

Russellville to host January 19th Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Commemoration March

Russellville will be the host site for this year's Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Commemoration March set for Monday, January 19th.

The annual event rotates among Lauderdale, Colbert and Franklin Counties each year as an important time for reflection, community service and celebration of King's contributions to the Civil Rights Movement.

The January 19th program is being organized by the Franklin County Branch of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Memorial Scholarship

Committee.

This year's theme is 'From Dreams to Reality, the Work Continues: The Courage to Care, The Power of Change.'

The march will begin at 11 a.m., at the A.W. Todd Centre in downtown Russellville and will proceed to the steps of the Franklin County Courthouse before returning to the Todd Centre, where a special program will highlight the life and accomplishments of Dr. King. A meal will be served following the short program.

Speakers at the January 19th event include the Reverend Dr. John H. Curry, Senior Pastor, Mt. Olive

With the recent completion of a \$6.2 million expansion and renovation building project, the Career and Technical Education Department will allow more students than ever to





Back to the Bible by Larsen Plyler: Matthew 10:5-25

Jesus sent the apostles on what is called the "Limited Commission." They were to go to the lost sheep of the house of Israel, not to the Gentiles or Samaritans (remember 9:36). They were to carry on Jesus' work of teaching and healing. They were not to try to make money with their work. They had freely received the power, so they were to give freely. Jesus told them to travel light and be ready to go. They were to be provided food as they journeyed. These were special instructions for the moment. Later journeys would require preparation and financial support (see I Cor. 9:1-18).

They needed to find people "worthy" to stay with. A worthy house received peace. An unworthy house wouldn't. Worthiness was not determined by the house's comfort, but by its response to the apostle's preaching. If a house or town did not listen, the apostle was to leave and shake the dust off their feet—a sign of rejection. At judgment it would be better for Sodom and Gomorrah than for a town that rejected the apostles.

But, the apostles needed to anticipate rejection—and worse. Jesus previews what they'd experience in the short and long term.

They were sheep in the middle of wolves. So, they needed to be snake-like wisdom and dove-like innocence. They'd be dragged before courts and officials and beaten. But, Jesus promised that the Spirit would give them the words to speak.

This would even bring divisions within families. The apostles would be hated. But, endurance to the end promised salvation.

They needed to engage as many cities as possible before Jesus' coming. (I take it that He is referencing Dan. 7:13-14 regarding the establishment of His kingdom (see v. 7 and 16:28). Rejection was a signal to move on.

Disciples and servants get what their teacher and master got. They called Jesus "Beelzebul" (a name for Satan). They'd do the same and worse to those who follow Him.

Lessons to Learn:

Reception of the apostles reflected reception of Jesus. Rejection of the apostles reflected rejection of Jesus. To reject their words puts us in a dreadful position in view of judgment. It would be worse for them than for Sodom and Gomorrah because they had the miracles and teachings right there in front of them and they still rejected it!

The apostles knew suffering was coming. The apostles followed Jesus and taught His word even though there was no promise of earthly gain and warnings of suffering. That speaks to their commitment to the authenticity of their message. It was no "get rich" scheme. Seeing the way the apostles will suffer in their labor should make us consider their words carefully.

King's legacy is the continued fight for racial equality, justice and human rights through nonviolent means. Dr. King's efforts led to the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

His vision is as important and meaningful in 2025 as it was 60 years ago, as his message continues to inspire civil rights activists across the globe.

What distinguished King from other civil rights advocates was his masterful use of non-violent resistance, including peaceful protests and civil disobedience, all rooted in love and empathy, that challenged segregation and discrimination against all groups.

His legacy lives on in ongoing societal struggles against racism, voter suppression and economic disparities still faced by many Americans today.

At its January 5th meeting, the Russellville City Council approved a resolution recognizing the January 19th Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., holiday and supporting the efforts of the Franklin County Branch of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Scholarship Committee.

Russellville District Four Councilman Lonnie Freeman presented a framed copy of the resolution to committee members at the January 5th meeting.

force.

And Russellville High School students are taking notice, with a record 688 students this year taking or having completed at least two Career Tech courses. The program has seen record growth, with a growing itinerary of programs that will offer immediate certification for job market entry after high school.

Students who complete at least two career tech classes are more likely to be employed post-graduation, have higher income and are most likely to go on to college and earn a degree or certification.

And that's reason for Holland to smile.

"Our philosophy is the 'three E's,' employable, enrolled or enlist," Holland said. "We want to provide our students with training that will allow them to secure employment after high school, and dual enrollment courses to supplement their education if they choose to attend college and training to help prepare those wanting to enlist in the military."

"From elementary school up, we are exposing our students to the benefits of CTE. There's no longer a stigma that you have to go to college after high school. We have successful partnerships with our local economic development boards and local employers and manufacturers so that students will have that option available to them after graduation," she added.

One of those programs leading to immediate post-graduation employment is welding, with a newly-expanded state-of-the-art welding facility, a multi-million investment with 16 welding booths for students. That's double the capacity from past years and the facility was described as one of the best in Alabama by state administrators during a recent visit to RHS' Career Tech Center.

With the addition of seven new classrooms, this was the first significant upgrade/expansion for the Career Tech Building, constructed in 1970.

Students can enroll in CTE courses in Army JROTC, Automotive Technology, Building and Construction, Business Management and Administration, Business Information Technology (Computer Science), Cybersecurity, Engineering, Family and Consumer Science/Education Training, Finance, Fire Science, HVAC, Healthcare Science, Plant Science, Welding and Career Coach courses at RHS, as well as a Business Management & Administration course at Russellville Middle School.

The renovations included the addition of a bay that houses an operating fire station for Fire Science training and education. EMT and

Paramedic training is another new addition for Career Tech at Russellville.

Along with Career Coach Alissa Moore, Holland has prioritized introducing Russellville City Schools students to Career Tech education and helping them learn they no longer have to make a choice between AP courses or Career Tech. Students may enroll in both, helping bolster their education and job marketability after graduation.

Time frame underway for individuals, businesses to support Russellville Hospital with dollar-for-dollar state tax credit

As of January 1, 2026, the window is now open for businesses and individuals wanting to support Russellville Hospital and/or any eligible Alabama rural hospital through a credit on their Alabama state taxes.

Recognizing the vital role rural hospitals play in the health of our communities, the Alabama Legislature created the Rural Hospital Investment Program, a new initiative that gives individuals, families, and businesses the opportunity to directly support rural hospitals like Russellville Hospital.

In return, donors receive a dollar-for-dollar credit on their Alabama state taxes.

"This program gives our community a meaningful way to care for us, just as we've been here to care for you," said Chris Ware, Russellville Hospital CEO. "By investing in your local hospital, you're not only keeping care close to home, you're helping secure a healthier, stronger future for our community."

Rural hospitals are unique. They consist of neighbors caring for neighbors, deeply rooted in the places they serve.

Beyond providing care 24/7, hospitals like Russellville Hospital create local jobs, support area businesses, and sponsor community traditions that bring people together. Contributions made through this program will help ensure that Russellville Hospital remains strong and ready to serve—today and for generations to come.

Here's how the program works:

- The Rural Hospital Investment Program began January 1, 2026.
- Contributions must be reserved and verified through the Alabama Department of Revenue's (ADOR) My Alabama Taxes system. (The procedures for reserving and claiming the credit will be posted on the ADOR website in December 2025.)
- Donors receive a state tax credit equal to the amount of their contribution, up to the following annual limits:
- Individuals: up to \$15,000
- Married couples filing jointly: up to \$30,000
- LLCs, S corporations, and partnerships: up to \$450,000
- Corporations: up to \$500,000

Once a credit reservation is made, donors have 30 days to complete their contribution. The hospital then verifies the donation through the ADOR system to finalize the tax credit.

"Every dollar contributed through this program stays here, supporting local healthcare for you and your family," said Ware. "This is an incredible opportunity for our community to come together and ensure access to care right here at home."

A full list of eligible hospitals will be available each year beginning December 1.

The Tharptown High School varsity girls' basketball team capped its Christmas with a jolly good trophy by winning the Berry High School Christmas Tournament championship on Monday, December 29.

In the follow-up boys' game, Phil Campbell earned a 54-37 road win over the Bulldogs.

The Bobcats took a lead in the first and never looked like surrendering it, outscoring the hosts in each of the first three quarters.

PCHS went up 15-11 to start the game and then doubled up on the Bulldogs in the second to take a 33-20 lead into the locker room at halftime.

By the end of the third quarter, the Bobcats had a 19-point advantage and were able to cruise to a final 17-point win.

Tharptown, aided by three-pointers from senior Alyssa Fischer and freshman Raeleigh Harrell, jumped up 19-12 after the first quarter, but a surge from Berry in the second sliced into the visitors' advantage. THS went into the break leading by just one point, 26-25.

Resuming play in the third quarter Tharptown was once again able to find its mojo, improving on its first period performance by dropping a massive 27 points. THS hit six three-pointers in those eight minutes, three of which came from Harrell who would go on to lead the Lady Wildcats with 23 points. Fifteen of the freshman's 23 points came from beyond the arch.

The Golden Tigers hung around with Pearl-Cohn in the first half, down 20-17 at the intermission, but coming out of the locker room in the third quarter the Firebirds began to pull away. RHS was outscored 21-6 in the third to make it 41-23 going into the final eight minutes of regulation. A solid 17 points for RHS in the fourth wasn't enough for the Golden Tigers to make up the deficit and they lost by 13.

Williams once again led the Golden Tigers with 21 points in the defeat.

The Bracy Invitational wrapped up on Monday with Russellville taking on South Lamar in the third place game. South Lamar, who lost to eventual tournament champion Deshler in the semifinal, came from behind to knock off Russellville in a low-scoring 42-38 game.

The Golden Tigers jumped out to a 12-10 advantage in the first period and added to that before halftime to take a 10-point, 23-13 lead into the locker room.

In the second half, however, the Stallions began to chip away at the deficit. The Golden Tigers, who struggled to rebound and hit shots in the final 16 minutes, saw their advantage closed to three points at the end of the third period before it completely evaporated early in the fourth.

With about seven minutes remaining, the Stallions took their first lead since the opening minutes of the first period. South Lamar, who led by as much as seven points at one point in the fourth, never surrendered the advantage once it grabbed it late.

"We kind of ran out of gas tonight," Odom told the *Franklin Free Press* after the game. "We're playing really hard, but I think we scored 13 or 15 points in the second half. We're still struggling to score consistently and that continues to be our Achilles' heel."



RBHS' Vinson headlines list of three local football players to receive ASWA All-State recognition

Three high school football student-athletes from Franklin County—one from Red Bay, one from Phil Campbell, and one from Russellville—were recognized on the 2025 Alabama Sports Writers Association All-State Football Teams, it was announced on Saturday.

Headlining the local selections was Red Bay senior running back Jaxon Vinson, who was tapped for the Class 2A All-State First Team Offense. Junior Hayston Scott of Phil Campbell and sophomore linebacker Braxton Duncan of Russellville were Honorable Mentions in Class 3A and Class 5A, respectively.

Red Bay's Vinson, also a *Franklin Free Press* All-Franklin County First Team running back and a Class 2A All-Region 8 First Team selection in 2025, is the Tigers' first All-State pick since offensive lineman Kyler Watson in 2023 and the first First Team selection for RBHS since another running back, Brady Hardin, in 2022.

"Jaxon is a really good player and an even better person," Red Bay head coach Tyler Jeffreys told the *FFP*. "In my opinion, he's one of, if not the best, running backs in 2A. He had a really good year, and he was really important for us this season. We counted

on him and he always came through for us.

"I think it's also a testament to our offensive line and the great job they did—and I think Jaxon would be the first one to agree with me on that," Jeffreys added.

Vinson finished his senior campaign with 2,038 yards rushing which, according to MaxPreps.com, was the most rushing yards in Class 2A this past season. Vinson averaged over nine yards per carry and scored 26 rushing touchdowns for the Tigers, playing a vital role in Red Bay capturing its first region title since 2019.

"I'm really proud of him and couldn't be happier for him," Jeffreys said.

Phil Campbell junior quarterback Hayston Scott was an Honorable Mention in Class 3A, making him the first Bobcat to receive All-State recognition since defensive lineman John Herring in 2021.

Scott, an FFP All-Franklin County First Team selection and a First Team All-Region 5 pick, was one of the top offensive players in the state during the regular season and ended the year with 2,833 yards of total offense. A 1,000-yard rusher the last two seasons, Scott threw the ball much more his junior campaign, finishing 2025 with 1,784 yards passing and 19 touchdowns. He added 1,049 yards on the ground and 11 rushing touchdowns, as well.

"I'm very proud of him," Phil Campbell head coach Jacob Hamilton said of Scott. "He's a great ball player and an even better person. He's a team player and shows great leadership on and off the field."

Rounding out the ASWA All-State players from Franklin County is Russellville's Braxton Duncan, a sophomore linebacker who was a Class 5A Honorable Mention.

Duncan led the Golden Tigers in total tackles (147) and tackles for loss (7.5). He also added three sacks, two interruptions and a fumble recovery.

"I'm happy for Braxton. He had a really good year and deserves the recognition," Russellville head coach Dustin Goodwin said. "We had a couple of other guys that should have been recognized, as well."

"Overall, I'm proud of our team and glad to see guys get noticed for their hard work and production on the field. Most importantly, I'm interested in what kind of teammate and person they are."

Duncan joins a long list of Russellville All-State selections, the 114th chosen by the ASWA since 1983.

Belgreen varsity basketball teams go on the road to sweep Hackleburg

The Belgreen High School varsity girls' and boys' basketball teams picked up road wins over Class 1A Hackleburg in their final games before Christmas on Monday.

The Belgreen girls, ranked No. 10 in Class 2A, defeated the Lady Panthers, ranked No. 4 in Class 1A, by a final score of 60-48; the BHS boys then beat Hackleburg 54-35.

The Belgreen girls opened their contest at Hackleburg with two 14-point periods in the first half to take a 28-22 lead into the halftime break. The Lady Bulldogs were then able to create more separation coming out of the locker room by outscoring HHS 20-9 in the third quarter.

Up by a comfortable 17 points heading into the final eight minutes, Belgreen allowed the hosts to outpace them for the first time all game, but the Lady Bulldogs' lead was sufficient for them to see the game out, winning by a 12-point margin.

It was a solid outing for the Lady Bulldogs who saw 12 players get time in the game and 10 different players score. Three BHS shooters hit double digits with Makenna Fisher leading the way. Fisher, who hit eight of her 10 free throws, had a game-high 22 points for Belgreen. Marlie Terry added 12 points for the Lady Bulldogs and Randi Terry scored 11.

The result—it was the Lady Bulldogs' second straight win—sees Belgreen improve its record to 9-5 overall this season.

The Belgreen boys, using two big periods going into and coming out of halftime, also walked away victorious over the Panthers.

Trailing by one point, 9-8, after the opening period, the Bulldogs went on a 17-5 run in the second to enter the halftime intermission up 25-14.

The third quarter looked similar to the second as, thanks to 11 third-period points by Aaron Rubido, Belgreen was able to outscore Hackleburg 18-6 and increase its lead to 23 points.

Hackleburg increased its production in the fourth period but only enough to cut four points off the deficit and Belgreen was able to secure the 19-point win over the hosts.

The Bulldogs were led by a game-high 21 points from Jake Dill and got another 19 from Rubido.

With the win, the BHS boys improved to 6-7 this campaign.
