

Appeals Board Going Active

FLORENCE — The City of Florence is taking steps to activate its Board of Appeals, a body established by ordinance in 2003 with the adoption of the Building Code,

to ensure a fair and transparent appeals process for building and property maintenance code enforcement actions.

Although the Board was legally created, it has remained inactive due to a lack of appointed members. The City Council is now moving forward with appointing members so the board can begin fulfilling its intended role under the City's adopted codes, including the International Property Maintenance Code.

"The Board of Appeals is an important part of ensuring fairness and accountability in how the City enforces its building and property maintenance codes," said Mayor **Ron Tyler**. "Reactivating this Board strengthens our ability to protect neighborhoods, address unsafe conditions, and serve our residents responsibly."

The Board of Appeals will hear appeals of decisions made by the Building Official, review alternative compliance methods that meet life-safety standards, and provide an avenue for property owners to challenge enforcement actions. The board will also support the city's ability to respond to imminent danger situations involving unsafe structures and hazardous living conditions.

The Board will consist of five regular members and two alternates, appointed by the City Council. Members are selected based on experience or technical knowledge in construction-related fields such as building, engineering, architecture, or related trades. There is no residency requirement. Initial appointments will be staggered, with all subsequent terms serving three years.

There is no budget impact associated with activating the Board.



the door to help neighbors in need.

"I want to continue where my parents left off and help my community," Oliver said. "There are not many people close to my age serving, and I want to encourage others to serve their community."

Balancing athletics and emergency service isn't easy. A typical week for Oliver includes early-morning workouts, classes, afternoon practices, and calls whenever she is available. Oliver has officially been serving as a volunteer firefighter since July of 2025, but she has been on approximately 80 calls.

According to Oliver, the most rewarding part of being a volunteer firefighter is being able to help someone on what might be the worst day of their life. "Knowing that I might be able to save someone's life, help an elderly person in my community they may have fallen, or even rescue a personal item from burning that is really sentimental, that makes it all worth it."

Patriots head softball coach Angel Brown says Oliver knows what it means to stand in the line of fire.

"As a pitcher, Bri (Brianna) faces every inning with the same courage and composure that define a firefighter — calm in chaos, quick to decide, and fearless when the pressure is highest," Brown said. "No matter the situation on the field, she sacrifices her body without hesitation for her team. The traits she's built on the mound mirror the ones needed as a volunteer firefighter: strength, resilience, and the heart to step forward when others step back."

Oliver hopes her journey encourages young girls in her community to chase big dreams.

"I want them to know they can do it all," she said. "You can be an athlete. You can be a firefighter. Don't let anyone tell you otherwise."

As she continues her studies and her softball career at Northwest Shoals, Oliver is not sure what her career will look like, but she does plan for it to include being a volunteer firefighter.

"I plan on doing this as long as I can. At the end of the day, I just want to make a difference," she said.

RTHP Funds Approved

MONTGOMERY – Governor Kay Ivey last week announced that Alabama has officially received its award figure from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) for the federal Rural Health Transformation Program (RHTP), formally approving Alabama's plan and unlocking \$203,404,327 in first-year funding. The five-year program is part of the One Big Beautiful Bill Act, with legislation that looks to help improve healthcare access, quality, and outcomes in the state. Funds will be administered by the Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs

Congress passed the One Big Beautiful Bill Act in July and was signed by the President Trump. Shortly after the law's passage, Governor Ivey directed state agencies to begin developing a comprehensive rural health strategy to ensure Alabama was prepared for the launch.

"After the passage and signing, Alabama got to work preparing for this program so we could hit the ground running once our state's new comprehensive rural health strategy was approved," Ivey said.

The plan includes 11 initiatives:

- Collaborative Electronic Health Record (EHR), IT and Cybersecurity Initiative
- Rural Health Initiative
- Maternal and Fetal

The SEARCH grant was substantial enough to cover the cost of an engineering planning study that identified the weakest parts of the system along with a cost estimate for repair and replacement.

This study was crucial as many state and federal funding opportunities require detailed preliminary engineering reports before a village can move forward with its application.

Community leaders say this award will be a step in the process of creating a safer, more reliable, and more efficient water system.

A simple, free library card allows patrons access to digital services like e-books and audiobooks, the library's Wi-Fi, public computers, and all books and DVDs.

The fine for an overdue book is 15¢/day with a cap of \$5 per book. The fine for an overdue DVD is \$1/day with a cap of \$5.

Library Public Affairs Coordinator Sherhonda Allen said more than 75,000 books were checked out or renewed for checkout in 2025, and that just applies to adults.

"That's fiction, nonfiction, eBooks and audiobooks combined," Allen said. "And there were almost 3,000 new cards issued to our patrons this year."

Those included 1,758 for adults, 719 for those younger than 18, and more than 300 eCards.

"We are so fortunate to have a community that supports their public library and uses it in these high numbers," Allen said. "We look forward to continuing to serve our remarkable community in the coming year."







administration, and my research uncovered not only that these groups received federal grants but that many of them sued the Trump administration to block his policies — particularly to keep the gravy train flowing. I testified in Congress about this research twice, and the Dao Prize honored me for it by designating me as a finalist.

The Trump administration cut off the funding streams for immigration groups that moved illegal aliens across the country. The Environmental Protection Agency clawed back extravagant grants to climate alarmist groups. The State Department shuttered the U.S. Agency for International Development. Congress finally cut off funding for National Public Radio and the Public Broadcasting Service.

After Scott Walter and I highlighted the leftist nonprofits that worked with Arabella Advisors, Microsoft founder Bill Gates withdrew his

foundation's entanglement with them, and Arabella Advisors purportedly dissolved, leading to the emergence of new entities.

Contrary to leftist fearmongering, civil society remains strong. Americans remain free to contribute to causes they believe in, we just aren't being forced to do so with our tax dollars anymore.

LOSER: Transgender Ideology

Candidate Trump campaigned on protecting children and bringing back sanity on gender. He has delivered on this promise in spades.

Trump's executive order declaring the basic truth that human beings are male and female corrected major abuses of the Biden administration.

In May, the Department of Health and Human Services published a review of the science, finding extremely weak evidence for the claim that "sex-rejecting procedures" — grotesque medical interventions that trans activists refer to as

"gender-affirming care" — have any positive effects.

A peer-review process confirmed this finding and highlighted why transgender activists seek to silence their opponents, rather than engaging with them.

HHS ended the year by announcing six major policy moves against "sex-rejecting procedures," which will prevent your tax dollars from funding "treatments" that leave kids stunted, scarred, and infertile.

In June, the Supreme Court upheld Tennessee's right to protect kids from these procedures.

LOSER: The Fourth Branch of Government

The president hasn't just been cutting back government spending — he's also paring back the unaccountable bureaucracy.

Trump has cleaned house at federal agencies, and he is now forcing the Supreme Court to consider, once and for all, whether there are parts of the executive branch

that fall outside of the president's control.

While the Constitution clearly vests all executive power in the president, Congress has established so-called independent agencies. In *Humphrey's Executor v. United States* (1935), the Supreme Court upheld the Federal Trade Commission as an agency not subject to the president's Article II authority because it engaged in "quasi-legislative" and "quasi-judicial" functions. Now, the court seems on the verge of rightly reversing that ruling and returning executive power to the people's elected president.

WINNER: Border Security

Former President Joe Biden repeatedly insisted that he needed new laws to address the border crisis, but Trump effectively solved the issue on Day One with executive orders, finally directing the feds to enforce the laws on the books.

An estimated 10 million





illegal aliens entered the country on Biden's watch, but border crossings hit record lows this year and remain a tiny fraction of what they were under the former president.

**WINNER: Trump
Peace Deals**

Trump has taken credit for ending eight wars.

While his celebration on this might seem premature, Trump has indeed brokered agreements to stop fighting and taken decisive action that ended conflicts.

For example, the brief war between Israel and Iran ended after the U.S. bombed Iranian nuclear sites in a show of force and

after Trump urged Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to immediately secure peace with Iran following the strikes.

Although India downplayed Trump's role in securing peace between New Delhi and its long-time rival Pakistan, the Pakistani prime minister nominated the American president for a Nobel Peace Prize.

Trump achieved a historic ceasefire and hostage release deal between Israel and Hamas this fall, securing the release of the final living Israeli hostages from Hamas.

While the war between Russia and Ukraine rages on, and Trump's strikes on drug boats off the coast of Venezuela may lead to a conflict, the President can rightly take credit for securing many peace deals.

When the Nobel Committee refused to award Trump the Nobel Peace Prize, the FIFA World Cup awarded him its inaugural peace prize.

**WINNER: Political
Violence**

This year saw an alarming increase in political violence, particularly from the Left.

Many on the Left raised money to help the alleged murderer of a health care CEO.

In May, a gunman yelling, "Free Palestine," shot and killed a Jewish couple outside the National Jewish Museum in Washington, D.C.

In June, a man allegedly murdered former Minnesota House Speaker Melissa Hortman, her husband, and shot state Sen. John Hoffman and his wife, both of whom survived. A few days after the assassination, a Democratic Party lobbyist reportedly sent text messages to a former friend of an opposing political viewpoint. The lobbyist wrote, "Excited to have my gun at the capitol and blow somebody's face off."

On August 27, a man who legally changed his name to affirm a transgender identity shot and killed two children and injured thirty others at a school mass at the Church of the Annunciation in Minneapolis.

On September 10, a man in a relationship with another man who identifies as transgender allegedly murdered Turning Point USA founder Charlie Kirk. Many on the Left celebrated Kirk's death. A church celebrating Kirk faced an arson attempt, and many Kirk memorials faced vandalism.

**WINNER: Affordability
Messaging**

The president has rightly called Democrats' attempt to blame him for cost-of-living struggles a "con job," because the root of most recent inflation is the excessive government spending during the COVID-19 pandemic.

That said, "affordability" clearly resonates with voters, and that helps explain the Democrats' victories in November. Americans want to see lower prices and higher wages, and Vice President JD Vance addressed the issue earlier this month.

Trump's policies have addressed some drivers of the affordability crisis—such as an all-of-the-above energy strategy that drives down energy prices—and many Americans may look forward to tax cuts in the "One Big, Beautiful Bill."

Expect affordability to remain a political issue, at least in the near term.

**WINNER: Conservative
Media**

Trump opened the White House briefing room to alternative media, including new conservative outlets. While *The Daily Signal* has long had a presence in the White House, Biden briefly excluded *The Daily Signal* and other journalists. Trump, by contrast, has

opened the briefing room to new outlets, allowing increased transparency.

The Trump administration has also bucked the trend for Washington Republicans. For too long, Republicans in D.C. would go to left-leaning outlets like *The New York Times* and *The Washington Post* with exclusive stories, hoping to curry favor. Now, the Trump administration has worked with outlets like *The Daily Signal*.

My colleague, White House Correspondent Elizabeth Mitchell, has become a scoop machine, and FBI Director Kash Patel gave me the scoop on the bureau swearing off the Southern Poverty Law Center.





Frozen to Death in the 21st Century

Editor,

How can we have heated streets for cars, but not heated homes for babies? How can we build heated bus shelters for people waiting fifteen minutes, but not for families waiting a lifetime for housing? In Gaza today, life has become a battle against the elements, against hunger, and against despair. Among the ruins of bombed-out homes and flooded streets, a two-week-old baby named Muhammad Khalil Abu al Khair FROZE TO DEATH.

Is there any excuse, any justification, that can explain a baby dying of a cold in a world with central heating, charity drives, and holiday fundraisers?

We have the technology to alert a phone when a package is left in the rain, but no alarm bell rings when a child's core temperature plummets in a city of millions. We deliver hot food to our doorsteps in minutes. Why is delivering basic warmth to a doorstep a logistical impossibility? We have weather satellites that can track a storm forming over an ocean. Do we not have the moral foresight to track the storm of deprivation gathering over a human being? We build submarines that can explore the crushing depths of the Mariana Trench and rovers that photograph the dust of Mars. But we claim it is a "complex challenge" to deliver a solar-powered heater and a tarp to a family sleeping in a rain-soaked tent.

Our priorities are not flawed: They are corrupt.

Yes! Little Khalil did not "die." He was murdered by the policy of a blockade that values the security of a border more than the life of a child. He was murdered by a vote in a parliament that funded more weapons but choked off medicine. He was murdered by the cowardice of every world leader who calls for "restraint" while children freeze to death. His autopsy would list hypothermia, but the truth is murder by political decision.

We have air-conditioned dog kennels and data servers that never dip below 70°F. But we lack the basic humanity to guarantee that a human child does not succumb to

the elements. Explain that hierarchy of compassion. Name one justification. Go ahead. Try to explain why a box of donated blankets sat undistributed while a newborn froze. There is none. Only evil.

Medicare Minute

Qualifying for Medicare

When I began working with Medicare health plans a few years ago it became obvious to me that people aging into Medicare were joining a health insurance program that they really didn't understand. Although the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) do all they can to educate Americans about the benefits of Medicare it still isn't enough for them to fully understand what they have as far as medical coverage through the federal government. Over the next few weeks we're going to discuss the basics of and what is covered under Medicare. But first let's look at how Medicare started.

On July 30, 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed into law the bill, Title XVIII of the Social Security Act, which led to the establishment of Medicare. The original bill included Part A (Hospital Insurance) and Part B (Medical Insurance). Today we know these 2 parts as "Original Medicare". In the beginning Medicare was created to provide health insurance to people 65 years of age and older, regardless of income or medical history.

Over the past five decades changes have been made as to who qualifies for Medicare. In addition to people over the age of 65, Medicare now covers people under the age of 65 who are permanently disabled and have been receiving Social Security Disability Insurance for 24 months. Also anyone at any age can receive Medicare if they have End Stage Renal Disease or ALS.

Although Medicare provides medical coverage for those who qualify it is not 100% coverage!! We often hear "once I go on Medicare my medical insurance worries are over." Medicare has deductibles and coinsurance that the Medicare beneficiary is responsible for unless the beneficiary has additional coverage to supplement Medicare.

workers compensation act is deeply flawed. It's not their job to fix it, it's their job to apply it.

The gentleman was completely unhappy with the scarring that resulted from the surgery he had because he was injured on the job. Completely understandable, but also not worth any money under the law. Now in a different kind of personal injury case, a jury could and likely would compensate a person for scarring.

Here's an example: If a person is injured on the job and has surgery and that surgery has a great result with no impairment rating, meaning that the full range of motion and strength was restored, and they were able to return to their job at the same wages and hours, their case is worth \$0.00. Now, you should have been paid two-thirds of your usual wages, and all your medical bills should have been paid. Still, no one in their right mind would go through an injury and surgery for money, much less for free.

That is absolutely unfair. Every judge I've ever met agrees with that, but there is nothing they can do about it. And there's two sides to the story. Employers don't think it's fair that they have to pay if someone gets hurt on the job, regardless of whose fault it was. Employers don't like having to pay workers compensation premiums that go up when someone gets hurt. The amount of the workers comp insurance premium for employers in the building trades like roofers, can make the difference between profitability or the inability to win a bid.

There are many ways that a good personal injury lawyer can help an injured person. Knowing the law and putting the client first is a great place to start. That said, understanding limitations of the law can streamline the process. Hire a lawyer you trust and listen to their advice.

Moments in Time



• On Jan. 5, 1914, Henry Ford made the welcome announcement that he was doubling his assembly-line employees' pay. However, there was a perhaps not-so-welcome catch -- home inspections to check for alcohol consumption and untidy living quarters.

• On Jan. 6, 1996, snow began blanketing Washington, D.C., and the eastern seaboard in a blizzard that killed 154 people and ended up costing more than a billion dollars in damages before it ended.

• On Jan. 7, 1891, future novelist and folklorist Zora Neale Hurston was born in Notasulga, Alabama. Though she would eventually publish more books than any other Black woman in America, by the time she died in 1960 she'd failed to gain a mainstream audience and was poor and alone in a welfare hotel. Today she is considered one of the most important Black writers in American history.

• On Jan. 8, 1963, Leonardo da Vinci's masterpiece, the Mona Lisa, was exhibited for the first time in the U.S. at Washington, D.C.'s National Gallery of Art. More than 2,000 dignitaries, including President John F. Kennedy, came out to view it. The exhibit opened to the public the following day.

• On Jan. 9, 1984, Angelo Buono, one of the Hillside Stranglers, was sentenced to life in prison for his role in the rape, torture and murder of 10 young women in Los Angeles. His cousin and partner in crime, Kenneth Bianchi, testified against Buono to escape the death penalty himself.

• On Jan. 10, 1863, the London Tube, the world's first urban underground railway, opened. Since its first tunnel ran under the River Thames and had no ventilation, it was always filled with smoke.

• On Jan. 11, 1775, Francis Salvador, the first Jewish person to hold an elected office in the Americas, took his seat on the South Carolina Provincial Congress. In July he earned the nickname the "Southern

Paul Revere" when he rode 30 miles to warn of a Cherokee attack on backcountry settlements, and just a month later he became the first recorded Jewish soldier to be killed in the Revolutionary War. (c) 2026 King Features Synd., Inc.


