#### Farrington challenges Gov. Mills no bid contracts

MAINE - Assistant Senate Republican Leader Matthew Harrington, R- York, sent a letter to Governor Janet Mills requesting answers surrounding her administration's use of no-bid contracts. Sen. Harrington's inquiry comes after changes have been made to the cover page for nobid contracts and reporting on numerous no-bid contracts of questionable need.

Among the questionable no-bid contracts Harrington highlights in his letter are expenditures on a "happiness expert,"

payments to statewide news outlets for positive coverage, and hundreds of thousands of dollars to house a non-citizen at a residential care facil-

These expenditures, along with State Auditor Matt Dunlap's 2024 Single Audit Report, which found dozens of material weaknesses and significant deficiencies in the administration's procurement processes, raise serious concerns about the use of both state and federal taxpayer funds.

"We've all seen reporting about absurd no-

bid expenditures coming from the Mills administration. Now, on top of that, they've changed the non-competitive procurement form to seemingly make it easier to bypass the competitive bidding process," said Assistant Senate Republican Leader Matthew Harrington, R-York.

"Maine's taxpayers deserve to know exactly how their money is being spent. I hope the Governor will answer the simple questions I've posed to her regarding her adment processes."



This winter, we present a formidable choral program entitled "I Have a Voice."

The seed of this concert was originally a concept of "power." Themes and memes of power, much of it formulated and wielded in aggressive and destructive ways, are everywhere with us these days. While recognizing this, we did not Joan Szymko's Malala lifts want to offer a concert that embodied that same posture or tone. Instead we aimed to

The concert title comes from the song A Beautiful Noise, written by eight women and recorded by Brandi Carlile and Alicia Keyes. Other songs on the program include Rise Up, a setting by Jake Runestad of some powerful words of Susan B. Anthony; and Eric Whitacre's Sing Gently.

#### Seniors Not Acting Their Age A Memorable Hike to the Summit of Day Mountain

In my opinion, there is no place in Maine that offers more outstanding outdoor recreational opportunities than Acadia National Park (ANP) on Mount Desert Island. The 47,000-acre park includes 26 named mountain peaks for hiking, 46 miles of crushed stone Carriage Roads ideal for biking, and numerous opportunities for sea kayaking along 64 miles of rocky coastline.

My wife, Nancy, and I have been taking fall vacations in ANP for over 40 years. We began when our two sons were little boys and have returned with family and friends almost every year since. For many years, our outdoor club, the Penobscot Paddle & Chowder Society (PPCS), held its annual multi-day fall outing in the park where we always had a full schedule of hiking, biking and sea kayaking.

Two years ago, the PPCS decided to change venues for the fall outing. After missing a park visit last fall, Nancy and I decided to return on our own.

Circumstances are different this year. I'm rehabbing from knee surgery and Nancy is recovering from some chronic joint issues. We were in search of hikes that would accommodate our current physical abilities and limitations.

After some research, we concluded that an ascent of Day Mountain in to be negotiated before arthe southeastern sector of the park would meet our needs. The relatively easy climb is unique in that it is the only peak in the park that has both a hiking trail and a Carriage Road that lead to the top. Since hiking up steep mountains is almost always easier and safer than descending, we decided to climb the hiking trail and possibly return on the Carriage Road.

We began our trek at the relatively new Day Mountain Trailhead located just outside of the park on Route 3 near Seal Harbor. We benefited from excellent hiking weather enjoying a cool, partly sunny fall day.

After crossing the highway, we entered Day Mountain Trail on a wide unobstructed path in a mixed conifer and hardwood forest. After a short distance, the trail passes Champlain Monument erected in honor of the French explorer, Samuel Champlain, who is credited with naming Mount Desert Island when he sailed past

Soon after, we traversed a lengthy log bridge and crossed the Carriage Road at a junction where the road begins the climb to the summit. We reentered the hiking trail on the left of the Carriage Road and began climbing more steadily. Soon after, a succession of steep ledges had riving at a massive boulder that provided a partial view of Seal Harbor and the islands beyond.

After another Carriage Road crossing, extended open ledges dominated the trail and led to an even larger boulder that provided a phenomenal view of the entire Cranberry Isles archipelago. We lingered to reminisce about a PPCS sea kayak trip to the most distant island in the chain, Baker Island. During that memorable voyage, we stopped to visit the ancient Baker Island Lighthouse and then traversed the island for a dance on famed Dancing Rock. A bumpy circumnavigation of the island followed.

Leaving fond memories behind, we persisted up the most precipitous ledges on the trail before arriving at the summit. The Carriage Road ends with a loop at the summit. We stopped on a huge boulder for a lunch break while enjoying additional outstanding views of the islands in the south.

The intimidating ledges near the top convinced us to descend on the longer Carriage Road. Initially, we enjoyed the added benefit of marvelous ocean views facing southwest. We made the right choice as the crushed rock surface and gentle grade were welcome relief for our recovering joints.

We had not seen anyone during the trip until rounding a sharp bend at about the road's midway point. A team of cyclists were persevering up the steady incline. Heavily dressed for the cold weather, they didn't need the warm clothing for the arduous climb.

friendly greetings as they passed. Nancy and I were reminded of a fall bike ride we had taken to the summit with close friends two decades ago.


The remainder of our descent to the trailhead was uneventful. More hikes are planned for the coming days.

#### **Maine nominees to US Military** Service Academies announced

Admission to the United States Coast Guard Academy, also a federal service academy, does not require a congressional nomination.





#### Maine Creates initiative to strengthen community wellbeing

people through the power

Launched in spring 2025, Maine Creates invests in local creativity as a meaningful response to challenges. community More than 35 teaching artists have already completed the training program, and five artists were selected to receive grants to implement community-centered arts projects across the state. These projects are now underway in libraries, a correctional re-entry center, community hubs, rural towns, and schools-each tailored to address local needs through collaborative, intergenerational art making.

Beth Wilbur Van Mierlo the Executive Director of Side x Side shared, "Decades of research show measurable outcomes when people engage in meaningful art making. We see gains in cognitive flexibility, emotional regulation, and social connection. These aren't just abstract benefits; they lead to stronger schools, communities, healthier and individuals who feel a deeper sense of agency and belonging. By training Teaching Artists to embed the arts where people live, learn, and gather, we ignite creativity, foster personal growth, and strengthen the social fabric that helps communities thrive. This is the transformative power of Maine Creates—and why every person should have access to it."

Building on this vision, the Maine Arts Commission underscores the ripple effect already emerging from the program's first year.

"Maine shows how artists can transform community life when they are empowered to contribute their creativity, compassion, and expertise," said Amy Hausmann, Executive Director of the Maine Arts Commission. "This pilot program demonstrates that teaching artists are addressing real needs, easing isolation, strengthening families, and opening doors for people of all ages to feel seen, heard, and connected. Their work embodies the spirit of our mission and the promise of this program. We look forward to nurturing and growing Maine Creates in the years to come."

In recent years, the Maine Arts Commission traveled across the state to listen to residents describe pressing community challenges. A clear theme emerged: many Maine people, particularly those in under-resourced communities, experience isolation, disconnection, and limited access to meaningful creative opportunities.

Maine Creates was developed directly in response to these findings. Through comprehensive training and ongoing mentorship, the program equips teaching artists to bring arts-based solutions into Maine's towns and cities. The goal is simple and powerful: ensure that every community has access to the transformative benefits of creativity.

"Maine Creates is rooted in our shared commitment to access and creativity. By advancing the field of teaching artistry, we can move the mystery of creativity into a shared experience—one that makes imagination and boundless possibility accessible to all," added Both

Nationwide research from social science, public health, and neuroscience demonstrates that participation in the arts:

Strengthens social ties, belonging, and civic engagement

Builds intergenerational connection and cultural continuity

Side x Side mentors each teaching artist throughout the year-long process, with every project culminating in a community celebration that honors both the artwork created and the relationships built. By June 2026, Maine Creates will have engaged hundreds of youth and adults statewide.

Looking Ahead: Funding Needed to Expand Statewide Impact

Side x Side and the Maine Arts Commission aim to build on the strong momentum of this inaugural year. The partners are currently seeking funding to launch a second Maine Creates training cohort in spring 2026. With additional support, the program will train another group of teaching artists and fund five new community projects, bringing creativity, connection, and wellbeing to even more Maine communities

#### **Updates on Eastern Trail "Close** the Gap" Project

SCARBOROUGH,

ME - The Eastern Trail is a vital multi-use trail of state-wide significance in Maine. The trail extends 65 miles from South Portland to Kittery, and travels by scenic woods, tidal marshes, and classic Maine villages. Since its Scarborough developments from 2004-2006, the trail has provided millions of people with a recreational and transportation resource that connects them to the beautiful Maine landscape.

A key piece of trail is missing in Scarborough. A 1.6-mile "gap" interrupts off-road travel between South Portland and Saco. The construction of this critical trail segment will close this gap and provide 16 continuous off-road miles reaching from South Portland's Bug Light to Downtown Saco. The cost to close this gap is \$4.1 million dollars. Funding was sourced from the Town of Scarborough, City of South Portland, Maine Department of Transportation, Eastern Trail Alliance individual and corporate donors, and state and federal funds.

After several years of work to raise the necessary funds, complete the project design, align stakeholders, and acquire the necessary permits and land rights, the project went out to bid in Spring 2025 and construction began in June.

Project Overview Shaw Brothers will be conducting trail con-





struction work from June 2025 to an estimated completion date of October 2027. Work will be completed in two phases:

Phase I: Pleasant Hill Road to Wainwright Sports Complex (South Portland). Estimated completion by October 2026

Phase II: Nonesuch River crossing (off Eastern Road extension) to Pleasant Hill Road. Estimated completion by October



Phase II requires the construction of two bridges, one over the Nonesuch River off Eastern Road in Scarborough and the other crossing the railroad track near Pleasant Hill Road. Additional conditions include working with the railroad company (CSX) and power line company (CMP), as the trail will go over the tracks and along the power lines.







#### Drive safe & sober on the roads this winter

Winter has fully arrived, bringing longer nights, colder days and the threat of snow and ice on the roads. For those driving in Maine, these tougher conditions require more caution and preparation. Drivers also face a range of winter-related fines, with extra rules designed to keep roads safe during severe weather.

The global car rental comparison site Discover-Cars.com has put together these tips on how to drive safely as the weather changes, to make the experience less stressful.

Watch out for winter fines. In the U.S., you could be fined starting from \$25 for having a vehicle covered in snow, or up to \$1,500 if snow or ice from your car causes damage to someone's property, or if it injures or kills someone. These fines vary by state. For example, in New Jersey, fines for having a snow-covered vehicle are between \$25-75, and if that snow causes damage to property or injures or kills someone, it can be \$200-\$1,000.

It's common to leave your engine idling to warm up the car in winter, but laws vary across the U.S. regarding how long it's acceptable to do this for. States and even cities have their own rules, with fines varying. In many states, the limit is 5 minutes. While in Connecticut the usual limit year round is 3 minutes, drivers can leave their engine running longer than this if it's below 20°F or

if the cold is putting their health and safety at risk.

Check your route ahead of time. Before setting off this winter, it's important to check the weather conditions on your route. You don't want to get caught in heavy snow or a storm that can disrupt vour journey. Make sure you stay up to date on the latest weather conditions and travel disruptions in your area and where you'll be heading.

Prepare an emergency kit. It's a good idea to put together a breakdown kit of everything you may need should you break down in the winter months. This should include a first aid kit with bandages, band-aids, antiseptic wipes and dressings for wounds and burns to treat any minor injuries. It's also worth keeping an ice scraper and jumper cables in your

Slow down. One of the most important things to remember when driving in snow or ice is to reduce your speed. Maintain a sturdy grip on your steering wheel and move forward at a slow and steady pace, changing to a higher gear for more control if you drive a manual car. Remember to maintain a safe stopping distance from the car in front of you, too.

Navigate bends carefully. When approaching a bend, it's best to brake before you start turning your wheel. If your car loses grip when doing this, firstly, don't panic. Keep your hands on the steering wheel and take your foot off the accelerator. Turn your wheels in the direction you want to go without taking your hands off the wheel. If you do skid, steer into it gently by moving in the same direction, so if your car slides left, steer that way too. Do this without braking hard and always keep your hands on the steering wheel.

Check your tires. Before you head out, remember to check the tread of your tires. If your tires are worn, this can stop your car from being able to grip the road properly and puts you at risk of aquaplaning. In most U.S. states, the minimum legal tread requirement for steer tires is 2/32 of an inch - regulations vary across different states, so if you're planning a road trip, make sure your vehicle is compliant.

Aleksandrs Buraks, Head of Growth at DiscoverCars.com, comments:

"Driving in the winter months can sometimes be stressful, especially for new drivers or when you're driving somewhere abroad. Remember to prep your car before setting off, ensuring your windshield is free of frost and your tires are in good condition.

"If you're planning on renting a car for your winter vacation this year, it's important to check the requirements for the state or country you'll be driving in. Some states and countries may require you to have winter tires and snow chains for maximum

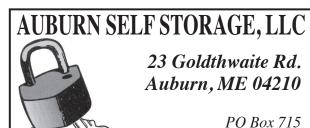


