Update on winter flood preparedness presented at joint news conference **held November 19**

The event, held in partnership with the County of Santa Clara, the City of San José, and the National Weather Service, highlighted regional efforts to prepare for the upcoming winter season.

The news conference on winter flood preparedness highlighted regional coordination, the use of advanced monitoring technology, and community readiness.

Key messages from representatives of Valley Water, Santa Clara County, the City of San José, and the National Weather Service emphasized collaboration, tracking storms with command centers and drones. and urging residents to prepare for unpredictable weather by creating emergency plans and heeding warnings.

Santa Clara County assessor candidates head to runoff election

ith all the votes counted in the race for Santa Clara County assessor, the contest is headed for a December runoff between Los Altos Vice Mayor Neysa Fligor and former Saratoga Councilmember Rishi Kumar.

Saratoga Councilmember Yan Zhao and East Side Union High School District Board Member Bryan Do placed third and fourth place, respectively.

The two runoff candidates agree big changes are needed at the Santa Clara County Asses-

sor's Office, including the completion of an ongoing tech modernization and reform measures to reduce assessment and appeals times.

But each also maintains their own background is best suited to carry out those reforms.

"I will be the first to tell you that there are things that need to be improved," Fligor, an employee in the assessor's office, told San José Spotlight. "But I also bring a fresh perspective, and when I see that change needs to be made, I'm the first one to say, let's figure out how to do this and do it well."

that there really are opportunities," Foley said at a news conference held at the grand opening on Monday. "This community... reflects our belief that every person deserves a chance to rebuild their lives."

The tiny homes have been funded with about \$9 million from the state and \$7 million from Measure E, a property transfer tax approved by city voters in 2020. San Jose also received more than \$2.5 million in philanthropic donations. Developer Dignity Moves received up to \$15 million to design and construct the site. The city has allocated \$3.3 million for operating costs from Oct.1 to June 30, 2026.

Dozens of homeless people previously lived on the land, which sits across from Hampton Inn and other major businesses and homes. The

city cleared the camps where the site sits by January and Valley Water established a no encampment zone to prevent people from returning. People who camp on the property can be charged with an infraction or fined under the water agency's policy.

The genesis of the Cherry Avenue project began in 2022, when the Valley Water board directed employees to look for ways to address homeless people living on agency land. Valley Water partnered with San Jose on a plan for its Cherry Avenue property, and in June 2023 the City Council approved temporary housing on the site — with the intention to move homeless people living there into the future tiny homes.

"I urge all government institu-

tions to consider this dynamic intergovernmental relationship," Jim Beall, District 4 director on the Valley Water board and former state lawmaker, said at the grand opening. "We end up with a lot more (housing) projects when that happens."

The Cherry Avenue tiny home village is the 11th temporary housing site to open in San Jose this year. Tiny homes on Branham Lane opened in February. Then came the Berryessa safe parking site, Via del Oro tiny homes, Taylor Street safe sleeping site, five motels converted to homeless shelters and the expansion of Rue Ferrari last month. One more site is scheduled to open this year, the Cerone tiny homes.

Once that is finished, San Jose will have added nearly 1,240 spaces for homeless people to stay — nearly tripling the city's capacity from last year, according to city data.

At the Cherry Avenue grand opening, Mayor Matt Mahan emphasized the city is upholding its promise to bring 1,000 beds online by the end of the year.

"Exactly 300 days ago, we stood in the same spot and broke ground on the community we see before you here today," Mahan said. "I shared the results that were proving that this



Continued from previous page approach was starting to work. I told you that San Jose had seen a 10% drop in unsheltered homelessness, while the rest of the state saw a 10% rise."

San Jose has 6,503 homeless residents. Unsheltered homelessness in San Jose has dropped more than 1,000 people since 2022. Roughly 3,959 homeless residents are unsheltered, or about 60%, and 2,544 are sheltered, according to the latest point in time count con-

ducted in January before the 11 sites opened. Still, the city has experienced a slight increase in its homeless population, up 237 people, from the last count in 2023.

San Jose is working to bring unsheltered homelessness down to 50% and reach "functional zero" — when the number of people exiting homelessness is greater than the number of people becoming homeless.

"If we stay determined to end the crisis on our streets, this city really is going to do it," DignityMoves CEO Elizabeth Funk said at the grand opening. "I'm proud to be a part of it."

VTA Awards \$750,000 to advance transit access, community resilience, and engagement across Santa Clara County

he Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) announced more than \$750,000 in grant funding to support projects that improve access to public transit, strengthen community resilience, expand inclusive engagement, and celebrate community identity across Santa Clara County.

These investments, going to 14 recipients in four different categories, help cities and nonprofits advance equitable, transit-oriented communities (TOCs) that connect residents to opportunity while promoting cultural vibrancy and sustainability.

This is the second year VTA has awarded these grants to various organizations and cities in Santa Clara County. The award presentation was held at the San Jose Museum of Art on Nov. 12.

Program Area A: Transit Access and Circulation Planning (\$350,000)

Program Area B: Community Resilience – Total Funding: \$200,000

Program Area C: Education and Engagement – Total Funding: \$100,000

Program Area D: Placemaking and Cultural Activation – Total Funding: \$100,000

Together, these projects share a regional commitment to building equitable, connected, and culturally vibrant transit-oriented communities across Santa Clara County according to VTA officials.

oversee the office of 250 workers and its \$55 million budget. She first joined the assessor's office in 2024 as a special assistant to the assessor.

In contrast, Kumar has a background as a Silicon Valley tech executive. In the assessor's race, he has positioned himself as a tax hawk with the technical and managerial chops to lead the assessor's office in a new direction.

"We need somebody who is a reformist, somebody who's not an insider, and can reorient the assessor's office to make it work for the people," Kumar told San José Spotlight.

The race was sparked over the summer by the retirement of longtime County Assessor Larry Stone, who held the role for 30 years. The winner will finish out Stone's term through the end of 2026, but will then need to run again for a full four-year term.

Whoever emerges victorious will take the helm of an office responsible for assessing the property values that make up the county's more than \$700 billion real estate and business property rolls. Such assessments have profound implications for property owners as well as the county's prospects for gathering property tax revenue.

Fligor has secured Stone's endorsement, along with a bevy of South Bay establishment politicians, including Congressmember Sam Liccardo, Assemblymember Marc Berman and District 4 County Supervisor Susan Ellenberg. Kumar has racked up endorsements from local elected officials, including former Assemblymembers Kansen Chu and Nora Campos, as well as Cupertino Mayor Liang Fang.

Fligor's vote lead is matched by an even larger funding advantage. So far, she has raised more than \$298,000 through donations and loans, according to recent campaign filings. Kumar has raised roughly \$22,000. He said he has turned down some donations from special interest groups to maintain his campaign's independence.

Fligor — a lawyer who previously worked for both HP and Santa Clara County — has criticized Kumar's credentials, pointing out that, unlike her, he lacks an official certification as a property tax appraiser. All California assessors are required by law to obtain the state-issued certification within one year of taking office.

"It demonstrates that I already know the work in the office," Fligor said. "I'll be able to hit the ground running on day one."

Kumar said he wouldn't have trouble obtaining the certification. Regardless, Kumar made the case that his own experience is best suited for the challenges presently facing the assessor's office. In particular, he argues his years of experience in the tech sector as a C-suite executive have given him the right mix of skills to shepherd forward the intricate process of transferring the assessor's office onto a new computer system. The long-awaited modernization project got underway after the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors approved the purchase of the new system in June.

"We need somebody who understands modernization," he said. "When I was part of IBM, we did modernization. I was a hands on guy ... I was living and breathing that world for almost 10 years."

During the campaign, Kumar has also highlighted his various efforts to block fee and tax hikes over the course of his career in local government. Most recently that has included the No on Measure A Tax Committee, which Kumar chaired. Santa Clara County voters on Nov. 4 passed Measure A — a five-eighth cent sales tax increase intended to fill a major federal funding gap — with 57% of tallied votes cast in its favor.

Kumar has attempted to carry his taxskeptical politics into his platform for assessor as well. His signature campaign initiative is a plan to sponsor a state ballot measure to completely eliminate property taxes for many homeowners aged 60 and over.

The plan has sparked considerable pushback. Fligor calls this campaign strategy "irresponsible," noting the county assessor has no direct authority to set tax policy. But Kumar argues the assessor's prominent role in local politics offers a prime opportunity to push for the reform.

While Fligor's vote lead in the November election is formidable, the runoff campaign remains competitive, Melinda Jackson, a San Jose State University political science professor, said.

"A county assessor race does not get a lot of attention," Jackson said. "It will be starting fresh with a new electorate in December."

The weather outlook presented at the news conference by Tom Chin, Deputy Director of Santa Clara County Office of Emergency Management, highlighted the significant influence of a developing La Niña pattern this winter, which typically leads to drier-than-average conditions for Southern California and the southern tier of the U.S., but greater uncertainty for Northern and Central California.

Key points from the forecast included:

- La Niña Conditions: La Niña conditions have officially emerged and are favored to persist through the winter months (December 2025 February 2026), likely transitioning to a neutral phase by early spring 2026.
- Precipitation Outlook: The typical La Niña pattern suggests a higher likelihood of drierthan-normal conditions across California and the Southwest. However, forecasts for Northern and Central California, including Santa Clara County, have low confidence and show equal chances of below-average, near-average, or above-average precipitation.
- Current Conditions: Despite the seasonal outlook for drier conditions, recent storms have led to a strong start to the water year, with some areas tripling their normal rainfall amounts through mid-November.

Officials stressed that California is prone to "extreme shifts from droughts to floods" and that potential flood flows on rivers could increase due to a greater frequency of mois-

ture-heavy storms. Valley Water and its partners monitor conditions in real-time and are prepared to open their emergency operations center during storm events.
