

With the divide between the two major political parties in the United States at an all-time high, one Franklin County man offers a pathway to reforming government in his new book.

Vina resident Eddie Puckett's latest release, "It's Time for a Political Spanking: No More Weaponizing Government—A Citizen's Blueprint to Rebuild the Republic," pulls no punches, with a scathing review of American politics and its continued erosion as a result of partisan poli-

FCCDC grant recipients include Russellville Middle School, Tharptown band

The Franklin County Community Development Commission met November 21, 2025, and awarded grants to multiple schools and first responder agencies.

The commission, which includes Brad Bolton, Jeremy Campbell and Red Bay mayor Mike Shewbart, meets quarterly to review grant applications. The commission is comprised of two appointees from Franklin County's legislative delegation and a rotating seat between the mayors of Russellville and Red Bay. Sen. Larry Stutts reappointed Bolton and Rep. Jamie Kiel reappointed Campbell to another four-year term.

With the most recent grants, more than \$3,170,760.08 has been returned to Franklin County since the inception of the funding. The funds come from in lieu of tax payments from the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Grant awards for the November 21st meeting included:

- -\$500 to Tharptown High School Band for new uniforms.
- -\$800 to Belgreen Elementary School for computer lab upgrade to equipment.
- -\$250 to Red Bay basketball for TipOff Club sponsorship.
- -\$800 to Russellville Middle School for purchase of translation devices.
- -\$800 to Belgreen High School for materials for Math Resource Library. -\$800 to Franklin County Sheriff'



Back to the Bible by Larsen Plyler:

Matthew 9:18-34

A synagogue ruler came to find Jesus because his little girl died. But, he had confidence that Jesus could raise her. On the way to the house, a woman with a 12 year blood issue touched the fringe of Jesus' garment, seeking healing. When she touched Him, Jesus turned, saw her, and commended her faith which He said had made her well. Perhaps He wanted her to know it wasn't magic or superstition that had healed her. It was her faith in Him.

When Jesus made it to the ruler's house, there was a commotion of weepers. Jesus said they should leave because she was just asleep. They laughed. But, Jesus went in and raised her like He was waking her from sleep.

Jesus left and two blind men cried out for mercy from the "Son of David." They were blind, but they saw who He was. They had faith in His ability. Jesus touched their eyes and they were healed. He wanted them to keep to themselves about it, but they spread the word.

Leaving there, folks brought a man who was mute from demon oppression. Jesus cast out the demon and the man spoke. The crowds were amazed and said nothing like what was happening had ever been seen in Israel.

Jesus' opponents, the Pharisees, said He did this by the devil's power. Jesus will address that accusation later.

Lessons to Learn:

Jesus— more than a carpenter. If Jesus was only a carpenter from Nazareth, the only help He could have offered was to build a casket. But, He was more. He was able to wake her from her sleep. That's all death for those who have Christ will be (I Cor. 15:51; I Thess. 4:13-18).


Remember that Jesus' healings and miracles, whether it is raising the dead or healing the blind, point to His ultimate spiritual power. He longs to give us true life and real sight.

Don't let folks whose sin or bitterness shape their thinking convince you to doubt Jesus.

Puckett, a retired dispatcher whose career as a public safety professional spans three decades, has penned nearly 30 ebooks, each available for download on Amazon.

His latest work goes beyond simply bemoaning the fractious state of American politics. Puckett offers some real-life solutions, with 10 common-sense reforms that call for citizens to remember government exists solely because we allow it to, not because government allows us to speak.

Puckett's books reflect his conviction that one person's actions can make a lifetime of difference, but only if we are willing to act. "I wrote this after 25 years behind the microphone as a 911 dispatcher—listening to voices on their worst day. The pattern never changed: when people call for help, they don't ask what party you belong to. They just want someone to show up and fix it. That's what this country needs now—someone to show up and fix it. Not for a party, but for the people," Puckett said.

While politicians argue with increasing partisan divide, Americans have seen prices soar while communities crumble.

"Enough is enough. This country wasn't built by career politicians; it was built by citizens who showed up when something needed fixing. Farmers, factory workers, dispatchers, medics, truck drivers—people who didn't wait for permission to do what was right. "That's who we are. That's who we still can be," Puckett said.

Chapters in his new ebook address term limits, media bias, political transparency and the power of citizens to recall elections. It's a blueprint for change to restore to government to its intended role of serving the citizens.

While recently retired from a career of public service, Puckett remains an active member of the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, where he serves in a leadership and volunteer emergency management support role.

The 48-page "It's Time for a Political Spanking" is available for purchase on Amazon for \$2.99, and it's free to download for Kindle Unlimited subscribers.

Puckett's other ebooks span a range of topics that draw upon his professional experience, including "Because of a Little Girl's Tears: A Life of Service, Compassion and Purpose," his most popular ebook, to "Bless Your Heart and Pass the Sweet Tea," a lighthearted collection of true Southern stories.



The 2025 Belgreen High School varsity girls' basketball team, in its 11th season under head coach Chad Green, is coming off yet another successful campaign in 2024-25.

Last year, the Lady Bulldogs won a fifth-straight area championship and finished with a 24-9 record, advancing to the regional tournament at Hanceville.

While Belgreen will be without top-scorer from a year ago, Dacota Green, who graduated, the Lady Bulldogs are not without experienced players who will need to pull together if Belgreen is going to win a sixth straight area crown.

Since taking over as head coach of the program over a decade ago, head coach Chad Green has continued to build success with the Lady Bulldogs' program, and one can expect that to continue with most of last year's starters returning.

These players include seniors Bryn Scott, Alayna Tate, Isabella Tate,

and Carson Hovater, as well as junior Lilliana Willingham, who was a key defensive player for the team last year, and Mackinley Hogan, who also saw a lot of playing time.

Scott and Makenna Fisher are the Lady Bulldogs' two returning players that made the *Franklin Free Press* All-Franklin County Second Team in 2024-25—Scott, who plays point guard and directs the offense in addition to showing defensive hustle; and Fisher, who will likely be one of those needed to pick up the slack on the offensive side. Randi Terry, one of the younger players on this squad, is also a good shooter, and Willingham, with her length, can get the ball to the basket effectively, as well.

Kiera Smith is a player to watch. While she saw limited time at the varsity level last year, when she did get into games later in the campaign, she impressed with good performances.

senior Leela Baker, who reached the 1,000 career points milestone early in the 2025-26 campaign. The 2025-26 campaign will likely be another one of growth for the Lady Tigers who appear to be a little short handed on depth this season.






