided by setting up a Living Trust and titling your home in the name of the trust, as well as retitling your bank and brokerage account. Alternatively, you can add one or more joint tenants to the deed and your accounts.

You may believe that your estate is not large enough to merit the legal cost of establishing a Living Trust. Joint tenancy with your children avoids probate, but it can cause problems of its own. Your joint tenants would legally own part of your home and your accounts. You would need their permission to sell or refinance. The creditors of your children could place a lien on the home. You will likely lose some of your Prop. 13 tax base so your property taxes will increase.

Also, upon creation of the joint tenancy, you would need to file a gift tax return. In addition, upon your death, your heirs will be stuck with part of your original home cost when calculating the gain on sale and will likely owe income tax. And most importantly, you can't change your mind and take the others off the deed because a permanent legal gift was made.

California law has another alternative to avoid probate: The Revocable Transfer on Death (TOD) deed. This deed names the beneficiaries who will receive the property without the need for probate when the property owner dies. Your heirs do not own any of the property during your lifetime, avoiding the joint tenancy problems. But when you die, the real estate is transferred to the designated beneficiaries just like your Payable on Death bank accounts. You can revoke your TOD deed at any time by notarizing and recording a Revocation of Revocable Transfer on Death Deed. Also, you can add beneficiaries to bank and brokerage accounts so that they are directly transferred to them upon your death.

SRS suggests you talk with an attorney before making this change. Your decision for a TOD deed may be confirmed or you may be persuaded that another solution such as a Living Trust is better for you.


