"This project reflects Florence's commitment environmental stewardship, innovation, and efficiency, said Mayor Ron Tyler. "We're proud of our recycling team and their dedication to keeping clean and Florence forward thinking. Every can recycled here has the potential to be reborn just a few miles away at Constellium in Muscle Shoals, supporting local jobs and fueling one of the most advanced aluminum recycling operations in North America. We hope everyone will do their part and keep those cans and bottles coming to help Eddy, and Maggie stay

busy."
"Adding this level of automation allows us to recover more materials efficiently," said David Koonce, Solid Waste, Street, and Recycling Manager. "Eddy and Maggie have already made a difference. Every can that goes into your bin helps them do their job better. The more our community recycles, the stronger our program becomes."

The project was funded through a \$95,797 Alabama Recycling Fund \$95,797 (ARF) grant, bringing full automation to the metals sorting line. Installation included partners Marathon Equipment, Hoosier Machinery Solutions, Thompson and Rents, Keeton

During the ceremony, guests watched aluminum cans zip, pop, and fly into bins as the automated system came to life. Representatives from ADEM and Constellium, global leader aluminum manufacturing joined for a and recycling, city officials demonstration, followed by a facility tour.

Residents are "feeding the line" by encouraged aluminum recycling steel cans, and paper, cardboard, and plastic bottles in a curbside cart, at a county drop-off location, or at the Florence Recycling Center. Every recycled item helps keep valuable materials out of the landfill and supports local manufacturers.

Muscle Constellium Shoals, located just down the road from Florence, plays a key role in the recycling loop. Home to the largest used beverage can (UBC) recycling facility in North America, the plant has the capacity to process over 20 billion can's annually. Operating 24/7, the site employs approximately 1,300 team members who transform UBCs through melting, casting, and rolling. The finished coils are shipped to customers across North America, enabling cans to return to store shelves in as little as 60 days.

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

The most valuable gift we can give each other—and ourselves this year might just be our undivided attention. In a noisy world, a little quiet connection is truly priceless. Happy, and mindful, holidays.

Sure, no cash in circulation can reduce the frequency of burglaries, employee theft, sales of stolen guns, and bank hold-ups.


If stolen, cash is essentially Editor untraceable. It is also useful for criminals and illegal transactions. But NO cash?

Revolution of Divine Tenderness

In Luke 1:46–55, we hear Mary's ancient song of praise—what the Church has long called the Magnificat. It rises from the lips



of a young woman who has just been told she will bear the Christ child. Her response is not fear, but a bold and joyful proclamation of God's upside-down kingdom: the proud scattered, the powerful humbled, the hungry filled, and the lowly lifted high.

In 1933, the German pastor and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer called Mary's hymn "the most revolutionary Advent hymn ever sung." Revolutionary—because Mary dares to believe that God will remake the world not through domination or force, but through mercy, justice, and the surprising power of smallness.

Mary's hope is not naïve. It is rooted in the way God works throughout Scripture. The Apostle Paul later writes that God chooses "what is weak in the world to shame the strong," so that no one can boast. Even King David once sang, "Your gentleness has made me great." God's revolution comes clothed not in intimidation but tenderness.

And that is why Christmas still draws us in. Like Mary, we gather because we, too, have been swept into this quiet revolution of divine love. We have felt its warmth—sometimes gently, sometimes unexpectedly—turning our own hearts tender.

Only the light of Christ can warm a cold heart. Only the tenderness of the Christ child can soften a hardened one. In this season, we remember that Christmas is God's love letter to a weary world: a promise that winter will not last forever. Hope is already here, alive in us, leading us toward a future bright with God's mercy.

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

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Medicare Minute Prescription Drug Plans 2

When looking at a prescription drug plan the first thing that most people look at is how much the plan cost. There are drug plans that cost less than \$20. There are also plans that cost more than \$100. Conventional wisdom tells us that something that cost \$100 has to be better than something that cost \$20, but when talking about Medicare prescription drug plans this isn't necessarily true. You have to look deeper than the premium of the plan to see if it's the right fit for you.

One important part of a drug plan is the deductible phase of the plan. A deductible is the amount of money you must pay out of your pocket before your plan will begin to pay. For example, if your plan has a \$615 deductible you may have to pay the first \$615 before the plan will pay. The good news is plans treat deductibles differently. Some plans have deductibles on all tiers of drugs. On some plans the deductible only pertains to tier 3, 4 or 5 drugs but not tier 1 or 2 drugs. Other plans have no deductible at all. The way to know if your plan has a deductible on the prescriptions you are taking is to look at the plan's Formulary to find your drug's tier and the Summary of Benefits to see if you have a deductible.

You will also want to know if the plan requires you to pay a coinsurance on any of your prescriptions. A coinsurance is a percentage you will pay on your prescription. A lot of plans have a coinsurance on tier 4 and tier 5 prescriptions. This means if you have a coinsurance of 20% on your prescription, and the prescription retails for \$500, you would pay 20% or \$100. Next week we will look at copays, formularies and provider networks.



Witnesses, Facts, and Cases

Last week I settled a case that had taken place in a county well south of here. The plaintiff (my client) had been rearended hard enough to explode the airbags in the car that hit him from behind. That driver's grandson helpfully told everyone at the scene that "his grandmomma was going to have eye surgery the next day.

My client saw this case as a slam dunk winner. The grandmother claimed that traffic had stopped suddenly and my client had slammed on his brakes causing the accident. That never registered on my client and I know that because of what happened at the mediation before trial.

I'm sitting in the room with my client when he asks if I want to see the video. I said, "what video?" that's when he tells me he had a dash cam. I very much wanted to see the video.

The video showed it exactly as he had described. Traffic slowed, he stopped, and after he stopped, a solid three seconds later, grandmother slams into him. When I got back to the office, I told Joel and he said, "they just don't get it, do they?'

I can not emphasize enough that just because a person was there and has their version of what happened (which to them seems like a fact), doesn't mean that version is going to be believed. This case was set for trial in December. It would have been a three-day trial where the grandmother would have said that my client caused the accident by stopping suddenly and there very well may have been a couple of the people on the jury who could see it her way. That doesn't mean my client loses necessarily, but it sure could bring the amount of damages down. My client had some preexisting issues and those are more difficult to value when there is controversy about who caused the accident, and it carries over into other parts of the jury deliberations.

All evidence is important. If you have it, keep it, and let your lawyer know about it. Do not post anything on the internet about your accident. Almost anything is going to be taken wrong.

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
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

and that eliminates the need to deposit, withdraw, and protect physical money.

However, a cashless society would not be favorable for everyone.

A cashless society would be heavily discriminatory against the less affluent in society. People with low income or debt tend to find cash easier to manage.

According to a recent FDIC survey, just over 25% of all Americans would currently unable to participate in a cashless system, because they either use no banks (6.5% - don't have the necessary accounts) or are underbanked (18.7% - may have a checking or savings account but they also tend to use financial products and services the banking outside system.)

Many senior citizens are less comfortable with tech, less able to switch from physical currency, and more trusting/susceptible to scams.

People in rural areas

could also be vulnerable because of poor internet connectivity.

In addition, in a cashless society, your child can't weed the neighbor's flower bed to earn a little summer cash. There will be no more piggy banks for your child to collect pocket money, to learn the value of earning, saving, and giving. We can't save an extra \$10-\$20 per week in cash and change for a rainy day or splurge fund. We can't have little side gigs to help cover emergency expenses or to simply put food on the table.

Public charity collections like the Salvation Army Red Kettle Drive will be no more. No more cash gifts or loans to relatives or loved ones. No more side bets on the game or office pools.

Forget about cash being "dirty" or carrying Covid. All your debit, credit, gift, and business cards... and your keys can and do harbor the same germs.

The first dollar bill was printed back in Abe Lincoln's day, and cash has been plentifully in circulation since the 1870s. It is legal U.S. tender that gives you control over how you trade with society. Cash helps provide our independence. It is our right to pay with cash. If you want to use a card, it should be your choice, not mandatory.

In a cashless society, a bank or other financial entity will have full control and details of every dollar you own, every penny you spend, every store you visit, and every transaction you make and when you make it. All your movements and actions are traceable.

And that means government have access to all that information if they decide they want it. Access to your money can be suspended or blocked instantly for any number of reasons, legitimate or not, bank mistake or not, political or not. And don't think it can't happen. If you are not familiar with "Arctic Frost," Google it and read information from sources other than Wikipedia.

In recent years, UNA made their home football games a cashless venue. Purchases may be easier to track for them, and going cashless may eliminate theft at concessions, but that doesn't make it convenient for the patron.

We would be wise to keep cash on hand, especially for the little things. It makes little sense to pay for a candy bar or a 69¢ senior coffee with a card. The consumer doesn't need to keep track of small purchases like that on bank statements, and the merchant doesn't need the unnecessary service charge deduction. That will only serve to increase prices to the consumer.

Although cashless may help to reduce theft and fraud, data and cybersecurity issues are an ever-increasing worry. And those concerns are justifiable.

The threat of cyber criminals is very real, and system vulnerabilities are rampant. Hackers are constantly finding new ways of maneuvering through established security systems. We hear about data breaches and identity theft regularly. And all of that is associated with the push to increase

our online presence.

In addition, when you pay digitally, you leave a digital footprint that financial institutions retain. Who will be harvesting that data to track spending habits and force-feed us information?

Many people also feel that cashless spending is more difficult to control. It's way too easy to put \$50 against a card with one scan. You hardly blink. Handing over a 10 and two 20s makes it real, and more emotionally and cognitively impactful. We will think more about the value of that purchase.

Most credit card and mobile payments also attract a 3% processing charge for businesses, often cutting into small profit margins. However, independent shops and small outlets now pass those on to the customer immediately at checkout. That's another ding for the card user, all so the card merchant can chisel another couple of dollars for their "service."

Cash is a trusted, instant, convenient, reliable, and essentially secure way to purchase many items, and it still makes sense when it comes to everyday spending and budgeting.

Using cash matters to people on lower incomes, older age groups, and those who prefer doing business face to face with physical interaction.

It's likely to happen, so advise your children what to do when pulled over by police.

Nobody wants to get pulled over. Getting pulled over can be stressful and scary for drivers. If new to this situation, consider following these steps when you see flashing lights in your rearview mirror:

Slowly pull over. Use your turn signal and proceed to a safe location along the right side of the road. If the location seems dangerous, continue driving until you find a safe, well-lit place to stop, but turn on your hazard lights to indicate you see the officer. As long as it's clear that you intend to pull over, most officers will understand.

Be wary of unmarked vehicles. If the officer is driving an unmarked vehicle, don't be afraid to question their validity. You can call 911 to verify that the unmarked vehicle pulling you over is an on-duty officer. Or, ask to see the officer's badge and photo ID. If the officer won't present it, request to call another officer. Always call 911 if the situation appears to be threatening or unsafe.

Follow the officer's instructions. Roll down the window and place both hands on the wheel. Do exactly what the officer asks, including providing your license and registration once requested. Alert the officer before reaching into the backseat, the glove compartment or into a purse or other bag.

Stay calm. Talk to the officer in a calm manner to avoid escalation of the situation.

Return to the road safely. Once the officer has processed your information and written a warning or ticket, and after they've said you may leave, put on your turn signal and look for oncoming traffic. Merge slowly onto the road when it's safe. Always remember to buckle up – a fine for not wearing your seat belt is one less thing you should have to worry about.

Proof of insurance

If you get pulled over, you will most likely be asked for your license, registration and proof of insurance. Are you prepared to show that information quickly? Is it at your fingertips? It's a good idea to always be prepared. You should always carry your vehicle's registration card in the glove box. As for proof of insurance, every state now accepts electronic proof of insurance on your phone using a mobile app.
