Rep. Panetta **Announces Student** Winners of the 2025 Congressional App Challenge

nited States Representative Jimmy Panetta announced the student winners of the 2025 Congressional App Challenge for California's 19th Congressional District.

Sixty students from across California's 19th Congressional District participated in the challenge, developing 44 original apps tackling issues ranging from sustainability, education, and social justice. Student participants included middle and high school students from 18 different schools.

First place went to Saumit Pathak from Silver Creek High School for the creation of an innovative app, LeftoSense. This award highlights Saumit's outstanding achievement in leveraging technology to create meaningful impact on their community. Saumit will also be invited to the #HouseofCode Event in Washington D.C. in the Spring of 2026 alongside other student innovators and have LeftoSense exhibited in the U.S. Capitol.

Saumit's app, LeftoSense, is a web application that utilizes AI to determine if the food is still safe for consumption or is beginning to spoil and then directs the user to the nearest donation point through Google Maps. By addressing concerns about food safety and making it easy to donate food, LeftoSense will help communities reduce food waste, stay healthy, and give people the ability to make better food choices.

Swarasai Mulagari from Evergreen Valley High School received second place for creating the app ShineUp, which serves as a starting point for people looking for clearer, healthier skin.

Bryan Hu and Jun Jiang from Valley Christian High School received third place for creating the app Billion, which uses AI to analyze complex government websites and documents to summarize them, helping people stay informed about government actions and political developments.

The Congressional App Challenge promotes student innovation, creativity, and engage-



ment in computer science through competition and the creation of a new digital application or "app."

"Our country appreciates the talent, drive, and ingenuity of our students to discover new technological solutions to real-world problems," said Rep. Panetta. "I am proud to continue to provide an outlet through the annual Congressional App Competition for students to not only test their digital skills but also to see how they can make a difference in our community. Congratulations to all the partic-



ipants in the App Challenge for creating amazing apps that exemplify California's 19th Congressional District's leadership in tech and deep-rooted commitment to service."

Winning apps are eligible to be displayed in the U.S. Capitol building and featured on the House of Representatives website, www.

already received surplus energy payments.

The city launched San Jose Clean Energy in 2019 as a means of providing residents with electric power from low-emission sources, including wind, solar, geothermal and hydroelectric. Today, the company sells energy to nearly all San Jose residents, though PG&E still transmits and distributes the power and also handles billing.

San Jose Clean Energy officials said the upcoming rebate is intended in part to offset the expected increase of a state-mandated fee paid by PG&E customers, which could begin Jan. 1.

"Issuing the credit now ensures that customers see a benefit on their January 2026 bills - typically a high-bill period — prior to the implementation of new (San Jose Clean Energy) rates in March 2026," San Jose Clean Energy Director Lori Mitchell wrote in a memo sent to the City Council.

A spokesperson for PG&E said its rates have declined over the past two years and are expected to drop again at the start of the new year.

City officials say San Jose Clean Energy has benefited from a mild summer this year, which helped reduce energy consumption and lower costs. With money pouring in, the company's rate stabilization reserve — which will fund the rebate payments — more than doubled over the last fiscal year, reaching \$106 million, according to the memo.

Councilmembers, who oversee San Jose Clean Energy, signed off on the rebate plan during their Tuesday meeting. During deliberations, Mayor Matt Mahan cheered the rebate and the modest financial windfall it will bring to residents.

"In a time when California's No. 1 concern is cost of living ... I am glad that we are showing that when we achieve savings, we can return those to folks and do our best to keep rates low," Mahan said at the meeting.

Eventful year noted: D8 youth sports expanded

s we wrap up another eventful year in District 8, I want to take a moment

to thank everyone who contributed to Mary's 15th Annual Warm for Winter Coat

Due to the generosity of our community, hundreds of families and individuals in need will receive the warmth and security they deserve. I also want to extend my appreciation to everyone who came to Santa at the Square. Evergreen Village Square came alive with a jolly visit from Santa and activities from our community partners; what a wonderful way to end the year!

Many of you likely heard about the Black Friday shooting at Valley Fair Mall, a stark reminder of why upstream investments in youth programming and public safety are so essential. That's why, during this year's budget, I championed funding to expand youth sports in District 8 (shoutout to Mayor Matt for his support). With those dollars, and in partnership with the San Jose Earthquakes and several community organizations, we launched Saturday Night Lights (SNL). SNL is an after-school futsal program that gives

kids a safe, positive place to be on Friday and Saturday nights, when too many of our youth have limited options.

The results speak for themselves:

- 100% of 8th-grade participants were promoted to high school, including students previously at risk
- 30% increase in school attendance among participants
- Zero disciplinary incidents
- Stronger peer relationships and collabo-

ration among all participants

Investing in our youth, rather than criminalization, builds the foundation for long-term community safety and long-term success and should be a priority. Having experienced firsthand how transformative sports can be, I will continue to strongly advocate for the expansion of this program across San José and am committed to scaling SNL citywide in the upcoming budget. I also want to extend thanks to Supervisor Arenas, who secured \$40,000 in the County budget for Phase Two

of SNL, which we are working to launch in

City Hall will be closed through January 4th for the holidays. My office will be monitoring emails sent to district8@sanjoseca.gov. Please note that responses may be slightly delayed.

On behalf of the District 8 team, I wish you a joyous holiday season and a Happy New Year. We look forward to an exciting 2026!

Panetta, LaHood reintroduce bipartisan legislation to simplify retirement savings options for seniors

S Representatives Jimmy Panetta (CA-19) and Darin LaHood (IL-16) reintroduced the Retirement Simplification and Clarity Act.

The bipartisan legislation can provide more flexibility and clearer guidance to Americans navigating retirement savings decisions. The bill would empower individuals with options and digestible information for securing their financial futures.

"Navigating the various methods of saving for retirement can get very complicated, very fast," said Rep. Panetta. "This bipartisan bill helps Americans plan for retirement by making the process simpler and giving them more flexibility. By helping Americans make informed decisions about their savings, we can strengthen their financial security for retirement and the years ahead."

Specifically, the Retirement Simplification and Clarity Act would implement key recommendations from the Government Accountability Office (GAO) to streamline the complicated 402(f) notice process. A 402(f) notice is the document provided to

individuals who leave an employer and request a distribution from their 401(k) plans. The notice outlines distribution options and their tax implications.

Under the bill, the IRS would be directed to redesign this notice in clear, straightforward language. The revised version would provide plain explanations of all distribution options, including rolling over savings into a new plan or leaving them in the current one, so that individuals can make well-informed decisions about their retirement funds. Additionally, the legislation would broaden in-service rollover options by allowing individuals aged 50 and older to transfer funds from their employer-sponsored 401(k) accounts into an annuity account.
