Rainbow of generosity powers food shelf for 15 years

On the quiet northwest shore of Mille Lacs Lake, generosity has found a permanent home. In a town better known for weekend cabin traffic and lake breezes than bustling commerce, Garrison residents have built something extraordinary: a thriving thrift store that keeps a vital food shelf running and the community fed.

The Christian Bible tells us to give food to the hungry and the poor, in Garrison, that message has become a mission.

"We are on track to have our biggest year ever," said Jacobs, manager of DoroHow to donate

Many Twin Cities cabin-goers and visitors swing through Garrison with donations in tow. Because Dorothy's Rainbow has limited space, the store accepts small, clean, usable items like clothing, toys, and household goods. They cannot take full-sized appliances or furniture, which donors are encouraged to bring to the Lakes Area Habitat for Humanity ReStore at 415 8th Avenue NE in Brainerd.

The food shelf, preparing Christmas boxes for local families, is especially in need of paper products, shelf-stable proteins (canned meat, fish, beans, peanut butter), and cash donations to help purchase fresh items like milk.

ago. On Dec. 15, 2010, the thrift store officially opened its doors. Next door, the food shelf — long in search of a stable home — finally

The journey to a permanent food shelf began around 2008, when the organization debated whether to rent or buy. Enter Dorothy and Norman Barthel, a well-off couple with no heirs and a desire to give back. It was Norman who urged the purchase of the Madison Street property; the Barthels covered much of the cost before paperwork was finalized in fall 2010.

Dorothy passed away one month before the store's opening.

"She was crazy into rainbows." recalled Walther. "So we decided that was the name for the building.

Even after purchase, the large building posed a challenge: how would the food shelf and Caregivers cover utilities and expenses? That's when Erickson suggested using extra office space for a thrift store.

"Of all things, it was Christmas time," remembered De-Jonghe. "So in the middle of Christmas, we were starting

Street home nearly 15 years to open a thrift store." An open house introduced it to the community — and the community didn't forget it.

> Dorothy's Rainbow has grown into a destination thrift shop, expanding well beyond its original office space. Today, the food shelf occupies the back of the building while the shop hums with volunteers, bargain hunters, and visitors who stop in just to say hello.

> "We've given out a lot of food this year," Jacobs said. "And we can always use more."

A lifeline for local families

Each Tuesday, as regular as the lake's waves, Tim De-Jonghe unloads a truck full of donations for the food shelf — a scene repeated week after week, year after year.

For families needing help, the food shelf is open on Tuesdays, 1–5 p.m. at 9541 Madison Street.

Minnesota's economy is lagging

One Minnesota Chamber of Commerce just released its new Business Benchmarks report, and it confirms what many of us have been feeling for a while. Minnesota used to stand out for strong growth and a high standard of living. Now we are slipping behind. From 2019 to 2024 our real per capita GDP grew only 1% while the national rate was nearly twice that. Job growth ranked 39th. Labor force growth ranked 40th. Household income growth ranked 46th. Nearly 48,000 more people left Minnesota than moved here from 2020 to 2024.

The report points directly to high taxes and heavy regulations that make it difficult for small businesses to grow and create good jobs. Minnesota has the second highest corporate tax rate and the sixth highest personal income tax rate in the country. That hurts local job creators. It also slows down innovation and tech growth. Families are moving because other states offer a better chance at building a future. Our cost of living ranks 19th highest nationwide while nearby states like Iowa and the Dakotas remain far more affordable. Young people and workers are choosing opportunity elsewhere.

Affordability comes up in nearly every conversation I have across the district. People tell me their paychecks do not stretch like they used to. Families are trying to keep up with the rising cost of housing, energy, groceries, and everything in between.

Two years ago Democrats

had full control in Saint Paul and an \$18 billion dollar surplus. They could have used it to deliver real relief to working Minnesotans. Instead they spent every dollar, increased government spending by 40%, and raised taxes by ten billion more. The priorities were clear, and helping regular people with everyday costs was not one of them.

Minnesota still has everything it needs to thrive. What we do not have is a governor who puts affordability first.


